

OTTAWA YOUTH CONFERENCE

May-haps you've that Tom (Terrific) Campbell displayed a certain amount of annoyance when he was told by the Federal Government that the hostels in Canada will remain open for the duration of the year? An explanation may be necessary.

The action taken by the federal government was instigated by the recommendations of the first national Youth Conference on Travel and Exchange in Ottawa which I was fortunate enough to be in attendance. The purpose of this conference was to explore the needs of youth today regarding travel across Canada. As it stood previous to September 8, all hostels were to be closed on that date, leaving many transient youth on the streets to fend for themselves all across Canada; a problem and a need, since fulfilled. This solution is a general solution to a general problem, and in way can it fulfill tangential problems like Vancouver's Beatty Street Armoury.

Aside from the aforesaid direct

resultant action of the Conference, no other action has taken place as yet.

The Conference consisted of delegates from Victoria to Newfoundland, including institutions such as universities, technological institutes, hostels, armouries, 4-H's, and a member of Kool-Aid, all versed in the problems of their specific institutions regarding youth travel, creating a cross-section of problems across Canada.

The government wanted to know the present problems and by this Conference had received 89 general recommendations. Plans for future conferences are underway, headed by one delegate per province as a type of planning committee to ensure action on the proposed recommendations.

Since I have a personal interest in this field, I would appreciate any specific questions or recommendations the student body may have sent to Room 462, and answering them, if possible by means of the Link.



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THE CUTBACKS

As our student association President makes it quite clear elsewhere in this issue, BCIT is about to undergo trying times in almost all aspects of its operation. This, of course, has been brought about by a general down turn of the economy throughout Canada (and North America, for that matter), which is being reflected in a cutback in spending of all governments in the area. The B.C. government is no exception, and BCIT-a government-run institute has begun to feel the bite.

It is where has been biten that is the problem-and the pain! While we sympathize with the B.C. government's predicament and the BCIT Administration's delemma, we cannot support the two major areas they have decided to reflect bugetary cuts. A library is an important if not the most important part of any educational institution and that ours be closed onboth Satur days and Sundays and reduced to a 5:00 pm closing time weekdays all in one fell swoop cannot be accepted without protest. Sure, it may be that Saturday and Sunday are the days the Library is least in use, but it still is and by a significant number of students. Many of those because of residence inconveriences, find those two days the only ones when they can put the Library to significant usage.

The closing of the cafeteria at 3:30 in the afternoon is yet another area of similar poor judgement. Even though it may not be as critical as the library, the authorities concerned should give due recognition to the fact that, for an institution the size of BCIT where residence-oncampus—is almost universally standard, the BCIT cafeteria three-meal service of the past had at least helped relieve the alimentary necessities of the students. Now even that essential convenience for the later hours of the day has been removed. We know this must be hard on the many students from distant places. After all, BCIT is not merely local, or even a provincial institution. It is federal, or more correctly, international, witness the many persons from all over the world who now form a growing minority of the student population. We would have hoped that the B.C. government could have understood this.

Alas, they have not. It is now up to us, under the direction of our hard working Student Executive to start putting the pressure on government to at least reconsider some of their budgetary decisions as they affect BCIT. We must be patient and not take any drastic or radical action-yet! Even if we ultimately fail to get any new decisions from government on the issues mentioned, all is still not lost. The Student Executive could possibly explain our crucial educational predicament to some of the larger industrial organizations who have always thought a lot of this Institute, asking them to support us financially in this time of need. Then we may know what BCIT's cultivated reputation is really worth.

POLICY

As befits a student newspaper, policy will not be hard and fast or be bent in any specific direction but will reflect general student trends of our particular period. We propose to publish a varied paper with appeal to the conservative as will as ultra-mod, the deeply-religious as well as non-conformists the entertainment minded (sex!) as well as those who want food for thought-and serious thought. Through it all we will try to be constructive in our approach to all subjects, refrain from interpersonal conflicts and artibcles which the editorial board considers in poor taste. Still, most of what reaches us will undoubtedly be published. We trust students will keep our LINK Box in the main foyers filled with articles, letters, ideas and suggestions, which will, in the final analysis, determine the quality of LINK.


The administration at B.C.I.T. is just as concerned as we are, and at the present time we are working very hard to find other ways in reducing the budget than to cut library hours, to discontinue the food service at night, to improve the bookstore service and other items which are however, of secondary importance. Since I have written this letter I will have had further meetings with the administration and on Monday, the 14th I am to meet along with the two vice-presidences, the Honourable Minister of Education, Mr. D.L. Brothers. Hopefully, some positive solution can be reached at that time.

