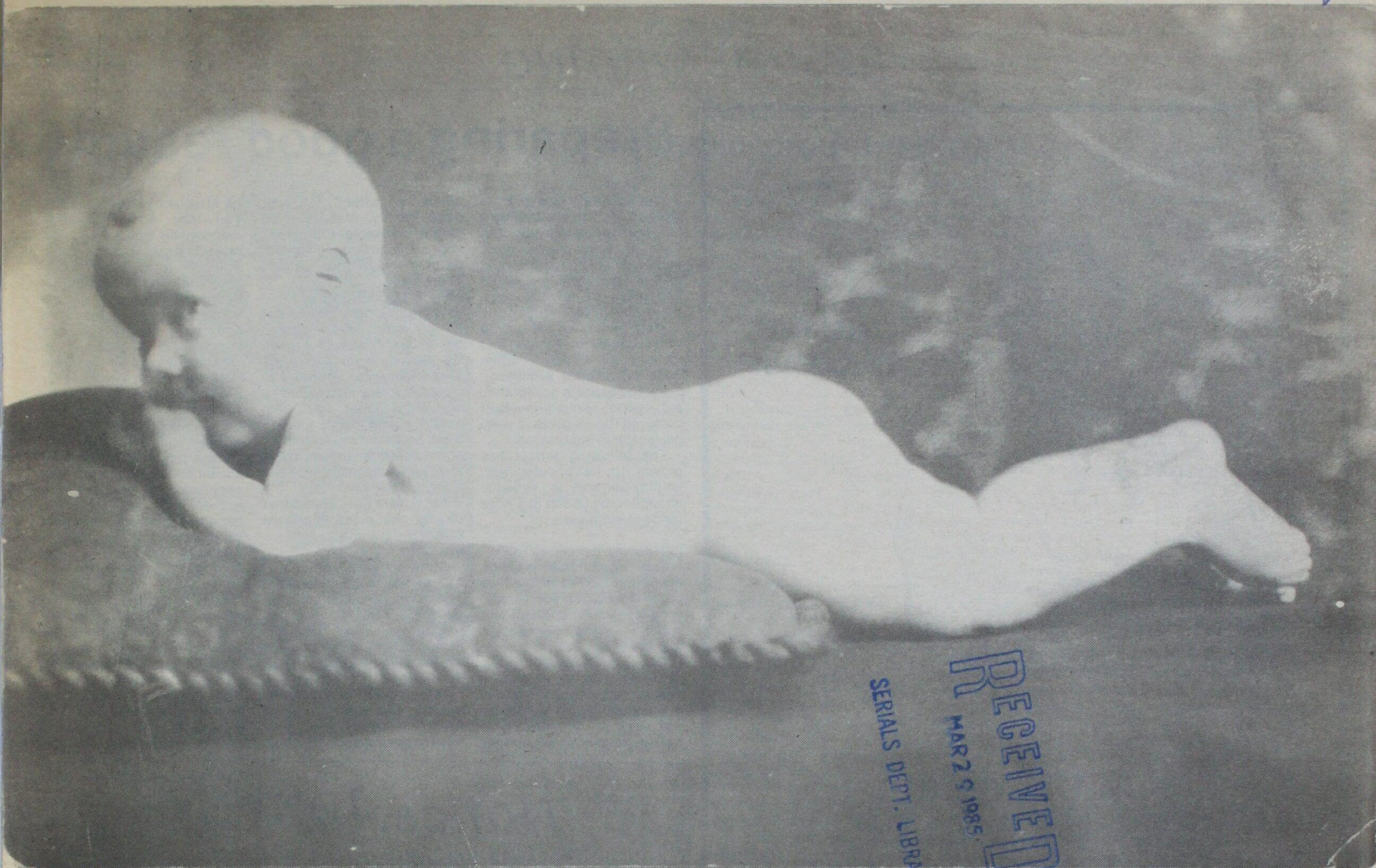

## Thom defends generic programming

At an open forum, which many participants claimed was hastily organized and poorly promoted, BCIT President Gordon Thom spent much of his time attempting to justify his decision to recommend generic math and communications courses in 85/86. That recommendation is among many he will be making to the Board of Governors Thursday March 28th.

