n a brief conversation with 1st year Engineering Instructor Russell Oye, we learned a little bit about the ship donated to BCIT.

Bill New, formerly of Coast Ferries, donated the Tyee to BCIT from her igational equipment and had her hull elongated to perform the necessary duties of a coastal freighter. The Tyee, at one point was a herring processor and did runs up the coast of BC with supplies for logging camps, like food, fresh water, an fuel.

In 1994 and 1995 the Tyee went through a bridge upgrade with digital charts, GPS tracking systems and modern navigational equipment as well as an engine and generator refit. Eventually she will be used as part of the classroom training sessions where cadets will get to hear in class what they must do, see first hand how a ship operates, and then get to pilot the ship themselves.

home at the Vancouver Marine Heritage Society on Sept. 24th this year. The ship was given as a training vessel for the mariners attending BCIT programs at the PMTC campus.

Pacific Marine Training Centre

BCIT more than a trades and tech school

estled near the Lonsdale Quay in North Vancouver sits the home of one of the most beautiful campuses in the Lower Mainland. The Pacific Marine Training Centre (PMTC) is a satellite campus for BCIT dedicated to educating new sailors and experienced mariners alike.

Entering the building is a treat. It is set up on three levels, called decks to simulate a ship's environment, and each deck contains different classrooms based on the courses offered. On the second deck we were first introduced to Captain Phillip Durell (see photo, top right) who was running a radar simulator course for experienced mariners.

"It's a five day course for expert navigators... we run them around Bowen Island and I can change everything from the weather conditions to the amount of nautical traffic to the number of targets [destinations] that the navigators must pilot to," said Durell, sitting at the helm of the simulator. Students are challenged with passage planning, executing the plan, navigating around other traffic, diverging from the plan and then getting back on course. From the simulator, Capt. Durell can cause malfunctions on the ships or help students in the use of Vancouver Harbour Patrol or other ship's captains.

Next we were off to the first deck where the marine engineering offices are as well as the safety and emergency systems are taught. Here, engineering students learn to work on all the parts of different vessels. We headed into the machine shop and had a look some of the huge engines and generators that the students were working on.

Also on the first deck, we spoke with Serhat Beyenir in the Propulsion Plant Simulator, which essentially simulates a working engine room with noise pumped in via a set of speakers and working diagrams of the insides of a ship.

The first deck is also home to a gym and a rigging room, where students learn how to tie all the necessary knots they will need for mooring boats and ships (see photo, bottom right).

Back on the second deck are map rooms completely outfitted with charts and other navigational equipment. As well as learning on all of the simulators and precise navigational equipment, students are taught theory and traditional methods of navigating the sea. On a desk in one of the rooms there was sextant that is used to chart one's position according to the sun.

We also had the opportunity to talk to Malcolm Fiander, a second year Nautical Sciences student in

the the four year cadet program at PMTC.

"The cadet program... gives you a Transport Canada recognized diploma, which is a fast track to becoming a first mate when you finish the course," said Fiander. He stresses that the term "cadet" is in no way related to the military designation and that PMTC is strictly a learning centre for merchant vessel crewpersons.

The cadets have a unique comraderie in their program, similar to the sets here at BCIT. They all dress in uniform around campus and most of them participate in the same programs, plus they go to sea together.

"It's like a co-op program," said Fiander, "only we have two semesters on land followed by a semester at sea." The cadets go to sea three times for six months over their four years in the program.

"Last time I was out, we were on a 280 metre coal ship for 52 days," said Fiander, noting that he only saw port nine times in the six months he was gone.

While at sea the cadets take care of everything above the hull, including mooring the ship, hauling lines, keeping the ship clean, fixing rust problems and checking the paint. While in port, they have to watch who is boarding the vessel, signing the appropriate paper work for the cargo the ship is taking on board or off-loading, and documenting all of the transfers of dangerous goods.

"One of the most important things we do while in port is maintain the structural integrity and balance of the ship... we have to watch the amounts of ballast water and evenly distribute the weight of the cargo so the ship has no stress on it," said Fiander.

When asked why he wanted to become a sailor, Fiander simply said, "It's an exciting prospect to go to work everyday and have a dynamic, 360 degree office to work in. And I love the outdoors." Plus the money, the time off and the overtime are reasonably good perks, if you don't mind being at sea half the year. The majority of mariners are paid in US funds and when you are on a ship there is no where to spend your money.

For the program, Fiander hopes that BCIT can implement a working relationship with companies that need competent sailors. There is a prediction that in 10 years, roughly 20-40,000 officers will be needed worldwide to staff nautical operations. The program at BCIT is the only one like it in Western Canada, so it is a valuable resource for out sailors of the future.

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IEL Team at BCIT Looks Into Web

Some of you might agree that Internet is the place for information, entertainment, meeting and chatting with people, split second news, realtime stock market quotes, and other valuable information.

The Internet is the one and only place where the whole earth can access information without restrictions or limitations. However, this digitalutopia became a "virtual armageddon" on October 21st, 2002.

"Hackers distributed denial of service attack (DDOS) to clog the heart of the Internet. That attack used a constellation of hijacked computers to unleash a surging wave of bogus data traffic aimed at the 13 root-level domain name servers (DNS) that function as the authoritative directory assistance for the Internet. Taking down these geographically dispersed servers, three of which are located outside the U.S., in Sweden, Britain, and Japan, would be the digital equivalent of turning off the traffic signals in Manhattan at rush hour."

It was the first time in history that hackers tried to take down all 13 root-level DNS servers at once. The function of the root DNS servers translates Web addresses like www.bcit.ca to a corresponding numerical IP address. The DNS servers are the Net's basic traffic directors, sending information to all other servers about which web sites are available and what specific Internet protocol addresses (the numbers that servers use to identify one another) are being used. Victimized servers include U.S.

