PRESIDENT

Like every other position on the Student Association executive, the President has a brief job description in the constitution of the Association. It reads like this: (sort of)

The President of the Association shall:

- i. Preside at meetings of the S.A. Executive.
- ii. Act as ex-office member of all committees.
- iii. Perform all other duties of a President as outlined in Robert's Rules of Order.
- iv. Make sure the performance of the Executive members is up to par, according to their duties outlined in the constitution.
- v. Be an official spokesman for the Executive and Council in the Association's dealings with all outside and internal bodies, in an appropriate and unbiased manner.

This is where it gets interesting. What this means is that you are a representative and contact person to the Administration of BCIT and any other persons wishing to deal with the Association. Actually, this is a duty that is a shared responsibility among all the Executive members this year. I get most of the mail, but we divide tasks up among ourselves, in consideration with our interests, previous experience, and time schedules.

Obviously, what is in the constitution does not really give the prospective presidential candidate much to go by. So perhaps I can outline some of things that I have been involved in over the past eight months.

The first thing The President is eligible for when she/he enters office is a summer job. I worked half time for the Association, familiarizing myself with the operations of the S.A. as a whole, and meeting many of the BCIT Administrative staff and Executive. Also, I worked part-time in the TNT shop to get to know the staff and operation of our campus store on a first-hand basis. During the summer Rob Slavik, Blake Cowan and myself got into the negotiations that got the Growlies project going.

When school started, we com-

menced meeting on a regular basis. If you are an executive member, you can cancel out your Thursday nights for the rest of the year. You will always have a meeting. Then there are countless other meetings, morning, afternoon, evenings. Your schoolwork? You can expect a 10% drop in marks, minimum. You can learn what it really means to work under stress. Your instructors, though mostly who are fairly understanding, will probably shake their heads in disgust as you regularly begin to miss class, but its not because you went roller-skating, but rather because you are wallowing in a sea of letters, school term papers, and unreturned phone messages.

What makes up for all this horsemanure? Fabulous things like learning to be a strong group leader, making important decisions as a group, and working with some dynamic people both in and out of the school community. This year I have gained an independence and level of energy I never knew I possessed. It is a fabulous experience, one that I would only trade for a very large sum of money, say about ten million bucks.

There is one critical ingredient that as far as I am concerned is essential to doing any kind of a good job, and that is that you have got to basically really like people, meeting them, talking to them, arguing with them, running against them, and most of all, listening to them, because that is what this job is all about.

How would you like the experience of working with a budget of over \$ 170,000? Or trying to keep track of funds that start from a budget of \$38,000 and grow because of unbudgeted expenses and unforeseen delays to the tune of \$54,000. This has been part of my experience this year working as Treasurer for the Student Association, and could be your's next year - should you accept the challenge.

This position does not require a lot of financial analysis or even ability, but an enjoyment of working with figures, percentages and projections would be helpful. I work closely with Phil Henderson, the Business Manager - who is perhaps 'the backbone of the SA'

I started off last year setting up and running the used textbook store in the SAC. Basically this involves buying back student texts at half the paid price, searching for the most updated status of the texts, then selling them back in September.

As well, the Treasurer is involved in the running and organization of the Whistler cabin. Though we've had problems with it this year, I think we finally have a good caretaker in there and that should make all the difference.

Working with the Student Association seems to involve persueing group or common goals (Growlies) and a series of personal ones. Recently I spent quite a bit of time researching the draught beer question. This involved everything from talking to liquor inspectors to estimating Beergarden sales and projecting and comparing bottled beer with draught beer sales. I have also been hounding the institute on various money matters - they just recently agreed to pay \$2,000

Billy governed by what he called divine inspiration...every-one else called it government by spur-of-the-moment.


Billy left BCIT pretty much alone. Unfortunately for the inhabitants of the campus, his education minister didn't.

As elections will be upon us very soon, I've been asked to write about the role of the Business Society Chairperson.

Although this is an elected position; this is a very selective elected position. Only business division students can run for this post and only those students in the business division can vote for this chairperson.

The basic job function of the Chairperson is to co-ordinate the Business Technologies so that each partner is aware of what's happening outside their own technology. The Chairperson strives to gather and present ideas that might be of benefit to the business student - outside of their present courses. Exposure is one such event that is put on in co-operation with the Business

Community, Instructors, and administration of BCIT.

Trying to get guest speakers is another job the Chairperson is in charge of. Unfortunately this year there hasn't been any yet, but you will see some soon. One of the problems in becoming the Chairperson is that in a very short time period you must familiarize yourself with various people around the school, as well as your new job and to start planning from day 1, your goals. To help the new Chairperson while trying for guest speakers for the remaining months, I am also working on setting some up for next fall, as

this will help get the Business Society moving immediately.

The Chairperson is also in charge of a budget. All clubs such as the Marketing Club must now request any monies desired from the Business Society rather than go before Student Council.

