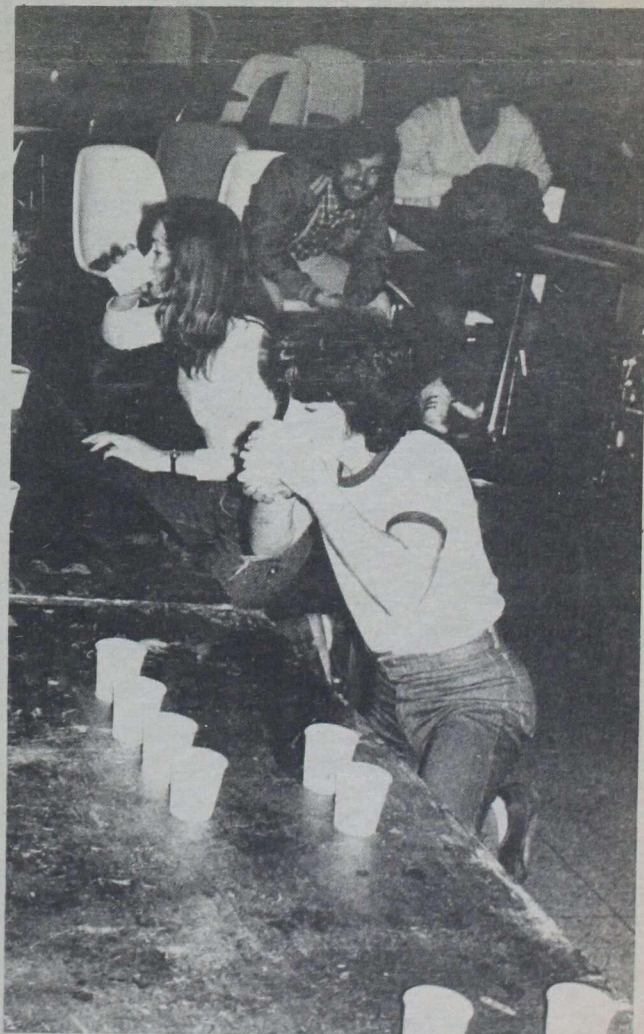

The Society of Engineering Technologists of B.C. in conjunction with the Engineering Division of BCIT is making a special presentation on employment searching strategies for students in the Engineering and Bio-Medical Electronics Technologies at BCIT.

The presentation to be held on Thursday, April 26th from 7:00 pm to 9:00 pm in Rooms 197-98 is free to all students registered in the Biomedical Electronics and engineering programs at BCIT.

Senior personnel responsible for recruitment for the Technical Service Council, MacMillan Bloedel Ltd., Dillingham Construction Canada Ltd., B.C. Forest Products, Gibraltar Mines Ltd. and H.A. Simons International Ltd. Consulting Engineers will be making short presentations on employment seeking strategies and taking part in a panel discussion and general discussion with student participants on how to successfully seek employment.

Topics to be presented include:

-Self Evaluation: How to determine your most employable skills and interests;

-Locating Job Vacancies: (The Canada Placement Centre isn't the only place to find a job.)

-Effective Job Application Techniques: Hints on preparing a good application, resume, letter;

