As is your brother

Last year, approximately 600 students of BCIT signed over their caution account to Help Hope in aid of Variety Farm Training Center. The \$6,000 donated was the largest single contribution made to the now completed residence.

Help Hope '72 is our new campaign to help the Sun's Tiny Tim Fund. The fund this year is being used to build a Hydro Therapy Pool for the unfortunate victims of Cerebral Palsy. The pool is only a step towards completion of a C.P. Center in Surrey.

Cerebral Palsy is a disability resulting from damage to the brain before or during birth and outwardly manifested by muscular incoordination and speech

disturbances.

Treatment of C.P. patients require the use of a pool to assist in their physical development and coordination. At the present time the center has a \$7.95 plastic wading pool. Once a week the children travel 2 and a half miles by bus to the "Y" pool. For some children this can be very time consuming.

The Help Hope '72 campaign will run from Monday, Jan 10 to Wednesday, Feb 9/72. During the campaign, the Sun paper will carry two articles on BCIT

contribution to Tiny Tim. The final announcement will be made on the Variety Club Telethon to be held Feb 12-13/72.

## RESIDENCES ENTANGLED IN BUREAUCRATIC BULL SHIT

No B.C.I.T. did not get her Christmas present this year. The Boys in Victoria feel that B.C.I.T.'s role should remain a glorified high school. Residences at B.C.I.T. are obviously not a priority for Donald Brothers nor are they for Jack White (Superintendent of Tech. & Voc. curriculum) or Mr. Webb (deputy minister of Public Works) or Mr. Chant.

A delegation from B.C.I.T. went to Victoria to present a proposal on Residences which has been worked on for over four years. The delegation went with high hopes of securing premission for a construction start in March.

The permission was not secured

Discussions centered not on the Residence but on the future of the Institute. Brothers stated that the campus could not afford to spare land for residences. Then he was told of kow the campus is presently being hacked here and hewed there by takeovers such as the Dept. of Highways and the Motor Vehicle testing station. After this revelation hit Brothers admitted there were mistakes and that they were beginning to worry him.

Brothers then pointed out that expansion of B.C.I.T.

## residences

may not continue in an ever increasing spiral, but another institute may be established at a different location.

Brothers inquired "If we do build another (institute) then what will happen to the residence".

Lauried Jack's reply was "Even if another institute is established there will still be a need for accommodation for those people in the lower mainland or for those that choose B.C.I.T. over another institute. The first stage of the residence building will only accommodate 7% of the planned expanded campus".

Jack White, Superintendent of Technical and Vocational Curriculum attended the meeting but seemed to get confused between the two hats he wears and jumped from for to against with the end result of being a good seat warmer. But he wasn't alone,

Mr. Webb, Deputy Minister of Public Works choose to pick apart the report on details swaying from the purpose of the meeting. (It's obvious that the writer is prejudice and admits it). He seemed to be upset about students taking the initiative to do this work when it should come from his department

but he can't be held for the entire blame. Mr. Chant, when he did speak, became very concerned about students having anything to say about the administration of the residence. This very nice

When questioned on the support the ministers would give the proposal in cabinet Brothers said "You don't have to worry about us supporting the students of B.C.I.T., we will support them."

When Jack was questioned on his opinion of the success of the proposal he said "In my limited experience with the government officials I think they weigh things in terms of votes. It's obvious Brothers

doesn't think there is many votes here since he didn't even read the twenty page report sent to him. He picked a safe out by saying he was unsure of the future of the campus. I think it's going to take a lot of work but we will probably just make it. The governments insistence on centralization of authority is a handicap. Obviously they

listen very little to the advisory council of the school, who voted to support the program

For a school the government prides as the best in the Province they seem to be content with holding us back on this proposal rather than extending a helping hand."

Another problem worrying our apprehensive government people is that in the proposal we are going to use Federal money on Provincial land. This creates a problem we were told. We were told it has never been done before. This certainly is an alarming proposition and it is understandable that it would cause a timid man to falter.

Last year the students at BCIT very generously donated the balance of their caution account to the Sun's House of Hope Fund. The money given to the fund by them was greatly appreciated and has been put to use in completing the residence at the Variety Farm in Ladner.

The nicest thing about the students' donation was, however, the fact that their thoughtfulness seemed to impress many Sun readers and it gave our Fund a real shot in the arm. There was a definite increase in the number of donations following the story we ran about BCIT.

I am writing this letter to you in the hope that the students would like to do the same for our Tiny Tim Fund. This year the money raised by the Sun will be given to Variety Club to assist them in building and equipping much needed facilities at the Cerebral Palsy Treatment Centre in Surrey. A visit to the Centre is all one needs to realize how important it is for the Sun to make its campaign a success.

