Job Situation Looks OK

If you have already read the letters on page two, you will realize that last issue received more attention from staff, students, and outsiders, not even connected with BCIT, than any other issue ever put out in this school. The letters were both for and against and we printed them all without omissions or changes in form.

In a few letters, we find that the students complain about the quality and layout of the paper, but we really cannot see how they can justify statements that we are hurting their chances for a job when they get out of BCIT. According to Mr. Freberg, of the Student Placement Center, there are more employers at the campus;

more people have contacted the Manpower Center asking for student applications; and Mr. Freberg also anticipates that less students will be looking for jobs at the beginning of this summer than last year. Is it possible that the publicity BCIT has received this past year (only in part due to us, I must admit) has introduced us to many prospective employers who didn't know BCIT existed?

Obviously, the publicity-good or bad-- if anything, enhanced our job possibilities. In the words of one instructor who stopped by to talk with us, (yeah, they do stop by to talk with us) "Any publicity is good publicity".

ignorance Abounds

The Link staff members would appreciate any help from the student body in finding the gutless individual (or individuals) who swiped the layout sheets from the Link office last Tuesday night. Evidently, these intelligent, well-bred young assholes felt they needed a sneak preview of the paper to ensure that nothing would be published without their approval and consent.

We spoke with John Kenmuir, President of the Business Society, and discovered that the theft of our layout sheets was done in a manner similar to the wanton destruction of the B. ELECTION RESULTS

The winners of the delayed elections were; Robert Moss, Vice president Internal. Mr. Moss is a first year E&E student. Alan Spetch, a first year Tech Man student, won the position of Treasurer.

True to form only about 15% of the students took time to vote.

There was a referendum on the ballot re: Whistler Lodge. The referendum tells that students favor a lodge by a two to one majority.

The proposal for the Gothic Arch lodge was preferred over the others. The proposal is now being taken to the annual general meeting where it was defeated last year. This year's proposal seems to be better in quality organization and price.

Examine Whistler mountain potential and it not only the best skiing area in the north-west but it is also in contention for major competitions.

Skiers are not the only people who would benefit from a lodge. The building may be used for a great variety of recreational activities the year round.

A lodge in the solitude of Whistler would be an ideal spot to hold seminars and group activities where uninterrupted peace is essential.

A decision on this issue must be reached at the AGM on May 10th in the SAC gym. Come out and make your stand. After all, YOU are the student association. The last Student Council meeting saw the council vote 35 to 4 in favor of removing the extra-mural athletic program budget for 1972-73 from the Student Association budget. In doing so, the Student Association has effectively withdrawn BCIT from the Totem Conference for at least two years, unless \$20,000 is available from some other source.

This action was taken by the Student Association after it was decided that the full \$20,000 needed to pay for extramural sports, was too high a price to pay. According to Laurie Jack, S.A. President, "We decided we just can't affordit anymore. Of the teams we compete against--we're the only one that pays the whole shot." Community colleges in B.C. receive up to 50% of their total athletic budget, from "Student Activities" budgets, from the Administrations of the various college councils.

According to Gerry Lloyd, BCIT Athletic Director, BCIT's withdrawal from competition will not become official until

August 18th, and Mr. Lloyd said he "would be very surprised if funds don't come from somewhere to carry out an extramural program next year." Mr. Lloyd also expressed the view that the Totem Conference certainly will not fold up simply because BCIT has decided to withdraw all teams from the various leagues, but will certainly have a tougher time with scheduling due to the fact that BCIT is one of the four campus' with full athletic facilities. If BCIT does decide to re-enter the Conference next year, they will probably have to post a \$1000 performance bond to insure their continued participation in the various leagues.



In an interview with the Four West executive, (Four West is an inter-collegiate athletic organization encompassing the 4 western provinces) on Friday, the Link attempted to discover the feelings of outsiders to our present situation. President Art Hooks, of NAIT, felt that student opposition to the "no sport budget" would be felt next year, with the result that beit will definitely be back in

the Totem Conference as soon as possible. Don Stouffer, of Mt. Royal, felt that it was not good for the BCIT image and is especially bad since BCIT has better facilities than most of the other colleges in the west.

Nonetheless, the action has been taken and unless funds are received from somewhere, BCIT will not field any teams in next year's Totem Conference.

DOUBLE YOUR PLEASURE

The end of the year is fast approaching but the sometimes maligned Business Society is continuing to work to bring quality entertainment onto campus for the student body.

