APATHY AND COMMUNICATIONS - USED OR ABUSED?

"Improve Communications"

"I will work on Communications between the Student Society"

"Top priority is student communications"

Do these sound like statements being bandied about by the candidates in our upcoming elections? The answer is both "Yes" and "no". The above quotes are taken verbatim from last year's election issue of LINK (Thursday, April 4th, 1974). The word communication appeared over and over again in the platform statements issued by the candidates to the paper. And it's happening again this year! On Wednesday lunchtime last week we were given the opportunity to know the candidates' views (often on the subject of communication) and in some cases to hear their inability to communicate!

"Communication" - that's really what it's all about isn't it? The candidates, past and present have all recognized this as a good election platform, there is always great improvement needed in this area and BCIT is no exception. But, has there been any improvement this year, will there be any next year, I wonder. If the candidates don't know how to communicate themselves, either verbally, through writing, or by

image and vibes, then how can they expect to change things at BCIT?

Think about the word for a moment, it's a Latin based word "communicatus" - pp of communicare - to impart, participate" (Websters) Our candidates, when elected have promised to participate and share their findings, views and basically let you know what is going on. Firstly, as I said, they must know how, then they must know what is going on to be able to accomplish and fulfil their promises to you. This can only happen

On Wednesday and Thursday of this week we have to decide, Can they, Do they, and Will they?

Do you know how many of the candidates have been to the Publications Department to see how they can use this media to fulfil their responsibility to communicate with you - NONE. Do you know how many have been to see Graham Fane, Student Administration (our liaison man between the students and the Administration of BCIT) - one, and he was elected by acclamation. How can these students ignore the channels open to them and still obtain the facts, know the issues, and communicate them to you. Incidentally, Graham probably knows most about what the issues are and who can help the Student Executive solve them. He is a

great resource person - ask your candidate if he/she has thought of talking to him.

Some of our candidates seem to believe that all they have to do is walk into an Administration Office, on the 2nd floor, bang on the table with their fist and say "the student body wants this, or that", it just won't work - I got the impression that some of our candidates think that's all their job is about!

We have to promote a good working relationship with Administration if things are to get done in the next student year. Right now there are many groups or factions on campus for example, The Staff Society, Public Works, and the most powerful, the Board of Governors. All these groups are vying for the attention and assistance of Admin. We are the largest of these groups plus, we are politically organized yet, because of the past disorganization and disagreement, little has been accomplished.

Another problem we have to face is that Administration itself is very understaffed, there just aren't the personnel there who have time to listen to some student banging his fist on the table - that doesn't give us any credibility whatsoever and when issues DC come up that have been thoroughly investigated, factually documented, and suggestions included to solve them, who is

going to listen? We must be united, we must be organized, and we must be willing to do the legwork involved.

Administration is willing to listen is willing to talk, is willing to try and change things for the better, but by presenting half-baked, un-researched proposals will never get us anywhere.

When you go to vote this week think carefully before you chose a representative. Look at candidates closely - do they look as if they could act in a professional manner when representing you? I would hope that those elected to office will have an air of professionalism in everything they do whether it be dealing with someone in Admin. or discussing ideas and issues at the Council Meetings.

If you know anything at all about the Student Association members in the SAC Building, you will know that they work long hours, put up with a lot of interruptions, many frustrations and blank looks (low grades too in many courses). Are your candidates willing to do the same, or do they have hidden agendas or hidden reasons for being President of this, or Vice-President of that - it does look good on your resume after all, plus you get a free parking spot! (It certainly can't be for the salary!). None of the candidates speaking last Wednesday struck

me as being terribly sure of what they were getting themselves into, or their responsibilities.

The student body at large gets called apathetic whenever things go wrong and events are not well-attended but apathy is caused by a lack of communication. It isn't that the students here are apathetic it's just that the issues often aren't interesting enough to get them to sit up and take notice or get involved. But, when they do get involved and they are excited by the prospect of doing something for BCIT they come through with flying colours - eg Shinerama and Telethon. All they need is to be asked and our students are right there and willing. But, the issues and events have to be interesting to them to provoke their participation. The Executive of the Student Association must realise that the initiation for the resolution of any issues comes from them, they are the students who know what is happening and to get feedback, involvement or whatever they want from the student body, they have to present the issues in such a way as to fire the student's interest.