Over 200 students and staff attended the Wednesday afternoon forum. They listened for half an hour as Thom explained in an opening address what he will recommend be kept and what he will suggest be cut, as a result of funding that has become available since the original cuts announcement in February. BCIT will be receiving 1 per cent more than anticipated in the form of a productivity bonus, as well as some other money from the provincial government. Thom said that while programs would be maintained, cuts to services and numbers would be necessary, as well as an 8 per cent fee increase for day school students. He also announced that he was recommending to the Board a 'differential fee' for Business students of \$100, on top of the increase. He said that the School of Management was a 'heavy burden' for the institute and that other institutions had a similar fee. Thom claimed that

administration costs at BCIT were in line with costs at other colleges and institutions. He cited staff studies and said he would be 'surprised if BCIT administrative costs weren't the lowest in the province.' Thom said BCIT's higher costs were in areas such as the library, where books are more expensive and more quickly obsolete. he wrapped up his address by claiming that BCIT would do 'everything it could' to minimize the number of layoffs. He added that he

didn't think formula funding was appropriate for BCIT, 'but the reality is we have (only) this much money.'

Questioning concentrated on Thom's recommendation that much core programming would be generic.

One instructor pointed out that technology 'rests on the ability to communicate,' through graphics, English and mathematics. He questioned the value of common English and math courses, considering the specialized nature of

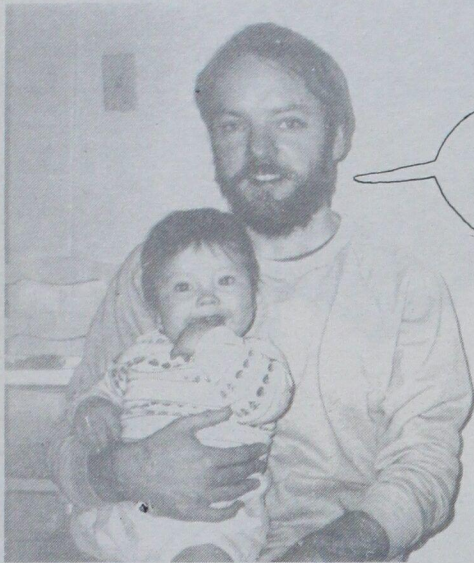

## Preparing a good resume

The resume is designed to get you an interview with a prospective employer. The style of your resume is a personal decision and should reflect your individual skills and areas of effectiveness. Be flexible in your format.

Most resumes are up to three pages in length and look most effective when done on a word processor. Coloured paper is acceptable, but good white or buff coloured bond gives a very professional impression.

The following format has proven to be popular with employers and is versatile enough to be useful in a wide range of industries.

### PERSONAL INFORMATION

This information may be centred at the top of the first page. It includes your name, complete address, telephone number and message number.

Do not include your birthdate, height, weight or health unless it is a requirement of the industry you work in or unless you have a health problem that

could affect your employability. Also, it is no longer advisable to include your social insurance number on your resume, for reasons of privacy.

### CAREER OBJECTIVE

This statement should not be longer than three sentences. It should explain the job you want and/or the kind of company you want to work for. It may also include a statement about your best qualifications for the job you want as well as a statement about any other special skills, abilities or attitudes that will bring you the job.

Employers have stated that this is the most important part of the resume.

### EDUCATION

Start with your most recent educational accomplishment first. Do not undersell your education. BCIT should be written out in full and describe your diploma as a 'National Diploma of Technology'. Also, list a few of the major courses included in your two year course at BCIT. A copy of your transcript of marks may also

be attached to your resume. You may also include a category for 'special courses, projects or awards'.

It is imperative that all the information for a particular marketing page remain on one page and that any additional information, particularly Employment History, start on a new page.

### EMPLOYMENT HISTORY

This category is the one that varies the most in resume design. You may choose any format that best accentuates the skills and experience you have acquired in the labour force. However, remember to highlight the occupation you held rather than the name of the employer or the dates you worked.

Include a brief description of your job duties and note any transferable skills acquired (e.g. analyzing, organizing, public speaking, persuading, writing, etc.)

Do not discuss reasons for leaving or salary earned. The resume is not intended to answer every question the employer may have.

### HOBBIES, ACTIVITIES AND AFFILIATIONS

This category gives you a chance to give a potential employer some insight into your character and personality. You may include clubs or professional associations, campus activities, volunteer work, hobbies and sports.

### REFERENCES

'Excellent references supplied upon request.' Do not include references unless you are sending a resume at the request of an employer. This procedure will preserve the confidentiality of the people you use as references as well as allow you to change your references for a particular employer.

If you are invited to an interview, bring a list of references at that time. Remember, before listing a reference in your resume, you need permission from that person.

### RESUME REMINDERS

Check spelling and grammar. Have your resume professionally typed or done on a word processor. Use good bond paper. Check your references.

### COVERING LETTER

Mail your covering letter and resumes to a particular person. Your company research will reveal who is responsible for hiring in a particular company.

