IRC has mill model

A scale model of Northwood Pulp Limited, Prince George, one of the most modern sulphate pulpmills in the world, is now displayed in the Library lobby.

Completed in 1966 at a cost of \$56,000,000, the mill employs over 400 people and produces 750 tons of bleached pulp per day.

All the smoke and water released from the operations are treated by equipment costing \$3,500,000, with a planned additional cost of \$1,000,000.

Northwood plants up to 400, 000 seedlings per year as part of its reforestation program over 1,500,000 since 1966.

Travel program shaping

Staff, as well as students will be interested in the 1972 travel program under the auspices of Western Student Services.

Canadian charter flights will be available on a weekly basis commencing April 30th.

For instance, one can fly to Toronto at a one-way ticket cost of \$75, which includes reservation facilities.

Details can be obtained from the Student Association Office.

The 22-page brief estimates that salary increases for faculty in the Metropolitan Colleges will range from 7.5% to 8.5% and recommends that salaries of BCIT faculty be increased by the average of these salary increases plus an additional base adjustment to compensate for the deficiency of previous years.

It notes that Regional College settlements have averaged 7.5% to 8.5% annually in the past two years while BCIT has had increases of about 6% to 7%.

It maintains that in order to attract and retain competent faculty we must maintain the same relative salaries as those offered by the Metropolitan Colleges.

Modified faculty salary scales, increased salaries for administrative staff, and changes in job classifications and number of salary increments of support staff are also recommended.

Two-way pension transferability between BCIT and other educational institutions in the province is asked, as well as two-way portability of sick leave entitlement.

Supplementary Sickness and Disability insurance inclusion in the Group Insurance Policy and increased Group Term Insurance availability complete the recommendations in the fringe benefit area.

The meeting expressed its appreciation to DEAN GOARD, R. S. CAREY, R.C.W. SMITH, and W. N. OUARRY, the Committee members responsible for this well documented report.