To do this they must use the media for communication the LINK and be able to present themselves well verbally AND they must know what the issues are. DO THEY?

This year's candidates surprised the pants off of a lot of students, myself included.

Not only were they reluctant to get up and express their views, many of them showed an appalling lack of ability to do so in a mature and professional manner.

Platforms ranged from the Frank is Cool variety to the Adolf Hitler fist shaking type. Still others displayed their ability to laugh non-stop for five minutes.

From what I've seen only a few remotely deserve the privilege of a mandate from the students to do a job for them.

Those who won by acclamation remind me very much of a discount department store, i.e. lack of selection and poor quality.

Therefore students when you go to the polls, simply follow these instructions:

1. Take a ballot in your left hand.
2. Take a pencil in your right hand.
3. Swing your pencil in hand violently over your head in a clockwise motion.
4. When you gain enough courage to make your selection jab the ballot with the pencil.
5. The name nearest the hole in the ballot indicates your choice.
6. Repeat this procedure until you have finished voting or until you are tired of bleeding.

BCIT Cougars participated in the Totem Conference Hockey Championships at Trail at the end of February.

Ms. Shrimpton set a Totem record in winning the women's Long Jump with a leap of 16 and a half feet. She also pulled in firsts with fine finish in the 100 meters and a heavy throw in the shot. The discus brought her yet another ribbon, this one for second place. Other impressive shows by the locals came from Bob Gordon (Forestry) who led BCIT to a 1-2-3 runaway in the gruelling 5,000 meters event. Gordon, along with Bruce Johnstone (building) and Doug Schweers (Traffic and Transport) easily outdistanced Douglas College and Trinity Western College competitors in the

distance. Bob Gallichen (bus. Admin) recorded a victory in the 200 meters as a compliment to third place in the 400 meter hurdles and a fourth in the 100 meters. WAXWORKS Mark Allan

Crash Landing-- Jimi Hendrix (Reprise) MS 2204

The Voodoo Child returns. Jimi Hendrix left the material world in 1970 but if you sit back and listen to this record with your eyes closed you'd never know it. A vast improvement over several crass, sub standard releases of Hendrix material presented shortly after he died, Crash Landing consists of cuts Jimi himself would probably have okayed for distribution. With the exception of several cuts the music isn't particularly memorable, but the overall quality of singing and playing is strong enough to dispel any doubts about posthumous Hendrix releases prompted by the aforementioned ripoffs, such as War Heroes.

but why a new Hendrix album now, almost five years after his death? Well, he was a prolific musician and he often jammed with other willing musicians whenever the opportunity presented itself. These sessions were invariably taped and quite a backlog of unreleased music was built

up. In fact, Alan Douglas, a producer and record company executive recently unearthed several hundred hours of such tapes. How such a cache of musical wealth has remained hidden for so long is anybody's guess, but the awaited new material, featuring such rock stars as Johnny Winter and Steve Stills and jazz luminaries and organist Khalid Yasin are already being eagerly anticipated by knowledgeable Hendrix fans. Crash Landing is the first such presentation and as such provides an idea of what to expect in the near future. Surprisingly, with the exception of Buddy Miles, the supporting crew is comprised of unknowns, at least to me. However, since Jimi was always the showpiece for any of his bands, this is now real problem. The album consists of six songs (three of them already on two other records under slightly different titles...these are different versions, mind you) and two instrumental jams. Peace in Mississippi suggests anything but with energy and for me is worth the

price of the whole album. The is more stretched out and strikes me as being the Hendrix equivalent of Jim Morrison's Riders On the Storm. The songs, featuring Hendrix' bittersweet, sardonic lyrics and earthy delivery provide some interesting alternate interpretations to Power to Love and Message of Love from Band Of Gypsies and also Stone Free, from the Smash Hits album. Three previously unreleased originals are also included, with the title tune having the edge over the others, especially with its chillingly ironic lines referring to heroin.

After hearing this album, if there is more Hendrix music existing of the quality of Crash Landing I want to know about it. The album is a bit short but even this is not entirely bad. Perhaps it just indicates that Douglas is not going to expose anything but the best of what is available. And that is exactly what us frustrated Hendrix fans deserve. Nothing but the best.

NIGHTWATCH

NIGHTWATCH by Mark Allan. PINK FLOYD -1. PACIFIC COLISEUM - 0.