The letter should include such things as the position you are applying for and/or your career objective; the reason you are seeking employment with this company or industry; a knowledge of the organization you are making application to and; availability for interviews.

technologies at BCIT. Thom said he had few students say they would miss specialized English or math, he said students had written in support of generic programs in modular competency based form. He added that what BCIT is doing is the 'direction being taken by U.S. universities.'

Richard Lund with the English (Communications) department, told Thom he had received a letter of support for specialized English courses from the Society of Engineering Technologists of B.C., who accredit many BCIT programs. Thom dismissed the support, saying he had also received a letter from SETBC, suggesting that BCIT should 'get out of business.'

Lund challenged Thom by saying there were options in Drug Svetic's original budget that Thom hadn't considered. Thom told the crowd the although it 'could be done this year, next year it would be cut.'

Later an Environmental student, speaking on behalf of several from his technology attending the forum, lamented the elimination of specialized communications courses in his program. He said he was 'quite concerned' that future students would be deprived of a program that has 'so far bene of immense benefit to us.' He said generic coursee with large classes would not nurture ability, that there would be no regular or significant feedback, and that there would be 'no opportunity' for instructor-student interraction.

He added that it was fine that a technological education was available, but 'if we're not given the skills to articulate that eductaion, it's lost.'

After the applause died down, Thom simply claimed that there has been a 'misunderstanding' about what has been put in the budget.

Another group of students, this time from Computer Systems, also expressed concern over the elimination of specialized English. They said they shared the same view as the Environmental students. 'We don't want next year's students to go without.'

Some students said they had heard rumours that with computerizations, students would be charged for modules. Thom said he hadn't heard that rumour, but didn't dispel it as a possibility in the future. Several students in the crowd told Thom they were already

paying for modules.

Another student expressed the concern that with the increase and the differential fee, business programs at BCIT were becoming 'twice as expensive' as those offered elsewhere. He said he didn't understand why BCIT was so expensive. Thom said that the number of applicants shows BCIT 'is doing something right.'

A Marketing instructor upset over the proposed \$100 surcharge for Business Students questioned Thom's claim that Business programs were not cost-effective. However Thom said costs in Business were 40 per cent higher than in Engineering.

Following more questions about the direction BCIT was taking, Thom said of his recommendations that he 'didn't have any alternatives given to him,' which drew a hostile reaction from the crowd. Members of the Staff Society were particularly upset at his comment, as they had tabled with the Institute what they called an 'alternative budget.' Thom criticized that proposal and said it didn't allow for 'services, registration, plant, telephones' and other expenses. Greg Layton,

President of the Staff Society, contended that the \$6 million left after education costs were covered was enough to 'adequately' fund the administration of BCIT.

One member of the audience insisted that Thom allow the crowd to 'move' that an additional open forum be called to further discuss the budget priorities. Although the speaker had support from the crowd, Thom ruled the motion 'out of order', telling the speaker that the forum was simply to 'provide information'. Instructors in the crowd claimed they had only found out about the forum 'that morning but that Thom knew the week before. Thom dismissed the lack of notice claim, suggesting that an article appearing in The Sun the day before was enough notice.

The cost-effectiveness of modularization came up when a HTRAC student questioned the value of modules where students had to individually ask instructors about material that could be covered in twenty minutes of class time, instead of taking 3 or 4 hours of the instructor's time to explain the same problem over and over again. Thom replied that he felt that E&E had a 'better, more

up-to-date curriculum than 2 years ago,' as a result of modularization.

A math instructor expressed his 'disbelief that Drug (Svetic) would make the statement that cutting (specialized) math would not effect quality. He suggested it would only provide more fees through higher attrition rates. 'It's going to severely cut into the time I spend with each student,' the instructor said.

Svetic, who was in the crowd, replied that he would 'prefer to discuss it with department', but he did claim that quality can be maintained, and that attrition may go down, not up. He said it will require 'carefully designed curriculum.'

When asked about the Minsitry of Education 'slush' fund, Thom said he didn't know where BCIT fit in. 'We may already have some of it in the form of the 1 per cent increase, or it may be tocover severence costs resulting from program changes.' He thought it might also be intended to fund equipment replacement.

At the ninety minute mark, although most of the audience had left, some students and staff were still lining up to ask questions when Thom tried to wind the forum down.

Thom told the crowd that although he was making his recommendations to the Bopard, it would 'not cut off' budget discussion.

