AIDS awareness the key

The man who was the first to investigate an AIDS related death in B.C. for the Coroner's Service, Eugene Shkurhan of Basic Health Sciences BCIT believes AIDS is a disease everyone should understand – and for the past two years he has offered a special lecture on the topic to all people at BCIT.

"I've given the lecture to whoever wants to attend but in particular I invite the term two nursing students who I teach. I've offered the lecture once a semester for the last two years", Shkurhan said.

Asked about response to his lecture he said general campus response has been down recently but two years ago 70 to 80 people would turn up to hear a detailed explanation of the AIDS virus and how to prevent its

transmission.

"I don't know why attendance is down, people are becoming complacent perhaps and information about AIDS is more widespread now."

Shkurhan has no definite plans to hold a special lecture this semester but says he might plan a lecture and

advertise the time and day which would likely be on a Wednesday at noon when there would be fewer schedule conflicts.

"Regardless of morals," Shkurhan said, "I have no general problems with an ad campaign for condoms". He added he believes we must do whatever is necessary to in-sure control of communicable diseases and "You're not going to stop people from hav-ing sex so the next thing to do is to tell people how prevent the transmission of

College principal quits: 'frustrated with government'

Fraser Valley College principal Dr. Barry Moore has resigned his post saying he is frustrated with the provincial government and adds he is the ninth principal to resign in the past 18 months.
"There has been a large tur-

nover of ministers in post secondary education and the signals we have been getting from the provincial gevernment are quite confused and when they are not confused the signals are often late", Moore said Moore said.

Moore says his ioh has been made very difficult by the provincial government anb the government has made it very difficult for all educators who are on "the

Moore was known in the education community for his outspoken critiques of the provincial government and he most recently came out in favour of a better student aid program.

Moore said student aid was originally drawn up to meet the demands of "typical university students

"But now", he said, "there are other classes of students with different needs - married people taking adult basic education, students already loaded down with other forms of debt, plus students who are not the sons or daughters of people who have a fair amount of money."

Moore has accepted a new

job as a principal of an Ontario Community College.

Advertising AIDS prevention

Advertising about the danger of AIDS and the prevention of the transmission of AIDS through the use of a condom will be common in Britian this year as British government has launched w \$40 million blitz.
Posters and ads on national and youth newspapers as well as in papers and on television will get the message to will get t British youth.

In Canada the government has set aside \$3.7 million over five years to educate the public, the medical profession, and school teachers. The Canadian Public Health

Association says the program will be launched on Feb. 24th.

Don Wright, publisher of the Link newspaper, says neither government or private industry has approached the Link for advertising space, but he said, "I do remember an advertising campaign by Julius Schmidt, the producer of condoms, a few ago."

Speaking from Toronto, the president of Julius Schmidt, Murray Black said his com-pany, which holds a two-thirds market share in con-dom manufacture in Canada, did run an ad campaign in

1981 but for economic reasons radio ads were removed and now the com-pany advertises only in magazines.

"We continue to advertise in 22 magazines in Canada in-cluding university and student newspapers" said Black.

Panels will be held Tues-day, February 17 at 7 p.m. at Langara Comunity College in room A130 and Thursday February 19 at 12:30 p.m. at Simon Fraser University in Burnaby, room B 9200 of the acedemic quadrangle.

MacNuaghton also reported

Andrea Bartlett,

Finance, reported on the ex-ecutive's search for a new ecutive's search for a new auditor. Bartlett called for estimates amd accepted Price Waterhouse's \$9600 bid to do the books next year. Said bartlett, "The company has some new ideas and seems willing to come to some meetings and help the executive." Last year's audit cost \$16,000.

Member at large Jim Redfern presented an idea to council concerning Redfern presented an idea to council concerning the marketing of the Link newspaper - he wants to have council build ten paper boxes for the campus and sell adver-tising on the sides of the

boxes to recover the con-

struction costs.
"Not enough people read the Link and a better distribution system will increase readership," said Redfern. He estimated the boxes will cost council about \$500 and council agreed the job could be done over the summer, possibly on a Challenge '87 grant.

At mid point in the meeting council members began what turned out to be the most lengthy and emotional debate of the evening, as two executive reported they were going to fly to Chicago to attend an entreprenuers conference.


Many council members objected to the executive spending \$826 for two airfares arguing that the S.A. is in a deficit position and some executive members should show restraint and make a personal commitment reduce the deficit.

The two members heading for Chicago, Cheryl Mac-Nughton and Andrea Bartlett, argued that there is a seperate budget for executive travel and they do not require council's approval to spend that money

Assistant manager Lorne Hildebrand reported that the business have recognized that there are needy students on campus and said, as a promotional move, food will be offered on a two-for-one basis Monday evenings and on film nights.

