Staff Tours

Plans are underway to give BCGEU support staff the opportunity to tour Open House on Friday, April 8.



The idea is the brainchild of Recreation and Athletic Services director, Jim Mitchell, who has received enthusiastic support for the idea from President Murray and the V.P.'s.

"I will be asking associate deans, directors and managers to send a representative from each of the departments to a meeting next week to discuss the plan. These department reps will then be responsible for determining how many staff tour guides will be required based on the size of the department," says Mitchell. "Once the number of guides has been determined we will bring them all together for a training session a few days before Open House."

On April 8 at 2 p.m. BCGEU support staff will be invited to assemble for a short reception prior to embarking on their tours. Each tour will take approximately two and a half hours and cover both north and south sides of the campus.

"The passport books," says Open House co-ordinator Lori Plamondon, "should act as an incentive to people to visit as many areas as possible. They will also provide us with a mailing list for future Open Houses."

DOBIS ADOPTED BY OXFORD UNIVERSITY

Oxford University in England is the latest to join the widening circle of DOBIS/LIBIS users.

The university chose IBM's DOBIS/ LIBIS system after an extensive discussion period which resulted in a 77-page Operational Requirements document and an equally detailed analysis of all available systems.

Anyone interested in learning more about this ambitious project should read the article by Tom Crawshaw of the Oxford University Library Automation Team (vol. 5, no. 3 December 1987) issue of the DOBIS/LIBIS newsletter. A copy is currently circulating in the BCIT Library.

IETE STAFF CHOSEN TO CONDUCT WORKSHOP

Dave McNeal and Peter Trant of the Industrial Education Teacher Education (IETE) have been invited to present a workshop at the annual convention of the International Technology Education Association (ITEA) in Norfolk, Virginia, March 21-25, 1988. The workshop is one of the 65 selected from hundreds of proposals.

Titled Task Analysis, Technology Transfer and Technology Teacher Education, the workshop deals with the process used in IETE's current program revision. It looks at how the revision team used the DACUM process for a teacher training program during a time of very rapid curriculum change, where its graduates may be doing quite a different job from the one that presently exists.

The ITEA is the world's largest professional organization for secondary level technology education and also has wide representation from postsecondary institutions. The conference attracts thousands of registrants from around the world.

BCIT CONFERENCE HAILED AS LANDMARK

Over the weekend of February 26 and 27, 1988 the Industrial Education Teacher Education (IETE) program at BCIT hosted a conference on Technology Education in Secondary Schools. The conference, which was sponsored by BCIT, The Ministry of Education, The B.C. Technology Education Association and three Lower Mainland school districts, was attended by nearly 350 B.C. teachers, administrators and trustees. Sharing their knowledge were Technology Education experts from Canada, the U.S. and Great Britain.

Technology Education, which is well established in Great Britain and the U.S., is a program to modernize the traditional industrial education, or "shop" courses in the secondary schools. Technology Education differs from traditional shops in several important ways, including:

 shift of emphasis from simply making products using existing plans, to the process of identifying needs and designing, manufacturing and marketing appropriate products and services
the addition of contemporary technology to the program content and including computers, lasers, fiber optics, robotics, synthetic materials, etc.

• a shift from traditional wood, metal, drafting, etc. shops to integrated, process-oriented labs.

Conference speakers included high school students, who demonstrated several laser systems they designed, the head of a design and technology program in Great Britain, and teachers and administrators of successful and award-winning secondary technology programs.

The consensus among presenters and registrants was that the conference marked an important landmark in the technical curriculum in B.C. secondary schools.
