DATES

1. Nominations open March
27, and close April 7, at 5:30 p.m.

2. Candidates get-together
and wine and cheese party, April
7, 5:30 in the SAC Boardroom.

3. Campaign Week, April 10,
8:30 a.m. to April 19, 5:30 p.m.

4. General meeting of the SA
and campaign rally will be held in
the SAC Cafeteria 12:00, April 19.

5. Nomination withdrawals or
position changes by April 18, 8:30
a.m.

These must be submitted in
writing to Rob Seines or Ian
Robertson by the candidate or
campaign manager.

6. Voting: April 20 and 21,
8:30 to 5:30.

7. Ballots will be counted by
polling clerks with Campaign
Managers in attendance, April 21
from 5:30 to the wee hours.

CAMPAIGNING:

1. Posters or other printed
material can only be placed on
bulleting boards and other areas
commonly designed for adver-
tising. Do not put posters on
doors or windows.

2. You cannot use lewd, in-
decent or suggestive material of
any kind. A candidate who does
so may be disqualified.

3. A campaign manager must
be obtained and will be jointly
responsible, with the candidate,
for the campaign.

4. Campaign speeches may
be made in classes by the
candidate or campaign manager
with the permission of the in-
structor of that class.

5. Campaign expenses shall
not exceed \$25.00. The use of
club funds is prohibited. All
expenditures are to be accounted
and given to Rob Seines April 19,
5:30 p.m.

SUGGESTIONS:

1. Use tasteful posters, pre-
ferably with your picture on them.

2. Do some research into this
year's Executive for background
information and suggestions a-
bout the position you are running
for.

3. Make lots of speeches to
classes and lecture theaters. Get
as much personal exposure as you
can. Be visible.

4. There will be an issue of
the Link for candidates to air their
views on various issues and
platforms. Write a short by
complete article about your views

and give it to the Link editor,
Mike Brownrigg, no later than
12 noon, April 6. It will be
printed in the April 12 issue. You
will be interviewed by Link re-
porters during campaign week.
Contact Link staff at their office
for interview times.

6. Prepare a short and concise
speech for the campaign rally,
April 17, in the SAC Cafeteria.

tive. They will be responsive and
interested in you.

Report on ACUI Conference

Along with 1032 other repre-
sentatives from colleges and uni-
versities in Canada, the US,
Australia, and England, I atten-
ded the 55th annual meeting of
ACUI. The theme, "What We
Teach" emphasized the role of
the student union in campus life
today. We all realize that life
today is more than just academ-
ics--we have to learn to use our
leisure time, to get along and
work with others to make deci-
sions, to allocate our time in the
most beneficial manner, etc.

Briefly, there are some points I
gathered at random that I believe
are of interest to us.

•USE OF STUDENT UNION
BUILDING AND FACILITIES--in
colleges and 2 year institutes
especially, the demand for use of
facilities by community groups is
increasing, reflecting the idea
that schools and facilities are for
•In college, the average stu-
dent age is increasing to between

25-30. More and more adults are
returning to schools.

•Extramural sports are being
discarded by many colleges as too
expensive. Emphasis is on
intramurals and programs for
everyone--not just a select few.
Schools continuing with extra-
murals insist extramurals pay
their own way--gate receipts,
etc.

Many state governments are
emphasizing physical fitness fa-
cilities and allocating funds for
new construction despite the gen-
eral economy cut back on spend-
ing.

•There is a general trend
towards more barber shops and
hair styling salons in union build-
ings.

•Football and solid state elec-
tronic pinball games are the
current vogue.

EDITORIAL

The continuing saga of the SAC Management Agreement

"I'm going to get that building" - Dale Michaels, Executive Director, Campus Life and Recreation, Personnel and Information Services, November 7, 1977.

The building being referred to was the SAC. The quote was taken from a discussion about the then unsigned SAC Management Agreement.

