## Work available through the CEC

For students commencing BCIT's two year diploma technology programs the Canada Employment Centre on Campus offers a variety of services.

Beginning in September, many employers place vacancies for part-time evening and weekend employment.

All non-technology related part-time jobs are displayed in a glass notice case just outside our office for all BCIT students to access. These jobs, for the most part, require fewer skills and are lower paying; however, on occasion we receive unionized part-time jobs which pay a higher scale, and some employers (for jobs like night security or computer operating) will even permit some on-the-job studying!

Part-time jobs which require technology-specific skills are posted inside our office, so if you are interested in work related to your technology we encourage you to drop in regularly during office hours to check for new postings.

Students who must work part-time may find the option of work-study their best bet for earning extra dollars during the school year.

The intention of work-study, as you may already be aware, is to provide flexible on-campus employment for students who require financial assistance to top up loans. Students who are ineligible to receive student loans may also qualify for work-study. To determine your eligibility, contact a financial aid representative through student services.

The Canada Employment Centre posts all work-study positions for BCIT departments. Traditionally postings have gone up later in September, however we advise students to check our job boards regularly after labour day.

As early as March employers contact us about recruiting technology students for summer employment. These positions, for the most part are excellent opportunities for first year students to gain credible work experience. Summer work experience can, and often does, lead to better work opportunities later on.

For example, the employer who hires you for the summer may be impressed enough to offer you permanent employment after graduation, and even if you decide to hold out for better opportunities, you will have the summer experience, and possibly even a reference letter to include in your resume.

We find that employers who recruit for technology-specific summer employment tend to pay competitive wages because they prefer BCIT students.

Students who choose not to involve themselves in the recruitment drive, can access non-technology related summer listings which we keep posted in a readily accessible binder. Many of these positions involve the tourism industry.

## Fraser Valley university studied

VICTORIA

Advanced Education, Training and Technology Minister Bruce Strachan has announced the appointment of a panel to seek public input on the expansion of post-secondary education in the Fraser Valley.

The panel, the Fraser Valley Access Consultation Group, is chaired by Chilliwack resident Harvey Schroeder, former Speaker of the Legislative Assembly.

Other panel members are Norm Duce of White Rock, Thomas Goode of Delta, Dwight Moodie of Abbotsford, James Cunningham of Langley, and Duncan Macpherson of North Vancouver.

"The Fraser Valley is growing rapidly and there is a clear need to expand its post-secondary services,"

said Strachan. "The chairman and his colleagues will conduct a series of public meetings to give area residents an opportunity to express their views on post-secondary education priorities."

The panel will invite public comment on the recommendations of the Fraser Valley Access Report, released in June 1990. The report, prepared by the presidents of Simon Fraser University, Fraser Valley College, Kwantlen College, and Douglas College, recommends a new degree granting institution with space for 4,000 full-time students, as well as expansion of existing post-secondary facilities.

The panel will hold public input meetings in 12 Fraser Valley communities between September 18 and October 11.

Expansion of post-secondary education in the Fraser Valley is an element of the province-wide "Access For All" initiative, a commitment to invest \$690 million in British Columbia universities, colleges, and institutes by 1993.

"I encourage residents of the Fraser Valley to participate in the consultation process," said Strachan. "It is an effective way to take part in the development of post-secondary education system, in the spirit of Access for All, is able to meet the region's present and future needs."

Copies of the Fraser Valley Access Report can be obtained from municipal halls in Delta, Surrey, Maple Ridge, Langley, Mission, Chilliwack, Matsqui, Abbotsford, and Hope.

# Medical coverage for \$1.55 a month

Everybody needs medical coverage. Students who never seem to get ill are still in a high risk category for accidents. The Medical Services plan of B.C. is like any insurance company - you can't decide to insure yourself after you have broken your toe. For those who are flat broke there may be help.