Finally, members at large received a boost in their meal allowance for each meeting they attend: council has rais-ed the allotment from \$3 per meeting to \$5

Letter of "protest"

A recent letter from the Simon Fraser University Stu-dent Society to the BCIT SA asking for support in lobbying the provincial government - a lobby aimed at the governto make post-secondary education more accessible brought a curious response from new SA president Pat Carrol. Said Carrol, "We want Carrol. Said Carrol, "We want to make changes to the current policies of the provincial government but we don't want to appear to be too radical". Carrol and the rest of the SA believe quiet negotiation with the BCIT administration and the Board of Governors will result in the desired changes in policy. desired changes in policy. But students around the world are showing a different way is possible and they're winning.

Witness France. In mid December international headlines declared the French government had capitulated to student demands after continious "pressure for two weeks". After two weeks of student unrest Prime Minister Chirac was forced appear on televi-sion to back down on proposed changes to university engance requirements.

In China thousands of students demand greater freedom and democracy via protest and demonstations The government is faced with international press coverage and a potentially embarrass-ing situation. It is a situation that promises to stay with the Chinese government for some

A strike in Latin America's largest university - Mexico City - is now in its second week with the strongest student movement in two decades that is standing firm in its opposition to proposed acedemic reforms. Leaders of

strike will continue until plans for fee increases and more restrictive admission policy are dropped.

The Mexico City strike has spread and sparked mass resignations from the capitol city's only English language newspaper. The ebitor and 14 journalists quit after saying they had "been ordered to slant coverage of the strike in favor of the university administration"

The French protest spread to Spain last week as college students protested enmasse. Leaders say they are "frustated over the government's refusal to allow

government's refusal to anom-free admission to university". Students worldwide have discovered the necessity of protest in their efforts to change the policy of short sighted governments who sighted governments who seek to limit university enrolment and raise tuition fees, thus creating an elitist educ-tion system. Protest has taken a wide variety of forms, but always it has included standing enmasse with fellow students from other institutions with joint proposals.

Here at home the local student council worries about "appearing radical" and "appearing radical" and believes a letter of concern mailed to Education Minister Hagan will be sufficient to insure tuition fees are lowered and access to university eduction is increased to all British Columbians, not

only the wealthy.
We shall watch with interest when the BCIT Baord of Governors discusses likely tuition fee increases next month. And we hold out no hope that the Ministry of Education will do anything in support of our SA's demands given the weak manner in which those demands were

Strife in the S.A.

Monday's council meeting erupted into a spirited attack on two executive members who booked air tickets to Chicago which they say do not have cancellation insurance, and as a result, MacNaughton and Bartlett argue they shall attend a young entrepreneurs conference even if the rest of council thinks the trips should be cancelled. The executive members argue there is a special budget for travel, a budget they have a right to use. on two executive members right to use.

Executive member Neil is the dissatisfied: he says they booked the tickets in a "sneaky" manner and he believes there are others who

are more deserving of the Chicago trip.

The debate promises to be with us for a couple of weeks, but in the meantime it is a healthy sign that council and executive members scrutinizing their budgets in an effort to reduce a defecit of over \$30 thousand,

Many executive members believe the Chicago trip is nothing more than a holiday for executive members, "a perk of the job". Mac-Naughton and Bartlett say yes, it's a perk, but we deserve the perk. Stay tuned. The flight to Chicago has not left the tarmac

Opposition not happy with Socred education policies

Almost four months into their mandate to govern B.C., the provincial Social Party has critics wondering if the government will be an "open and consultative" ad-'open and consultative" ministration, as promised by Premier Vander Zalm.

New Democrat education

critics Darlene Marzari (MLA Point Grey) amd Barry Jones (MLA Burnaby North) fear policy will be generated by the "musings" of the Premier, and they call on the government to invest in education.

Link: What kind of action should students be taking at this time?

Marzari: That is an interesting question, The participation rate is the lowest in the country and tuition fees have virtually doubled in the past six years. Things have never been worse for post secondary education in this province.

I think students have to yell bloody loud and draw attenas best they can to the situation that they are in... it's also the cost of living, to even think about going to a post secondary institution is a major decision for any potential

Link: Has there been any sign, in terms of education, the government is going to be open and consultative?

Jones: The only real promise made in education was an agreement made by all parties that there was a need for a commission to review the entire educational system. Such commission has not been established.