By being elected to this position you must hold your own Business meetings at least once a month, be present for all executive council meetings as well as attending all regular council meetings. So you can see the time involved is considerable and you must be willing to put in on average 5 to 8 hours a week.

In addition, this year various jobs in conjunction with the Yearbook came under the Business Society Chairperson's supervision as well as sitting on a few extra committees that required student representation.

So why go through this work? What are the benefits? The first benefit is one of personal satisfaction of seeing something getting done, helping the students and contributing your ideas to the betterment of the school. The second is realizing that if you can co-ordinate your school workload with your responsibilities as Chairperson then you should have

no problems handling any job you might get once you graduate. The third benefit is getting to meet and contact, people who might help you later on whether it is in the capacity as a job source or reference source. The fourth benefit and only concrete one is your honourium, some business cards, and a chance of a regular parking spot.

"I agree," said Willie Wonderspam, Minister of Human Resources, "everything should break even at least. Maybe even make a profit."


"Good!" said Billy Bungles, figuring that as Premier he should say something.

Dear Editor,

This letter has two purposes, the first is to let everyone in on what's been happening between Forestry and C&S, and the second is to criticize a few hot heads in Forestry. I must state right here that this letter is only my interpretations of what has happened. I don't want it edited, and I won't reply to any letter in response to this one.

Last spring, C&S swiped Forestry's trophy case. In the fall, C&S proposed a way that Forestry could earn their case back. Forestry was to have a bake sale with the profit going to Shinerama, and that a first year girl forester cut up that gross wood pecker they call a mascot. Forestry didn't respond and C&S kept the trophy case.

Student Parking

Additional BCIT security personnel will be on duty to assist and direct students to the above temporary parking locations and any other areas which may be available.

One of the uglier things that I have experienced was the strategy used to convince employees to join the union in the last place that I worked. It was a new shop supplying prefab roof trusses for the building industry. One day a fellow from the union walked in and demanded a meeting with us. We told him to take a flying leap and he replied that he would be back. The next time that we saw him, he had arranged for us to be told by the plant owner that he must be given an audience. We submitted and were told that we were going to join the union. Somebody said that we were perfectly happy in the situation that existed and that joining the union would apparently only bless us with a net loss in pay as the dues would have been greater than the current pay differential they were using as a sucker come-on. The union fellow hummed and hawed and then produced his answer. We had exactly two weeks to agree to join the union or the plant would be shut down. What could we do? We joined the union. From past experience with the same union, nobody will see any of them until it is time for negotiations, and then they are usually several months late. I have paid several hundred dollars of hard earned money to the unions over the years, and I really cannot say that they have done anything for me except screw me.

Nuff said for now.

Onions have been praised as a cure-all for a wide range of ills. I remember an article published in the Sunday Times magazine from England that even went so far as to link the lowly onion with reductions in the level of blood cholesterol. But the diminutives survive: in U.S. **pants** for trousers and in England **pants** (for women **panties**), or, when particularly exiguous, **briefs**, or **scanties**, as undergarments. **Breeches** has returned and, with the help of **jodhpurs**, **plus-fours**, **shorts**, and **trunks**, has ousted **knickerbockers** which, in its curtailed form **knickers**, has been appropriated by women. **Bloomers** was short-lived for cyclists, but survives for schoolgirls; **drawers** is falling into genteel obsolescence, and even the highly respectable **trousers** is menaced by **slacks** and **jeans**.

Much thanks for the above goes to the Oxford University Press. It should be pointed out that, in the typical Canadian rubber stamp fashion, we more commonly use the American terms and meanings. For instance; pants are both under and over garments and jeans are jeans (the normal formal wear of most people).

Supertramp revisited

I have developed a great feeling of animosity towards accounting over the past few weeks. A balanced statement occurs only when a multitude of mistakes act to cancel each other out, thereby creating the illusion of all being well. What brough this up is that I, along with hundreds of other business students, have just completed the accursed 'practice set'.

All this has nothing to do with music, except that if it wasn't for the music playing while spending all those hours struggling over debits and credits, I could easily have gone raving bananas.

And who better to listen to than Supertramp?

Crime of the Century is both musically and lyrically one of the most remarkable albums of the decade. The lyrics are exceptionally perceptive, and the impact is incredible. The feeling one derives from listening to the album is a powerful sense of silent isolation, with the underlying theme that you are fighting a massive system, to which you find you are actually an integral part.

I get so involved in this album that, even while writing this, I had to have it on.

It was on this album that Supertramp, which actually had released two albums previously, changed all but two members and developed the sound which is a Supertramp trademark, yet to be successfully imitated by anyone.

