BCIT gives Cystic Fibrosis research a big boost

ne hundred and twentythree shiners participated in Shinerama Day boarding buses to downtown, or driving to locations around the city to shine shoes and raise funds for Cystic Fibrosis research.

"The shiners did a great job of reeling in the dollars for CF," said SA vice president of PR and Marketing Rafael Atienza, Shinerama '98's coordinator.

Shinerama Day donations collected by the shiners have been totalled to over \$6,100.

"The shiners did a great job of reeling in the dollars for CF," said Atienza.

And while the total is slightly less than last years, Atienza said, "In comparison to other years, by amount raised per shiner, this is one of the highest totals."

This year's shiners to collect the most donations and winners of tuition for the winter semester were Natasha Beckow and April XXXX, from Business, who collected \$420 in donations. The names of the other prize winners will be posted on the buletin board outside the SA offices in the Campus Centre.

Shiners also made appearances in VTV news spots breakdancing at Robson and Burrard and on the Gabreau show.

Totals for other shinerama events such as the two barbeques, the golf tournament and the sold out Shinerama Nuts and Bolts Dance have not been totaled at press time.

The popular Shinerama t-shirt sold out on campus but a few were left over from the golf tournament are still available if you're quick, according to Atienza.

"BCIT students can be proud that they have made a difference in the lives of people with CF," he said.

A silent auction, with all proceeds going to the Shinerama Campaign, is to be held today in the Great Hall of the SA Campus Centre from 11am to 2pm.

Atienza expressed his thanks to the Elephant on Campus for the breakfasts and BBQs, and to Restauronics for the bagged lunches provided to the shiners headed downtown for the day. Golf tournament's second year a continued success

BCIT's second annual Shinerama golf tournament appears to have been a resounding success.

About 100 golfers competed in the tournament which was held at the Mylora Golf Courses in Richmond.

Golfers were treated to a day of golf in near perfect weather and a barbeque lunch.

Prizes were awarded to the days's best golfers in the tournament but none of those who attempted the \$500 hole-in-one

— about 60 percent of those attending the tournament according to Shinerama coordinator Rafael Atineza — succeeded in sinking the ball with one swing.

Total revenues for Shinerama raised by the tournament have not been calcuated at press time but with 25 corporate sponsorships each sponsoring a hole, entry fees for the golfers, the hole-in-one contest and donations made by participants at the course revenues should be comparable to last year's figure of over \$8,000.

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

n enormous set, designed specifically to make humans seem small. A huge lamp, 1/2 a giant car, lights strung everywhere, and a monstrous boot. All created to make the actors appear miniature, because there are no humans represented in this production, only CATS! They saunter through the audience, bright eyes glowing, pawing at some people, while others clean their fur or scratch their heads. Dozens of feline creations, complete with fur, ears, tails and extraordinary complex and convincing make-up. The effect is complete. You believe they are cats, and you find yourself identifying with their celebration.

The Queen Elizabeth Theatre

Based on "Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats" by T. S. Eliot, CATS is a celebration of every animalistic trait we recognize in felines, seen through the animals perspective. It is the tale of the Jellicle Cats Ball, where one deserving feline is chosen every year by Old Deuteronomy (the ancient leader) to pass on to the heavenside layer, the cat equivalent of our heaven.

CATS is a beautiful parable of many different cats, all viable choices for Deuteronomy and the hilarious or heartbreaking reasons for their selection. The music is feline in nature and the cast somehow transform themselves into the animals, complete with all the familiar actions, personality traits and breeds. There is a Persian, many alley cats, and even a distinctive Siamese.

This is definitely a show children can appreciate and I saw many a delighted face during their first exposure to grandiose musical theater. My favorite feline was Macavity, the nasty cat who never gets caught in any of his mischief. Most who come to see CATS have a favorite pick, whether it's Mr. Mistoffelees the Magician, Growltiger the Pirate or Grizabella the Glamour Cat. The singing and acrobatic dancing in this show is fantastic. It always amazes me how actors who are dancing and madly flying around a stage can still keep the breath needed to sing in clear, confident voices

Although CATS had less than a weeks run here at the Queen E, it made an impression on the people who had the pleasure to catch it before it "pounced" on another city. I highly enjoyed it and recommend it upon it's return!