A number of things have been going on: the latest being the AIDS information question and it seems that policy development is made by musings of the premier when he gets a chance to talk to reporters

addition there's number of processes that are underway that seem to con-tradict the idea of a commission. The mayors are studying decentralization in education, the labour minister is study-ing bargaining for teachers, cabinet committee on social services is going around the province accepting briefs on education and much of this is going on without any real consultation. without any real consultation with the education community.

Marzari: The House is being called late as there is a con-sultation on student fees and student tuition which set up a special board, and a scecial advisory group will be produc-ing a report for the cabinet to I heartily applaud the peruse. consultation process but await with some - some - anxabout the outcome. wonder if any of the people who have been consulted will have their voices heard.

Link: You presented a brief into the consultation process.
What are the top two goals

you hope the government will accept and try to implement?

Marzari: The tone of our brief calls on the govrenment to take post secondary education seriously... to keep students in the province and enrich the province... that is our top priority.

The second priority is that we would like to see a return of the grant system and some rebates on students loans.

Could Members Bill help to get some improvements in place?

Marzari: No Private Members Bill is going to put anything into place. Private Members Bills, in my opinion, and looking at the record simply serve to draw attention to a problem.

I think what you will see with this NDP opposition is that we'll be putting together a series of Private Members Bills that will build toward a package of legislation when ve are elected in three years from now.

Link: We've seen SFU and UBC raise their tuition fees this year, what do you believe needs to be done with tuition

lones: The whole question of funding for education is a critical issue and the govern-ment can be a lot more generous in this regard. The \$54 million that went to post secondary education last year came entirely from the federal government. With the kind of government. debt load, and low participa-tion rates in B.C. there is no excuse for the government not to improve funding for secondary educatiom And it must be more accessible to those from lower socio-economic backgrounds. I see no sign the government is doing anything in that regard.

Link: What has caused deficit financing? BCIT has a \$2 million deficit and other schools also have a deficit. Should it be allowed to go

Marzari:Deficit financing caused by this provincial government's attitude towards post secondary eductaion. They don't like it and they don't want it unless it is related to job trapning and pushing kids into jobs immediately upon graduation and they haven't been too successful at that.

What they have done is to take \$300 million that was supposed to increase \$700 million and put it into a fund administered by the fund administered by th cabinet behind closed doors called the Fund for

The fund then becomes, on cabinet mandate, not on the mandate of thedepartment of Education, or on the mandate of any advisory council or heads of boards of governors the Fund for Excellence then fund deficits and that's what they intend to do.

Link: Is this a negative use of

Marzari: It doesn't get us out of the problem, it creates a larger problem, that being the cabinet itself starts to make decisions about what goes on at community colleges and threatens the autonomy of the local regions where the colleges are, and the univer-sities, the universities and colleges become puppets of a smallnumber of people who lock themselves behind closd doors and call themselves the

Link: A lot of schools are looking into corporate funding. Is this a good thing or is it dangerous?

Jones: I think there is some danger. If corporations were very generous and had no strings attached to education funding it would be worthwhile. But I think education must be free from political and corporate interests.

Link: Is the Vander Zalm government following the Bennett government forcing the educational institutions to look for funds in the corporate sector?

Jones: It certainly seems the direction we're going and B.C. has become the backwater of educational B.C. has become the backwater of educational enlightenment and maybe the only hope is corporate funding. But certainly that is not the way it should be done.

Credit government doing about student summer employment and what is the opposition pushing for at this

Jones: I see in the current government a continuation of the past. There has been programs and students in t and assistance to in the past but not to the degree necessary. Our job is opposition is to point inadaquacies we're looking for something to be done for students in the province.

Help your heart!

Okay trivia buffs - What's a Sphygmomanometer?
Besides being quite a mouthful to say, it's that funny looking contruption your doctor uses to check your blood pressure. The device was first developed in the 1890's by Russian military physicians to measure the blood pressure of injured soldiers. It takes its name (in English) from the Greek for "pulse measurement."

Two numbers make up a blood pressure reading. They look like a fraction (ie. 110/60, spoken as "110 over 60"), but actually refer to the pressure exerted by the pressure exerted by the blood within the arteries during the two phases of the heart cycle.

Systolic pressure, the first number, indicates how hard the heart is working when it contracts to pump blood into the tissue. The the tissues. The second number, the diastolic pressure, designates the lower pressure exerted when

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the heart relaxes to refill.

To measure blood pressure, a cloth cuff is wrapped tightly around the patient's upper arm. Air is pumped into a rubber bag inside the cuff. As it expands, the guage reading on the sphygmomanometer rises in response to the increasing

response to the increasing air pressure.

As more air is gradually let out of the cuff, the pulse momentarily gets louder and then fades. as a hose, if the arterioles become narrower or shut off for some reason, the blood cannot easily pass through them. When this happens, the heart must pump harder to push the blood through. This increases the blood pressure in ther arteries. If the pressure increases above normal and stays there, the result is high blood pressure.

