

You'd think that people who have so much of that there education would know better, but I guess they've spent so much time with noses in books that they ain't had time topayattention to what is and what ain't healthy

Another thing 'bout the outhouses of this here school; they got a set of 'em for boys and another set of 'em for girls. I've tried to figure out why, but city folks are strange and ain't got horsesense like folks back ho-

The first day I came to this school they made us waitinline outside the building, then let us in, gave us an envelope, toldus to go into this here big room with lots of weird, smalltables that you can't even put your meal on and only seats one to a table, then this guy spoke to us 'bout something that didn't make much sense. 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
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SHINERAMA

For now, I have PEACE OF MIND.