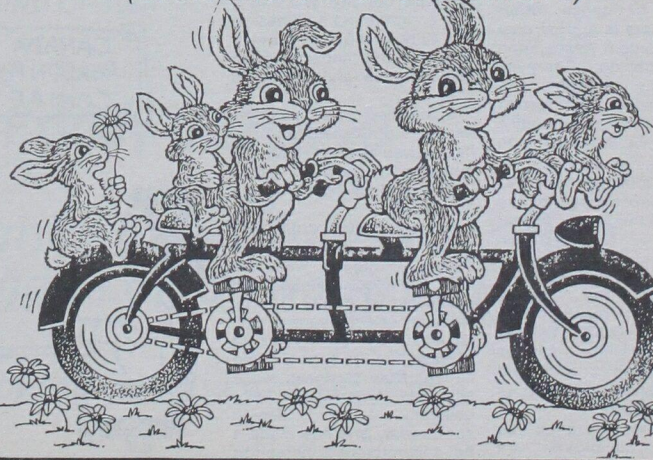

## Avoid the 'slate'

Editor, The Link,

With the announcement last week in the Link that the SRF slate is contending the four positions of President, VP Administration and Finance, VP Public Relations and Marketing, and VP Student Affairs, it appears that these four candidates are attempting to set up a clique that will determine the strategies and policies of the S.A.

With all of the election excitement that is sure to occur this week, be aware that the S.A. is a student organization designed to represent all of the students, and not the special concerns (or perceived concerns) of one group in particular.

Our main concern about this group is that their activities strongly emphasize political activities external to the S.A. and (to a somewhat lesser degree) the Institute - that is 'each SRF member...will lobby the provincial government...' If each of them is planning a trip to Victoria on a regular basis, when will they get time to listen to the students? If the executive are in meetings all day long, where is the student input going to come from?

We believe that the provincial government can sort out a good portion of the problems that the students and the Institute are facing, but not all of them. It will take consultation and persuasion of the provincial government, the Institute, and the Staff Society by the Student Association.

The S.A. is also not wholly reliant on the external activities of these other groups. There is a great deal that the Student Association can and does do on its own. With some thought and imagination, we can further enhance the community's view of us, by introducing an entrepreneurial approach to the way of thinking in the S.A. This is a new concept to the thinking of the typical former Student Association Executive.

We can set up our own advertising and media campaigns to highlight the graduate of BCIT. We can also approach serious problems with a 'We' and 'Them', instead of a 'We' vs 'Them' approach.

The statements stating that the S.R.F. candidates are

'committed to protecting the status of the BCIT diplomas...' are what any Student Association member would expect of their elected representatives.

If you think these four positions are too important to be filled with people who are independent thinking, be careful who you vote for on April 2, 3 and 4.

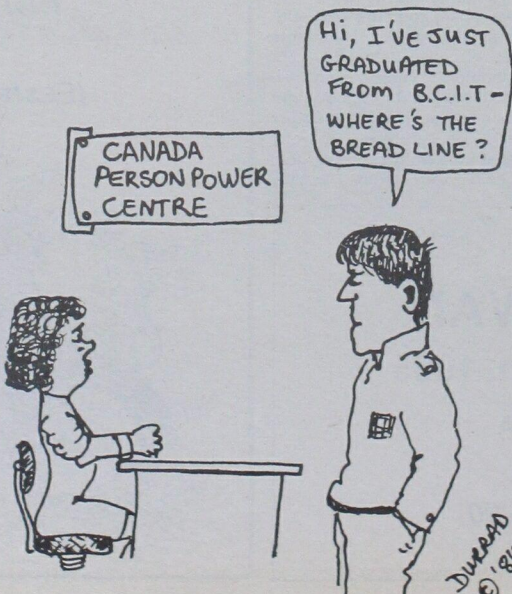

## Handbook due

the Engineering Society recently contacted 1500 engineering firms with the intent of setting up a career day. However, according to Society Chairperson Bill MacPherson, while the exposition has been tabled, the society has been able to attract funding to produce a handbook of engineering graduates. 'The companies are making donations to the handbook,' says MacPherson, which will contain resumes of all graduating engineering

students. MacPherson says he hopes to 'get a job' for every grad. 'We've got a minimum of 350 jobs identified now.'

In addition, the Society of Engineering Technologists will be doing a California job search where they hope to send some technologists to California to remedy the 'increasing demand' for engineers in Southern California.

MacPherson expects the handbook will be out by mid-April.

'A miracle! A true bona fide miracle!'