Their latest and final effort comes along and shouldn't be missed by anyone who enjoys good folk singing. The event is the appearance by both Russell Thornberry and Ann Mortifee at the Coffee House this Thursday night, May 4. Although their styles are quite

different they both offer a superb repertoire of ballads and songs. Ann's voice is soft and supple while Russ' strong tones bear a resemblence to the style of Gordon Lightfoot. To have an opportunity to hear both singers at the same Coffee House is something which we all shouldn't miss. Outside interest from the school is growing and it's sure to be a packed house, so get there early. Irish coffee and fruit of the vine will be served. Doors open at 7:30. Be there.

the death of the family

Last week I wrote about women's liberation. However, the matter has far greater implications than just an individual proclaiming her freedom. Our entire society can

be, and should be rocked to its very foundations by this movement. This is the last issue of the Link this year, so I have only time to go lightly over some of the implications. This time, however, I'll try to avoid the f--- words.

I shall take as a premise that the liberation of women is desirable, and, hopefully, inevitable. The woman as housewife is the basis of many of our social and economic institutions. Let us examine the possibilities.

A woman, to be free, must be given the same sexual freedoms that a man has. Where marriage has tended to allow men to "fool around", the same liberties have been denied women. They are only recently asserting their own rights to sexual and intellectual freedom. The advent of the pill, and easily obtainable abortions, has freed women of their old. and justifiable fear of pregnancy. They can now be as

alive in their relations as they please.

With the fear of unwanted pregnancy virtually gone, one of the major rationales for marriage has disappeared. Conception and sexual enjoyment can effectively, for the first time in history, be separated. With these responsibilities gone, men need no longer desensitize themselves to the woman and her potential risk. They can appreciate the woman for herself, free of the fear of knocking her up. And the woman, in turn, need no longer try to seduce a man into marriage in order for him to share the responsibilities of their mutual enjoyment. She can for the first time experience her body and sensuality for itself!

Marriage has traditionally been a bond for ensuing the successful upbringing, both physical and social, of children. Before, children were more an accident than planned for. And the woman often ended up at home mobbed by kids while the man tried valiantly to provide for .them. But the initial factor today, due to the pill and safe abortions, is that there need never be an unwanted child born again.

To bring a child into the world is a very serious matter, and when two people decide to do

that, they should be prepared to face up to the great responsibilities involved. Marriage would seem traditionally, to be the answer. But marriage, the legal binding of two people, is inconsistent with the view that they are two free people. Monogamy, as a matter of personal choice, will still probably survive. But, as more and more young people become aware of, and actually live, the "new morality", monogamy will probably generally accede to a more liberated attitude towards human relationships. ever-increasing availability of members of the opposite sex for both sexual and intellectual friendships seems to make this inevitable. Members of the younger generation (that is young at heart - I know of numerous 80 year old teenagers within our own school!) have a very large potential for experiencing numerous facets of our world. Why have just one job, one country or even one sexual partner? As long as one is honest, sincere, and wellmeaning in approach, the world has many things to offer. Why needlessly restrict yourself? Old conditioning must give way. to intelligent reappraisal.

It thus seems reasonable to say that the number of twopeople exclusive relationships will continue to decrease in favour of more open interac-

Today there are an tions. increasing number of single and separated mothers, and it isn't fair that they should assume the major responsibility for the kids. Yet, an exclusive relationship would be too binding. The responsibility must thus find a new focus.

The collective raising of children will soon become a necessity, and it is a very favourable situation for all concerned. The parents can continue to live their lives with a reasonable degree of freedom, while still contributing both financially and emotionally for their children. They can do this separately, or as a pair. it matters little. And the children will also be free of the potentially stifeling atmosphere of the nucleus family. Many prominent psychologists (eg. Laing and Cooper) are now calling the family a breeding ground for psychosis and neurosis, and making very convincing arguments for its abolition. The success of the Kibbutzin in Israel seems to be a good model.

There are many gaps still left open, many details yet to be filled. But it is individuals like you and me who will respond to the circumstances and hopefully build a better world. Some people just talk about the weather. Others do something about it.



Extramural athletics are now out at BCIT for at least two years. This move by the Association has left the fledging Totem Conference in bad shape and has brought out something that nobody knows. Did you know that BCIT is a junior college? Overnight, the Minister of Education made us one.

To quote an article from the Vancouver Sun "Education Minister Donald Brothers said in Victoria Tuesday that junior colleges should approach their local school boards for financial support for athletic programs."

Now really! Does Mr. Brothers think we are stupid enough to accept that? Number one, we are not a junior college, regional or community college. BCIT is an Institute of Technology and does not fall under the Universities Act or the Public Schools Act. The Institute was created under an Order-in-Council and directly under the thumb of the Minister. Junior, regional or community colleges have college councils, primarily made up of school boards. We have an Advisory Council.