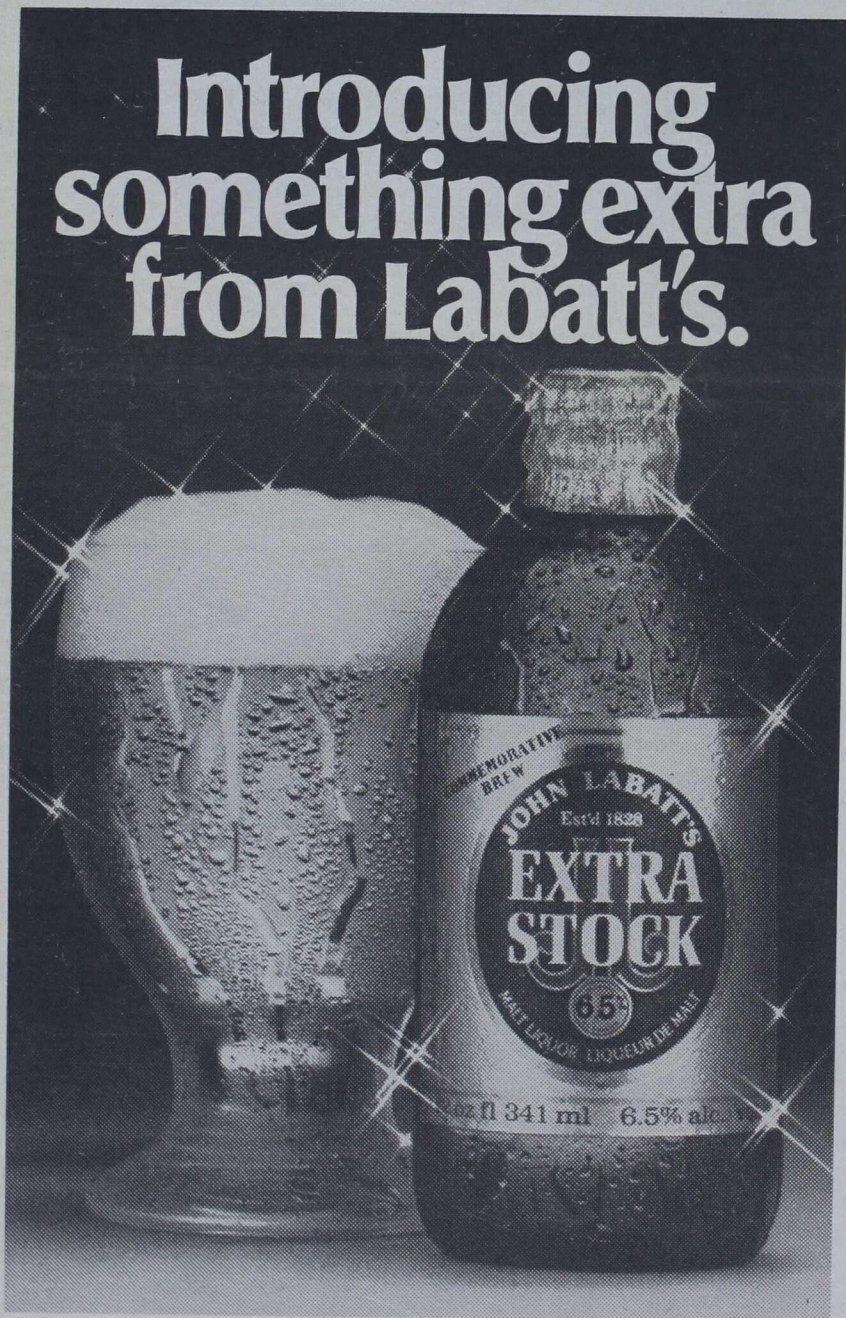

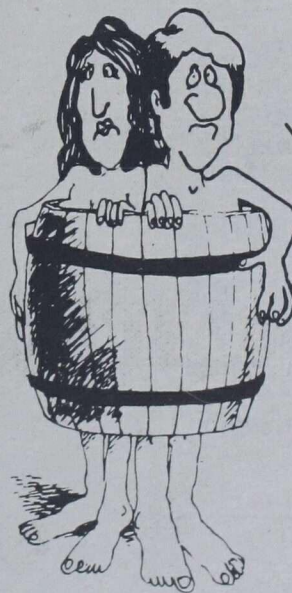

In fact, our team promises to be out in full if a professional male dancer is hired.

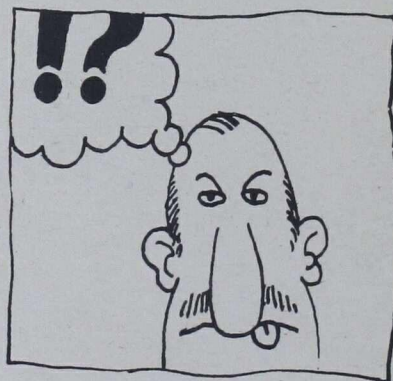

## Madmen Jethro Tull

Why is it that the best headlining performers seem to always have the worst opening acts. Last Wednesday night was, unfortunately, no exception. Opening for Jethro Tull was a relatively new group by the name of U.K. They started with the title cut from their second and latest album - DANGER MONEY. This song was bad enough, but they got progressively worse. Throughout their feeble attempt at entertaining the masses, they sounded like a third-rate imitation of EL&P's Yes et al. It was a really disappointing performance following all the hype they have been receiving lately.