It's important for all British Columbians to have the facts about the Nisoa'a Treaty.

Tax Equality

The Nisga'a will be subject to all provincial and federal taxes and are the first aboriginal group in Canada to agree to give up their Indian Act tax exemptions.

The Land

Private land is not part of the Nisga'a final agreement and won't be on the table in any treaties the B.C. government negotiates. When all treaties are complete, the total amount of land held by First Nations will be proportional to their population – less than 5%.

The Nisga'a Government

The Treaty allows the Nisga'a people to govern themselves in a way comparable to a municipal government. The Canadian Constitution, the Charter of Rights and Freedoms, and the Criminal Code will apply to the Nisga'a people.

A Free Vote

A free vote by your elected representatives will be held in the B.C. Legislature. This allows all members to vote with their conscience, not along party lines.

A vote will also be held in the Federal Parliament in Ottawa.

The Nisga'a people will hold their own ratification vote.

A Public Process

Over 400 public meetings were held, and an all-party committee of the legislature travelled B.C. to hear views on the Nisga'a and other treaties. The Agreement in Principle has been widely available since 1996.

All Canadians Share Cost

B.C. taxpayers will pay less than 1/5th of the total cash cost of \$312 million, spread over fifteen years, while Canadian taxpayers outside of B.C. will pay the rest.

Economic Certainty

KPMG and Price Waterhouse, two national accounting firms, have found that the prolonged uncertainty of unresolved land claims has cost B.C. billions of dollars in lost investment and jobs.

r so read the graffiti which began to appear around London in the mid-sixties, as a young Eric Clapton emerged as the guitar phenomenon at the core of the Yardbirds.

Concert Review **Eric Clapton** at GM Place September 8, 1998

The slogan was probably an exaggeration, but for those fans and musicians who have followed Clapton's path through the Yardbirds, the Roots Blues of John Mayall's Bluesbrakers, the psychedelic glory of Cream and Blind Faith, the emerging seventies sound of Derek and the Dominoes, and his long and often beguiling solo career, his performance this evening, before a capacity crowd at General Motors Place did perhaps offer a glimpse of divinity. It was a two-hour clinic in blues guitar, put on with

great enthusiasm and unbelievable skill and style by perhaps the greatest guitarist alive today.

Bonnie Raitt opened with an hour-long set of passionate, kindhearted blues. Her voice was clear and powerful, and her superb slide guitar playing always up-front and right on the number. Backed by an excellent four-piece band, she got the house rocking with songs from her new album, as well as old favorites from her long and evolving career. She was then joined by local boy popster Bryan Adams for a spirited romp through their duet 'Rock Steady'. To top it all off, local angelicvoiced Sarah McLaughin joined them in a beautifully harmonic and heart-felt 'Send Me An

Clapton took the stage to uproarious cheers, having forsaken all rock god flash and pretension for a simple but beautiful projected backdrop of slowly changing colors and Eric dressed in faded Levis, a blue t-shirt and sneakers. Backed by an outstand-

ing five-piece band (two keyboards, guitar, bass and drums), he opened with three songs from his new album, 'Pilgrim'. If the first two, 'My Father's Eyes' and 'Pilgrim' were somewhat subdued, 'She's Gone' was a sizzling foot stomper which showcased

A lengthly and exquisite acoustic set followed, with a seated Clapton showcasing both older

Clapton's explosively fluid guitar

('Tears in Heaven', tunes 'Layla') and new ones ('River of Tears', 'Goin' Down Slow', 'If I Could Change the World'). Then it was back to the Stratocaster. 'Crossroads' was an epiphany, conjuring up existential images of Robert Johnson selling his soul for the blues on a lonely Louisiana roadside, and was followed by an unbelievable 'Have You Ever Loved a Woman' sung with great clarity and passion. A

predictably slow and emotional 'Wonderful Tonight' and a wickedly ripping 'Cocaine' sent the crowd into a frenzy, and they hollered themselves hoarse before Clapton and his bandmates returned for the grinding, howling blues power of Cream's classic 'Sunshine of Your Love' capping off a full two hours of musical brilliance and letting the audience leave with the feeling that maybe we 'had' just seen God.










