MEMO FROM THE REGISTRAR

The conclusion of the academic year is approaching and the Registrar's office would like to inform all B.C.I.T. students of the Scholarships and Bursaries that are available for them and the methods of applying for same.

The following definitions of scholarships and bursaries apply generally to post-secondary education.

A SCHOLARSHIP is granted for outstanding academic performance and may carry an automatic award of money, as is the case at B.C.I.T.

A BURSARY is a financial award made on the basis of need. A student's academic achievement, academic potential and character are taken into account.

### **GOVERNMENT OF B.C. BURSARIES**

Not applicable to B.C.I.T.

### **GOVERNMENT OF B.C. SCHOLARSHIPS**

Students attending B.C.I.T. may apply for the Government of British Columbia Scholarships. This award is available for the current year to a student who takes a full-year programme at the Institute. Candidates for scholarships applicable to the session 1969-70 will be considered on the basis of standings received in Term 2. Application must be made for these scholarships. Eligible applicants who attain first class standing will be granted 75 per cent of their tuition fees; top second class students will receive 50 per cent of their tuition fees; and the next group of second class students will receive 33-1/3 per cent of the fees. B.C. Government scholarship application forms and information pertaining thereto are available at the Registrar's Office. Applications must be received in the Registrar's Office by June 27, 1969.

### **B.C.I.T. SCHOLARSHIPS**

It is hoped that there will be sufficient funds for at least one. scholarship in each technology. Persons awarded these scholarships will be those with the highest standing in their particular technology. Therefore, it is not necessary to apply for a B.C.I.T. scholarship.

### **B.C.I.T. BURSARIES**

B.C.I.T. bursaries are awarded on the basis of financial need. In addition, a student's academic achievement and character are considered during the adjudication by the B.C.I.T. Scholarship and Bursary Committee. It is necessary to apply for a bursary. Application forms may be obtained from the Registrar's Office after May 7 and completed forms must be returned by June 16, 1969. Students do not make application for a specific bursary, but make application for consideration to the Scholarship and Bursary Committee who administer the fund. Those students awarded bursaries will be notified, by mail, during the fall, 1969. MONEY FOR

After investing in two years of your life at B.C.I.T., students look forward to a satisfactory job, since this was the basic reason for enrolling here.

The jobs situation at BCIT according to the Student Placement Office is again this year very favorable and it is expected that the majority of the student body will have jobs.

However, sometimes the jobs may not be to your liking. Maybe the job, the location, the pay or the promise of promotion are not quite what you are looking for.

Exposure

The important factor in looking for any job is one of exposure. You should not just apply for one job but as many as possible. This will give you a broader range to choose from and it takes time for employers to process your applications and make their decision.

There are many ways to find a job. Some of these are:

1. Newspaper classified and business section.

2. Trade magazines.

3. Student Placement Centre at BCIT.

4. Private Personnel agencies.

5. Application directly to individual companies.

6. Tips from friends or relatives.

You should try as many channels as possible to look for the job of your choice and once you find the one that interests yourself follow them through. Prepare a resume of yourself and make a dozen or more copies. This will supplement your application and provide a better picture of yourself to the prospective employer.

The most important part of job hunting is to apply to more than one firm. The time involved in processing is lengthy and if you receive a refusal you have to start all over again where if you made half a dozen contacts maybe your chances of success will be greater.

Job hunting is selling yourself. You must place yourself in a positive frame of mind and do a little homework (preparing resumes etc.). The point to remember is that no one is going to go out and get you a job, you must get it yourself.

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### NAVIGATOR CONVENTION

On Saturday, Feb. 8, a group of students from the Varsity Christian Fellowship Club went to Seattle to attend a Navigator Convention.

The Navigators are an interdenominational informal organization of Christian young people They are composed of students and working people They meet together on various evenings and share their feelings about Jesus Christ. These meetings are open to anyone with any type of belief. Some young people who come to these meetings believe in Him, others definitely don't and still others are full of doubts. Everyone is welcome to freely discuss their feelings and ideas. As you can imagine, the discussions become quite controversial; but, the group welcomes this type of session.

Once a week the "Nav" kids go to the University dorms where they share their experiences with the students there. The response has been quite good. I think it's because students enjoy hearing how other students have "conquered their doubts, and climbed over their hangups." Here is a group that really practices what they believe. Talk to any Navigator; ask him how he "conquered his hangups" and just how on earth Christ can be real and helpful today; he'll tell you! The characteristic I like most about these people is that they don't preach at you. They'll just tell how they've found Him real today and then try to be a real true friend to you.

This group have area conventions and conferences approximately twice a year. At these conferences there are large open sessions, small group discussions and time for general visitng over coffee. In the large open session the young people are taught how to communicate with people and how to be a real true friend as Christ was while here on earth. The purpose of the smaller group sessions is to give the individual a chance to communicate on a topic and to discuss problems (What are they?).

The conference took in the "Pacific Northwest" area which includes B.C., Washington and Oregon. Of the two hundred in attendance there were representatives from nearly all the Universities and Colleges in thsi area. There were also many representatives from the "working world." I should add a note here that representatives does not mean a sweet, elite little group chosen to go. Anyone who wants to can jump in their car and go to any Navigator convention or meeting any time they like.

Because the purpose of VCF Club is to "Know Christ and to Make Him Known", it was decided that this type of conference would be of specific practical help to anyone coming out to the meetings. The eight people who went from BCIT found it just so!

The first session was a small group discussion time. The you people went to any discussion that interested them. Some of the topics discussed were: "How to present Christ to your neighbor"; (we had to learn the meaning of neighbor first for that one!) "Daily Meeting with God through the Bible and Prayers"; "How to Prepare your Testimony"; "How to have a Vital Prayer Life"; and "How to Help a Christian Grow through the Bible."

There was a one-hour break for general visiting and coffee, after which the second session was begun.

This session was a large open meeting. Here, the group listened to a full-time Navigator worker speak on "How to be a Real True Friend to a Person". He outlined how Christ accomplished this task while here on earth. I really enjoyed this session because it was "people oriented". This is one of the main goals of a true Christian. Because, you see, in Christianity God is reaching toward Man through Jesus Christ. If man has really reached Gog through faith in this Jesus Christ, he will have received some of that everlasting love and want to reach his fellow man, communicate with him, care for him and listen to his

problems. In essence he'll want to be a true friend to people.

The executive members of VCF came back with a determination to follow Christ's teachings and examples on how to be a true Christian and friend today. They also came back a little bit broke because the water pump on Dan Wannop's car decided to "go" while heading down one of Seattle's beautiful freeways!

The course that was set out looked straight forward, although most of the drivers found certain turns to be very deceiving. This was evident particularly at the finish. Two laps were made per run, and this took


approximately two minutes. Each of the twenty-one cars had three runs.

Tradition has it that established institutions such as BCIT have certain mementos that students receive to commemorate their two years of living.