WHAT IS HIGH BLOOD PRESSURE?

Certain arteries in the body, called arterioles, regulate your blood pressure. They are the smallest branches of the aorta, the main artery leaving the heart carrying blood in the circulatory

The way arcerioles control blood pressure is sometimes compared to the manner in which a nozzle regulates water pressure in a hose. If you turn the nozzle to make the opening larger, less pressure is needed to force make its opening narrower, or smaller, the pressure on the hose increases.

Uncontrolled high blood pressure adds to the workload of the heart and arteries. The heart, forced to work harder than normal over a long period, tends to a long period, tends to enlarge. A slightly enlarged heart may function well, but a heart that is very much enlarged has a hard time keeping up with the demands put upon it.

demands put upon it.

As people grow older, the arteries and their smaller branches the arterioles become hardened and less elastic. This process takes place gradually, even in people who do not have high

blood pressure. However, elevated blood pressure tends to speed up this hardening process.

The possibility of stroke -blood vessel damage in the brain - is increased if you blood vessel damage in the brain - is increased if you have high blood pressure. Uncontrolled high blood pressure can also affect the blood vessels of the eyes, heart, kidneys and nervous system. These effects can be prevented or reduced if high blood pressure is detected and treated early - and if treatment is continued.

THE BRITISH COLUMBIA INSTITUTE OF TECHNOLOGY

CONSTITUTION

- 1. The name of the Society shall be the Student Association of British Columbia Institute of Technology, hereinafter referred

ociety shall be subject to the Societies Act and the Robert Rules of Order


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BYLAW 1 -MEMBERSHIP

BYLAW 3 - GOVERNING BODY OF THE ASSOCIATION. MEMBERS AND

- 3.1 The name of the governing body of the Association shall be the Student Association Council hereinafter referred to as

3.5 DITTIES OF MEMBERS AT LARCE

 - c. The Set Representative will fulfill duties as designated by the Technology President;

- Set Representatives shall present any recommendations of their set to their Technology Committee;

- g. The Set, Vocation or Trades Representatives will be responsible to inform classmates of specific job postings.
- h. The Set, Vocation or Trade Representatives shall establish and maintain communications between their Student Body, Technology Committee, Division Council, Faculty, and Administration.
- 5.3. DUTIES OF THE TECHNOLOGY PRESIDENT
 - a. reports to the Chairperson of the Division Society;
 - responsible for attending and participating in their Division
 Society meeting as a representative of their technology;
 - responsible for retaining minutes of the Division Society meetings (for the current year only) to pass on to the incoming President;
 - d. verbally report technology activities at their Division Society meetings;

- i. provide direction to their student body in the following areas;
 - instructor difficulties
 - access to Student Executive
 - access to Administration
- j. make himself/herself available to the Technology Committee and student body as a resource person;
- k. to ensure the election of set representatives by the end of September;
- conducting elections for the incoming second year Technology President by the end of April;
- m. conducting elections for the first year Technology President by the end of September;
- n. holding and chairing Technology Committee meeting at least
- co-ordinating and assigning responsibilities to the Technology Committee as he/she sees fit.

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RYLAW 6 BUSTNESS ORGANIZATION

- 6.1 The Student Association recognizes the importance of the business organization and the employees and therefore includes these bylaws to help govern the business organization and it's relationships within the SA.
- 6.2 The Management employees of the BCIT Student Association shall be governed by the 'Management Employees Manual'.
- 6.3 The Non-Management employees of the Student Association shall be governed by the 'Non-Management Employees Manual'.
- 6.4 Both the Management and Non-Management employees manuals should come up for revision on a regular basis by the Employee Manual Committe.
- 6.5 All senior management have employment contracts which come up for automatic revision every 5 years.
- 6.6 Following the organization chart (see EMMU 2) included in this constitution, all employees, report only to their senior managers, and only the senior managers report to the SA through the Business Limison CAMENTIEE (see Bulaw 7) and the SA Council.