SONIC YOUTH A Thousand Leaves (DGC)

This NY band began in 1981 with Thurston Moore and today it still rocks and experiments with no fear, the outer limits of sound and noise. Sophisticated and stylistic guitars tuned to crazy warped tunings the sound on this album is rock, noise, jazz and complex composition experimental. This four piece group were absorbed instantly by young listeners open to hearing something new and challenging rather than your classic rock guitarist and his backup band doing Bon Jovi covers. This starts with an interesting blend of

scratched noise and the dark spooky vocals of Thurston Moore leading into rocking guitars and rhythm with the second track (Sunday). LIONROCK City Delirious (Concrete Recordings)

At first you may have thought this was some kind of Rasta reggae rock album, but after a listen you'll clearly hear something of a total different sort. Justin Robertson, (have you heard of him?) has elevated in the DJ world, most respected in Britain as a musician and a producer. He has been tour DJ with the Chemical Brothers, Primal Scream and even the Beastie Boys. Justin can cut tracks and spin the turntables with wizardry, while mixing beats and rhythms from his friends and band members. The second track is proba-

bly the most reggae sounding of them all, with its integrated cuts and samples from some roots reggae album. Lionrock sound like blend of the Propellerheads, Bran Van 3000 and jungle music. Lionrock are fully electrolyzed, the samples and beats are clear and very clean cut, all exactly timed and placed on the metronome. Influences are from Curtis Mayfield, The Stoogies, hip-hop, Northern Soul, and litres of ale. Lionrock deserves a full spin to hear techno, jungle, reggae, ambiance, and funk. 

RIVER TRIVIA

What do you know about the Fraser River?

The Fraser rivershed system drains one quarter of BC and is North America's most varied watershed that includes nine of BC's 12 biogeoclimatic zones.

The Fraser River was declared a Heritage River by the BC government in 1995 and voted BC's most endangered river by the Outdoor Recreation Council in 1996.

Almost two-thirds of the population of BC lives in the Fraser Basin. It contributes 80 percent of the province's gross domestic product and 10 percent of Canada's gross national product.

It also boasts the world's most productive salmon river system, supporting five salmon species and 57 other species of fish, including steelhead and giant sturgeon. Its estuary is BC's most productive waterfowl breeding area, and one of the four major stops for birds on the international Pacific flyway. But it's also in danger from urban development and industrial pollution.

Changing course on River's Day

ivers Day is about changing course changing the way we treat our most basic and precious element, water. Rivers and the aquatic environment have come under an onslaught of pollution and destruction over the last century. In Vancouver, for example, out of 50 salmonbearing streams only two remain capable of producing salmon. Rivers Day is about protecting salmon, rivers, the ocean they run to, and the environment in

B.C. Rivers Day was founded by our very own Mark Angelo, head of the

Fish, Wildlife and Recreation Program here at BCIT way back in 1980. He and a small group of 40 did a clean-up along the Thompson River. Now, in 1998, Mark says there will be over 100 major events around the province involving 25,000 to 30,000 people. Eighty local governments have proclaimed the last Sunday in September every year as Rivers Day.


But Rivers Day has already begun. Since last weekend, people all over the province have been cleaning up river banks, planting native vegetation on stream sides, marking storm drains with yellow fish and talking to their neighbors about their local creek or river. But on the

official B.C. Rivers Day this Sunday, September 27 is when the action really starts.

