### BOARD'S EFFORTS KEY TO OBTAINING MATCHING GRANT

The lobbying efforts of BCIT's Board of Governors and Development Council was key to obtaining the recently announced \$5 million matching grant," says Board chairman Wynne Powell.

"Members of our Board and Development Council recognized that BCIT's lack of matching funding was a severe drawback to the Institute's fund raising efforts and worked hard to state our case to the government.

"Through their efforts the Minister recognized that we had to have the means to seek private funding if we were to become the kind of unique post secondary institution identified in our mandate.

"Companies that have shown reluctance to donate money in the past are now reacting to us in a much more positive way. I can confidently say that reaching our fund raising goal is more than enhanced by the availability of this funding!"

### REPORT IT AND RECORD IT

All staff and students at BCIT are covered by Workers' Compensation Board Regulations. Every work-related injury or disease must be reported to the First Aid Office as soon after injury as possible so that the appropriate first aid treatment may be carried out and documentation done. Even in cases where injuries did not require first aid but where a physician was seen, an "Employer's Report of Injury" (Form 7) must be submitted to WCB within three days of the incident. To report off-campus injuries call North Campus First Aid non-emergency number at 432-8872 or report in person to Building 22.

#### In Case of Emergency

In your working area, are the emergency numbers posted in a clear and legible manner near the phones? If not, take a few minutes and look up

the appropriate numbers for your area in the BCIT Calendar, Directory or the Employee Orientation Manual and write them out. Don't procrastinate; do it today. Someone might need it for you tomorrow.

### If You Call An Ambulance:

NOTE — BURNABY CAMPUS: if after calling First Aid, you call an ambulance, make sure you direct it to the Willingdon/Goard Way entrance and call Safety & Security to notify them of the accident site and they will direct the ambulance to the site; otherwise we have people chasing ambulances all over campus.

If a serious accident happens, these steps should be taken:

- 1. Call First Aid (Burnaby Campus 8820; Sea Island 278-4821)
- **2.** Call an ambulance (872-5151) and instruct the driver to come to the Willingdon/Goard Way entrance.
- 3. Call Safety & Security to meet the ambulance there and escort it to the scene of the accident. Some areas of the campus are difficult to reach; Safety & Security know the best routes.