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BYLAW 7 BUSINESSLIAISON COMMITTEE

- 7.1 The objective of this bylaw is to officially spell out the line of authority between the SA businesses and the council of the Association.
- 7.2 The Business Liaison Committe shall be the only official/authorized body to contact the Managers of the SA Business and shall be the conduit through which the Business Managers officially contact the SA.
- 7.3 The committee shall meet on a regularly scheduled basis(every two weeks) to discuss any business related problems/opportunities. At which time, necessary policies or actions will take place by the Committee or the most appropriate member.
- 7.4 The Committee shall work by co-operation and consensus and not by vote, and when a resolution cannot be made at the Liaison Committee level, the Council should be asked to make the necessary decisions.
- 7.5 The Vice President Administration and Finance, with the aid of the manager, will report at Council Meetings, following the Liaison meetings any appropriate information.
- 7.6 The Committee shall be made up of be VP Administration and Finance, a member of the executive ad a lst year council Member at Large; and the senior business manager(s) and one operation manager elected by fellow operational managers.
- 1.7 The council shall elect the Business Liaison Committee first year
 . Member at Large at the first full council meeting of the academic year.

SYLAW 8 - FLECTIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

1. Elections

- 1.a The elections of the Association Officers shall be conducted by the last school week of March.
- 1.b The VP Administration ad Finance shall serve as Chief Returning Officer bereinafter referred to as the C.R.O. and shall be responsible for the administration and conduct of the elections; a decision by the C.R.O. concerning the interpretation of the electoral Bylaws shall be considered final;
- 1.c The C.R.O. shall appoint the following to assist in conducting of the elections;
 - i. Deputy Returning Officer;
 - ii. Polling Clerks;
 - iii. Other officers as deemed necessary;
- 1.d The Notice of Elections shall be posted at least two (2) weeks prior to the opening date for nominations and in the first issue of the Official Student Association Newspaper in the New War;
 - The date of the elections and the hours during which the polls will be open.
 - ii. The location(s) of the polls;
- iii. The opening and closing dates for nominations, where the nomination forms may be obtained and to whom the must be submitted;
 - The positions on the Executive for which nominations are being called;

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Bylaw 8.3b

- b. The use of lewd, indecent, or suggestive material or the defamation of campaign materials, irrespective of the form they may take is prohibited. A candidate using such materials or acting in such a manner shall be disqualified upon decision of the C.R.O. and shall not be eligible to run for office in the Association for the full academic year subsequent to the offence.
- c. Each candidate for office shall be required to obtain the services of a Campaign Manager. Candidate and Campaign Manager shall be jointly responsible for the campaign.
- d. Campaign speeches of a spontaneous nature may be made at any location either by the candidate or the Campaign Manager on his candidate's behalf. The speaking time allowed to each candidate at the general meeting of the Association shall be determined by the total time allotted by Administration for the Assembly;
- e. The campaign expenses incurred by any one candidate must not exceed \$75.00 (seventy five). The use of club funds or Association Funds is prohibited. All Campaign expenditures are to be accounted and submitted to the C.R.O. after date of elections.

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8.4 Polls and Voting Procedures

- a. The elections shall be by secret ballot and the single "X" shall be the system of voting employed. This procedure will be posted on each ballot slip.
- b. Candidates will be identified on the ballots in the order of their submission.
- c. The Polling Clerks shall present the ballots for inspection. The Deputy Returning Officer or Chief Returning Officer shall inspect the ballot boxes before and after the casting of ballots.
- d. The ballot boxes shall be constituted of metal or wood and shall be equipped with a lock and an appropriate seal.
- e. Each voter must satisfy the C.R.O. that he/she is a member of the Association. Each member of the Association shall have 1 vote.
- The voter shall mark his ballot, fold it and place it in the ballot box.
- f. A voter who inadvertently spoils their ballot shall return it to the Polling Clerk in exchange for a new ballot. The Clerk shall immediately destroy the spoiled ballot.
- g. While voting is in progress, access to the polls shall be limited to the following:
- i. Chief Returning Officer
- ii. Deputy Returning Officer
- iii. Polling Clerks
- iv. Staff Advisors to the C.R.O.

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- 8.5 Counting Procedures
 - a. Immediately following the final closing of the polls the Deputy Returning Officer shall convey the ballot boxes to the area wherein the counting of ballots is to take place. The C.R.O. will personally unlock and unseal the boxes.
 - b. The C.R.O. shall decide on the validity of all ballots Once a ballot has been declared invalid, it shall remain as such. Ballots shall be declared invalid for the following reasons:
 - i. If any mark other than "X" is used to show choices;
 - ii. If more than one candidate is marked for a single office being contested;
 - c. The following and no other shall be allowed inside the area where and while the ballots are being counted.
 - i. Chief Returning Officer
 - ii. Deputy Returning Officer
 - iii. Polling Clerk
 iv. Campaign Managers

BYLAW 11 - FUNDS

8.6 Newly Elected Officers

The newly elected officers shall attend all regular seetings of the out-going Executive and Council and familiarize themselves with their new offices with the guidance and advice of the current office Bolders. They shall be entitled to participate in the deliberation of meetings but shall not be entitled to vote.