Number two. We cannot go to school boards to get money. We get the whole shot from the provincial government. Local school boards do not have even a remote connection with BCIT. The provincial government does not approve budgets for extra-mural athletics directly but they do approve budgets for Student Services and this is where the rest of the colleges get their money for athletics.

With the exception of BCIT, no other college or university student association supports 100% of the extra-mural athletics.



Tenders have been called on the construction of combination basketball-tennis courts with another playing field planned too.




B.C.I.T. Rumbling

There are murmers of discontent rumbling through BCIT, to the dismay of some and to the relief of others. A lack of commication between the adminstration and the student body has existed for too long. A loose cog in the machinery had to develop sooner or later. I sincerely hope it is soon enough; not too late.

For the smooth running of an organization, communication between all those involved is essential. This also applies to an institution such as BCIT. Tdecisions made at the administrative level directly affect us, the students, and yet we have no say in their making. I think it is time that we step foward and show the initiative to make our views known and to try to attain our proper position in this organization.

The administration has recently made what I feel to be an important decision that will greatly affect both students and staff and the decision was made without even asking for a concensus of opinion. I refer to the changeover of all Health technologies and E&E to the quarterly system. The changeover is now definite and yet it the quarterly system. The changeover is now definite and yet it would seem the administration felt it should be considered "top secret". Before I say more, I shall present the overall picture to you.

Now that you know the facts, let us consider the effects. The immediate point to raise is that this will split the school in two. The technologies involved will become alienated from the main flow of the school life because of the clashes of exams and breaks. This puts an extra big strain on the staff involved since they have to completely restructure their courses, especially the labs, and three months isn't much time.

As far as I can gather, the administration consider this an experiment, with thoughts of perhaps making use of the system in the future. The quarterly system does have its merit and is used in many colleges and universities, one local example being Simon Fraser University. But I think we have to consider the implications of such a system.

With four terms, the school would be open all year round. Students would be able to start their course in any term and they would also be able to take a term out to work before continuing. In order to accommodate this, we would require far more facilities and a much greater staff, and we would require them in the near future to justify the purpose of this experiment. I sincerely doubt that such wonderful things are forth coming in even the far future. What we will be left with is a

frustrating year for the students and staff involved and another idea chalked up to experience for future reference.

This transition was made through the Academic Standards Committee. We have a representative on this committee and I feel that he has fallen down in his job of representing us. In all the months that plans have been in progress. he has never presented the facts and asked for student opinion. A surprising number of staff are as ignorant of the facts as we are. does communication exist at all at BCIT?

Many of you say" Why ahead anyway". I think not The men in our administration are obviously good at their job or they woudn't be here. They are also open to suggestion, and I'm sure they would consider our point of view if we made it known, but we have been silent for so long that they assume that we either completely agree with everything done or we just don't care.

I think that neither is the case and we should let our administration know where we stand. The running of the school should be a combined effort and if we show an interest I think the administration will welcome it. The school is, after all, for us, the students and we should be equally concerned with its functioning.



Quality In Food Drops

Many students have noticed a decrease in the quality and quantity of food served in the BCIT cafeteria. Those who were questioned about the food said that the plate is either getting larger or the amount of food is on the decrease.

Evening meals can be cited as one of the worst of the three served in a day. Examples are the same type of buns night after night (rock hard), same salad dressing almost every night (vinegar) and desserts that seem to be left over from the day before, although few raised objection to the dessert section.

Most objection seems to be that the increase in price that we saw this year did not keep the quantity of food at an acceptable proportion.

The cafeteria, that operates on the basis of only recovering cost of food excluding labor and overhead, is a training operation for the vocational school. Mr. G. L. Van Poppel instructor at the Food Training Center (caf) said that the revenues received throughout the year do not cover the expense of food and that each year more money has to be put in the budget to make up the difference. He did not agree that the quality and quantity of the meals was on the decrease and explained that attendance for evening meals always decreases at this time of the year while day time meals are steady.

Mr. Van Poppel seems to be one of the few people that feels the cafeteria is up to its usual standards. In the past the cafeteria was noted for its fine foods sold at a reasonable price and can in fact still boast of outstanding meals being served this year. But these meals seem to be fewer and certainly not designed to benefit evening meals.





My Life as a Suspendee

On Thursday, April 20, I was called out of class by the head of my department, Mr. Cairns. We went up to Mr. Bannerman's office where a meeting was hald amongst the three of us.

