# BUDGET REVIEW PROCESS REACHES CLIMAX

The detailed budget review process, which started April 11, ends this week. On April 28 President Murray and senior managers will begin working on a Reduction Plan that must trim approximately \$4m. from this year's budget.

During the week of May 2 the plan will be presented to the three staff union presidents, the Board of Governors and finally, on May 6, to the provincial government. Staff will be officially notified of the plan during the week of May 9 to 13.

During the past few weeks, all budget managers on campus have defended their budgets and tried to come up with innovative ideas for saving money. During meetings with all staff on April 13 President Murray also extended an invitation to anyone with money saving ideas to forward them to him.

Those responsible for reviewing the budgets and coming up with solutions are President Murray, Clayton McKinley, Len McNeely, Drug Svetic, Paula Pick, Nora Andrew and Jose Stockdale. Student reps and staff reps from the three unions have had unrestricted access to the meetings with budget managers.

#### PUBLIC SUPPORT REVEALED IN VU13 INTERVIEW WITH MARK ANGELO

#### **BOARD MEETS**

A report from Dr. John Kyle, dean of the School of Business, an update on the budget situation by President Murray, a resolution on Open House and the adoption of some new and revised policies were on the agenda during the Board of Governors meeting April 14.

The Board and approximately 40 guests also stood for a few moments in remembrance of Malcolm Wickson who served the Institute as a Board member from 1980 to 1983 and as Board chairman from 1983 to 1987. Mr. Wickson passed away on April 9.

In recognition of efforts made by staff and students in this year's Open House, the Board passed the following resolution put forward by the Education and Student Affairs committee:

The Board of Governors congratulates the students and staff of the Institute on the success of Open House '88. The Board would like to acknowledge the enthusiasm of all those involved, the creativity of the displays and the commitment of the coordinating committee in accomplishing this outstanding success.

During a brief presentation on the School of Business, Dr. John Kyle discussed a proposal with the Board that would see a restructuring of the School's program delivery system. If adopted, the system would incorporate a generic core of business subjects.

Among the policies passed by the Board was a much revised policy on Cheating and Plagiarism stating the following purpose:

Honesty is expected and required of all students. This implies fairness, straightforward conduct, academic integrity, adherence to the facts and trustworthiness. The purpose of the following policy is to deal with academic honesty in the conduct of all examinations, essays, reports and other projects or forms of assessment prepared or completed by students pursuant to the requirements of a BCIT program or course.

The whole policy can be accessed via PROFS by calling up the Policy Manual (type Policy next to arrow at bottom of screen, type Cheating in section marked A Word in Policy Name, press PF2).

A new policy extending Library privileges to BCIT retirees was also passed, along with one on gifts in kind donations.

# BCIT's Co-op programs featured on KNOW

BCIT's Co-op Education programs will be featured in a Knowledge Network telecast on Thursday, April 28 at 7 p.m.

"Bridging the Gap," an exploration of Co-op Education programs in B.C., is an hour long program that portrays the benefits and expectations of Co-op

students and employers interested in participating. A panel discussion by those involved in Co-op Education and a phone-in from viewers will answer questions about this practical approach to education.

BCIT began selective Co-op Education programs in the technologies in 1984. In 1987, trades programs began with a mandatory Co-op component. Placements occur year round in the technologies and at selected times in the trades. In 1987 a total of 227 students were involved and 147 placements were made. In 1988, 210 placements are expected, involving 300 students. The Aviation Co-op program will begin in fall 1988 and other Co-op programs are being planned. Co-op placements cluster in southwest B.C. but range throughout several provinces, the Territories and occasionally,