Just the front cover and name alone of the **Crisis, What Crisis?** album makes a powerful statement about society today. However, a lot of people were somewhat disappointed by this album. It wasn't as serious as their previous effort, nor did it have the impact. It represented a slight change in direction for Supertramp. The music was a bit simpler, and the lyrics not quite as profound, but it was a good album nonetheless.

It was well over a year later that **Even in the Quietest Moments** finally hit the airways. It was almost immediately received as one of the top albums of 1978. Once again a slight change in direction - this album allowed them to slow down with a pair of extended tracks resembling symphonic productions. Half the songs on this album received extensive airplay. Anyone who wasn't familiar with Supertramp before was now hit left and right with their music. (at least on FM)

Now, with so many people hungry for new Supertramp, their newest album, **Breakfast in America** should sell extremely well. Once again, a slight change in direction, without losing the characteristic Supertramp sound. This prevents the group from stagnating as so many bands do these days.

This album should satisfy any and all previous Supertramp fans. Songs like 'Breakfast in America' and 'Take the Long Way Home' are the lighter side of Supertramp as in **Crisis, What Crisis?**, whereas 'The Logical Song' is reminiscent of 'Crime of the Century'.

Overall a superb effort by a group destined for fame and fortune, although I'm probably too late in saying that. Word has it that they'll be in Vancouver in the early summer. That will be a concert to watch for.

Alice Cooper returns to the Coliseum tonight, and a whole raft of other concerts are coming up in the next few weeks.

Well, its Tuesday morning while I'm typing this into the machine, and I just dumped a Stats exam. That'll teach me to not buy the book and not go to any classes.

Any movement by anyone to abolish accounting and statistics would receive my full support.

The TP Record Review

The Female vocal world has finally come up with an answer to Russ Mael's Sparks fame. A high, operatic voice. The answer is Kate Bush; the album is **LION HEART**. Very unique, and interesting to say the least. All the songs were written by Bush, and not one of them is bad, just some better than others. Duncan MacKay, who had a brief association with The Baker Gurvitz Army and spent two years with Steve Harley and Cockney Rebel and now with 10cc, complements the songs by Kate Bush very nicely.

On the whole, **Lionheart** is very well-recorded, though at times her voice sounds like she went too high and kept the VU meters in the red for too long. We know here at TP that isn't exactly the most technical description, but anybody who does home recordings knows what effects will produce a sort of 'muddy' tone is given when the sound gets a bit too loud or high. Nevertheless this only happens on about two spots and is made up for by the quality of the recording on the album as a whole.

Methinks our set's Flaydoggie would very much enjoy this album. Don't you, Mo? The songs are very poetic and imaginative. Bush has improved since her last album but if you get the chance, get both of them, we don't think either one of them will disappoint you.

RUSH have again come up with a good solid album. **HEMISPHERES** is probably the best by this Canadian power trio. Geddy Lee's vocals and bass are as strong as ever, Neil Peart's drumming and percussion really stand out and of course Alex Lifeson's guitar (the backbone of the RUSH sound) is nothing short

of incredible. **HEMISPHERES** is an expansion of **CYGNUS X-1** from the **FAREWELL TO KINGS** album but does not delve into the "science fiction" as much.

HEMISPHERES contains some classical influenced music along with their imaginative power rock that RUSH fans have come to know and love. The album also contains their first fling at complete instrumental with **La Villa Strangiato**, the best cut on the album. This album was beautifully recorded and really should only be bought on import for those of you with decent stereos to pick up everything.

One of the many strengths that Tom Waits has is that he can tell the same story over and over and make it sound different each time. **BLUE VALENTINE** is his latest and as usual is a solid album by this convincing story teller. The stories are old but the detail in which Waits goes into make his songs almost too believable, too close to reality. Most people who come across Waits for the first time wonder how he, or anybody, is actually able to sing like that. His strength is in his lyrics. His music almost always contains the typical piano vamps and bluesy riffs, and, is there anything wrong in that? Nothing too pretentious on the album. **BLUE VALENTINE** is a fairly decent recording but nothing too special is needed with this type of music.

We at TP tried to listen to **MIRROR STARS** by the **FABULOUS POODLES** with an open mind. It didn't work. We were very surprised to hear what we were hearing. Catchy bright tunes with funny lyrics. Songs about zombies in suburbia, haircuts and a really unique piece called **TIT PHOTOGRAPHER BLUES**. All the songs are carefully put together instrumentally

as well as vocally. The **FABULOUS POODLES** are not dumb or out to be a bubble gum sensation. They are more along the lines of a more commercially oriented **GRIMMS**, (we mentioned Grimms earlier this year; Neil Innes who is the musical writer/director of **Monty Python** is a member of Grimms). The music hints at 60's pop but with a lot more intricacies in the instruments, vocals and arrangements. If you buy it for a laugh for a friend you will soon be sorry that you didn't keep it for yourself.


2Okay liquid chefs, pour that last beer into the skillet with the carrots and butter.