If no progress is made and we feel it is necessary to call a General Meeting for you, the student body, we will do so and it is your responsibility to attend and to decide what further steps we will take.

In the mean time I ask you to bear with us in the mature way B. C.I.T. students have always shown themselves and not to make any rash decisions which we may regret in the future.

Owned and operated by the BCIT Student Association the store has been in the planning stage for a number of years. Turn and pass up through loop and . . .




Complete by slipping down through the knot in front. Tighten and draw up snug to collar.

BIRTH CONTROL

Handbook given out at UVic

VICTORIA (CP) — A new subject, birth control, has been unofficially added to the syllabus for the academic year starting at the University of Victoria.

When they registered Friday. 5,700 students received copies of a birth control handbook published by McGill University students' society.

Robert McDougall. UVic student union president, said the union does not condone "loose morality," but it does recognize the need for information on the subject.

McDougall said a handbook published by the Victoria Family Planning Association was also considered.

But the McGill book was chosen, he said, because it answers the needs of the student more directly than the family association's manual, which is "oriented towards the married man."

The student leader said the McGill handbook was approved as medically correct by the family association.

Other leaflets passed out to students concerned the availability of birth control devices and counselling services in Victoria.

By now many first and second year students are wondering what is going on at BCIT.

The institute is growing at a very rapid rate. Changes are evolving and in many cases "the right hand does not know what the left hand is doing". This is typical of most larger organizations.

The registration period of organization or should we say disordganization happens to the best of schools. It will take time to straighten things out.

PROBLEMS

The major problems at BCIT presently are the opening hours of the library and the school, parking and cafeteria meals.

LIBRARY

BCIT library hours this year are nine to five on weekdays and that is it!

True BCIT is undergoing dramatic bud getary problems like in other institutes around the world and cut backs are usually necessary. But why the Library?

The Library is truely the academic centre at this institute. Library hours should be extended not shortened. Most technologies are dependent on the resource centre for doing their day to day assignments. Students do not have time during the day to work on projects in the library. This is a special hardship to those students who are entirely dependent on reference material in the library for certain courses.

The few breaks during the day are not enough. No sooner does the student get set up for study then it is time for the next class. Night time operation, where students may spend a longer streetch is essential in

achieving satisfactory academic studies at BCIT.

UBC's library is open till midnight and SFU's till two in the morning. Why must BCIT's close at 5 pm?

Students also require library services during the weekends. Out of town students in many cases live in places unsuitable as far as study is concerned at night or during the weekend. During the weekend students are able to work on major projects or catch up on the weeks heavy work load.

In either case students should not be refused their privilege in the use of the academic facilities. Surely we can cut back on something else. The extra cost (approx. \$13,000) for staffing is rather small compared to the investment placed in the building, the books and the students.

Time and equipment limitations in the day require the main school to be remian open at night and on weekends also. All the students cannot use the limited equipment during the time provided during the day. All technologies face this problem. We certainly agree that things should be closed down if they are not used but previous records indicate that both the library and the school are being utilized extensively during these hours in which they are now closed. Lets not who short change students.

At present Administration is seriously looking into the situation. Dean Goard has stated that somewhere there must be cuts and these will affect the students. What he however is trying to achieve is to select cuts that will have a minimal effect on the students. The student association is also presently doing everything it can to resolve the problem. They are to meet with Donald

Brother, Minister of Education this Monday and will inform the students of all outcomes.

PARKING - THE BCIT CANCER

BCIT has been infected with a disease that will if unchecked spreak out and cover the entire campus. Reserved student parking is the governments way to infiltrate its compulsory parking fees for the students.

A special reserved scilent parking area has been used as bait and because of the quickness has been swallowed by many first year students at BCIT.

Although it may seem logical on the top, there is a lot more below this ice berg. The present fee for reserved parking will most certainly increase as will the size of the reserved parking lot until we have compulsory paid parking throughout the whole campus. Willingdon will be closed off and parking fees will be substantially increased.

This is what will happen if we do not stop it now! BCIT staff are presently paying a parking fee. The vocational school staff however refuse to pay and will fight the issue until the end. Student Parking facilities at BCIT are bad enough and on top of that we have to pay for it.

The student association executive recommends to the council and the students that students should refuse to pay any sort or parking fee and ask for a reimbursement of any parking fees paid to date. Reserve parking is a voluntary matter. Don't fall into the government trap or will all lose in the end. Why pay for something that exists only as a plan of the government to squee\(\frac{1}{2} ze \) money out of students.

LATE ANNOUNCEMENT

Word has reached us that the library will be open as per regular hours from last year. How long this will last is not certain. Student use of the facilities is the best way to ensure that the place stays open. Use the library.
