## Staff Society president jumps to Personnel

In the second month of labour negotiations between the Staff Society, representing all faculty and technical staff on campus, and the BCIT administration, the President of the Staff Society has resigned his post and joined the other side.

Past President Michael Stepler has informed all his union members by letter that he was asked last week if he was interested in filling the position of Personnel Manager for BCIT.

Staff Society Vice President Jennifer Orum has informed all union members that she and head negotiator for the Staff Society, Patrick Thomas, have a written agreement with Michael Stepler insuring he does not divulge certain information to the administration about the union.

"One is that Michael not be asked by management to divulge any confidential information that he became aware of in his role as Staff Society President. The second is that

he will not be at the bargaining table during this round of negotiations", said Orum.

Asked if the sudden loss of their President came as a surprise both Orum and Stepler said, "it was a surprise to all of us". But Orum said the move is not unusual.

"Personnel has three people that did the same thing...so they have quite a team of people who have come from unions."

Neither Orum nor Thomas view the departure of their President to the ranks of

management as an advantage or disadvantage for the union, saying management would not become more sympathetic towards the union.

"I don't think the word sympathetic fits. The fact they are knowledgeable about our contract, a reasonably complex one, there is some advantage in having someone who understands it", said Orum.

Negotiations between the Staff Society and BCIT continue with no settlement "in the immediate offing" according to Thomas.

## Board arranges loan for campus centre work

### Nomination Procedure:

1. All nominees must be members in good standing of the Association with minimum of sixty-five per cent first term standing, or a letter of recommendation from the Department Head of the nominee in question.

2. Nominations must be submitted to the C.R.O. on the form provided for this purpose. The nomination shall be considered invalid unless the information called for is complete in all respects, to wit:  
Name of nominee (printed or typed); position of Executive which the nominee will contest; signatures of at least fifteen members of the Association in good standing; signatures of nominee, campaign manager and present office

holder, and date of nomination.

3. Any member of the Association may sponsor only one candidate for each office. Signing a nomination form shall not be considered a pledge of support in the ensuing campaign and voting except for the case of Campaign Manager, who has stated his or her intentions.

4. A Candidate wishing to withdraw must do so no later than forty-eight hours before the opening of the polls by tendering his withdrawal, in writing, personally or through his Campaign Manager, to the C.R.O. at the offices of the Student Association. If he/she was the sole candidate for the office in question, the office shall be left off the ballot and a special election shall be held no earlier than two weeks following the general election.

Students producing news stories can earn five cents per published word, while students interested in writing movie, theatre, concert and record reviews can pick up free passes and albums as available.

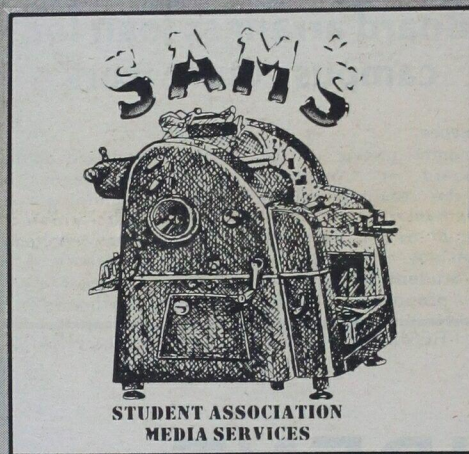
The Link is also looking for students to sell advertising space (commission is 25 per cent) and do typesetting at \$6/hour.

# Council considers changes to S.A. constitution

The Student Association gathered Monday night for its regular council meeting and the main topic on the agenda was the S.A. constitution.

The meeting opened with the announcement that business manager Phil Henderson was to become S.A. senior advisor, with

assistant business manager Lorne Hildebrand taking over as full business manager.

Hildebrand then reported that Access Computers had another good week with sales in the area of \$8700.

Council then discussed the Needy Student Fund, a program where the S.A. collects money for needy students where the government matches the amount collected up to a maximum of \$14,000. The program ends March 31st, although the S.A. intends to continue promoting the fund past that date. About two weeks ago the fund reached the \$4000 mark.

The first of the proposed constitution amendments were ratified at the meeting, but not the entire document as had been expected (and shown in the Link February 11 and 18). Bylaw 8, dealing with elections and appointments was passed as proposed so that it would be in effect for this year's executive election. The remainder of the constitution will be discussed at an addendum meeting during Spring break. According to council members, when the final changes are made, the

constitution will then be submitted to a lawyer before council passes the amended constitution.

Recreation and Athletic Chairperson Ray Richard said that council members should read the constitution very carefully in order to catch typographical errors.

Finally, council endorsed in principle a proposal from S.A. publisher Don Wright to start another publication on campus. The publication, called *Technology Tonight*, will serve continuing education (nightschool) students, and will be published in a magazine format with articles and information pieces of interest to continuing education students.

