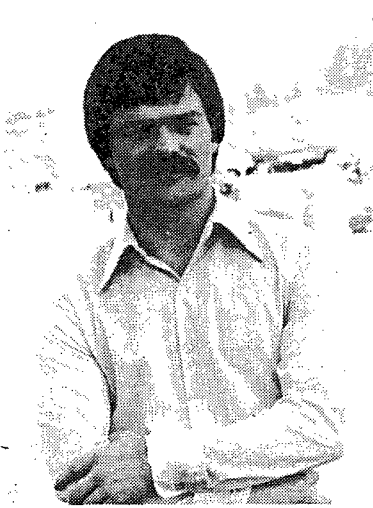




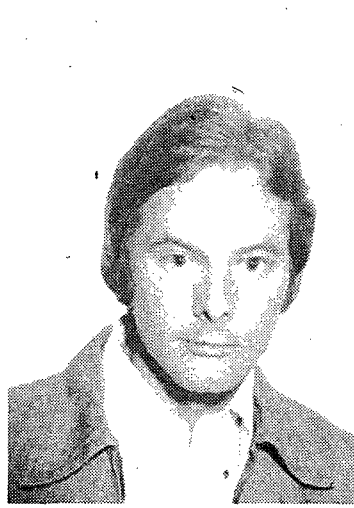

Over 750 vote

## Scott the new prez.

John Scott is the SA's new president for 1977-78.

Scott outdistanced second place finisher Keith Gill by nearly one hundred votes in the presidential race. Bernard Wuttke trailed a distant third.

About 750 people voted and the results were never in doubt from the time counting began at four o'clock last Friday afternoon.

Rob Seines easily defeated, Allan Schmelzel in the VP Internal race; Ian Robertson defeated John Poelman for the position of VP External; Jean Bengough

narrowly defeated Joan Angrignon for the Business Society representative; Pat Hanrahan beat Norm Nalleweg for Sports rep; and Warren Allen easily outdistanced Randy Chang for the position of Activities Coordinator.

The only position for which there was a close fight was the Treasurer's — Allan Walker defeated second place finisher Barney Sharp by 46 votes with Ken Buchanan a close third.

Brent Simpson ended up taking the Engineering Society position on the Executive by acclamation

after Ian Comrie dropped out. Robert Owen was elected by acclamation as Health Rep, as was reported in last week's LINK.

The referendum on raising the SA fee by \$5 to go to the Building Fund was narrowly defeated by less than 70 votes.

Some electees had not submitted statements of thanks/acceptance by our deadline Monday morning. Those which were submitted are reprinted below. Congratulations, everyone, for a well-fought campaign!

## No quorum kills council meet

The Student Council meeting which was scheduled for Wed., April 13, turned out to be a disaster as the number of people who showed up was not even enough for a quorum. It was very essential that the Council have a quorum for on the agenda was the passing of the constitution changes. Since there was not a quorum, the Council decided to make the meeting into an executive meeting, thus giving them the power to vote on some issues.

Three meeting was very short so there was not a heck of a lot discussed. Lianne Kos, Business Society Rep, announced that the end of the year exams will be written in the Willingdon gym, SAC cafeteria and school classrooms. The exams will not be written in the gym as the Administration feels that it ruins the

floor. The idea of a Campus Life Coordinator was brought up once again. Sharon McElroy reported that she had talked to Dale Michaels and that Student Services could not possibly share the burden of the extra salary. The job of a Campus Life Coordinator would be to bring into BCIT a much more varied form of entertainment than we presently have. The matter was tabled for further investigation.

The most interesting outcome of the whole evening was Sharon McElroy's announcement that she would be saving the Council \$700 in the month of May. This thoughtful gesture was made because Sharon will be leaving BCIT for bigger and better things. During her time in office, continued on page 4

## Scott—'must unite council'

John Scott, the SA's president-elect, was interviewed by the LINK shortly after the ballots were counted Friday afternoon. He was, naturally, very enthusiastic about the new position.

John stated that he's very leery about heading into the new job at full speed because of his relative inexperience. His first job, he said, will be to get to know the administration, with current president Sharon McElroy's help.

Scott expressed some concern about the upcoming budget, which is being drawn up by current-treasurer Don MacKay. Both councils (new and old) vote

on it and Scott hopes to put some input into it. He pointed out that although the Building-Fund referendum was defeated, he still hopes to be able to proceed with SAC renovations. There is some money in the SA fund and he hopes to be able to start work this summer. He felt that the reason the referendum was defeated is that students did not see any immediate results from their money.