It isn't every day you get to see a dragon killed, but last Tuesday was such a day. The dragon in question didn't breathe fire but instead lurked in the Pacific Coliseum and devours sound rather than beautiful maidens. however, the infamous Coliseum acoustics finally met their match at the hands of the good English knights Sir Richard Wright, Sir Roger Waters, Sir Nick Mason

KNOWN AS Pink Floyd. Employing a mind boggling quad sound system they made musical history, at least for me. For the first time in my life in the Coliseum, I was actually able to hear every drumbeat and wonder of wonders, even the bulk of the lyrics. On this basis alone the eight dollar entrance fee was worth it.

Pink Floyd, synonymous with a spacy, etheral kind of rock, is probably the greatest existing example of technology as music; intricately mixed stereo and quad electronic effects play a major role in their total sound and often subordinate all else. As it turns out the lyrics and singing are usually pretty pedestrian anyway

and this is not a serious loss. On the contrary, the results can sometimes be highly moving and even beautiful. Unfortunately the band didn't always take advantage of their sound system's potential and in several spots they didn't appear to be moving anywhere at all. But when they did use their resources to the limit the audience couldn't help but be impressed.

And there was a large sellout crowd there well ahead of showtime, just waiting to be awed by the Floyd's electronic wizardry. Obviously Dark Side of The Moon, their last release and most commercial effort to date has finally extended their popularity beyond a small underground following. Money, a top selling single of that album didn't help either.

Unfortunately, on the basis of the material played from a forthcoming record, a recession could be imminent. Only three pieces filled the first half of the show and although they all began promisingly, one by one they succumbed to various degrees of aimlessness and repetition. A large rotating chrome buzz-saw hung above the stage was the only thing which saved the 30 minute third selection by creating a kaleidoscopic light effect over the heads of the audience.

After a short intermission the real show began. An eager crowd loudly applauded the first few notes from Dark Side Of The Moon and the huge circular screen high above the stage came to life, flashing bizarre and frequently beautiful images in synch with the music. Particularly pleasing to me was a Salvador Dali-like cartoon which featured thousands of airborne clocks during Pink Floyd's song Time. Most of Dark Side's material was even played, each a faithful representation of the album versions, barring some improvisation in the middle of each number. I must admit I was impressed with the band's total professionalism...the lights, the movie, everything was flawlessly matched to the music. Cameo appearances by the two exquisite black female singers and the sax player who were on Dark Side Of The Moon provided some of the evening's best moments and also made the uncanny reproduction of the album's music possible. Finally, after a thunderous ovation came the encore, Echoes, complete with dry ice mist and a thirty foot geyser behind drummer Nick Mason. In review, the show could have been better, especially the first half, but considering the highlights I would say my money was well spent.

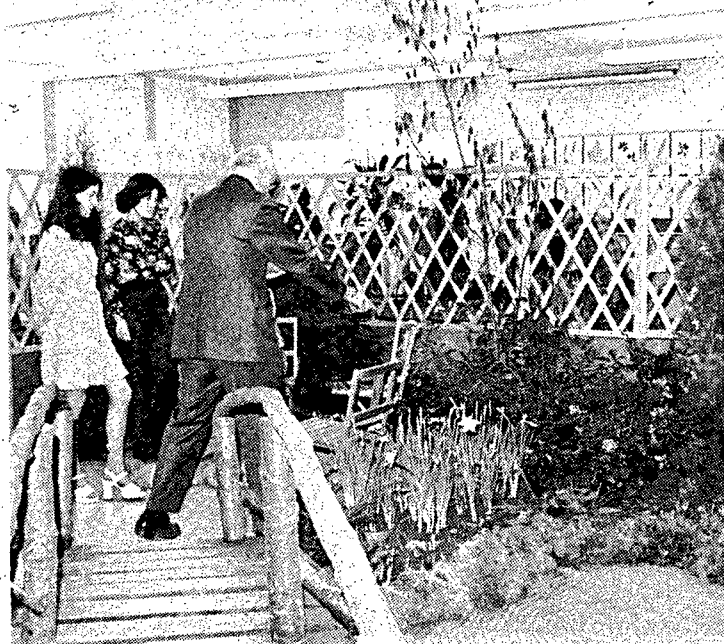