8.7 The Vocational and Trades seat will not be an elected position. Bowever, the Vocational and Trades Division Council will appoint a chairperson or designate either via election or Vocational Division Council Movement. This seat will be open on a rotating basis and must be filled by the Vocational and Trades Division chairperson or designate.

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BYLAW 9 - CONDITIONS OF OFFICE AND IMPEACHMENT

- The officers of the Association shall be required to resign from office under the following conditions:
 - a. If the officer or officer elect fails to pass the academic year, that is; fails two or more courses, or drops two or more courses, or any combination of the above.
 - b. If the officer fails to be in full attendance at any two regularly scheduled meeting (per school term) of the Executive and Council without approval of the members as recorded in the minutes.
 - c. If at any meeting of the Council, a vote of non-confidence is moved against an officer of the Association and the motion is carried by a two-thirds majority of those voting,

- c. Disbursements shall be in the form of cheques drawn on the S.A. approved bank; any two signatures of the following shall be required on each voucher of at least one must be an executive member;

 - V.P. Administration, Finance & Secretary

- d. Funding of special events:
 - i. shall submit a budget to council for funding approval

BYLAW 10 - REPLACEMENT OF OFFICERS

- In the event of resignation, death, or impeachment, of any officer of the Association, the following procedure will be followed:
 - a. In the event of the resignation or impeachment of the President, The Vice President Administration. Finance & Secretary shall assume the office of the President on a part-time basis, until the Council selects a new full-time. President. This must be by two-thirds majority of Council and the selection should be made within one month of the office becoming vacant.
 - b. In the event of the resignation of the Vice-President Administration, Finance & Secretary or their being selected to the office of President, a new Vice-President, Administration, Finance & Secretary shall be elected by the Council and from and among the members of the Council.
- c. In the event of the resignation of the <u>Vice President</u> <u>Public Relations & Marketing</u>, a successor shall be elected by the Council from and among the members of the Council, this procedure will also apply to the position of <u>VANCE</u> <u>President Student Affairs</u>.
- d. In the event of the resignation of any other officer, a successor shall be elected according to the following priority:
 - By and from among the members of the three Division Members at Large;
 - By and from among the members of the Division or Council directly associated with the office in question;
 By the Council from among the members of the Association

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BYLAW 12 - AUDITORS

- The auditors of the Association shall be appointed by the Executive and shall be paid such remuneration as the Executive shall determine. The Association shall be informed of the appointment at the Annual General Meeting.
- 2. The auditors of the Association shall have a right of access at all times to all books and records of the Association and all subsidiary organizations and shall be entitled to require from any and all members or officers of the Association or any subsidiary an explanation as may be necessary, for the performance of the duties of the auditors.
- The auditors shall make an annual report for the preceeding session ending June 30th, to the members of the Association, and the report shall include:
 - a. Whether or not they have obtained all the information and explanation they have required;
 - b. Whether in their opinion the balance sheet referred to in the report is properly drawn up so as to exhibit a true and correct view of the affairs of the Association according to the best of their information, the explanations given to them, and as shown by the books of the Association

-35-BYLAW 13 - BORROWING AND LENDING ROWERS

A. BORROWING

Subject to the provisions contained in Section 35 of the Societies Act of British Columbia, the Council may for the purpose of carrying out the objectives of the Association, borrow, raise or secure the repayment of such sum or sums of money in such manner and upon such conditions and terms in all respects as the Association may by resolution prescribe, and in particular by the issue of bonds, perpetual or redeemable debentures, or any mortgage, charge or other security on the whole or in part of the property or assets of the Association, both present and future, including all fees or membership dues now or hereafter due or payable.

There will be no personal loans granted. An advance not in excess of 1/2 the established monthly bonorarius may be granted for no greater than a month period.

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BYLAW 14 - INJURIES

- The Association shall carry sufficient Third Party
 Liability Insurance, with a minimum \$5,000,000.00 in respect
 of any injury sustained by any member or other person
 participating in any student activity. This figure shall be
 reviewed each year at the budget meeting.
- The Student Association shall take advantage of the Workers' Compensation Board's offerings for its employees, i.e. student employees of the Student Association while working for the Student Association.

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BYLAW 15 - SUBSTIDIARY ORGANIZATIONS

- 15.1 The Vice President Student Affairs shall control such subsidiary organizations (ie. clubs) activities as their respective consitutions may provide, and are approved from time to time by resolution of the Council.
- 15.2 The Constitutions of the major subsidiary organizations and their subsidiary organizations shall not contain provisions contrary to the Constitution and Bylaws of the Association and shall be subject to the approval of or amendment by, Council or the Association. The activities of all such organizations shall comply with any regulations or resolutions made from time to time by the Association or the Council.
- 15.3 Any group of students proposing to form an organization for any purpose within the objects of the Association, shall first make application to the Vice President Student Affairs for permission to organize under that directorship and their constitution shall subsequently be ratified by the Council.
- 15.4 Any student organization not recognized by the Association shall make application in writing to the Council for permission to use the Association's name for notice—boards or those of its submidiary organizations.

