


On behalf of the Student Association, I would like to apologize for such irresponsible actions. I would also like to thank you for your patience in this matter.








Doug Shmyrs in the second mile of the 5000 meters.




Margo Walliston and John Munsie taking home silverware.





Margo Walliston preparing to throw the javelin





### PACINO."SERPICO

Serpico is definitely one of the best movies around. Al Pacino (Serpico) is in almost every scene, and every scene he is in holds your absolute attention, I have rarely seen an entire audience's i attention captivated by a movie as much as this one. It is so quiet in the theatre, I found myself trying to hold my breath during the extremely quiet portions of the show.

This story is a trip everyone experience, a trip into reality with an honest cop. That may come on a bit corny,

but this true story of a brave plain clothes cop, responsible for turning a reluctant spotlight on police corruption in New York City is effective in every way. The movie is moving as well as effective, so effective that you feel as Serpico does. The story starts off with Serpico being rushed to Hal Hickey

the hospital with a hole in his face, put there by a .22 calibre bullet at close range. It immediately captivates your attention when a detective from the top brass confesses that it might have been a cop that did it.

From there, you travel into Serpico's past. Starting from his graduation from the Police Academy, right up to where the beginning left you hanging.

Al Pacino is a brilliant actor, and anyone who appreciates excellent acting will appreciate this film. Nobody knows how it missed being nominated for best movie, and for \$2.75 you can't beat it for 2 solid hours of entertainment.

During the whole seemingly mixed up mess he manages to fall in love with Constance Bonancieux (Raquel Welch) who plays a pivotal: role in the film.

You could say the film is a self-satire, because most of the actors cast in French roles come equipped with natural English accents. But some roles are quite serious such as the Cardinal's: henchman, Rochfort, played by the villanous Christopher Lee, best known for his British Dracula films.

























# MICHAEL WHITE RETURNS TO VANCOUVER

There's a new club in Vancouver, only this is one with a It's called Lucy's difference. Jazz Workshop and it's the only place in town bringing in really well known jazz acts on a regular basis. This is something we've missed for some time. Vancouver must be growing up.

The John Handy Quintet opened the club several weeks ago and playing there now is his former violinist, Michael White. White, who has had his own quintet for over two years also played with the highly respected Fourth Way. The group he has now is composed of Kenny Jenkins on bass, Bob King playing guitar, drummer Clarence Becton and percussion ist Kenneth Nash.

In person, it becomes apparent that this is a group in the fullest sense of the word. Although Michael is ostensibly the leader, he doesn't do what so many other so-called leaders do by attempting to prove their position by dominating the proceedings and drowning out the other musicians. As he says, his music depends more on establishing a melodic feeling than on technical virtuosity. He can play very well, of course, but he doesn't flaunt it. Consequently, for some fairly long segments of the set, he wasn't even playing but sat instead as a benign observer and let the rest of the band set the pace, I was particularly impressed with bassist Jenkins who carried much

of the load during these moments.

That they reverse a lot was evident from moments such as the abrupt ending of Ebony Plaza, the second number they played. Following this example of perfect timing was a quiet, soulful selection called Water Children, written by the absent Kenneth Nash. He had been detained by other business but should have arrived in Vancouver by the time you read

It's a pity he couldn't have made it because he surely would have enhanced the already fine sound. One other thing I thought might fill out the band is the addition of a keyboard player. Happily, Michael indicated to me that this is a part of his plans. Also planned is a fifth album. with recording to possible begin

At any rate, The Michael White Quintet will be at Lucy's until Saturday night. It's a very attractive split level club and if you get there early you can get seats practically right on stage. Doors open at nine.

Coming up next is Stan Getz, opening on April 15. Following are such outstanding musicians as Pharaoh Sanders and Leon Thomas and Freddie Hubbard. Here's hoping this is the beginning of a lasting and profitable operation.

## S.E.T. PART II

In considering professional organizations, it is best to first define the terms. Evaluating the Society of Engineering Technologists of B.C., two terms stand to be defined: technical, defined as: "of or in or peculiar to a particular art or science or craft"; and profession, defined as "a statement of what is to be taken as ones feeling or belief or intension or motive." The Society and it's main objective is contained in the definition of those two words.

The Society, formed first as the Society of Architectual and Engineering Technologists, now operates as the Society of Engineering Technologists of the Province of British Columbia under a Constitution and Bylaws dated in 1968. The Society was developed as an organization working to obtain recognition of the Engineering Technician and Engineering Technologist profession in British Columbia. In certifying and issuing a certificate of proficiency, the Society is providing B.C. with a controlled qualified and responsible body of technicians and technologists. It is with these high aims and objectives that the Society and it's members can look to recognition from industry and business.

The Society in it's formative years was dependent upon the Association of Professional Engineers in establishing a system of classification based on academic and experience factors. Mutual co-operation exists to this day, with a liaison committee working toward proper definition and support of the "Engineering Team." The Society for the most part is now independent and thankful for the continued support of the Association of Professional Engineers.

The governing body of S.E.T. is the Provincial Council, it's eleven members elected annually from the Society membership. Responsibilities of the Council include the management, direction and administration of the business and finance of the Society. Various committees such as the Public Relations, Finance, Education, Bylaws and Research and Statistics committee formulate and carry-out policy in there particular area. To assist in the business and public relations of the Society a Registrar and back-up staff has been employed.

Following a thorough review by the Board of Examiners, comprised of Professional Engineers and Certified Engineering Technologists, an applicant is admitted into the Society with one of the following classifications:

Student Technologist Technologist-in-Training **Engineering Technologist** Technician—in—Training Engineering Technician Senior Engineering Technician **Certified Classifications** 

The three grades of certified members are permitted to use the initials C.E.T. after their name, to wear the Society ring and to display the Society Certificate.

S.E.T. of B.C. is only one of ten societies now functioning in Canada, each one being a Provincial Society with varying structures. The Societies are now united under CCETT. The Canadian Council of Engineering Technicians and Technologists, an organization striving to standardize admission requirements, to. provide a means for transferability from province to province, and to represent the technical people nationally and internationally. Our Society maintains close liaison not only with CCETT and other Canadian Societies, but also with the Association of Professional Engineers of BC and with our American counterparts, The American Society of Engineering Tech-Certified nicians, ASCET.


