## Remembering BCIT, Circa 1964

20 years ago students on campus were distinguishable by their short haircuts, ties and suits. The women mostly had long hair or bouffant styles and the miniskirt was just becoming the rage. Occasionally at socials and dances the BCIT dress code, established by first principal, E. Cecil Roper, would be abandoned in favour of a variety of outlandish costumes from the popular bikers outfits to the now infamous Frosh Queen ball gowns and high heels.

Since that time the BCIT dress code has been abandoned altogether and the Frosh Queen exercise relegated to an amusing anachronism. This week, though, the Institute is indulging in a little nostalgia and on Friday, when it officially celebrates the anniversary of its 1964 opening, all students and staff are being asked to help create that 60's feeling by dressing according to the 1964 BCIT rules:

"All students are required to dress in a neat and tidy manner in keeping with the dignity of the Institute. For men this means the wearing of the following attire on the campus: shirt and tie, business suit, or sports coat or blazer with suitable trousers. In laboratory and shops a laboratory coat, which will be supplied by the Institute, is worn in place of the coats or blazers mentioned above. Women should be attired appropriately in accordance with the regulations for men."

The official birthday party celebrations will kick off in the 2N Plaza at 3 p.m. (SAC gymnasium if raining). Performing the official rededication ceremonies in the place of Premier W.A.C. Bennett who opened the Institute on October 5, 1964, will be Minister of Education, Jack Heinrich. Also present will be BCIT's first principal, E. Cecil Roper and other guests from the early days including the former Minister of Labour and Education, Leslie R. Peterson, John S. White, former co-chairman of BCIT's first advisory council, 1964 and Ross Ford, director of Technical and Vocational Training, Federal Department of Labour. Mayor Bill Lewarne and MP's Svend Robinson and Pat Carney will also be present. Some major announcements regarding BCIT's 20th Anniversary Fund Raising Campaign will be made by President Gordon Thom and Jack Heinrich is also expected to make some important announcements of interest to the Institute.

An official BCIT group photo of everyone present will be taken during the early part of the ceremonies, the Band of the 15th Field Artillery will provide some rousing music and the affair will culminate in a coffee/cake reception in the SAC lobby with an original 1964 film clip of the opening ceremonies on view.

All students are urged to attend this important BCIT event.

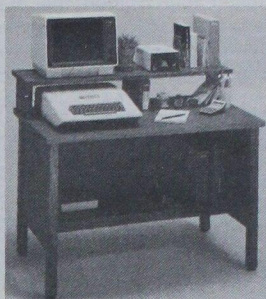

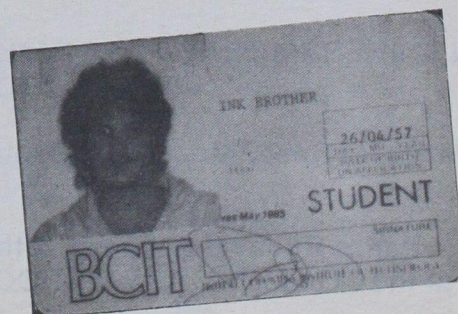

*How to obtain your student I.D. Card without pain and aggravation!*

### PROOF OF STUDENT STATUS:

1. If you already have a fee receipt with your name on it, that is acceptable. **Do not** harass the cashier's at the front office, they cannot issue fee receipts on request.
2. If you do not have a fee receipt, apply for a library card at the BCIT library. They take a few days to process, so don't get upset at the librarians, either.
3. Bring your fee receipt or library card, along with proof of age, to S.A. Media Services, room 28 in the SAC. 'Proof of age' can be one of the following: Driver's License, B.C. I.D., or Passport. If photo proof of age cannot be provided, a student card with no birth date can be taken.
4. Until Sept. 21st, Student I.D. Cards will be provided at a cost of \$1.00. After Sept. 21st, they will be \$2.00 each, and available for a limited time only.

