#### **New Appointments**

The School of Health Sciences now has a direct relationship to the BCIT Technology Centre through the appointment of Dr. David Johnson as the new manager of health research and development.

As a member of Dr. Norman Streat's Technology Centre team, David will be responsible for the planning, facilitating and implementation of the School's research and development strategy and the various projects arising from it. David will work closely with all interested parties in the School and others at BCIT who would like to contribute to initiatives which will expand the health technology industry in B.C. and/or will contribute to cost containment in health care.

David, who is a well known scientist in Canada and internationally, did his graduate studies in experimental physics and cryogenics at UBC. He joins us from the Department of National Health and Welfare, where he served in a variety of functions for 18 years, including physical scientist for Ultrasound Safety with the Radiation Protection Bureau, chief of the clinical devices division at the Bureau of Medical Devices, chief of evaluation, research and standards for the Bureau of Radiation and Medical Devices.

Another new staff member at the Technology Centre is Erwin Bublitz who has taken a one year leave of absence from his positon as chief instructor in Benchwork and Joinery. Erwin will be working in the Centre under the auspices of the National Research Council of Canada as an industrial technology advisor (ITA).

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In his new role Erwin will liase with the business community in B.C., offering various forms of technical assistance to small and medium sized woodworking industries and introducing them to new technology.



#### ENVIRONMENT HIGH ON AGENDA FOR NEW HEALTH ASSOCIATE DEAN

Bruce Sandy, BCIT's new associate dean of Health Technologies will be working closely with faculty and staff in Electrophysiology, Biomedical Engineering, Prosthetics and Orthotics, Environmental Health, Occupational Health and Safety and Health Care Management. He will also be very involved in environmental health activities as they relate to BCIT. Projects that tie in with this are the new Health Part Time Studies program in Environmental Management of Real Estate Assets and the BCIT Environment Committee.

Bruce, who joined BCIT on September 4, comes to BCIT from London, Ontario where he worked at the University of Western Ontario Health Sciences Centre as chief administrative officer. No stranger to BCIT (he worked here on a case study for the Health Care Management program from September to December 1986) Bruce brings an impressive array of health credentials including director of Clinic Operations at UBC.

At the University of Western Washington Bruce had administrative responsibility for 12 clinical departments, nine basic sciences departments and a number of other education and administrative support units. He also served as chairman and member on a number of hospital committees.

Bruce received a graduate degree in Health Services Administration from Dalhousie University and his undergraduate degree in clinical and biological psychology from the University of British Columbia.

# OBITUARY FOR ROBERT JACKSON

With the death of Robert Jackson on July 24, BCIT lost an excellent teacher and a staunch colleague.

Robert was a natural leader and positive thinker — qualities that went a long way to ensure harmony within the Financial Management department and even within the Institute when larger issues became contentious. One such issue seized attention several years ago when faculty lost patience with the general condition of campus facilities and called for action from the administration. Bob, not one to sit and wait, took matters into his own hands by organizing a painting bee consisting of faculty, staff and former president, Roy Murray.

"That was characteristic of Bob," says Financial Management instructor Margaret Briscall, who was also a personal friend. "He was a leader in every situation, whether it was in the Staff Society or in the department, he always spoke up and made a useful contribution."

But it was as a teacher that Robert left his most lasting legacy. Thousands of students benefitted from his impeccable delivery, well organized classes and personal interest, gaining confidence and skills that enhanced their careers and reflected back positively on BCIT.

Robert's total dedication to his students was never more evident than in the last two years of his life when, stricken with cancer and on long term disability leave, he came into the Institute every Saturday to tutor Introductory Accounting students. "That effort sorely taxed him," says personal friend and colleague Peter Woolley, "But his extraordinary resolution and determination kept him going."

Needless to say, Robert was one of the first recipients of the Excellence in Teaching Awards established by the School of Business.

In March the Financial Management department, realizing that Robert didn't have much longer to live, held a special party honoring first faculty members. It was their way of saying goodbye.

An Award Endowment in memory of Robert Jackson has now been established. The annual interest from this will provide an annual award to a student selected on the basis of achievement in Financial Management 101/201. 
# FAST-TRACKING EDUCATION

BCIT has accepted sponsorship of a racey subject. They will be sponsoring — in a non-financial way — the operation of a stock Camaro to be driven in competitions sponsored by the National Association for Stock Car Auto Racing (NASCAR).

The Camaro has already been made available to ten different areas of the Trades Training group, with coordination provided by Don Eklof.