The Centre is treating more than 140 children up to fifteen years of age in quarters that are almost impossible to describe. Because of lack of facilities, those needing treatment can visit the Centre only once each week - most of them should be there at least three times a week.

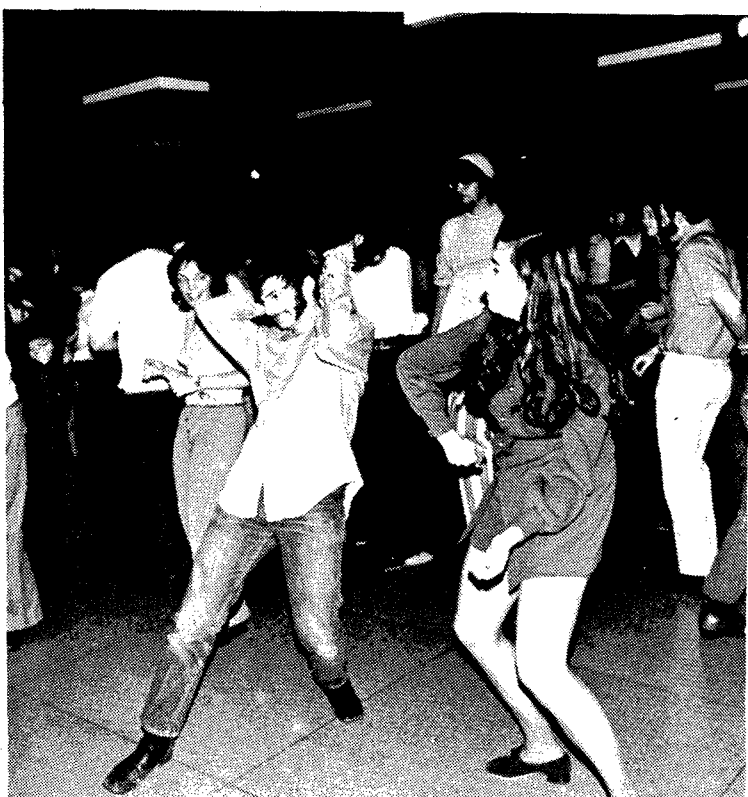
Naturally I hope the students will come through again and if it is their decision to help us, please let me know as soon as possible so I can arrange to have a photo and story in the Sun.

**SPEECH BY ROBERT STANFIELD TO THE P.C. YOUTH FEDERATION: DEC. 4/71**

There was a point, and not so long ago, when the young people of Canada and North America particularly those in colleges and universities... seemed bent on rebellion. Looking back, perhaps much of this was simply a fad as the thinking of the Berkeley Free Speech Movement spread out ... as the Student Non-Violent Co-ordinating Committee changed directions ... as Black Power, Red Power and Gay Power went the rounds.

But today, I sense a different attitude in our young people ... sure, there are still movements afoot ... but there is a certain quiet in Canada today, a feeling that, in some ways disturbs me more than the noise before ever did. It is a quiet, not of apathy, but of personal concern. That concern, and I am sure many of you feel it today is: what am I going to do with my education?

That is not a new question ... but the context in which the answer must be sought is far different than in the past.

Five years ago, young people could become totally involved in ideological discussions with their parents and teachers, relatives and professors ... they could be concerned about other segments of society or such broad issues as universal availability of higher education all the more easily because their own lives seemed secure.

I think you, as a group, are probably balancing the rebellion of the 60's with the self-concern that grips so many young people today, grips them to the exclusion of all other interests, domestic and international. While all of us are concerned about the future for ourselves, we must not forget the larger problems facing Canada ... and that is why this meeting and your ideas are so important as we search for the answer for Canada.

At Monday evenings council meeting, I saw a prime example of Canadian conservatism at it's best ( or worst ). A group of four Business Administration students were asking council to allow them to operate the Used Book Store, free of any "conditions" from the Association, during the next year. After a suitable amount of debate, some members expressed a desire to know how much profit this group was making from their venture. Of course this information was not revealed, so many members of the Association tried to force the group to either produce a financial statement next - or don't operate the bookstore.

Even though this motion was voted down, (and the group will operate the bookstore next year) the whole episode left a bad taste in my mouth.

This attitude of some Association members is typical of the majority of Canadians - try to stick the guy who has made a profit doing something you could have done, but lacked the guts to try. Be jealous of his position and tax the son-of-a-bitch out of existence if you can. That way, he won't be around to remind you that you could have had a business too--if you had taken the opportunity.

## DICIPLINE -the keystone of civilization and progress

Let us start with a simple train of thought.

Man's material welfare is based on civilization.

Civilization is based on law and order.

Law and order is based on discipline.

Discipline is of two types - that which is imposed and that which is self-imposed.

Discipline must be imposed on children to form the personal habits that make good character.