## SFU protest is in the mail

Simon Fraser University students have been busy sending postcards to MLA's Stan Hagen and Darlene Mazari. A two postcard package was distributed to SFU students in mid February. The first postcard urges Hagen, the Minister of Advanced Education and Job Training to "reinstate a program of student grants aimed at reduced debt loads and allowing access to Post Secondary Institutions for all qualified students, based on need". The second postcard asks Mazari, NDP debate leader on Post Secondary Education to also urge Hagen to reinstate the grant portion of the provincial student aid program.

The Simon Fraser Student Society printed 2000 copies of the postcard package, which they hope will make the government aware of how students tell about student aid in B.C.

## Alberta students rally against education cuts

More than 5,000 University of Calgary students blocked traffic and occupied administration offices during a protest rally two weeks ago.

The rally was called in response to government plans to cut university funding by three per cent resulting in program cuts and eliminations. The protest started on the university campus and then moved onto city streets where students blocked traffic until being asked to move by the police.

University faculty representatives and opposition MRA's addressed the crowd when it returned to campus, encouraging the students to keep the pressure on both the government and the university administration. Arts students were particularly upset, one week earlier a ceramics program unique in Western Canada was cut and its building slated for conversion into administration offices complete with a \$250,000 "skywalk."

ding to Murray the main purpose of the tour was to visit the Asia schools as a comparison to BCIT and to formulate possible exchanges of students and staff. Student, staff and research exchanges were negotiated with a few of the schools although no dates were mentioned. Murray said it is an opportune time for these types of programs as the provincial government is a strong supporter of international education.

The Student Association made it's first presentation to the Board of Governors on the proposed Campus Centre since July last year. The presentation was made by S.A. president Pat Carroll, project director Troy Nagy and fundraiser Nuala Woodham and featured a scale model of the centre and

large illustrations and floor plans. Nagy reported the confirmed cost of the project is \$5.403 million - up 5.6 per cent since July. One million dollars is expected from the provincial government, private capital should net \$600,000, \$236,000 through the Student Association, \$100,000 through the staff club and \$80,000 from the Bookstore. This leaves approximately \$3 million in debt at about 11 per cent that would take 12 years to clear. Other funding possibilities were brought up, including a donor's club and a president's club. Fundraising is expected to begin in May.

The Board endorsed the proposal and then voted to extend a \$100,00 loan to the S.A. through the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce.



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# Check your medical coverage

The full cost of medical cover with the Medical Services Plan is \$216.00 for one person for 12 months of cover. However, a number of students may qualify for greatly reduced rates - up to a whopping 90 percent off the regular rate!

Are you one of the lucky ones? It depends upon how much taxable income you made in 1986 - not what you actually earned - the taxable portion of your earnings. If your taxable earnings for 1986 were less than \$2060 you may have hit the jackpot and could get your medical for just \$21.60 for a whole year. There is another rate at 50 percent if your taxable income if your taxable earnings were under \$3160.

You must have been a resident of B.C. for 12 consecutive months prior to applying, and you must be sub-

ject to Canadian Income Tax. Come in to Medical Services and get the necessary forms.

All MSP premiums will increase by approximately 10 percent on April 1, 1987.

\*\*\*

Please help us when you visit Medical Services by bringing your Medical Services Plan (MSP) number with you the first time that you wish to see a doctor. We do allow you a first visit without your number and naturally will always see emergency cases, but you do help us to operate efficiently when you carry it with you.

\*\*\*

For your information and to help you, we keep a supply of claim forms for your student accident insurance, in Medical Services. If you need a claim form or if we can be of help call in to Medical

Services.

There has been a recent change in the ruling regarding people studying on a student visa. These people are once again eligible for cover under the M.S.P. of B.C. after a waiting period. Certain documents are required. If you think you are eligible call in at Medical Services for details and application forms.

We are sorry - Canadian students from out of province will not be accepted for cover under M.S.P. of B.C. unless they can prove they have moved permanently (not just while they study here) to B.C. They must retain cover under their province of origin - we, of course, accept that cover when they wish to visit the doctors in Medical Services.

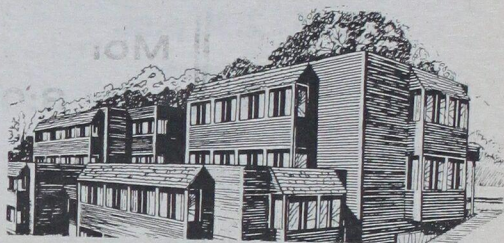

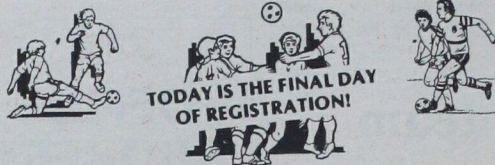
