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70 staff positions affected by BCIT funding crisis



About 70 BCIT Staff Society members were handed three months notice on Thursday, March 1 after President Gordon Thom publicly explained the reasons behind such drastic action to a packed audience of staff and press in Room 198/1A.

Explaining first that the areas and staff affected were arrived at after extensive consultation with departments through the PPBA ranking process, Thom went on to explain the crisis situation BCIT is now experiencing after unexpected increases in costs and reduced government funding. (Copies of the "ranked" list of operating activities, schedule of

varying tuitition fee levels and draft executive summary have been circulated to all staff at the Institute).

BCIT's provincial grant will be reduced this year by \$3.9m, an effect of the govenment's Formula Funding system which puts BCIT at a funding level equal to that of colleges even though the costs involved in providing quality technological education are far higher.

A portion of this year's grant must go to cover BCIT's 1983/84 \$300,000 deficit (caused by the unforeseen Pension Fund Act (Bill 18) which added \$800,000 mid year to BCIT's expenses),

\$1m worth of similar benefit costs and severance pay conservatively estimated at \$500,000. The total effect of the above funding reduction and increased costs is equivalent to an almost 15 per cent cut in government funding.

If there is no tuition fee increase (an option not yet decided on) the total number of notices may total as many as 120.

Thom assured staff that the Board of Governors is making strong representations to the provincial government on BCIT's behalf. Their next meeting, during which the Institute ranked list will be reveiwed, is scheduled for the first week of April.

A seminar designed to give staff an opportunity to hear first-hand about some of the more recent technological developments at BCIT will be held during spring break on March 13.

Each of the five divisions will be making presentations on topics like HITRAC, Skills Growth, CAD/CAM, Robotics, Self Study Projects, Microcomputers, Computer Aided Instruction and, as organizer Dave Hume explains, "generally those kinds of things that are computer-based, self study based or mastery based."

After each short presentation there will be a question/answer period.

The seminar will take place in room 129/1A from 8:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. with a break for lunch between 12:00 p.m. and 1:00 p.m.

BCIT acquisition is 'Cadillac among CAD/CAM systems'

Tony Adamo of Mechanical announced at the Educational Council meeting of February 23 that a new CAD/CAM system called INTERGRAPH has now been acquired for the Institute.

Calling it, "a remarkable acquisition" and, "a Cadillac among CAD/CAM systems," he said it was chosen because of its flexibility and enormous wealth of software for Mechanical and other uses.

The U.S.-made Intergraph system has been adopted by 12 other users in B.C. and its popularity is increasing according to Adamo.

BCIT's Intergraph has been ordered and is currently being "readied in the factory." The software will arrive soon after and there will be a testing session in the first or second week of March.

A curriculum for the CAD/-CAM technology, which will start in September, is currently being designed and will be presented to the advisory committees on March 14. Adamo said there will be heavy use by Continuing Education and Industry Services as well as the day technologies and this makes curriculum design particularly sensitive.

The CAD/CAM program comprises a two year diploma curriculum which includes Computer Aided Drafting and Design (CADD), Computer Aided Manufacturing (CAM), technological training in several disciplines as well as a solid technical basis in mathematics, applied physics and general computer science.



Open House '84

Survey instructor, Keith Errington, readies the planetarium for Open House later this month. The planetarium, which is used by Survey students and outside groups to study astronomy, was the first to be built in Western Canada. A Planetarium Show will be featured at regular intervals during Open House. Survey students also plan to display some of the old equipment used 20 years ago to show how the technology has changed and is changing, and demonstrate interesting equipment like the satellite recorder which traces the passage of satellites travelling overhead.

Educational Council Task Force recommendations on Counselling/Financial Aid given close scrutiny

A task force report on Counselling and Financial Aid and the proposed wording of a recommendation to the Institute on the transfer of Technology Fundamentals to Douglas College dominated discussion at the February 23 meeting of Educational Council.

Pat Rogers, who presented the findings of the Counselling/Financial Aid Task Force, held the floor for almost an hour while members made several amendments

Some of the key areas identified in the report included the importance of financial aid as an ongoing service, the importance of Counselling's liason with departments and the image of Counselling among students.

Several speakers said financial aid dominated the Counselling function and some suggested that it should be made separate. Director of Counselling, Al McLean, pointed out that economic cutbacks to financial aid had made the service more important than ever and that students needed help with the pages of complex forms. "Financial aid is what drives us," he said.

Counsellor Howard Peto said he didn't like the inference from speakers that counsellors were dealing solely with financial aid and he pointed out the amount of career counselling that goes on.

"We are dealing with very

large numbers of students and I think we are having an impact on marketing in helping attract appropriate candidates for technologies. We cannot underestimate the importance of career counselling in relation to this," he said. (The areas of recruitment and marketing have been identified in the Task Force report as, "high priority.")

A motion was carried to amend the original recommendation to read:

"Financial aid continue as a major activity carried out by the Counselling Department", instead of the originally worded, "The major activity."

The importance of communication between Counselling and the various departments was recognized by Council as being very important but they amended the Task Force recommendation that, "the secondment of faculty to the Counselling Department should be seriously considered," to:

"A system of liaison with faculty be established for each department to assist the counselling department in specific career and academic counselling."

The Task Force also found that Counselling's image suffers from a lack of awareness on the part of students. Too many students are unaware of where Counselling is located on campus and what kinds of services are offered. The Task Force recommendation was am-

"The counselling image within BCIT must be improved. Students and staff require more awareness of the financial, career, academic and supportive counselling services provided by the Counselling Department."

ended to sound more specific:

On motion of Dave Brousson another amendment was passed to include consideration of the recommendations made on behalf of part time students contained in a Minority Report submitted by Jacquie Jones.

A motion put forward by Henry

Arthur that the Educational Council recommend that the Institute. "take every possible step to ensure that it is actively involved in the establishment of Technology Fundamentals in programs at Douglas College and other colleges, with a highlighted note to the effect that our interest in Technology Fundamentals is parallel to that of an employer," was challenged by Greg Layton of the Staff Society who objected to its tone. He said BCIT was already perceived as having a superiority complex and this kind of language only served to enhance that.

His motion that the wording reflect a desire to assist the establishment of Technology Fundamentals came to a close vote and was carried (12 for, 11 against).

Mason to speak at B.O.T.

Retired dean of Engineering, Bob Mason, has been invited by the Vancouver Board of Trade to speak at one of their Monday Luncheons on March 19.

He will report on discussions and recommendations of the Skill Development Leave Task Force, the federally appointed body in which he was involved as deputy director last year. The theme of his topic will deal with how the rapidly changing technology and economy of today makes it necessary for skill development to be a lifelong affair, not something just learned in youth.

SLOW DOWN— LIVE LONGER

Don't rush your life away! Change to a more relaxed less

stressful way of life.

Evaluate yourself by taking stock of your goals. Concentrate on what is worth being instead of what is worth having. Think more in terms of quality and rid yourself of some of your obligations. Give up trying to be a superperson and forget perfection. Delegate responsibilities that don't have to be done by you. Spend more time alone just quietly staring out a window instead of scurrying about "doing things". Cultivate your esthetic side by attending a concert, a museum, or read a difficult book.

Cure "hurry sickness" by leaving more time than you think you will need to get somewhere or accomplish something. Take something to read if you think you may have to wait or stand in line. Leave your watch at home for a week. Get up 15 minutes earlier so you won't start the day in a rush. Stop interrupting other people's conversations or finishing their sentences. Practice being a good listener and concentrating on what is being said.

Conquer Hostility by thinking about what situations upset or annoy you and try calling upon your sense of humour and intellect to get you through.