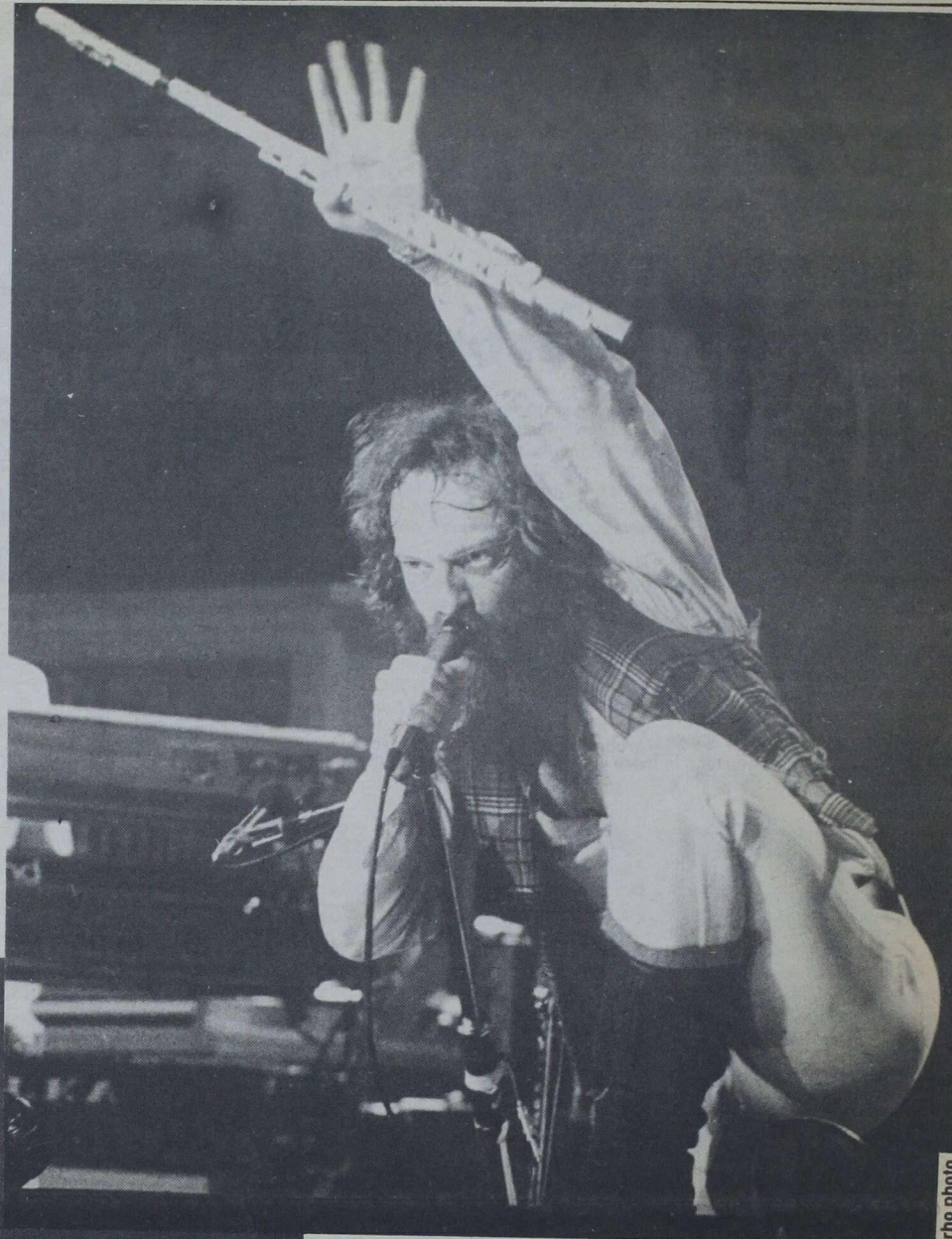
Tull, on the other hand, put on a fine performance. Frontman and center of attraction Ian Anderson is looking a bit old, though that may be attributable to his hermit-like appearance - long scraggy hair and an even longer scraggier beard. He is actually the 32 years old that typifies the average rock legend these days. Last year he celebrated his tenth year of touring and recording, with a sold out concert in Madison Square Gardens that was televised live across Europe.

However, a sell-out concert did not materialize in Vancouver. In these parts, Tull has largely a cult following. The 7000 or so filling the reds were an older audience, probably familiar with Tull in its various forms right back since the first of their eleven gold albums.

The selections Tull choose seemed to reflect the type of crowd that had gathered, to the exclusion of his latest AM hit - "Bungle in the Jungle".

Jethro Tull was as alive as ever, Madman Ian Anderson filling the Coliseum with his vocals and flute riffs, and the rest of the band madly pumping out high energy rock.

A thoroughly enjoyable performance by a long time master.

Rockers like 'Sweet Little Rock and Roller', 'Twisting the Night Away', 'Born Loose', 'Maggie May', and '(I Know) I'm Losing You' were interspersed with the young girl's favourites like 'Tonights the Night', 'You're in my Heart', and 'Do Ya Think I'm Sexy', with the same crowd pleasing results.

It was truly a show not to be missed by anyone. Everyone was in prime form, Bass player Phil Chen, Guitarists Gary Grainger, Billy Peek and Jim Cregan, drummer Carmine Appice, and new keyboards player Kevin Sanger. By the end of the second show, the group had loosened up quite a bit and they were almost into a party on stage.

Stewart and group are about halfway through a massive tour that will see them perform all over Europe, North America, and Australia/New Zealand, and they were showing no signs of fatigue.

I saw both concerts, and if he did a third show, I'd go and see it as well. You can take all the new wave, disco, technological rock and punk, and set them all out on the curb.

I'll keep Rod Stewart, thank you.
