

- Rob Brimacombe -BCIT's Student Association will be holding a referendum in the tomorrow (March 29), to find out students' opinion on a proposed 50 percent tuition fee increase for next year. The S.A. Council voted Monday night to go to the students with three options: "a) Would you like a 20 per-cent tuition increase, but face large course structure changes b) A 30 percent increase with less drastic changes, or c) a 50 percent increase which could ensure a course content

could ensure a course content and structure the same as this years

S.A. President Antoine Van Dierendonck hopes students will vote for a 50 percent in-crease to ensure BCIT doesn't

become a college. "Our proposal is that stu-dents feel that BCIT is differ-ent; that we're willing to pay more, so we'll pay 50 percent more to a total of \$1500. That would guarantee us - and this is what we're proposing - that the money would be spent on acedemics, and only acedem-ics." Van Dierendonck feels if students are willing to put out


Van Dierendonck feels if students are willing to put out more money for their educat-ion, then BCIT's administrat-ion should put more pressure on the provincial government for higher quality education. the Board of Governors is still waiting for next year's budget, expected to be a 10 percent decrease from this

years budget. That would force the Institute into tuition fee increases of 15 to 30 percent

cent. Van Dierendonck says a higher tuition fee increase would put acedemics at a higher priority in the budget. Currently, an increase of about 30 percent would see course hours per week cut, and generally a lower level of education than students are receiving this year.

education than students are receiving this year. Council is hoping for a large turnout to the referendum, so the results will have an impact on the Board of Governors and the Education Ministry. Council will be presenting the results to BCIT President Gordon Thom and the Board of Governors this Monday.






\$5000 for new course

This play is fun for a change

Sam Corea SCAPINO! is a play of pure, light hearted fun. It concerns the misadventures of young Italian lovers. Set on a street corner in Naples, the story consists of twists and turns and slapstick humour.

Ottavio is the son of a miser, Argante. While his father is away, Ottavio falls in love, and marries a penniless woman named Giacinta. Meanwhile his friend Leandro, son of Geronte, falls in love with Zerbinetta, a

falls in love with Zerbinetta, a poor gypsy. Argante returns with news that he's arranged a marraige for Ottavio. Well poor Ottavio is absolutely devastated and seeks the help of Scapino, Leandro's crafty guardian. Ot-tavio needs 200 thousand lire. Leandro is also in trouble

Leandro is also in trouble He has learned that Zerbinetta will be taken away by the gypsies unless he coughs up 500-thousand lire. He also ask Scapino for his help. What Scapino for his help. What follows is a crazy, unbelievable story as Scapino tries to get the money out of the boys' tight-wad fathers.

tight-wad fathers. It's a silly plot, but the story succeeds in making the aud-ience roar with laughter. Part of the reason is the elaborate stunt work. There's a com-plicated chase scene as Ottavio and Leandro go after Scapino trying to hit him with a large sausage. They jump over tables, onto balconies, and in between chairs. They even run into the audience and outside the theatre. It's a well choreo-

the theatre. It's a well choreo-graphed piece, full of difficult physical stunts, and the three carry it off nicely. In fact, the whole play is filled with elaborate stunts, and the actors exhibited a high level of energy, bringing the play alive play alive.

The set is bright and cheerful, too, capturing the feeling of the street where everyone meets. There are many supporting characters which carry the play through, adding to the fun. They include waiters who juggle plates, a street vender doing somersaults, a godfather acting like Marlon Brando, and a tramp looking out her window...these characters help paint the over-all picture of the Naples street corner

Dr. Foth takes on the Tories

Neal Foisy Citizens of Canada, take heed! The merciless Dr. Foth, self proclaimed saviour of our great country, is at it again. With a pencil for a scalpel, the good doctor has once again performed open heart surgery without an anaesthetic. The patient: our dearly beloved federal opposition party, the Regressive Conservatives. For the uniniated, Dr. Foth

For the uniniated, Dr. Foth is Allen Fotheringham, South-am newspaper columnist and lord of the back page of **Mclean's** magazine. Fothering-ham has recently published his second book in as many years second book in as many years, Look Ma, No Hands. Sarcast-ically subtitled "An affection-ate look at our wonderful Tories", the book is neither affectionate, nor does it portray the Tories as anything near wonderful. It does, however, prove Fotheringham to be the wisest and wittlest political analyst to ever haunt the halls of parliament. Look Ma, No Hands is nothing less than excellent. econd book in as many years, ook Ma. No Hands. Sarcast-

excellent. The book is the logical counterpart to Fotheringham's 1982 opus, Malice in Blunder-land. In that book, the Saskatchewan-born author set out to de-frock the 'natural govern-ing party', the Liberals, and their leader Pierre Elliot Him-self", who was described as, among other things, a dilet-tante and a lazy leader. And so, in the interest of fairness, Fotheringham has given us a biting biography of the longest reigning opposition party in Canada, the progressive Con-servatives. servatives

Canada, the progressive Con-servatives. As a basis for his book, Fotheringham has borrowed from another great epic, The Wizard of Oz. Thus we have the author as Dorothy, leading the reader down the yellow brick road to the magical Kingdom of Odds, better known as Ottawa. Along the way, we encounter the Coward-ly Lion (John Diefenbaker), the Tin Woodman (Robert Stan-field), and the Scarecrow (Joe Clark), the most recent victim of the Conservatives' 'cannibal-istic' attitude to their leader. "The Tory party is the story of a Caesar", says Fotheringham. Indeed, in the 116 years since confederation, the Conservat-ives have had twice as many leaders as the Liberals.

Of those leaders, perhaps the one who received the most consistant attacks was the pride of High River, Alberta, Joe 'who' Clark, or as Fother-

ingham calls him, "Joe Was". Fotheringham himself is widely attributed with being one of a select few responsible for the downfall of Clark. That ascens-ion from power was due in no small part to the fiasco of Clark's 1979 world tour. The ill-fated episode, reported in detail in Look Ma, No Hands, cost Clark a majority govern-ment in the election of the same year, because Clark's aides were, in Fotheringham's words, "well-meaning inno-cents who couldn't organize their own lunch, let alone a world tour."

It's vitrolic wit like that which makes Look Ma, No Hands an engaging delight. Fatheringham is the undisput-ed master of the stinging barb, an art which he sprinkles liberally throughout the book. But that's not the only strength of the book: take away the cutting wit, and you're still left

with some of the most fascinat-ing and insightful political commentary yet from Fother-ingham. Put quick simply, Look Ma, No Hands is a joy to read. One can only wonder if Dr. Foth is readying the operating room for the NDP. operating room for the NE The party should be so lucky

One more time for overworked theme



Although youngster Wil Wheaton does a fine job portraying the lonely boy, the part is too big for the movie. The story of a child bringing lovers together has been done too often, and it isn't funny anymore. been done too ofte isn't funny anymore.

The second half of the movie is a vast improvement, with the child's part downplayed and the adults taking over. Both Dryfuss and Sarandon turn in reasonable perfor-mances in the characters they play, and once again Jean Stapleton has a good support-ing role as doting Grandmother who just can't cope with a

who just can't cope with a grown daughter. Dreyfuss' realization that he can't be an acclaimed author, and that he can't stand his brainless girlfriend, makes the movie a happy, pleasing enter-tainer, and well worth seeing, if the viewer can stand the child's monologue in the first half half.