One of the reasons that the Student Association finally signed the agreement was to eliminate the chance of that situation happening. Another was the ultimatum from principal, Gordon Thom, that if the agreement was not signed he personally would decide who had jurisdiction in what area of the SAC.

Well, the Agreement is already in trouble. Apparently Dale Michaels and company haven't given up yet. Overtures are now being made to move the Campus Life and Recreation Dept. into the offices now occupied by the SA Executive and the Executive into the trailer. However, knowing how the group has worked in the past it is a safe bet that no formal proposal will be made until after the upcoming election so that it will be dealt with by people not fully informed about the situation.

We should all remember this when making our decision about who to vote for on April 20 and 21. It is vitally important that we elect a strong executive to deal with this and other issues that will come forward during the next year. It is also vitally important that each and every one of us use our vote. This is the one time of year that every individual student gets the chance to make his or her opinion explicitly clear to the Student Association. Make sure YOU take advantage of it.

You will also be asked to approve an increase in the amount of student fees you pay. The reason for the increase is to continue the improvements being made to the SAC Building. With the proposed increase the SA hopes to be able to apportion \$10 from each student's fees directly to a special "Building Account".

If you enjoy the changes made this year and would like to see more of the same, remember to vote April 20 or 21.

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ACUI contd

•At Loyola, a synthetic carpet-like material is now used on the gym floor for tennis, badminton, baseball, floor hockey, etc. It is standing up extremely well.

•More and more union buildings are installing small beer-gardens and pubs. Live entertainment is very popular. Liquor age in most states is 21.

•In the field of legal problems the following interesting points were noted:

a) Administration of schools (i.e. Presidents have the right to direct proper spending of student union funds if it is deemed necessary.

It has been ruled by courts that student governments are part of the college or university and subject to final decisions by the President of same.

b) Non-school groups using school facilities must provide their own liability insurance.

c) Rights to control sale of items on campus and rights to limit advertising on campus have been upheld by court decisions.

d) Levy of student union fees on every student—principle upheld by courts.

•Increasing trend by colleges to double or triple fees for foreign students and in some cases to limit the number on a quota allotment.

•Many colleges and schools are leasing facilities to outside food service companies instead of continuing themselves. The schools regulate menus and prices if possible and obtain a return from the companies for the privileges.

•"Buck-passing"—with the growth of school bureaucracies, students are getting the run-around more often. We must learn to handle this better.

•The 2-year colleges and institutes are becoming much less formal in course standards—many adults are just attending for one or two courses and student union fees are being assessed on a per course basis—not on just degree or diploma course programs.

•Many schools are upgrading or establishing separate deans of women departments.

•I personally canvassed a good number of college delegates and most advised me that they have a Dean or Director of Student Services who reports directly to the Principal or President and who is divorced from the Admissions Dept. and Personnel Offices. Student Services usually administer counselling, sports, housing, student union liaison, day care centre, ombudsman, etc.

All in all a very good conference.

According to that document, any proposed changes must be published for two weeks in the Link. Although many of the proposed revisions appear minor, there are some more consequential issues under consideration which should be examined by the concerned student. If anyone has questions about the changes or wishes to examine the present Constitution, he or she may do so at the SA offices.

i. to provide Campus Recreation Activities statistics in the weekly editions of the Link.

j. to provide maximum value from student fees which subsidize the majority of activities.

B4 Duties of the Sports Chairperson

a. work with the Co-ordinator of Campus Recreation to co-ordinate intramural sports, clubs and activities

b. report to the Vice-President Internal

c. meet with the Campus Recreation Committee at least once a month and keep minutes of such meetings.

d. Keep classes informed, through representatives, of sports programs, timetables, etc.

e. work with the CCR to schedule sports programs and post notices of such programs on campus

g. inform students of sports activities through the Link newspaper

h. obtain input from student body on recommended leagues, events etc.

i. work with the CCR to disperse funds for different sports activities where necessary

j. present the budget for intramural sports to the Vice-President Internal for inclusion in the Student Association budget, no later than the first week in May.

k. to assist the Athletic Manager in the publicity and promotion of extramural activities

l. organize a recreation and student activities club's day at the beginning of the academic year.

m. call organizational meetings for the clubs so that a club executive may be formed.



