Lack-of-communication cited

'Some nurses shafted'

The other day I had the opportunity to meet several of a number of disgusted nurses. It appears that they are totally outraged at how the administration is handling people who have failed a course or a term. There was a case of a student going in to write her registered nursing exams and being told at that point that she had failed and could not write the exam. One can imagine how the poor girl must have felt. She had gone through two years of school and then was failed at the very end, completely unexpectedly. There seems to be some discrepancy over this matter, for when I went to talk to Marg Neylan (Acting Dept. Head) she said that the girl had received her notice of failure through the telegram system.

There are two sides to this story: on one side, there is a poor girl who though she had passed, but did not receive any notice; on the other side, there is the faculty who say they have documented proof that she did receive a telegram. As we all know, the postal service in this country is not the best by any stretch of the imagination, and to rely solely on this means shows a total lack of understanding on the part of the Administration. There must be a better way of informing the student of their achievements. All that is heard from the Administration is that it is such a pity that these problems are occurring, but they have not showed any initiative in trying to find a better system.

Upon talking to Marg Neylan, she promptly passed the buck to the Registrar's office. This is common practice when no one is ready to accept the blame. It shows that there is no responsibility for their actions. nurses are at a loss of where to go for help. They feel that they have been wronged and that if they do go to the Administration, they will likely be passed off. This is why they came to the LINK to make their plight heard.

There are quite a few unsatisfied students in the nursing technology. Their problems are many, but there are a few that are specifically worth mentioning. When the nurses are in the hospital, they are marked on what

they call "Process Recordings." They feel that the recordings are not a valid instrument and should not be used for marking purposes. When I approached Marg with this, she said that the students are entitled to their opinions. She did not state that she would investigate this matter. If the nurses are so concerned. it should be her duty to see what exactly is going on and what and why the students feel the way they do.

If you would ask any of the S.A. executives, they will gladly tell



Manpower student centres open

Looking for a job this summer is not going to be an easy task. As in the past, there are far fewer jobs than students seeking them. However, there are a number of methods and resources available to assist you in your search.

The Canada Manpower Centres for Students are now in the process of being set up. One of their major functions is to seek out summer jobs in their local areas. It must be remembered, though, that Canada Manpower has about 10 to 15 per cent of the jobs available at any given time. The majority of jobs are obtained through contacts (friends, relatives, previous employers and the grapevine) and personal walk-ins.

This being the case, you should first try to obtain a job through your contacts. Let people know you're seeking a job. This should be done immediately if you have-

n't already.

Next you should plan an organized employer visit schedule. Keep a record of where you've been and the result of your visit. Lists of employers and information on them can be obtained from the yellow pages, Chamber of

Commerce member lists, and Contacts Influential (at your local library) to name a few.

When making employer visits, bring a list of information often requested on applications. Prepared resumes are also helpful. but remember to keep them short and simple. You should include what position or job you're seeking. Putting "anything" turns employers off. They've got better ''anything'' turns things to do than decide what job you want or can do. Keep in mind that the major purpose of an application or resume is to get an interview.

If you do get an interview, try to find something about the prospective employer (e.g. product lines, branch offices, etc.). This shows the employer you're interested. The attitude you convey is often more important than past work experience. Dress accordingly for an interview. Don't wear a suit if the potential job is in a mill or wear old clothes for a sales interview.

Be creative in your job search. There are many more methods and resources available to you than outlined above. Some forethought and planning on your part could mean the difference between a job and unemployment. Some students have created their own jobs in the past. With some good organization the payoff can be good.



Amendments await Council's okay

The following are proposed amendments passed by the Constitution Change Committee, ratified by the Student Council, and awaiting the approval of the Student Body:

BYLAW 1 - MEMBERSHIP

1. The active members shall comprise all students (including full-time day students and Career Programme Students who have paid the required Student Activities fee for the current year.

BYLAW 2 - EXECUTIVE BODY

OF THE ASSOCIATION 2. The Executive shall:

b. Meet at the call of the Chair, four members shall form a quorum for the transaction of business.

c. Set an example for Council Therefore they shall be in full attendance at all scheduled Executive and Council meetings. The executive member must submit a reasonable request in writing to the Chairman prior to the meeting stating a valid reason for his/her absence or early departure from the meeting. The Chair shall submit the request to question. If the question is defeated by majority of the voting members, the Business Manager shall be authorized by the Chair to deduct 50% of the delinquent executive member's honorarium for that month. The deduction shall be recorded in the minutes. See

d. Enter minutes of all Executive meetings in books kept for that purpose.

e. Subject to any Bylaw, regulation, restriction and directions which the Council may from time to time make, impose, or give, be considered competent to exercise all of any part of the powers, authorities and discretions vested in the Council, save and except the power to enact Bylaws or to amend this Constitution, or to amend by Bylaws enacted by the Council.

f. Ensure that from June 1st to September 1st the President and the Treasurer will be employed on campus by the Student Association for the purpose of preparing for the commencement of Council at the beginning of the ensuing term.

g. Be issued a copy of the Constitution by the V.P. Internal no later than June 30th. The Executive shall be expected to have a working knowledge of the Constitution.

3. It is expected that all Executive would curtail any extracurricular activities that interfere with executive duties, or cause the executive to fail to be in **full** attendance at all scheduled Executive and Council meetings. See

Such notice shall be signed by the Vice-President Internal, provided always that the Council may by resolution provide, from time to time, such other manner of giving notice as it may deem good and sufficient.