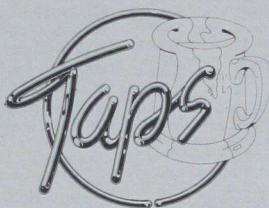
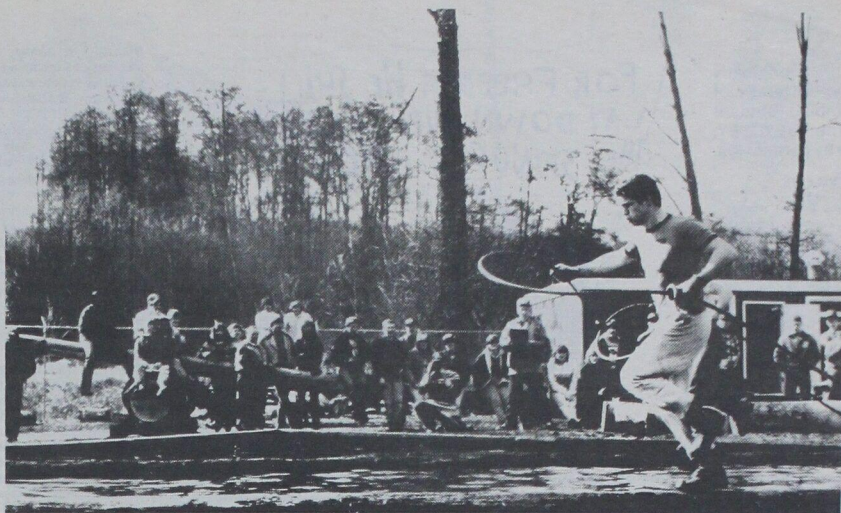
'Huh?' asked the other two in unison.

# Political refugee describes South Africa

A refugee is any person who is outside his/her country because he/she has a well-founded fear of persecution by reason of race, nationality or political opinion and because of such a fear, is unwilling or unable to avail themselves of the protection of the government of their nationality.

The above definition of a refugee is the standard one used in international law and was used to determine my legal status by the Government of Canada, and the World University Service of Canada.

I am a political refugee from South Africa. I was forced to flee from my homeland as a result of my opposition to the South African government's policy of apartheid, which is the systematic oppression of the black majority population by the white minority.

The whites, who comprise less than one fifth of the population, control and own 87 per cent of the land mass, while blacks are herded into the remaining unproductive 13 per cent.

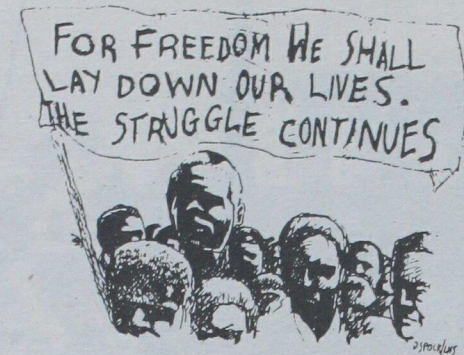
Opposition to the white government is met with repression, and political rights for blacks are virtually non-existent. Torture, detention without trial, banishment and deportation are the most common methods of repression.

My political activism against the South African government began when I was at university in Johannesburg in 1980. As my association with various anti-government groups grew, so did my awareness of the brutal methods used by the South African police.

Our protest methods—were peaceful: we started with sit-ins, marches and boycotts. However, the police would break up gatherings by using police dogs, tear gas and batons.

We were lucky—the police have opened fire on students on numerous occasions.

As opposition mounted, so did



the repression. One by one, my friends and associates began disappearing. Some were banned; some were detained for months without trial or access to legal recourse; others lay low for a while, and two close friends of mine were tortured.

One friend was strung from the ceiling by his hands and feet, which were beaten until he passed out with pain and exhaustion.

My other friend, a woman, was tortured by a policewoman with long sharp fingernails, and suffered some gross sexual perversion.

The circle was tightening and after being questioned on occasion by the police, I dropped university, went home, and lay low for a few months. However, since military conscription is compulsory for all white males, I was drafted into the armed forces.

The armed forces act as the tool of repression for the South African government. Illegally occupy Namibia (a country north of South Africa), and regularly invade neighbouring countries like Mozambique, Angola and Lesotho.

By serving in the armed forces I would not be defending my country but in fact defending the apartheid system which I totally rejected. Desertion or refusal to report for duty is punishable by six to eight years of imprisonment—objection is after all tantamount to treason. My alternative was to flee from

South Africa.

I applied for political asylum in Swaziland. After spending two days of interrogation at police headquarters, and appearing before a committee of government officials, UNHCR representatives, security officials and other individuals, I was granted political asylum and refugee status.

The next ten months as a refugee were the most intense, animating and difficult of my life.

Survival in a foreign country, which harbours many South African refugees, produces a cat-and-mouse existence which is difficult to describe. The South African agents use various methods to stifle potentially "subversive" elements who have fled South Africa.

Swaziland seethes with informers for the South African government, and refugees are in constant fear of being kidnapped, bombed or murdered by South African agents operating in Swaziland.