One of the highlights this year will be Fin Donnelly's event. He's the young man who swam 1350 kilometers down the Fraser River in 1995 to bring our attention to the plight of rivers, salmon and the environment in general. This year he's going to swim down the Fraser from Coquitlam then around and back into False Creek over two days to Science World in False Creek, along with flotilla of voyageur and natifve canoes, as well as other swimmers joining along the way. At 2 pm Sunday, the show kicks off at the park beside Science World with

There will be a giant, walk-thru fish, an electric porsche, solar-powered gadgets, and another 20 displays from everyone from Environment Canada to the Green Pen Company. Watereare Trps

very hill, every valley, every road, every neighborhood is part of a natural drainage system called a watershed or rivershed. Oil, gas, radiator fluid, sometimes even paint and hazardous chemicals get spilled or misted onto the ground and end up in our riversheds every day. Add to this aquatic onslaught the pollutants we pour down our drains - from shampoo, bleach, Draino, paint thinners or left-over insecticides, and we have an ugly chemical soup reaching the waterways in our hometown, and ultimately, the Strait of Georgia within 24 hours of leaving our home.

Here's what you can do:

1 Don't flush paints, solvents, or other hazardous products down the street drains, your house drains or the toilet. Don't use the toilet as an ashtray or wastebasket. Every time you flush a cigarette butt, facial tissue, or other small bit of trash, you waste between 22 and 32 litres of water. Separate your household wastes from regular garbage and save them in childproof containers for proper disposal at collection depots. You can return used oil and radiator fluid at a local gas station. Used paint can be returned to some retail paint stores and special collection depots in your area. For information on the location nearest you call the Recycling Hotline at 732-9253.

- 2 Buy only those environmentally hazardous products you really need. And buy them in quantities you will be able to completely use up, so that you don't have to worry about their disposal.
- 3 Use environmentally friendly products whenever possible. For example, use latex or water-based paint so that your clean-ups don't require solvents or paint thinners. And buying unbleached regular paper and toilet paper keeps deadly organochlorines related to bleaching paper out of our waterways.
- 4 Wash your car on the grass, using safe cleaners. Keep water consumption down. In fact, check out the water-less car wash product at the Rivers Day event at Science World on Sunday.

Make these changes in your use of household products as a start to protecting the water cycle, and you can feel great satisfaction in having taken a big step towards a safer, cleaner world for our kids.

Did you know that less than five percent of all water on Earth is fresh? And of that, only one percent is fresh wateer on the surface. Most of the H20 here on the third rock from the sun is locked up in ice or out of easy reach in the world's salty oceans. Potable water is a precious resource, and it

cycles up and down, in and out, and all around us. But clean, fresh water and even clean sea water is becoming increasingly

Consider this:

- Eighty per cent of marine pollution comes from landbased sources.
- Urban storm water is one of the top three sources of pollution of our nation's rivers, lakes, oceans and estuaries.
- Three and a quarter million tons of oil enter the oceans of the world each year. More oil enters coastal waters from street runoff than tanker spills.
- Pollutants that evaporate from the oceans into the atmosphere are often brought back to Earth by rain or snow.

PCBs, DDT and mercury were detected

at 90 percent of 388 EPA-evaluated water sites in the U.S. The southern regions of Canada would mirror these results.

In the U.S. alone, sewage treatment plants dump 5.9 trillion gallons of wastewater into coastal waters each year.

 A wide range of diseases can be carried by pathogens in sewage-contaminated waters, including gastroenteritis, dysentery and hepatitis.

In 1995, more than 3,500 beaches were

closed or advisories were issued in the U.S. against swimming due to pollution.

- The major pollution sources responsible for beach closings and advisories include sewer overflows storm, water runoff, sewage treatment, plant malfunctions and polluted runoff.
- In January this year, urgent threats to marine species and ecosystems prompted more than 1,600 marine scientists and conservation biologists from 65 countries to issue an unprecedented

warning to the world's governments and citizens that the sea is in trouble due to human activities. The scientists issued the warning to mark the United Nations' International Year of the Ocean.