After the autograph session was completed, Ra, Frank, a couple of high school girls from Ladner and I found a corner in the tapes section where we talked for about 45 minutes on Trooper, their music, their successes and failures, and their future. The following are excerpts from about 45 minutes of tape.

DON: Who thought up the name Trooper?

RA: Three of us all say we thought up the name Trooper at the same time, me, Harry, and Tommy.

DON: When did you guys first get together?

RA: Hmm, 73-74, Doni and Frank were in a group called Brutus—remember the song "Ooh Momma, Momma"?

DON: How did you all meet each other?

RA: Me and Smitty have known each other since we were sixteen. The others are musician friends who have joined since.

DON: What did you do before Trooper?

RA: I've always been in a band, since I was thirteen years old. I've never had a real job.

DON: I understand you have a new album in the works.

RA: We're about two-thirds finished. We haven't got all the songs decided yet, but what we have already really "kicks". It's being done at Mushroom Records for the first time. It'll be released likely late May or June.

DON: Will it be similar to the last two, or will it be slower or faster?

RA: It'll be better. If you liked "Two For The Show", you'll like this one.

DON: You said something earlier about a live album.

RA: Yes, we want to do one. A lot of our songs have really changed, the live versions are really different from the way they were recorded. MCA actually wanted us to put out a greatest hits album already, but we thought it was too soon. We wanted to have every song on the album, instead of just six hits. Then they'd have to figure out what to do about four or five other songs, so we'll put out a greatest hits when we have an album's worth.

DON: When and where is your next tour?

RA: We're going right across Canada in the summer, two and a half months straight from Halifax to Victoria; gonna do every city that has a room big enough to hold us.

DON: When are you playing in Vancouver next?

RA: I don't know, there's talk that we might play in the PNE.

DON: What do you think of Vancouver audiences?

RA: Great, wonderful, the best—can't be beat. It's our home, what are you going to do? Everyone here is our friend.

DON: A lot of people associated your first album as being somehow BTO in sound, how has that affected you?

RA: We never really meant to sound that much like them. We had a lot of songs that were really heavy songs, and we had songs like 'Santa Maria' at that time. Randy (Bachman) picked the material, so he picked all the stuff that was like BTO, and then he produced it like he produced BTO, cause he had never produced us before, so he really didn't know how else to do it at the time. It was after that we

started getting more into our own style.

DON: Does Randy give you a lot of freedom?

RA: Now he does, anything we want to do. On the first album he told us what to do and we did it, and it only took us three days... He said we were going to do an album and we said great, terrific. We just wanted to make an album, we didn't care...he said, okay, do this, do that, and we did exactly what he said. It was after that we said okay, now we're going to make our second album, and we can look at the first and figure what we want, that's when we started having input. Now when we go in, it's a team effort.

DON: Have you known Randy Bachman very long?

RA: It's been quite a while, four or five years now.

DON: You mentioned before about not caring much for the States.

RA: I can live without it, it's just that we've spent so much time going from one city down there to another, we've been in every city in America, and played with every group we could possibly play with, after a while it gets to be really boring. We prefer to play in Canada, to headline shows so we can control our own show, instead of doing half-hour sets with say the Doobie Brothers or somebody, where nobody gets a chance to see what we can do. You're in a different town every night, you don't really get to see it, it's just a madhouse. Whereas in Canada, even if you're only in the town for a little time, at least you have a lot of fun, and that's very important.

DON: Any concerts stand out in your mind for any reason?

