PERSONNEL **CHANGES**

BRIAN GILLESPIE APPOINTED NEW V.P. EDUCATION

New V.P. Education, Brian Gillespie, is taking over the position during the second most challenging period of the Institute's history. He views the prospect with characteristic calmness. knowing there will be difficulties and changes ahead, but convinced that the new mandate is putting the Institute on the right track. "For me the most significant thing about the mandate is that it gives the Institute a sense of direction and clearly differentiates us from the colleges," he says.

"One of the biggest tasks facing us right now is to come to grips with all those things impacting the mandate by the end of September. On a day to day basis, I don't see there being any dramatic changes; all the program changes will probably occur next September during the 1989 fiscal year."

The liking and respect Gillespie has earned for the clear sighted, hardworking approach he employed during his tenure as Dean of the School of Health Sciences will aid him in his new job as he assesses priorities. Assessing new priorities as V.P., he says, will include looking at ways of building closer relationships with industry, reviewing the state of equipment and facilities in classrooms and labs, student recruitment on a province-wide basis, BCIT's role as a provincial institution and the structure and articulation of curriculum within BCIT.

This new phase of Gillespie's career, at age 43, coincides with his recent appointment as chairman of the Vancouver General Hospital board and his recent marriage. He is also deriving satisfaction these days from seeing the subject of his doctoral thesis the development of an advanced diploma in Health Sciences for B.C. - put in place at BCIT and become very successful.

Born in Toronto, Gillespie obtained his Ph.D in Education from Nova University in Florida in 1983, his M.A. in Nuclear Physics from McMaster University, Ontario in 1969 and his B.Sc (Hons) from U.B.C. in 1968. He came to BCIT in 1976 from Vanier College in Montreal where he began as a physics teacher and rose in three years to principal of the Snowdon campus

PERSONNEL DIRECTOR TAKES UP **NEW POSITION WITH MINISTRY OF REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT**

Personnel Director Ron Bell will be leaving the Institute September 16 to take up a new position as Regional Development Officer, Mainland, S.W. Region, in the provincial ministry of Regional Development. Elwood Veitch is the Minister.

Labour Relations Manager, Jose Stockdale, has been appointed Acting Director of Personnel in the interim and Bell will be working with her on certain projects until his departure. He will also maintain a liaison with BCIT during the period of transition.

NEW ACTING DEANS APPOINTED

Following recent changes to staffing on the academic side, two acting deans have been appointed to replace John Kyle, who resigned during the summer, and Brian Gillespie who has taken on the position of V.P. Education.

Filling the position of acting dean of Engineering Technology is Dave Chowdhury, an instructor in the Marketing Department. Chowhury has a B.Sc in Math, a post graduate diploma in Aeronautical Engineering, an M.A. in Computer Science and a Ph.D in Management Information Systems. He has previously worked at IBM and B.C. Tel.

Lorne Fingarson, director of Business Part-time Studies, is acting dean of Business. Fingarson has a B.A. in Commerce and is an M.B.A. candidate. He has had seven years of teaching experience at BCIT and prior to ioining the Institute in 1976 was president of a variety of small companies. He is active as an advisor to the I.W.A. and interior forest industries on job evaluation.

George Eisler, associate dean of Health Technologies, and Len McNeely continue as acting deans of the School of Health Sciences and School of Trades Training respectively.

The President has indicated that it is anticipated that all dean positions will be permanently filled early in the new year.

MORVEN WILSON RESIGNS

Computer Resources director Morven Wilson has resigned from the Institute and will be taking up a new position as director of Ryerson's computer facilities later this fall.

In the meantime, V.P. Education Brian Gillespie says he will be looking at the administrative organization of **Computer Resources and Computer** Systems to see if they should be administered separately. Morven Wilson has administered them both, as director of Computer Resources and Associate dean of Computer Systems, the BCIT technology program.

Gillespie anticipates that two acting department heads will be appointed in the interim.

BOARD COMMITTEES REVISED

While the Institute undergoes change as it grows into its new role, the Board of Governors has also been reviewing its functions. Under new Board chairman, Ed Taylor, the governors recently revised the standing committee structure to include new members, improve efficiency and reflect new priorities.

Apart from the Executive Committee which sets the agenda for Board meetings and generally looks after internal Board-related issues, Board committees review policy relating to their specific areas of responsibility and make recommendations to the Board. The College Liaison Committee has been newly established to reflect BCIT's growing relationships with other post secondary institutions and to provide liaison at the Board level.