The full cost of medical is \$31.00 a month, but if you qualify for premium assistance it can be as low as \$1.55 a month. It will depend on your taxable income for the previous year (your 1989 tax forms). You do not have to be a student, although many students qualify, so those of you who graduate this year may still be eligible for reduced premiums for the coming year.

The current rates for premium assistance, for an individual, are given below. A more complete breakdown of family rates are

included in the kits available in the medical services office located in the SAC building.

15% premium assistance - premiums payable by a subscriber who qualifies for premium assistance and whose 1989 adjusted net income is between \$15,000.01 and \$17,000 - one person - \$26.35 per month

35% premium assistance - if 1989 adjusted net income is between \$13,000.01 and \$15,000 - one person - \$20.15 per month

55% premium assistance - if 1989 adjusted net income is between \$11,000.01 and \$13,000 - one person - \$13.95 per month

75% premium assistance - if 1989 adjusted net income is between \$9,000.01 and \$11,000 - one person - \$7.75 per month

95% premium assistance - if 1989 adjusted net income is \$9,000 or less - one person - \$1.55 per month

Students under 25 can go back as a dependent on their parent, but it is the parent who must contact the plan to arrange this. If there are already two people on the plan (both parents or a parent and another child), the cost for additional people is only \$84.00 a year. Much cheaper than the full premium for a single person.

Overseas students studying on student visas are eligible for M.S.P. of B.C. after waiting for the balance of the month in which they arrive plus two further months. We hold application forms and we also have applications for private insurance to cover the waiting period.

If you are out of province - we are sorry - Canadian students from out of the province are not accepted for cover under the M.S.P. of B.C. unless they can prove they have moved permanently to B.C. (not just while they study). Keep your provincial coverage and we will accept this.

To help you, we carry application forms for the medical plan and for private insurance including travel insurance. We also carry claim forms and information regarding the student accident policy. There is no longer a government dental plan but we do have information regarding low cost treatment available in the Vancouver/Burnaby area.

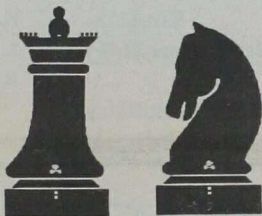

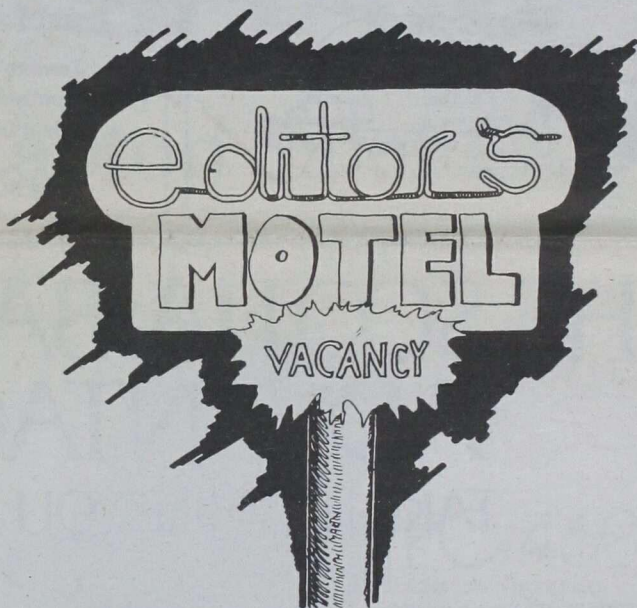

## MP supports walkathon

A year ago I visited Mesa

Grande, a Salvadorean refugee camp in Honduras, as a member of a SalvAide delegation. There I met hundreds of courageous people who, having fled violence and war and lived for over ten years behind the

barbed wire of that camp, decided that they were finally going home, back to their home villages. Our

Burnaby-Kingsway New Democrat riding association has agreed to support one of these villages,

Tremedal, by twinning with them, and sending desperately needed medical and agricultural supplies and other assistance.

Last month, I visited the people of Tremedal in El Salvador, again with a SalvAide delegation. It was a very moving experience. Tremedal is in the war zone and while I was there the Army was terrorizing the communities in that area by air from helicopters and by moving into the villages. I met a Jesuit priest who was shot by Army snipers.