Department of Defense Network Information Center in Vienna VA; U.S. Army Research Lab in Aberdeen, MD (U.S. nuclear research lab); VeriSign Global Registry Services, Herndon VA; VeriSign Global Registry Services, Herndon VA; Autonomica Stockholm, SE; Reseaux IP European - Network Coordination Centre London, UK; WIDE Project Tokyo, JP.

"It was the single most elaborate and focused attack on the DNS network that we have ever seen," said Tom Ohlsson, vice president of Matrix NetSystems Inc. The attack was activated by commanding the hacked computers to overflow the 13 root servers with ICMP (Internet Control Message Protocol) messages. ICMP messages are data packets that contain information about control, error, and other network minutiae.

The ICMP overwhelmed the targets with bogus ping queries, eventually clogging the pipe and effectively making the target computer inaccessible on the Net.

The attack was digitally equivalent to 50,000 phones to dial 911 at the same time, therefore actual users were unable to reach the Websites. According to Web security firm, Matrix NetSystems, seven of the servers were affected enough to have periods of "zero-reachablility." As of October 30th, FBI investigators are still trying to track down sources and information to find the responsible hackers who are still unknown and at large. Computerworld.com defined this attack as "Net's Vulnerability Exposed."

According to Eric Byres, a professional engineer and research team leader of the Internet Engineering Lab (IEL) at the BCIT Technology Centre, "the hackers are getting progressively more clever. It's a game to most of them, but they may do something that is life-threatening by mistake and people with malicious intent now suddenly have all these tools."

"The last time it was done, it was a 13-year-old," says Mark Rasch, an executive senior vice-president at a Net security firm Solutionary in Omaha, Neb.

Fortunately, the security specialists quickly reacted by advising its clients to temporarily switch traffic from those ISPs affected by the event. The service was restored within hours and no further damage was done.

Thank goodness for people who know how to handle computer attacks.


Value: 8 – \$1.99 for a massive hot dog and refillable pop. We aren't sure if you're supposed to get refillable pop, but we took it regardless.

Local models paraded the creations of about 50 designers down the catwalk at AuBar on the evenings of Thursday, October 24th and Friday the 25th, with the 10 best designers showcased on the final Saturday evening.

Senator Paul Wellstone: One Good Politician

The major problem with the review is that there is barely any mention of the movie itself, simply social commentary on an interview with the movie's star Gabriel Byrne.

Caddell discusses with Byrne the state of horror films in today's market and relates sparse information about the film to the way we view the horrors of our daily lives, including terrorism, fear, and greed. In fact, there is more information about Gabriel Byrne's 1993 Oscar winning film In The Name of The Father than there is about Ghost Ship.

Basically, Ghost ship is a pretty standard horror film. At points in the movie I would comment to my friend "hey, that guy's head is going to fall off," and sure enough, it did. Predictability is normal in films like this. At some points, the movie had the audience laughing aloud, which is also reasonably normal for horror films. What Ghost Ship lacked was in fact horror. The premise of the film is that a Canadian pilot (Desmond Harrington) finds a mysterious ship in the Bering

Straight near Alaska and hires a rag-tag, motley crew salvage team (lead by Byrne and Julianna Margulies formerly of ER fame) to go and salvage the ship.

This is where all hell breaks loose.

The ship is full of lost souls, the patrons of the ship's past. Some of the ghosts are good; some of the ghosts seduce the members of the crew and push them down elevator shafts. Margulies's character is aided by the ghost of a small British girl (Emily Browning) named Katie who helps her discover the true nature of their Canadian pilot friend, who turns out to be evil. For full details on that, go see the movie

As an aside, if Ghost Ship is a mirror of our current societal fears, according to Ian Caddell of the Straight, why do Americans insist on portraying Canadians as evil? Hmmm...

I found Ghost Ship to be more entertaining than scary or horrific. The crew was very comic book with no character development and the foreshadowing was all completely obvious. One thing Ghost shipped lacked was a jump factor. There was not a single scene that startled me. There was some gore, some maggots, and some evil plotting, but overall it was just another horror film. Kudos to the production team for getting the funding necessary for this one.

Peter Gabriel Up Geffen Records

T is been exactly a decade since the release of **Peter Gabriel's** last official studio album - Us. One would think with an album title such as Up, we'd be treated to a bunch of up-tempo, powerful poppy songs from the former lead singer of **Genesis**. For the most part, Up is down, but this doesn't make it bad at all.

Gabriel, now a man of at least 100 years, has always been on the outer fringes of pop and with this record has reestablished himself in that position. The album begins with "Darkness," a track that juxtaposes loud abrasive sections next to laid back melody. Next is "Growing Up," which is an obvious choice for the next single. This hookladen number features the middle-eastern influence that **Gabriel** so often dabbles in, in combination with sampled beats and grinding guitars. This is cutting edge stuff here, which shouldn't be surprising to anyone familiar with the man's work.

The first single from Up is "The Barry Williams Show," a heavy-handed commentary about daytime talk shows. It's an odd choice for leadoff single...even though it is catchy, it's probably the weakest track on the album, and seems a bit dated. Most of the tracks on Up approach the 6-7 minute mark, and take most of that time to fully develop.

They're well-written, dense songs, especially "I Grieve" which turns from beautiful ballad to funk at the drop of a high hat. It might just've been the ten year wait that made this album so welcome to my ears, or maybe it was the fact that someone is still willing to put out a daring pop record such as this. I don't think this is the last thing we'll hear from **Gabriel**, and hopefully he'll continue to embrace 21st century ideas and keep pumping out more of these songs.