In my case, the South African authorities tried to get me extradited by accusing me of a murder which I had never committed. During this period my parents and friends were harassed, their houses were searched and their mail was read.

While the UNHCR officials in

Swaziland desperately tried to find a country of resettlement for me, I had to eke out an existence by relying on the good will of the Swazi community.

Jobs and educational opportunities are extremely scarce and many refugees spend the days wandering from place to place and often from country to country.

My case came before representatives of the Canadian government in Southern Africa. In co-operation with the World University Service of Canada which has a field office in Swaziland, I was granted protection by the Canadian government by landed immigrant status.

Through the WUSC group at the University of Regina in Saskatchewan, I was granted a scholarship for the period of one year. Funding for the scholarship came from the students, staff and community at the University of Regina.

For a refugee, the chance to study is a rare and treasured opportunity, and although the adaption to a new culture is not always easy, the relative freedom from harassment lifts much tension and provides much relief.

For many of us in exile, the education, experience, and knowledge we gain will be used if we are ever legally able to return home to our people and families without fear of persecution.

I am presently studying at UBC, where there is a local committee of the World University Service of Canada. A group of dedicated students in WUSC-UBC have recently run a successful referendum, where students voted to sponsor two refugee students.

These refugees will be given full financial sponsorship for one year, and will then be treated as regular students.

My experiences as a refugee are not unusual. Thousands in my country are still stuck in refugee camps in Africa. Thousands of other refugees from Ethiopia, Uganda, El Salvador and Vietnam live in similar circumstances with little or no hope of continuing their education.

The local committee of WUSC BCIT are currently preparing a referendum to be attached to the S.A. Student Executive Election in April. Students will be asked to vote on a proposed two dollar addition to the student activity fee, which will be used to support one refugee who would study at BCIT.

Students at BCIT have within their power the ability to support a refugee student and to provide him/her with a life which is relatively secure from threat. Please vote Yes on the referendum.

Above all, Wally has stressed the importance of recreation at BCIT as an opportunity to relieve the academic pressure, a chance to forget about the books and get some exercise.

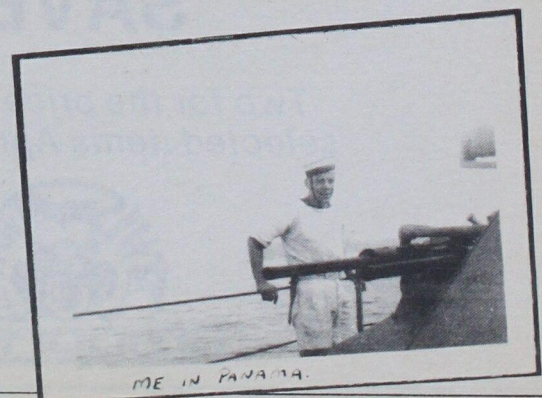
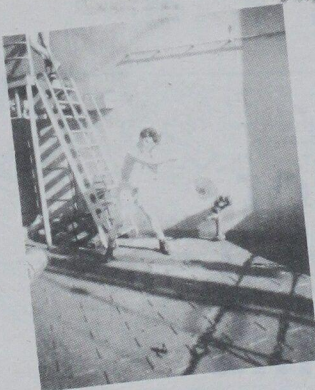
The S.A. sports-chairperson realizes each year BCIT students need these stress breaking opportunities more than ever.

