## COMMUNICATION A PRIORITY FOR INCOMING PRESIDENT

John Watson, who joins BCIT as president on June 12, is no stranger to BCIT. As assistant deputy minister of Universities, Colleges and Institutes, he regularly met with Roy Murray last year to keep abreast of the Institute's needs and plans and during those visits also became acquainted with other members of the administration and board.

Now poised for some important decision making as head of an institution with an ambitious and challenging new mandate, Watson is taking a close look at priorities. Communications, one area he is particularly keen to improve upon, will see him circulating both with staff inside the Institute and with business, alumni and potential students in the community.

"Our long term interests are best served if we know what is expected of us and people know what we can do. I like face to face contact so I hope people will stop me, introduce themselves and tell me what is on their

minds," he says.

"Marketing", says Watson, "is an important part of the communications thrust and I have been talking to the V.P.'s about enrolment and issues that have a marketing component. BCIT is a singular institution and needs to keep its name in front of the various publics for their benefit and ours.

Watson has a reputation for calmness and consistency, important qualities for an individual at the helm of the BCIT flagship. His demeanor is quiet, unassuming and friendly — the sort of man you could chat to about anything. This, matched with his determination to meet staff on their own ground, in BCIT shops, offices and cafeterias, augurs well for a person whose position is often perceived as too far removed from the real world of students and staff.


John Watson, born on D Day, 45 years ago in London, England, comes from Anglo/Irish parentage. His father who emigrated to Canada as a boy but returned in 1936 to study at Queens University in Northern Ireland, worked with the team of engineers instrumental in developing

Lion, a biography of Winston Churchill by William Manchester), bridge and skiing. He used to play hockey and golf but finds he rarely has the time

One of his concerns since being appointed president has been to find a place to live. Not particularly fussy about the location, he has considered various areas and would be happy with a house or condominium. Separated, he has two children - a son, 21, who is taking time off from university to work as a dee jay in Taipei, and a daughter, 20, who is studying for her B.A.

Asked if he had a message for BCIT staff, Watson responded: "I think BCIT has a bright future, but we need to work together and prepare to meet that future. It won't just happen.'

the team that displays the most knowledge about welding by answering a series of skill testing questions.




