

Open House '98 a huge success

pen House was a huge success last weekend. The excitement built all week as several appearances on local TV and radio shows took place. Larry and Willy continued their stellar BCIT support Thursday morning as they talked Open House on their C-FOX morning show. Vancouver Breakfast also hosted BCIT Open House Committee members and several other radio stations including Z-95.3 and KISS FM also participated.

Friday morning, volunteers arrived early and began preparations for what many believe was the best Open House ever. By 8:30, school buses from around the Province were arriving and thousands of students began investigating the opportunities B.C.I.T offered them. Schools from Williams Lake, the Kootenay's, the Island and all points in between brought their students, mostly grades 11 and 12, to "the best" Open House Tour yet. Those words from Ashcroft student, Heather, who had lamented that UBC and SFU were boring and offered nothing more than a tour of the hallways as incentive to return for further studies. She liked the fact that at BCIT there were things to do and the programs had a "hands on" kind of feel to them.

Those sentiments were echoed by many other students as they absorbed more and more of the campus. At one point there were more than 50, bright yellow school buses parked in the lots. Students were given maps, itineraries and then pretty much free to browse the campus.

There were many highlights all day long for the youngsters, who seemed very interested in the program displays and activities. For most. especially the out of town students, this was their first impression of BCIT.

The first organised event of the day was a new environmental contest, held in the gymnasium. It featured 25 different items (all to be recycled) that teams of four or five had to put together to construct some

sort of person, animal or thing. The items ranged from toilet paper rolls and milk cartons to film cases, wire and egg cartons. There were over 6000 straws and 4000 yoghurt cups included in the assortment and the creations made ranged from a very sinkable Titanic to the on-air set of the Jerry Springer show. Another group from Parkland in Sydney, BC, actually used one of their members to create a living, breathing, Panther Cyborg! And a group from McRoberts in Richmond claimed to create a likeness of their teacher....Miss Dragonmare. (Oh, the glory days of high school!)

The Master of Ceremonies, Randy Friesen did an excellent job of entertaining while co-ordinating over 75 groups of young inventors. After the 20 minute time limit for planning and building the strangeyet creative masterpieces, awards were handed out for tallest, strangest, most group oriented and my favourite ... nobody knows what the hell it is...but you used all the stuff you had...so here's a prize!

IBM and TLD Computers donated a IBM and TLD Computers donated a \$3500 computer package that was given away to one of the schools participating in the Environmental Contest. Columneetza in Williams Lake won the prize. Ajay Lai, Cortney Ruault and Danielle Pinette were the group that won for their school and all three were very excited. Their science teacher and chaperone Phyllis MacCloud said that the school had computers, but nothing like the Aptiva S Series they had just won. Phyllis also said she would see what she could do about arranging special user privileges for Ajay, Cortney, and Danielle.

Once the contest was over, students were invited out onto the field where they stood on the huge chalk marked letters of BCIT. Once all were assembled, a helicopter flew by and took pictures that will be sent to each school that came by for Open House and the pictures will also be used for future promotional purposes. BCIT Director of Student Services Jim Mitchell thought the idea was a good one and also said that he would like to see a

similar event planned for student orientation in September. Jim also thought that this Open House was very creative and positive which was a tribute to all the students, volunteers and the Open House Committee. He hoped that the initiatives started here, like the Environmental contest, group photo and the Let's Make a Deal game show, had the potential to grow and bring more "life" to campus.

The Opening Ceremonies took place in the Great Hall at 2pm and featured prestigious guests like MLA Joan Sawicki, Burnaby Mayor Doug Drummond and key-note speaker Peter Legge. The ceremony was handled by the Dean of Broadcast, Brian Antonson. Joan Sawicki arrived from Victoria just in time to congratulate the students of BCIT on their creativity and skills that were being showcased and she thought that we all should be proud of being here.

Student Association President Brent Bradshaw said that "days like today make you proud to be a student. The events of today are the success of tomorrow." Those sentiments were echoed by Mayor Doug Drummond who said that Burnaby "was lucky to have a campus like BCIT in their community" and also said that "this is a campus that is not just talking...but doing!"

Key-note speaker Peter Legge gave a rousing fifteen minute speech on some of the important steps in success. "The first step," he said, "is communication. Communication with friends, family and the workplace. Sixty percent of businesses succeed because of good communication and 60 percent of marriages fail because of bad communication." Peter also said that attitude will determine how successful you are going to be. He then proceeded to tell a couple of stories to illustrate his points. Peter also said that "BC is the best to live, grow and be educated on the planet Earth."

Peter is the President of Canada wide Magazines and Communications, which is the largest independent publishing house in Canada. His company publishes 17 magazines, including TV Week, has 107 staff, does \$25 million in sales and is 100 per-

cent B.C. owned. He has written three books himself and says that "people should consider their lives and contributions to society, because we have a very finite time on the planet Earth to make our mark...what's yours going to be." Peter has received the Order of the Red Cross, Citizen of the Year and the very prestigious Variety Club Award. He gives lectures about 100 times a year and will be off to speak in Bermuda soon.

The Environmental Awards were given out right after all the speakers had said their piece. The \$500 prizes were shortened from three to two with the extra cash being awarded to second and third place recipients in each category. Kirsten Westfal, Steve McDonald and Steve Svralko are sharing their first place prize for their Fish Wildlife and Recreation display on the effects of gravel mining and water quality. The model they designed will be used for years to come. Susan Joyce, Coral Losiak, and Cathy Choo won first prize for Chemical Sciences and their studies and display on testing absorbents to clean up water after oil spills. The results of their studies may be used by the Coast Guard in a technical report headed for Ottawa.