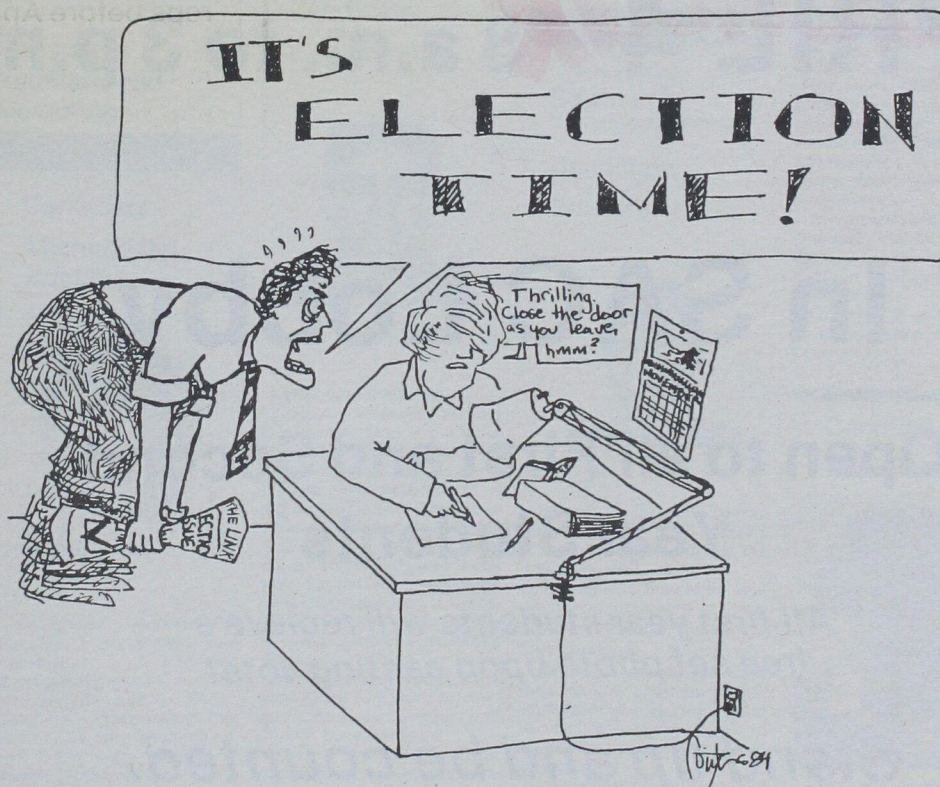

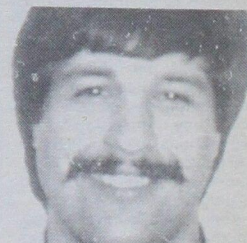
1. Administrative staff reductions

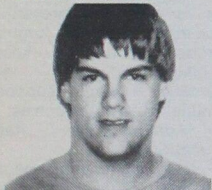

5. An ability to work hard, experience with organizing, and a sound time management ability.

How can I put this to work for you?

When you came to BCIT you came armed with the desire to learn and a commitment to work hard for your goals and in return you expected the Institute to give you your money's worth in education and a reputable diploma. These days, with cutbacks chipping away at the core of our education, we have to realize that sitting back and waiting for someone else to give us what we need and put it all together for us is an illusion. If we want to be employable and be respected in the 'real world' we've got to pull together and make BCIT the kind of school that we need to make us employable. We need to stand together and make ourselves heard and respected in the community, in the school and out in the work place.

To show you how this can happen, one of my ideas is to propose that we lend out our newly acquired abilities to businesses that need consultation on marketing their services, planning their objectives, devising organization systems, computerizing assistance,

hospitality training, media assistance, etc. What I would like to see is a 'personnel agency' or STUDENT CONSULTING SERVICE that goes out and finds business owners that need help with planning or problem solving to help get them on the right path to success. This 'agency' would send out letters to advertise our abilities: BCIT students with marketable services that could assist business. This would be offered as a paid service with a portion of the payment going to the student consultant and a portion going to the S.A. which benefits all students.

This 'Agency' would not only pay you for your services but would also give you important contacts in business, experience in actually putting your training to work and most importantly, confidence in yourself to do the job. This service could directly assist BCIT students and grads in setting up their own businesses (for day and night school).

I have the contacts with government agencies that could make the Student Consulting Service a viable solution as early as next term. All funding would be taken care of and we could have the first Student Consulting Business in this province. This is a natural complement to the government assisted Business Information Centre which the S.A. and Carl Severson successfully began this year.

BCIT's reputation as a quality institute would be further enhanced as the employers out there would see first hand what we are doing and what great things we can do for them. We would be relying on our own abilities to show the 'real world' that BCIT students can take care of themselves financially and in business. And in the final analysis, isn't that what we have to do when we graduate anyway?

There are many ways to plan to make money and gain experience in our chosen fields. The Student Association could spend a lot of money on many ideas, but choosing the one that represents your best interests and uses the budget in the most advantageous way are the duties of a responsible government. The ideas that we come up with have to follow this criteria and I feel that is my first responsibility - giving you the assurance that you will be represented fairly and your money used appropriately.

There are many other projects, such as these, that can be implemented with your help and imagination. The funding is there if you know where to look for it. If we keep the lines of communication open, which I promise to do, between

ourselves, the S.A. Executive, the Ministry of Education and the Provincial and Federal Governments, then we can realize our own future goals and make them happen for ourselves.

So, during the polling days, April 2, 3 and 4, keep in mind what I have said. If we, as Business students, stand together and help each other improve our own education by establishing our place in the 'real world' then we've succeeded in reaching the goals we came here to reach: education, experience and satisfaction with what we can do and who we are. Together, we can make it work, divided we are leaving to others the fate of who we become when we graduate.

Look for the bright yellow posters and wear the bright yellow badges. Yellow is the colour of success. Vote to unite the Business Technologies, vote for Lorraine Rieger.