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Bylaw 15.5

- 15.5 Student political clubs may be organized under the Vice President Student Affairs to bear the name and to profess the politics of political parties (or comparable organizations) subject to the following regulations:
 - a. Such clubs shall in all respects be subject to the rules of the Association;
 - Except as specially provided by resolution of the Council, such clubs shall not receive funds from any outside organizations.
 - c. No such club shall participate directly, or otherwise, in elections to any student offices outside the club itself and acceptance of any such support shall render any candidate for office ineligible.
 - d. The Association in no way will provide financial assistance for a political club or be liable in any way for the action of
 - NOTE: Violation of any of the aforesaid regulations shall render the clubs concerned liable to suspension.

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Bylaw 15.6

- 15.6 Each subsidiary student organization shall be so massed as to indicate that it is a student organization under the Association and in no way purports to be separate.
- 15.7 Other than designated political clubs, no organization in the Association shall become or allow itself to become an instrument in partisan politics.
 - a. Any such organization deemed by the Council to be or to have been improperly acting in interests of a political party (or comparable organization) shall be liable to suspension of its charter.
 - b. Such charter may be restored by the Council only if and when the Council is satisfied that the organization concerned will serve the purpose and only the purposes for which it was organized.
- 15.8 The financial reports of subsidiary organizations of the Association shall be received by the Vice President Student Affairs who shall pass them on to the Vice President Administration, Pinance & Secretary (14) foorteen days before the Annual General Meeting.
- 15.9 The Annual reports of all subsidiary organizations of the Association shall be received by the Vice President STCDEIT Affairs beenty-one (21) days before the Annual General Meeting.



Bylaw 15.10

- 5.10 a. The proposed expenditures of the subsidiary organizations of the Association shall be received by the Vice President Student Affairs before the first week in May of the year prior to its implementation. A revised budget may be applied for no later than January 30th, and this estimate shall not exceed an increase of five percent (5%) of the May budget.
 - b. Submidiary organizations of the Association formed during the academic year may submit budgets to Council and through the Vice President Student Affairs, at the time of formation for approval.
- 15.11 If any subsidiary organization of the Association desires a purchase through its budget, a request for the article(s) desired shall be submitted to the Vice President Student Affairs who shall review the request and disburse/not disburse the necessary funds.
- 15.12 Any member of the Executive shall have right of access to minutes and reports of all subsidary organizations of the Association.
- 15.13 a. All submidiary organizations which purpose to organize special functions, fund drive or appeals on or off the campus shall first secure the permission of the Council before organization or conducting such functions, drives or appeals.
 - b. In the event of a loss incurred by subsidiary organization in sponsoring such an event, the Association shall not be held liable for the loss.

BYLAW 16 - DISCIPLINE

- 16.1 Any form of gambling for money, or for any monetary equivalent, is prohibited within the precincts of the Institute without authorization of the Council.
- 16.2 No publication or advertisements or forms of commercial enterprises whatsoever shall be printed or displayed or distributed and no member of the Association shall attempt to sell or dispose of any publications or advertisements or goods or services on campus of the Institute without first having secured permission of the Council.
- 16.3 Any disciplinary action will be conducted and dispensed at the discretion of Council.

BYLAW 17 AMENDMENTS OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

- 17.1 Amendments may be initiated by:
 - a. Any member of the Association may propose an amendment. Such amendment shall be signed by at least seventy—five (75) percent of the Association in good standing and handed to the Vice President Administration, Finance & Secretary of the Association.
 - b. Any member of the Council at a Council Meeting.
- 17.2 The Constitution Committee forthwith after receipt of such proposed amendments shall publish them in two consecutive issues of the student newspaper prior to the submission of the proposed amendments to the Council for revisal and ratification.
- 17.3 The Constitution and Bylaws may be altered by a majority of at least seventy-five (75) percent of the Council members present at a Council meeting.

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BYLAW 18 2 SEAL OF ASSOCIATION

The seal of the Association shall not be affixed to any instrument except in the presence of the President or Vice President Administration, Finance & Secretary and then only by the authority of a resolution of the Council. The said officers shall witness every instrument on which the Seal of the Association is affixed in their presence. The Seal of the Association shall be kept in the custody of the Business Manager or such other person, as the Council may from time to time appoint.