Mr. Bannerman immediately informed me of his displeasure with my article in the Link called "Men and Women". He announced his intention to suspend me until May 1. He, and numerous other people, particularly amongst the administration, were very upset about my use of four letter words. They felt I was again harming the image of the institute. I explained that the very language was inherent in the point I was trying to make. Amongst other things, they were trampling on freedom of the press and effectively censoring the paper where no censorship was supposed to exist. Mr. Bannerman said that the suspension could be lifted if I made some sort of public retraction of my article, or the words used. I, of course, refused. I felt that they had over-stepped their bounds, and I had no intention of apologizing for a matter in which they had no business. Lasked Mr. Bannerman on the

basis of what rule I was being suspended. In the Sun, he said his authority was "not really spelled out." In effect, he quoted this rule from our calendar which states that in regard to suspensions, "the Principal will take into consideration his (the student's) conduct and attitude, both on and off the cam-Did you know that you could be suspended for what you think off campus? And remember, you signed that piece of paper with your application where you agreed to abide by all the institute's rules. Think about it!

The matter of dress was also brought up at our meeting. I definitely stated that if I was being forced to wear a tie by threat of suspension, then I would definitely wear a tie. Not happily, but I would. I feel that at this point in time, it isn't worth getting suspended over. But, I was told that I wasn't being suspended for dress regulations. I was definitely being suspended only for the article.

Immediately after the inter view, on the way to the SAC I was approached by several friends who asked me how long I'd been suspended for. Apparently they knew about it even before I did. Very interesting!

At Monday night's students' council meeting, Laurie Jack, president, informed the students that it was "defiances of dress regulations that led to Mr. Smugler's suspensions." This was not the truth at all. But Laurie and other students had apparently been given this reason by the Administration. One would have thought they knew why they'd suspended me. But either they themselves are confused, or they were trying to confuse the students. In any event, an atmosphere of confusion was created in which any effective action was thwarted.

At that same Council meeting, it was decided that "the Link staff should have a free hand in the publication of the Link newspaper." This was a reaffirmation of the freedom of the press.

I was informed on Monday night, that sapparently all I had

to do to lift the suspension was to call Mr. Bannerman. I called him Tuesday morning, only to find out that some sort of retraction of my article was still necessary. Abit confused,

I again refused and hung up. On Wednesday afternoon, Laurie Jack and I went on the Alan Garr Talk Show. We all spent a fine hour discussing the dress regulations at BCIT, but I still didn't see what that had to do with my suspension. Laurie stated unequivocally that I was suspended for defying the dress regulations. I just as venomently asserted I was suspended for the article alone. I stated my willingness to wear a tie. and he promised to get me back in school next morning. A meeting was arranged for Thursday at 8:30 a.m.

I arrived 5 minutes late and wlaked into Mr. Goard's office There sat Mr. Goard, Mr. Bannerman, Laurie Jack, and Bob Simons (V.P. Internal). They asked me to leave for a while, so I did. After 30 minutes of pacing back and forth, I slowly became upset. There they were behind closed doors, discussing my fate, and I wasn't even invited! I tried once more to get in, and was again rebuked. Finally the meeting broke up. (I never even got a chance) and I was invited up to Mr. Bannerman's office. I talked Laurie into coming, because this time 💂 I wanted a student there so that no confusion would result. Mr. Cairns was also there again. Mr. Bannerman immediately

Mr. Bannerman immediately told me I was to be reinstated that very day. First, I asked again why I was suspended.

He said it was for the article, not dress regulations. Then I asked why I was reinstated several days early, for I still was not in any way sorry for having written it. He said something to the effect that I'd come in and talk to him about it. I still for the life of me can't understand why I was reinstated early. I also asked whether suspension for writing "no-no" articles in the Link was still possible. Answer - yes, apparently it still is.

The explanations of the Administration are inconsistent. I lost a week of classes for no apparent reason. However, there seems to be a method behind their madness.

Mr. Cairns mentioned at one

point that an example was being made of me. I have been a thorn of sorts in the Administration's side lately, and I believe they were simply trying to intimidate me, and warn other similar-minded studnets against expressing their dissatisfaction too openly. The image of this school must change

soon, for the students in it are changing. But the authorities still want to project our image as passive products. The success of their threat depends on your reactions. Frankly, I am unimpressed, only more angry than before.

What is to be done? It is already almost too late this year. There will be a joyful protest of the dress regulations next Wednesday, and hopefully we can all have a party and make our point too! If you're interested, come on out. You've got nothing to lose but your apathy.

The rest of the anger should be saved by 1st year students for a renewed effort next year.

If you're interested in the paper (which is vital to ensure that students receive accurate, uncensored information) then apply for editor at the SAC. Hopefully, we can get a good collective going. Otherwise, think about it over the next summer. Just how much is your personal freedom worth?

they called out "brother"


