Board Profile

Wendy McDonald was appointed to the BCIT Board of Governors in April, 1993.

She is the chairman and CEO of B.C. Bearing Engineering Ltd. which has 26 branches in Western Canada and the Yukon and a subsidiary company, US Bearings and Drives Inc. which has 10 branches on the west coast of the United States.

She has spent much of her life building up this company beginning during World War II when her husband gave her power of attorney. When her husband died in 1950 she applied all her business experience and determination to the company, building it up to its present size.

Many remember her inspirational keynote address during the 1992 School of Engineering Technology convocation.

She has won many awards over the years. In 1988 she was honored by the YWCA with the Woman of Distinction award for her business management skills. In 1987 Vancouver's Better Business Bureau recognized her contributions to the basic principles of the bureau. In 1987 she won the Power Transmission Distributor of the Year Award and in 1982 she was selected Canadian Businesswoman of the Year in the Schenley's Veuve Clicquot Award of Distinction. ARCHIVES

National Award Recognizes BCIT's Industry-Education Partnerships

atching student expertise with realworld practical challenges has won BCIT a prestigious national award.

For its successful program of having students solve industry problems, BCIT received this year's National Award for Excellence in Business-Education Partnerships from the Conference Board of Canada on April 27.

In 182 industry-sponsored projects covering 30 fields, BCIT students worked with companies small and large. Among them were BC Transit and the Pulp and Paper Research Institute of Canada.

The scope of projects was as varied as the industry sponsors, with students successfully tackling problems covering everything from developing new uses for a customdesigned computer chip to creating a robotic system with the ability to see and move millimetre-long tree seedlings.

For BCIT's faculty and students, the award is further recognition that

the match of industry and education works — a concept developed by Dr. Dave Chowdhury shortly after becoming the dean of the School of Engineering Technology in 1988.

"It's a validation of what we've been working toward for years," says Ernst Wilmink, student projects coordinator for BCIT's School of Engineering Technology. "This is the industry elite recognizing education in harmony with industry."

"We have always been good at that. We do what industry wants and needs, so we produce job-ready graduates."

One of the top projects was a new logic analyzer — a diagnostic tool vital for troubleshooting digital circuitry that's the heart of a computer system — from students Jan Borge and Paul Vallee.

Working with a major distributor of high-tech electronics equipment, their challenge was to find a new way to use a re-programmable computer chip.

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Starting from scratch, they abandoned the traditional design approach and reworked the chip so it could almost instantly adapt to numerous needed uses — effectively becoming many chips in one.

"We could get more out of the chip that way," says Borge, who graduated from BCIT and is now further developing the logic analyzer for future marketing.

"It allowed us to use a cheaper chip" — and cut costs by a staggering 80 percent over other analyzers, making the important technology affordable for schools and smaller companies.

And as for the National Award for Excellence in Business-Education Partnerships, Borge isn't surprised BCIT won over institutions from every province in Canada.

Working with industry gave him an insight into the field he might not have otherwise had. "It's an excellent opportunity for students to get real experience in the industry," he says of the partnerships.

Administered by the Conference Board of Canada and sponsored by Stentor — a group of Canadian telecommunications companies the national award carries a prize of \$5,000, which will be used to further industry-sponsored student projects.

We are no bus, we're a BMW!

If BCIT was an automobile, a majority of high school students would describe it as a BMW, a recent survey has discovered.

Almost 300 high school students were surveyed following last month's Spring Tour Day and 31 percent said BCIT was like a BMW, 28 percent likened us to a Honda and 11 percent said a GMC Half-Ton.

Another surprising result of the survey was when students were asked where their parents want them to go following high school graduation. Parents with no preference totalled 34 percent, 26 percent preferred university and 22 percent favored BCIT. Only 4 percent favored community college.

"This is surprising," said David Bernard, manager of marketing and corporate relations who compiled the survey results. "While university is still number one with parents, BCIT ranked a close second. The community colleges hardly registered as a preference among parents. These responses are decidedly different from the findings of our high school focus groups two years ago, which indicated strong university and community college preference."

The tours themselves seem to have a positive impact on students. Prior to the visit about 66 percent of students were considering enroling at BCIT. Following the tour 87 percent are now considering enroling at BCIT.