RA: Moncton, New Brunswick. We remember the cities where we go crazy. A Moncton, we threw a bunch of cream pies all over ourselves, so we were sliding around with cream about an inch thick all over the stage. At Fort St. John we played recently and our roadies came out and started taking our equipment while we were playing the last song. They were taking away the drums, the amps, all the spare guitars. By the time they were finished, the drummer had only a snare and bass drum, and there was only one microphone left on stage, and we were still trying to play. It was a lot of fun. Otherwise, we try not to differentiate between cities because one is as good as another.

DON: Your latest album has just gone gold and "Two For The Show" is certified platinum in Canada, but you don't seem to be as successful in the States. Any comment?

RA: We've played down there a lot, and get a lot of FM airplay and is played once in a while. So, in a lot of places they know who we are, we just don't have any hit records down there. Probably the reason for that is the hit record thing down there is so very competitive, and when we were just trying to break into the States

was the time when people like KC and the Sunshine Band—white disco—was just starting to be accepted. For a while, new rock groups just didn't have a chance. I don't know. Who knows, maybe they just don't like us.

DON: I couldn't see that.

RA: Well, I mean, it's always a possibility. Our attitude is, we just keep on trying, we don't particularly want to be American superstars, but it would be nice to be recognized for what we're doing up here. We'd rather be a Canadian band.

DON: When do you feel you were first really recognized in Canada?

RA: Right around 'Two For The Show'. Our other songs from the first album had been hits, and everyone knew them, but nobody knew who had done them. As soon as you played 'General Hand Grenade' they said, oh yeah, but they didn't know it was Trooper. The same with 'Baby Woncha Please Come Home', nobody knew what band it was. Then, as soon as 'Two For The Show' came out, all the disc jockeys for some reason started saying "This is Trooper". And so, between the success of that song, the fact that people were into talking about Trooper, and the big change in our music, it started to happen, and it's been happening ever since.

DON: You're about to try and break into the European market, is that right?

RA: That's the intent of the new CBS release. 'Two For The Show' had just been released in the British Isles and all, and we're waiting to hear from them about what's happening, we have no idea what's going on over there...they know who we are, this will help a lot, but it takes time, it took time here and now it's paying off.

DON: How do you write the songs, do they come to you or what?

RA: I have no idea how we write songs. You just have to really want to do it badly, and keep trying. I sat up the other night will five o'clock the next morning, and I'd been up since 11 a.m. trying to write two verses for a song the music was already written for. You have to really work at it and have some idea of what kind of song you want it to be...the style, the phrasing, you have to have a starting point. I don't believe in talent as such, if you really want to do something badly, you'll be able to do it.

DON: Now, what about the lyrics to 'General Hand Grenade'?

RA: It's just about people, a lot of different kinds of people. The words don't mean anything in particular, it's not heavy for sure, lots of our songs are just songs, I'm not Bob Dylan. Like 'We're Here For a Good Time', it's just a nice song, happy, not very many people write happy songs.

DON: Which, of all the songs Trooper has done, is your personal favourite?

RA: My favourite? 'Two for the Show', probably, cause I wrote it. I don't know, I also like 'The Boys in the Bright White Sportscar.'

DON: Thanks, Ra.

I can't believe it. There we were, sitting in the Orpheum 22 rows up. The Vancouver Symphony Orchestra was just finishing the last piece before intermission. At the last note, this lady a few rows ahead of us jumped up and nearly ran down the stairs in her long dress. She didn't even applaud the performance. Five minutes later I found out the reason for her rush. There was a 10-minute line up for the women's john. For all the money and time put into restoring this beautiful theatre, why didn't they put in another washroom? The building certainly looks large enough to warrant more than two sets of restrooms. I was smart. I went before the concert.

But, this is not the only matter of concern for the interior conditions of the theatre. The dust is really terrible. Someone should have installed one of those built-in vacuum cleaners. People read, sleep, cough, and even talk sometimes (though I wish they wouldn't). But the best example I've heard yet is about a lady who took her knitting to a concert one night. Unfortunately for those sitting around and above her, the Orpheum's acoustics are so perfect that others could hear the knitting needles clicking.