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BYLAW 19 - RECORDS

- The minutes of the meetings of the Association, Council, and Executive shall be kept at the offices of the Student Association in the British Columbia Institute of Technology, 3700 Willingdon Avenue, Burnaby, B.C.
- 2. The books and records of the Student Association may be inspected by members in good standing at the offices of the Associationon any business day except Saturday and Sunday during the academic year between the hours of 10.00 a.m. and and 4.00 p.m., provided such times are mutually convenient to two members of the Executive and the members of the Association making such inspection.

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BYLAW 20 - GENERAL POWERS OF THE ASSOCIATION

The Association shall have the power to make such regulations from time to time as it may deem necessary or advisable concerning the activities of the Council or any of its subsidiary organizations and to repeal, wary, alter or amend the same in such a manner as it may deem fit. Such regulations shall be made by a resolution at a general Association meeting.







Back to the Centre

At a time when so many bands have sold the farm, it's refreshing to hear from an artist who chooses not to compromise his position for fortune and fame. This record is one of the least contrived and completely original I've heard

in a long while.

"Back to The Centre" is Irishman Paul Brady's new release on Mercury Records. But don't let the title fool you, "Middle of the Road" isn't where Brady fits in the musical spectrum. Each song on the album has unique musical flair, ranging from traditional folk, to folk-rock,

to straight-out rock 'n roll

"Back to the Centre" certainly is more "rock" than the "folk" of Brady's earlier records, but he says he hasn't lost his loyal following. Brady says he didn't im tentionally want the album to sound "rock". "Basically it's music how I feel it and songs how I feel them. I never particularly hear a market when I'm making a record I just play it the way I want it."

It's not surprising that Brady's music has fallen between the cracks of market research and failed to gain the ear of local radio station programmers. "Back to the Centre"'s novel combination of melody, imagination, and emotion defies simple classification: it doesn't fit predictable radio formats.

redictable radio formats.

"Back to the Centre" is Brady's fifth album. His first, "Welcome Here Kind Stranger" won Melody Maker's album of the year in 1978 and contained traditional Irish music. 1981 saw Brady's "Hard Station" LP reach number one in Ireland, and though it gained critical success, it failed to receive much airplay. "True Blue" followed in 1983 with Bradf continuing to hone his musical and lyrical skills. The same year, he went on tour as the opening act for Eric Clapton, and then as a guest on the Dire Straits "Alchemy" tour.

Straits guitarist Mark Knopfler was so impressed with Brady he asked him to collaborate on the music from the film "Cal" in 1984. Then in 1985, Brady wrote the songs for "Back to the Centre".

"The Homes of Donegal" showcases Brady's folk-roots in a lilting traditional Irish folksong: "The time has come

for me to go / And bid you all adieu / The open highway calls me back / To do these things I do." In "The Island", Brady's Irish blood stirs with highly charged polotical references to Ireland and Lebanon. "They say the skies of Lebanon are burning / Those mighty cedars bleeding in the heat / Women and children dying in the street / And we're still at it in our own place / Still trying to reach the future through the past".

What sets this record apart from others is Brady's eclectic musical methods which frees him to combine elements of bouzouki and tin whistles with electric guitar and bass. And of course there're the lyrics. They're intelligent and poetic evoking images of Brady's own experiences and his personal convictions. "Back to the Centre" is aother one of those great records you'll never hear on the radio.

The probe is "calling" to earth, but no one on earth knows how to respond. The earth is doomed.

However, before they get too close to have their energy cut off, Cwptain Kirk and his small crew pick up the weird noise the probe is emitting and Spock, ever the clever Vulcan, suggests modifying the signal, taking into account the probe seems specifically directed at the earth's oceans, adjusting for water density and so on. It's the call of the long-extinct humpback whale. The probe has obviously returned to earth to re-connect with the species it had communicaced with centuries before.


Time travel is the ticket, and Kirk and his team decide to travel back in time to bring forward a humpback whale ot two to answer the probe before it presumably destroys earth

This is fun stuff. The crew may be serious about the mission, but they're really party animals at heart. Kirk even has time for a circa 1986 class of beer, although he has the pizza wrapped to go. Sure, some of the events are rather circumstantial, but this movie has thankfully left stuffy sci-fi pretense and Stars Wars type wanton violence to other celluloid efforts.

Kirk and his crew, as space musketeers, may disobey a few orders but they somehow manage to save the day nonetheless.

Spock (Leonard Nimoy) cowrote and directed this episode. His uptempo approach to the Star Trek phenomenon has produced an exceptionally enjoyable and entertaining film.

I highly recommend it.