The people of Tremedal desperately need our help. I urge you and your family and friends to join in the SalvAide Walkathon on September 29 and seek as many sponsors as possible. If you can't personally walk please send a generous donation in support of the villagers in rebuilding their lives. All funds contributed by Burnaby-Kingsway donors will go directly to supporting the people in the village of Tremedal. Thank you - your support, your cheque, will make a tremendous difference in the struggle for peace and justice in El Salvador.

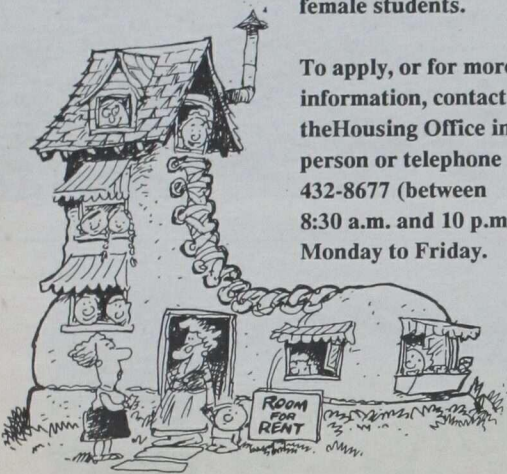

Experts believe the aliens are a highly sophisticated life form that recognizes the value of saving and sorting used paper.

"The fact that they were sorting the paper so carefully, points out the advanced state of their society," noted Dr. Spec, an internationally noted repsychologist.

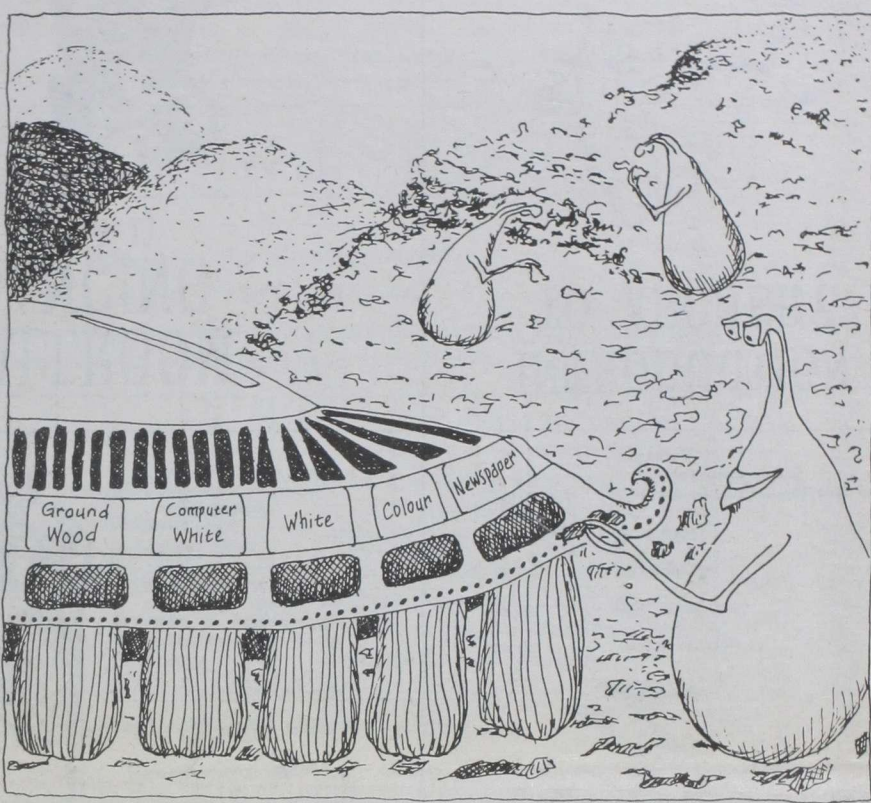