It must also be imposed on adults who do not impose it on themselves.

Now let's consider the fact that in the United States, discipline has, for an entire generation come, more and more, to be regarded as old-fashioned. This revolution started in the classroom under the labels of "progressive education" and "permissiveness," - meaning encouraging children to do what "comes naturally."

It spread to the home as parents were advised that forcing children to do things they did not want to do created anti-social attitudes and stunted the development of "the whole child." This philosophy frowns upon making embarrassing comparisons of the scholastic achievement of one child with another, and holds that criminal tendencies result from natural lack of standards for which the individual isn't responsible.

The result of this "progressive permissiveness" has been to discourage the teachers, confuse the parents, and disgust the police authorities. Mass education has never been worse and crime has never been so high. Respect for the principles and institutions underlying the American civilization has never been so low.

One good thing, however, has happened. The recent stupid

excesses of the lawless minority, on the streets and on the campus, has finally shocked the nation into realizing the enormity of what is happening and seems to be crystallizing the greatest of all social forces public indignation in a free society. From all indications, the importance of discipline and law enforcement is being rediscovered.

This does not mean that the American people either do or should believe that all the existing laws are perfect, but they should believe that as long as any law (even one in need of improvement) is on the books, it must be obeyed. The old truth is reemerging: any society in which laws are to be obeyed, is headed for history's scrap pile.

The last truth is well-known to the professional radicals who are planning and manipulating the ghetto and campus riots. These apostles of violence expect to reduce American civilization to chaos before our "decadent society" rises up in self-defense. But they are about to discover the overwhelming superiority of legal counterviolence.

Unfortunately, some of the steps that are being demanded by the outraged majority (and reflected in the explosive temper of Congress and state governments) may go too far and destroy some of the perfectly proper privileges of dissent which are necessary to the progress of any democratic society. In a stable society, the maintenance of law and order is a municipal problem.

But discipline must prevail, and people who do not discipline themselves within the framework of the law must be disciplined by others. Let us pray that we do not burn down the house to kill the rats.

These jobs do not pay anything. Your time is donated. About all you get is a trip to the prairies and a lot of satisfaction when the job is finished. The jobs are those of co-ordinating SHINER-AMA. We are looking for a co-ordinator, publicity co-ordinator, and physical co-ordinator.

Experience is not necessary. Age is no barrier. The pay is rotten. You have the chance to use all the ingenuity you can muster. Everything to do with SHINERAMA is donated. Advertising, buses, food, balloons, etc. The co-ordinators figure out what is needed and how to get it.

To apply for one of the jobs, come to the SA office and ask for me. I will be delighted to fill you in on all the details.

The success of the delegation to Victoria to get residences is very questionable. The Minister of Public Works, Mr. Chant, did an admirable job of buck-passing to the Minister of Education, Mr. Brothers, who did an admirable job of being a politician and committed himself to nothing.

It appears that our provincial holocaust in Victoria looks to the future. Twenty-five and fifty years to the future according to Mr. Brothers. If you look at the plans for BCIT in just the next 3 or 4 years, you will see enrollment at close to 4500. The proposed residence at the current time will house less than 20% of the students. In 1975 this figure drops to about 7%.

Mr. Brothers is apprehensive about the education systems of the future. "What if we are going to be taught via television?" Perhaps look at it another way. If the television bit is right, what do you do with a \$25 million white elephant called BCIT?

Mr. Chant did not say much worth listening to (actually he did not say much of anything) and Mr. Brothers talked at length and said nothing. "Much ado about nothing," so to speak.

These two gentlemen did say that they would take the proposal to the cabinet. If the Minister of Finance (Prime Minister, Premier, or whatever) is in a good mood, we may get the residences. If not, a lot of hard work was for nothing.

The BCIT Advisory Council supports the residence proposal. The Municipality of Burnaby and the Summer Games people both support the proposal. Here's hoping "da Preem" is in a good mood.

## Youthful opportunist takes advantage of project

A lucrative Opportunities for Youth project in New Brunswick netted one University of New Brunswick student \$8,600 for only six weeks work, according to a report prepared for the Federal government by the co-ordinating agency for local OFY projects.

The report from COPE (Community Opportunities Providing Employment) claims that Jonathan Marler, a second year law student at UNB received 35,000 from OFY last spring to carry out an "ecological forest survey" in the province.

Instead of probing the woodland ecology, the report

alleges, Marler rented a tree harvester and chain saws and sold timber and pulpwood to local industrialists at cut rates. This continued for six weeks until complaints from his employees cost Marler his job.

According to the COPE report Marler hired about 30 students at \$1.25 an hour but did not inform them they were working on an OFY project. It was "only when the students heard that their job was a youth opportunities project" that they became suspicious stated the report.

