## Educational Leave policy detailed

Approved by the Civil Service Commission in 1969, the policy on educational leave from BCIT in effect recognizes two types of leave, subject to different guide lines.

EDUCATIONAL LEAVE OF ABSENCE WITH PAY may be granted by the Department of Education on the recommendation of the Principal to members of the teaching faculty - provided

...the member has been an emplovee of BCIT for at least

five years

...the member has applied in writing to the Principal at least 12 months prior to the beginning of the year in which he plans to start his leave.

...a suitable substitute can be found

...Leave will normally be for a period not exceeding 12 months

... The purpose will normally be for academic pursuits or approved specialized experience

Salary paid while on leave will normally be 50% of his

normal salary

A member will become eligible for a leave after each five years of service thereaf-

In new and rapidly growing fields, these periods may be reduced and the salary allowance varied at the discretion of the principal.

Two such leaves per year have been approved by the Dep-

artment of Education.

An extended LEAVE OF ABS-ENCE WITHOUT PAY to members of the teaching faculty may be granted by the principle - pro-

...the member has applied in writing to the Principal at least six months prior to the beginning of the school year in which he plans to start his leave

...a suitable substitute can be found

The leave will normally be for a period not exceeding 12

The purpose of the leave will normally be for academic pursuits or approved industrial experience

Leave of absence when granted will be without prejudice to the right of the normal salary increment.

About six such leaves are being granted yearly.
