This year I had the pleasure of meeting endless numbers of personalities and people.

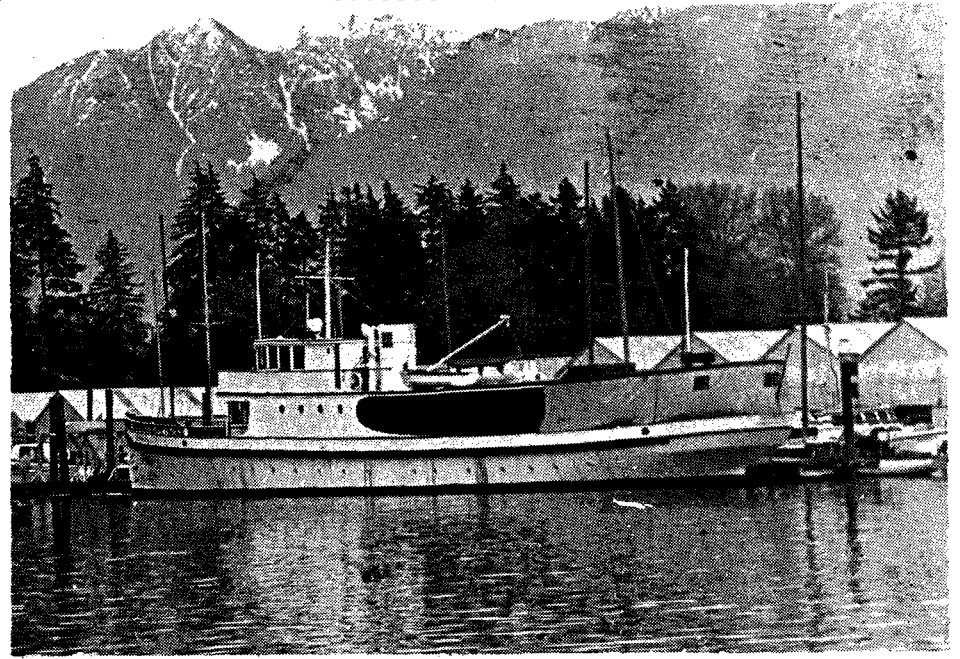

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