Stock car racing is a fast and competitive sport, and damage to vehicles is not uncommon. The school is providing a variety of support services to the Camaro's crew in exchange for advertising on the car. Services include calibration of engine ignition, work on drive train components, welding and body panel work, painting, electrical work, piping replacements, and repairs to field compressors and generators.

Tom Berrow, owner/driver of the Camaro, and Tom Mackay, team manager (Eric Mackay in Personnel is Tom's son) and their pit crew have

been working together as a team since 1975 and have built this car from scratch.

The technical support, advice, and assistance of BCIT's Trades and Training group have helped to keep the Camaro in competition. Although the team is able to budget approximately \$8,000 per year, some of their competitors spend up to \$150,000. Despite that income gap they have been very successful, finishing in the top ten in five out of six races this year. That result is largely due to the expertise and hard work of BCIT's instructors and students.

While the Camaro's team provides all of the basic funds for parts and materials, Trades and Training provides the expertise and manpower. That includes professional advice and assistance from instructors and students in Trades and Training. Work that is needed on the car is worked into regular schedules, providing students and instructors with a new focus. As Ewen Sheard, Instructor for Heavy Duty Mechanics, remarks, "I'm able to take my truck mechanic expertise and translate it into car racing technology."



## Spotlight on Staff

## NO OLD CROCK TOO MUCH FOR CROCKER

Brad Crocker, who works for the Survey and Civil Technologies, has created a remarkable teaching aid for the school.

The standard surveying instrument Survey students train on is called a Topcon Auto Level, a complex instrument, with an intricate system of prisms and mirrors aligned to delicate optics. All of this sits atop a moveable base calibrated to 360° and adjusted by means of an "endless screw."

The problem is that this complicated mechanism is encased in a cast metal housing and although Survey students learn to use the level and appreciate what it can do, Brad says they have no understanding of the delicacy and complexity of the internal workings.

So taking a broken survey instrument, Brad stripped off the external metal casing, and created a clear plexiglass housing using his lathe and milling machine. The result is a work of art — but more than that, it is a valuable educational tool that illustrates the instrument's components. You can now clearly see the interaction of the prisms, mirrors, gears, and optics.

All this took Brad about three-months but he enjoys this kind of "tinkering" and has a talent for it — balanced by 20 year's experience as a mechanic. Besides his regular work at BCIT, he has repaired weedeaters, clocks, cameras, electric fans and — yes — even rice cookers for various BCIT groups.

#### **SPECIAL EVENTS**

BCIT's Public Affairs and Marketing Department coordinates a number of special events on campus. Here is a sampling of September/October events coordinated by special events coordinator Carol Dion and her assistant Michelle Traynor:

- A delegation from the Japan Housing Co-operative Society toured BCIT's R2000 display house and related construction program areas on September 13. The delegation was welcomed by Dean of the School of Trades, Ray Walton and escorted by John Eliasen, chief instructor, Construction Programs. Mr. Susumu Yamamoto, chairman of Japan's National Federation of Housing Cooperative Societies, headed the delegation.
- Eight Fellows of the Commonwealth of Learning toured BCIT on September 14 as part of a general tour of major educational institutions in British Columbia. The group was primarily interested in exploring the latest developments in the provision of distance learning. Escorted by Carol Dion of Public Affairs and Marketing, the fellows toured the program areas of Interactive Video, Nursing, Transystems, and the Broadcast Centre, and investigated resources available at BCIT in curriculum development, audio-visual and trades and technology. The fellows were from India, Barbados, Botswana, Uganda, Nigeria and Zambia.
- A six-week Tourism Management Training Program successfully wound up on September 21, with 20 men and women from Indonesia's tourist industry receiving certificates at a graduation dinner held at the Vancouver Trade and Convention Centre. The pilot program, a joint effort of BCIT and Capilano College, was designed to expose Indonesian tourism professionals to various sectors of the B.C. tourism industry in order to help build a team of Indonesian tourism specialists.
- On September 26, BCIT's Entrance Awards Ceremony was held at 1:30 p.m. in the Administration Boardroom.

The focus of these awards is recognition of students' academic achievement and leadership, although each award program is also designed to support specific educational goals. The President's Entrance Awards were established to strengthen BCIT's image in the community as a preferred school, to attract academically qualified student leaders, and to attract students from outside the Lower Mainland. The Canada Scholarships are intended to encourage students to pursue a degree in the areas of science and engineering. The various corporate awards also are intended to support academically qualified student leaders in specific programs — the Teck Corporation Entrance Awards in mining, the B.C. Dairy Foundation Awards in food technology, and the Kloss Entrance Awards for trades. A new award, the CN Scholarship for

Women, has been established to encourage women to enter non-traditional professions.