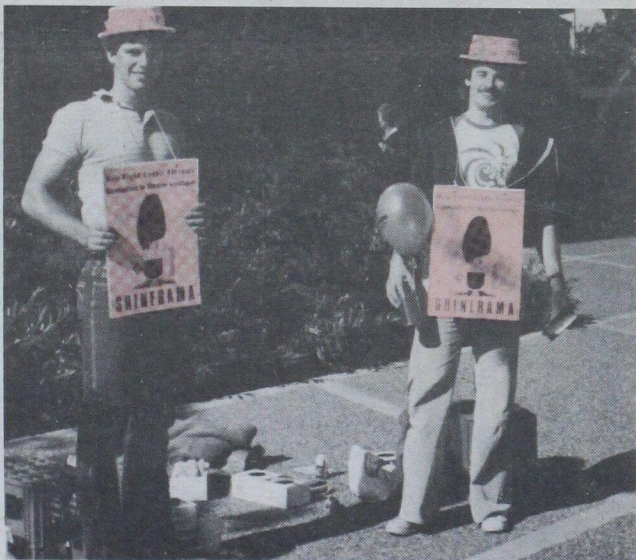

# Octoberfest returns to BCIT

BCIT's Student Association executive held their first meeting of the academic year Monday night in the SAC Boardroom. The executive is still in the organizational stage, so nothing of great consequence was resolved.

Phil Henderson, Business Manager for the S.A., kicked off the meeting, reporting on the "excellent art show last week" held in the SAC lounge. The S.A. earned \$250 by letting the print vendors set up in the SAC. Henderson also announced the arrival of five IBM PC Computers, paid for by the Student Association.

This & That Emporium manager Linda Field reported on the progress of the 3 campus stores over the summer. The main outlet, in building 2N is doing well after an expansion and rearrangement of display areas. She has been "swamped in bookwork" lately, and clarified the status of the computers they

are selling currently. She told the executive that they are being sold on a commission basis, with 10% of the take going to the TNT.

Bill Sekhon, S.A. Food and Beverage manager, reported on the cafeteria and TAPS bar. The newer staff members are getting well organized, and sales are quite brisk - \$600 worth during last Wednesday's lunch break. He suggested that the cafeteria needs a new sound system to go with the new screen, adding that the installer of the screen was willing to put in a new sound system at a wholesale rate. And, despite minor difficulties with it at the start, Bill reported that the S.A.'s satellite dish was working well.

Link manager Don Wright made a brief but newsy report on the progress of the paper to date. He said that a Link organizational meeting would be held this month, and was urging those interested in writing for the

paper to show. He also urges staff and students to give him feedback on the paper as the year progresses. Lately, he and his staff have been busy shooting student ID cards, with 600 done so far and another 2000 expected.

Further announcements were made through the meeting of interest to students. Thirty people are

needed to sell flags at the Pope's visit to Abbotsford Airport, Educational Council requires student representatives from each division, and Campus Rec requires students to fill work study positions. Further details on these items are available from SA representatives.

Finally, the group voted in

favour of holding this year's Octoberfest at BCIT's Taps, rather than at the Commodore Ballroom, citing cost and convenience as the prime factors.

The S.A.'s next meeting will be Monday night at 6 p.m. at which time the group will likely be in full swing. All interested students are invited to attend.

## Fundraising off to good start

The BCIT Cougar Rugby team has yet to score a try or make a tackle, but has already recorded a financial victory.

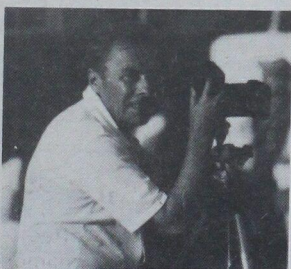
The Cougs, with the backing of the Student Association, ran a very successful food concession on Friday in conjunction with the orientation beer garden hosted by the S.A.

"The backing of the S.A. is very important in our plans to tour Montreal and Ottawa for nine days at the end of the school year in May," said coach Gary Miller. "We have to raise upwards of \$10,000 in order for the players to tour for \$100 each...we have done it before and we'll do it again with this kind of support."

at 5:30. According to Miller, everyone is welcome with or without experience, "just a good attitude and the willingness to work hard."