Take a look at what kind of work the current council has turned in, so as to assess the experience that SRF candidates are claiming as an asset.

They bungled the election, in ways that reveal a disinterest in democracy.

First of all they passed a rule that the CURRENT office holder's signature has to be on the nomination. This in itself would probably have annulled the whole thing if anyone had squawked to the Registrar of Societies. Secondly, they WITHHELD vital information from candidates until two days before campaigning began. I couldn't even find out who or how many I was running against. And I still haven't received a list of the campaign rules. But the 'Insider' candidates knew all this information long ago. Thirdly, competition for limited billboard space is completely unregulated.

They neglected complaints about instructors. On my own, I researched and publicized details of the appeal procedure. That's all that's been done this year.

They ignored classroom computerization, failing to gather and disseminate ANY meaningful information about the upcoming change, again leaving the task to me and other letter-to-the-editor writers.

They concentrated on cutbacks, and did so in a way that aggrandized their own

roles - hobnobbing with the bigshots - while leaving the students in the dark. No one asked us whether we preferred degradation of services and core to cuts of whole programs. No one asked us whether we thought BCIT should snuggle up to the provincial government or publicly confront it. Indeed no one asked us whether the S.A. should be attacking the government, the staff, or the administration. While students in other colleges were informing themselves and going out to inform the public, Rippon and Nagy were 'representing' us at 'high level' meetings. They chose - and changed - targets at will; we had nothing to do with it.

We're so ill-informed that we had no alternatives to offer at last week's budget forum; all we could do was trash Gordon Thom, with a grandstanding SRFer leading the charge. Meanwhile, the cutbacks went through, more are coming, and Troy Nagy wants re-election because he 'knows all the key role-players.'

It's possible mobilizing all of us non-key-role players wouldn't have stopped the cutbacks. But why wasn't this tried? And why did the S.A. neglect criticizing the computer classroom proposal, and going after bad instructors, both of which are struggles we have the legal tools to win? And why were election candidates denied information?

Bureaucratic Personalities - I'll tell you why. These guys (the SRF incumbents) think like bureaucrats; ways of sharing the information that gives them power don't even occur to them. They don't help us to think for ourselves; they want us to elect THEM to do our thinking for us. Of course they have an 'open door' policy and will listen to your problems; they're your buddies as long as THEY make the decisions. Power hunger can be cured of course but not by feeding the addiction.

**EMPOWERMENT PROGRAM** - I intend to spread around information, power, and money. Here's how:

**FIRST:** cultivate a group of student researchers and reporters who will get paid to dig up, organize and present information on issues, both for the S.A. and The Link.

**SECOND** - prepare special information packages for appeals of various kinds (grades, student loans, instruction quality).

**THIRD** - set up public debates to clarify contentious issues, such as the Staff Society's alternate budget, HITRAC, fees, etc.

**FOURTH** - hold referendums and demonstrations which allow the students to DIRECTLY express their feelings and opinions.

Compare this program with what the SRFers did on the current council, and want to continue doing next year. Which do you want?

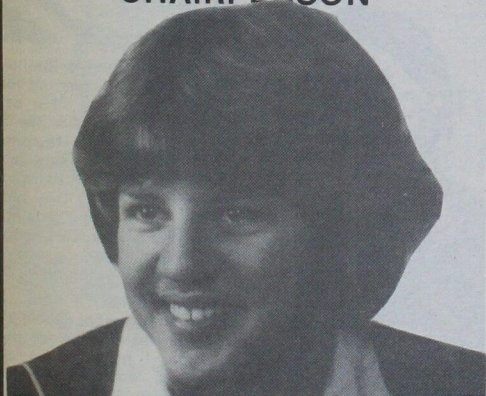

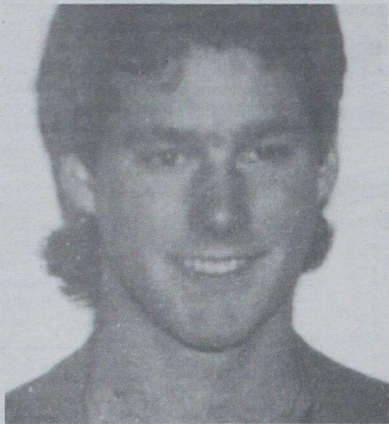

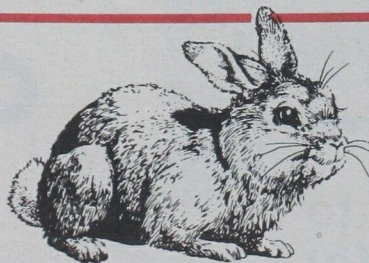