BYLAW 8 - BOARD OF GOV— ERNORS REPRESENTATIVE

A. Elections
1. Notice and nomination(s) for the Board of Governors Representative will be carried out in the same manner as for Executive positions as outlined by Bylaw 7, Section 2.a.

B. Representation at Executive and Council Meetings

1. The BoG representative is welcome to attend all Council and Executive meetings publically posted by the Chairperson.

BYLAW 9 - CONDITIONS OF OFFICE AND IMPEACHMENT

1. The officers of the Association shall be required to resign from office under the following conditions:

b. If the officer fails to be in **full** attendance at any two meetings (per school year) of the Executive and Council without approval of the members as recorded in the minutes.

c. If at any meeting of the Council, a vote of non-confidence is moved against an officer of the Association and the motion is carried by a two-thirds majority of those voting.

BYLAW 11 - FUNDS

2. Disbursements of the funds of the Association:

c. Disbursements shall be in the form of cheques drawn on the S.A. approved bank; two signatures shall be required on each voucher; one signature shall be the Treasurer of the Association; the other shall be that of the President, V.P. Internal or V.P. External

BYLAW 13 - BORROWING & LENDING POWERS A. Borrowing

There will be no personal loans granted. An advance not in excess of the established honourarium will be granted for no greater than a one month period.

BYLAW 14 - INJURIES

2. The Student Association shall take advantage of the Workers' Compensation Board's offerings for its employees, ie. student employees of the Student Association while working for the Student Association.

BYLAW 17 - DISCIPLINE

1. Any form of gambling for money or for any monetary equivalent is prohibited within the precincts of the Institute without authorization of the Student Association.

BYLAW 18 - AMENDMENTS OF THE CONSTITUTION AND BYLAWS

3. The Constitution Committee forthwith after receipt of such proposed amendments shall publish them in two consecutive issues of the student newspaper prior to the submission of the proposed amendments to Council for revisal and ratification.



A look at E, L & P's latest

This album proves beyond all doubt that Emerson, Lake & Palmer are among the world's greatest and versatile bands. Unfortunately, this two-album set contains three sides of individual efforts. It is not until side four that Keith Emerson (keyboards), Greg Lake (vocals, guitar), and Carl Palmer (drums, percussion) rejoin forces to produce some music the way E, L & P was meant to be.

Starting on side one is Keith Emerson with "Piano Concerto No. 1." Almost 20 minutes of straight classical piano with full orchestra support; no organs or

synthesizers at all. Rather disappointing from a 'rock' point of

Greg Lake is featured on side two. Superb vocal work on this side; notably, "Lend Your Love to Me Tonight" and "C'est La Vie," the latter presently receiving considerable F.M. airplay.

The third side features the third member of the group, Carl Palmer. He too concentrates on classical type music, but brings in some brass and flutes for a Blood, Sweat & Tears/Chicago sound. The last track is a reworked version of "Tank," with the emphasis this time, of course, on

Side four combines these three masters in two long compositions: 'Fanfare for the Common Man' and "Pirates," both E, L & P at their best. Here, Keith finally brings out his multitude of keyboards and synthesizers.

This set is labelled 'Volume I'. 'Works, Volume II' is a single album on its way. E, L & P are presently rehearsing in the Velodrome at the Olympic facilities in Montreal. They are preparing for a U.S. tour, complete with a 37 piece orchestra. I sure would like to see them in Vancouver!





George Segal, who plays Dick and Jane Fonda, who naturally plays Jane, star in this comedy with Ed Mc-Mahon of ''Johnny Carson'' fame. Ed plays Charlie, the President of an aerospace firm who has to fire Dick for economic reasons.

Dick returns to his heavily mortgaged home, Jane, and the crew who are installing a heated swimming pool. Dick isn't immediately snapped up by another firm so with the help of an exjanitor he learns the ropes of how to obtain unemployment insurance, food coupons, welfare and also learns how to chisel these programs. However, the Government soon catches up with him and he loses his unemployment benefits.

Jane then makes a visit to her rich parents but unfortunately her father is a devoted fan of Emerson, who believed "Need, Breaks Desire," and sends her off home empty handed with hearty congratulations to Dick for losing his high paying job and being faced

with learning how to be poor.

Desperate by this time and yet unwilling to give up their home because Dick feels that they, the middleclass, are "the backbone of America," they trot down to their local loan shark company who agrees to lend them \$1,000. The money is no soon signed over when the loan company is robbed and the hold-up men make off with their \$1,000 and Jane.

to rob a safe full of "bribe money" belonging to Dick's old aerospace firm becomes too great to resist. Do they get away with it? That I'll let you find out! All I'll say is "they live happily ever after" in typical Dick and Jane style.

As there's lots of action in this movie, there is no need for in-depth characterizations to make Dick and Jane believable. The small character parts such as

the unemployment clerk, Jane's parents and especially Charlie, played by Ed McMahon, are very well done.... so for an entertaining evening not to be taken any more seriously than an evening with your primary reader, go see "Fun with Dick and Jane." It's rated 'mature' and is playing at the Odeon on Granville, Hyland on Kingsway, West Van Odeon I on Marine and at the New West Odeon. —JB



If not, then it will be up to the students to go to their respective department heads and give them a piece of their minds. If you do not get up the courage to complain, then it is only natural for the faculty to assume that all is hunkey-dorey.