Saturday featured Ian Waddell, Minister for Tourism, Small Business and Culture. He spoke to a crowd gathered in the Great Hall about Aboriginal initiatives. The afternoon also featured a rendition of Monty Hall's, Let's Make A Deal game show. Prizes for that varied from Nintendo 64 games to a night at the Quay. There were also golf packages available or if you weren't so lucky, you may have traded your favourite ball cap for a rubber chicken. However fun was had by most.

So the millennium closes out with what many believe as the best, most entertaining, most interactive and most organised Open House of the century. The students of the future now have a model and some very high expectations to fill, when the new millennium opens with Open House 2000.

TREVOR FRIESEN Vote Trev For Pres!





The nominations are in and all the candidates are busy on the election trail hanging posters, making promises and giving out free stuff, all in an effort to win your support. a 2.5 kilometer short run course that will end up at the CG Brown pool where the third leg of the relay takes place. Teams consist of seven people, two runners, two canoeists, one swimmer and one cyclist. The team captain will assist the race marshals. If you register by April 17 the fee is \$96 per team. If you wait till late the fee is \$120. The field is limited to twenty teams, so register early.

There is also a bike polo tournament on May 9th. You can register at Rec. Services.

Frisky Frolics is a drop in program for those students who want to relax, have some fun or just let off a little steam. It takes place Thursdays in the Gym from 5:30pm till 7pm. They play a variety of games including trivial pursuit, around the world and indoor softball. 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Philip & Me: Michael Moore takes aim at corporate welfare

eople who won't go to see Michael Moore's 'The Big One': Philip Knight and Roger Smith, CEOs; Nike aficionados, tories, businessmen and business students.

People who will go to 'The Big One': leftists, people with a sense of humour, people interested in social causes, Michael Moore fans and business students with a social conscience.

Film Review The Big One Fifth Avenue Cinemas

'The Big One' is Michael Moore's new slogan for a new America: a new nation that has forgotten its democratic roots, whose people desperately try to search out a living under the 20th century reign of 'King George' corporations. Forget "the home of the free and the land of the brave," think "don't mess with the Big One ... or else!"

The Big One,' a documentary that follows Moore's promotional

tour for his book, Downsize This: Random threats from an unarmed American, starts innocently enough. From its humble specualtive beginnings about why Steve Forbes doesn't blink, 'The Big One' journeys to 52 cities across the US. On his trek Moore ecnounters those 'downsized' in America's 'booming' economy, employees at Border's bookstore trying to form a union in the face of hostile management, prisoners

who book flights for TWA, media 'escorts', businessmen extorting the need for profit and hostile security guards who protect the rich from the ragamuffins.

The big moment in 'The Big One' is Moore's surprise innvitation to the Nike palace by its king-businessman Philip Knight. The subsequent meetings between the two men generate both frustration and disbelief.



Knight had read Moore's book, which cites him as a "corporate welfare mother," and felt it necessary to arrange a meeting. But why? What did Knight hope to accomplish? It becomes glaringly obvious that Mr. Knight cannot comprehend the plight of the poor in America and abroad. The sense of Moore's frustration is thick: I think he wants Knight to admit his business practices are wrong, but to no avail.


Film Review Suicide Kings Opening April 17th

These monks are from the Shaolin Monastery in Northern China. They have been exposed and exploited by talk shows to

industries, to bring them to the Western world for our capitalizing entertainment. They performed with excellent serenity and agility in this totally foreign and artificial environment.

Unfortunately the venue and some of the audience took away from the spirituality and seriousness of these performers. Some people in the audience would make stupid wise cracks as the monks demonstrated some of their most concentrated physical accomplishments. The stadium had an annoying announcer the entire time and synthesized music played loudly to needlessly emphasize these monks performing with limitless endurance and control over their minds, bodies and spirits.

Tonight these monks demonstrated for us, on the spotlighted stage, everything from high flying kicks and the use of weapons to spontaneously choreographed assemblies of monks performing traditional exercises and incredibly dangerous, unthinkable physical feats.

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
Getting drugs From drinking water

Pharmaceutical drugs have been detected in European water supplies, according to the March 21 issue of Science News. German studies have proven that the drugs are originating from human wastes. Up to half of prescribed drugs may be excreted from the body in its original form or as another biologically active form. In some cases up to 90 percent of the drugs originally ingested find their way into drinking water, lakes, rivers and streams.

The highest concentration level is caffeine excreted from regular coffee drinkers. Other drugs include cholesterol-lowering drugs, antibiotics, analgesics, antiseptics, beta-blocker heart drugs, and drugs to control epilepsy. In Switzerland, clofibric acid, a drug used to lower cholesterol, was found throughout Switzerland's waters. Considering that this drug is not manufactured in Switzerland, it could not have come from an industrial accident or spill.

According to a Swiss scientist, Hans-Rudolf Buser, the drug is thought to come from human wastes. Some chemicals can be converted back into their active form through chemical reactions that occur in the environment. The active form through chemical reactions that occur in the environment. The trace levels of these drugs in the water could alter the ecology of the environment as well as creating an antibiotic resistance. More research is needed for testing drugs in water considering there is a lack of data for gauging the potential toxicity of pharmaceutical drugs to humans, wildlife or aquatic ecosystems.

- 2. Use continuously reliable sources of energy.


3. Come mainly from the qualities of being human (ie. creativity, communication, movement, appreciation, and spiritual and intellectual development).