Scott feels that his main task this year will be to unite the student council. He would like to work more closely with student service continued on page 2

## Book display in library today

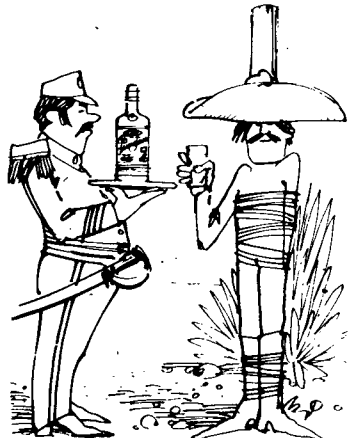
Publishers have been invited to display their new book offerings today in the Library. Students will be given the chance to choose the books they want to see in the library next year.

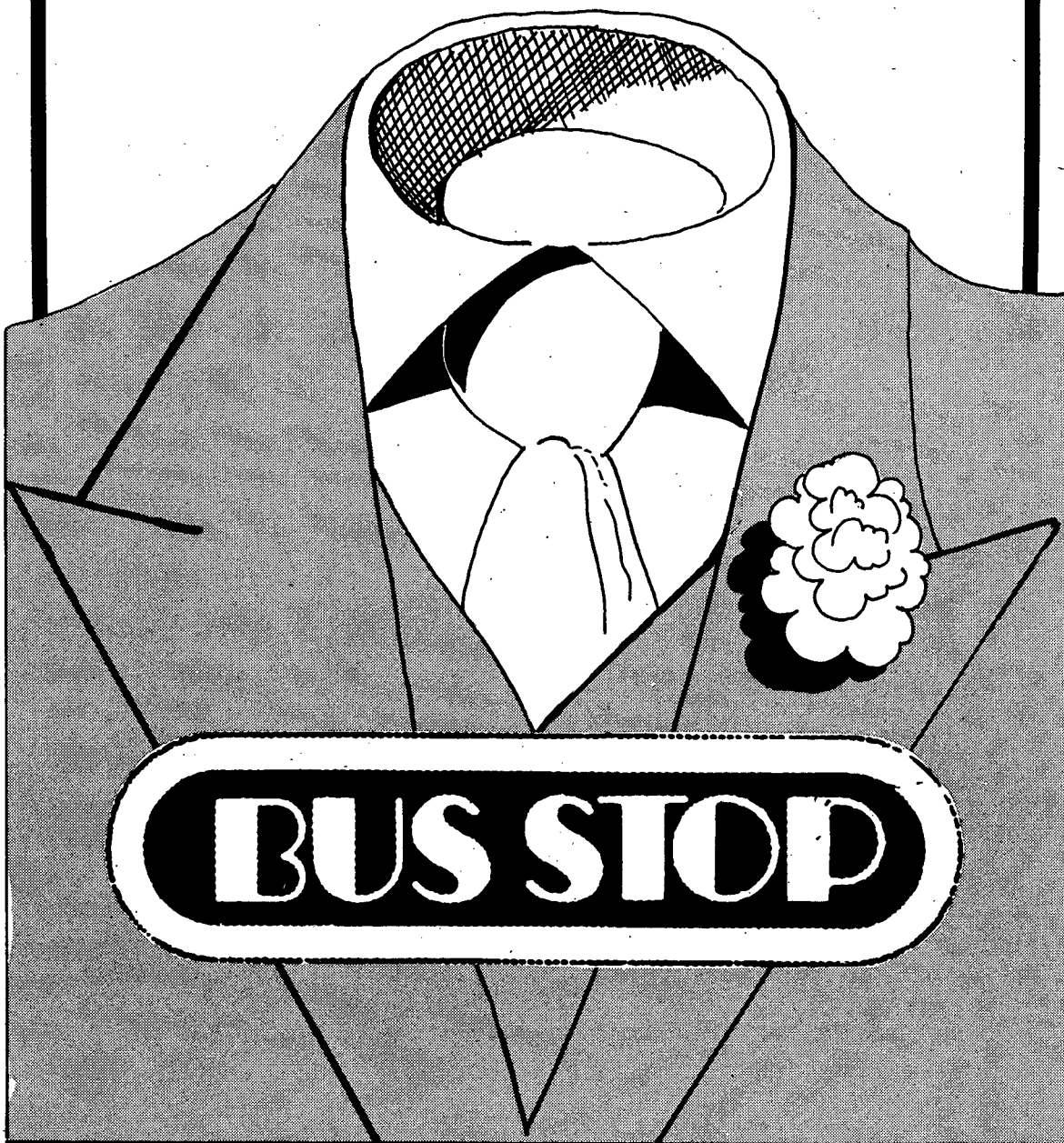
