Sexual Assault

How Big an Issue is it?

Sexual assault is currently a very heated and controversial issue. Clarence Thomas, Willie Smith, and Mike Tyson have all been recently involved in highly publicized cases of women speaking out against violence. These shocking accounts of sexual assault may have been sensationalized by the media but they represent a very important part of the sexual revolution. Women are now being encouraged to speak out against sexual abuse; it is not longer the silent issue of earlier decades. But with all this recent attention a question still remains; is date rape a major problem in our society? Well, that can be a difficult question to measure because around 90% of all sexual assaults committed are never reported.

The following are the statistics that have come to attention in Canada and North America:

- A woman is raped every 29 minutes in Canada
- A woman is sexually assaulted every 6 minutes
- 84% of the women who are sexually assaulted know their attacker; 57% of these assaults happened on dates
- Approximately 7,000 students on 32 campuses nationwide found that 1 in 8 women were victims of rape. 1 in 12 men admitted to having physically forced intercourse.
- · The majority of these victims are between the ages of 15 and 25

These statistics are enough to make anyone sit up and take notice. According to what's stated above, date/campus rape is a problem that warrants our attention.

What is sexual assault?

"...Sexual assault is any form of unwanted sexual contact. It can include kissing, fondling, grabbing or forced intercourse..." Any protest from the woman means that sexual contact is "unwanted."

Seduction vs. Rape

A useful distinction to keep in mind is that seduction involves no force, implied or otherwise. Seduction occurs when a women/man is manipulated or cajoled into agreeing to have sex; the key word is "agreeing."

How does sexual assault usually occur?

Date rapes occur when a woman and a man are alone together. It can take place anywhere a woman is in a vulnerable position whether it's an apartment or the back of a car. In many cases, the use of alcohol or drugs precede rape but that is not always the case. Alcohol can cause a person to become more sexually aggressive or more vulnerable but that is not the main element of date rape. Mixed signals are probably the most responsible factor. The woman acts in a certain manner that makes the man think she is open for sex. The "no means maybe" syndrome is often to blame and with this attitude held by people such as Supreme Court Justice Sherman hood, the sexual assault issue becomes even more confusing.

What are the causes of date rape?

"...There is no one direct cause of date rape. Although there are usually three key elements involved—socialization, miscommunication, and/or changing sexual mores—one major reason for date rape is a lack of consideration for a woman's rights and wishes..."

Our traditional roles of the aggressive man and the passive woman could be the basis for miscommunication between the sexes. Men are taught to be aggressive from childhood and aggression has always been a typically



masculine trait. On the other hand, the majority of women are socialized to be more dependent, passive, and "ladylike" which involves not making a scene. Men are encouraged to explore their sexual feelings whereas women are first taught that "good girls don't fool around" and are discouraged against sexual experimentation. The idea that a woman initially says "no" because she doesn't want to be seen as loose or easy can be misinterpreted but in any case "NO MEANS NO" unless "yes" is said.

Other factors that may instigate date rape are changing sexual mores and insecurity. With the creation of the birth control pill, many people are sexually active at a younger age and college-age men and women are usually the most active. Sex is commonly expected by both partners in an active relationship and not wanting sex is more of a rarity in today's society.

Insecurity is also a factor because some men who have strong insecurities can behave in a sexually aggressive manner. Forcing sex makes that person feel strong because it makes someone else feel weak. This insecurity is a lack of respect because people who do respect others do not coerce them into things they don't want to do.

Whatever the causes are for date rape, it should be

dealt with openly to not strain the relationships

What is being done for rape victims?

WAVAW (Women Against Violence Against Women) is a non-profit organization that has established a rape crisis centre. It has a 24 hour crisis line, offers counselling, legal/medical information and organizes support groups. They help victims deal with the feelings of fear, guilt, and helplessness and they have a high success rate. Their services are completely confidential.

How can we stop sexual assault?

- Communication is the key. If you have any doubts about what your partners wants stop, ask, and clarify.
- People should trust their instincts and avoid compromising situations
- Little things like walking someone to their car late at night or carrying a whistle for protection will also help.

We have to remember that the majority of people have good intentions but communication and protection are the key factors that help alleviate problems.





BCIT Announces Trades Exploration Program for Women

Burnaby—Applications are now being accepted for the BCIT Trades Exploration Program, an exploratory course for women interested in careers in the trades.

The part-time program runs between April 23 to June 2 two evening a week and provides an overview of the working conditions, physical requirements, labor-market conditions, wage rates and support services of various trades.

Students gain an understanding of each trade through hands-on projects in electrical, carpentry, aviation trades, automechanics and plumbing. Projects will be led by women skilled in each trade.

"Although the economy is slow right now, predictions for the future suggest there will be a shortage of skilled workers," said Kate Pelletier, coordinator of Women in Trades. "Statistics show that more women are entering the labor force while the numbers of youths entering the labor force is in decline. As this trend continues women become the logical resource to help meet the predicted shortages."

Registration for the program is \$100 but financial assistance is available in some cases. There are only 16 seats in this course so apply now.