"They complained to Marler who retaliated by firing the entire lot and then

they complained to Ottawa."

"The federal government," the report continued, "dispatched OFY organizer Sheila Zimmerman, who had approved the project in the beginning. Naturally, she was defensive and the whole meeting was entirely unpleasant."

In the end however Zimmerman spoke to Marler and asked him to vacate his post. He did so reluctantly, the report said, but not before he had pocketed \$8,600 for himself.


A number of people in the region — including the Moncton office of the Secretary of State's Depart-

ment — pressed for an immediate investigation the COPE report revealed but it was turned down by Secretary of State Gerard Pelletier.

"Zimmerman issued instructions that there was to be no publicity given to the affair at all", COPE reported.

The report also charged that during his tenure as project manager Marler issued regular pay cheques to his brother who was not employed on the project, as well as two per week to his girlfriend who was.

Fredericton RCMP say they are investigating the affair but no details have been released.

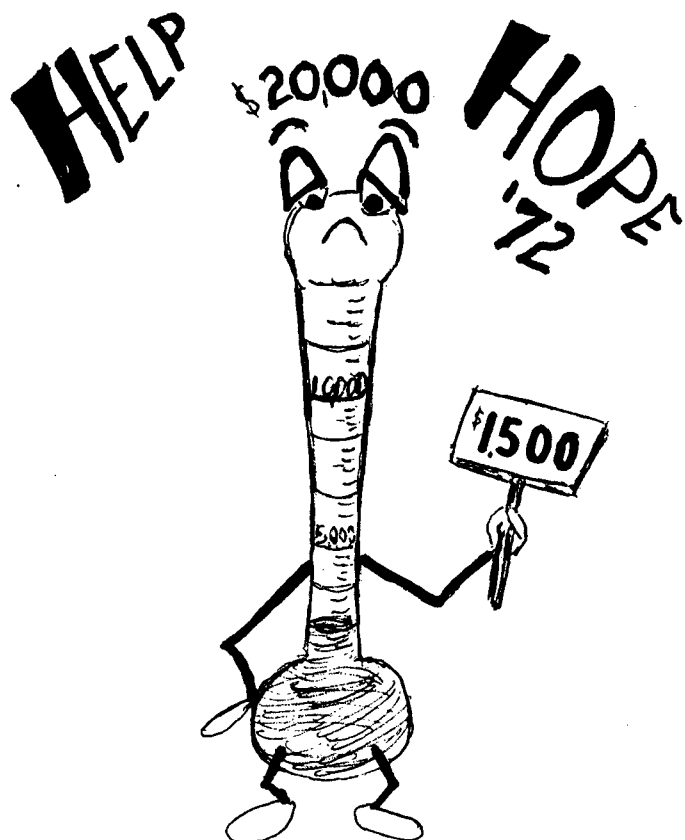

# BCIT goes to bat again as Tim fund tops \$60,000

It may be too soon to call it a campus tradition, but giving in a big way to people who need help seems to be at least a strong habit among students at the B.C. Institute of Technology.

Last year, the students raised \$6,000 for The Sun's House of Hope campaign through their own Help Hope drive.

This year they are out to give what could be a major boost to The Sun's Tiny Tim Fund.

The fund Monday went over the \$60,000 mark with the help

of \$2,600 in donations from 439 contributors over the weekend.

The BCIT student association Monday went over plans to carry the fund even further.

In an attempt to retain the

spirit of last year's success their drive will be billed as Help Hope '72.

And the same fund-raising technique will be used again this year, according to Robert Simons, students association internal vice-president.

Students will be asked to donate their \$10 "caution fee" to help build a hydrotherapy pool for the Children's Treatment Centre in Surrey.

Each year, Simons explained, the institute's 2,700 students are required to put up \$10 to cover the cost of any equipment they might break during the term.

If nothing is broken the money is normally returned to the students.

But in the next weeks, 60 student leaders will be asking their classmates to pledge the \$10, or whatever is left of it at the end of the term, to the

Tiny Tim fund.

"It's a fair chunk of money for some students," said Simons, "but since the money is already out of their pockets, we're just asking them to sign it over to Tiny Tim."

"A lot of students are now familiar with the fund and I think they will see it as an opportunity to do something to help these kids."

"We also like the fact that every bit of the money donated goes directly toward the cause it was donated for," he said.

Simons said the fund drive

within the institute will also provide a build-up to student participation in the Variety Club Tent 47's telethon next month.

The Variety Club has undertaken a four-stage reconstruction program for the children's centre, which treats victims of cerebral palsy and other crippling diseases. Most of the funds for the program will be raised through the telethon.

The Sun's Tiny Tim Fund is seeking funds through public donations to provide the centre with a hydrotherapy pool.
