# WAXWORKS Mark Allan and D.A. Grierson

Relayer-Yes

I used to think that there were some things in life which one could rely on consistently. Yes albums for instance...technically proficient, unusually melodic in spots, intelligent and thought provoking. After hearing the latest Yes releace I must report my values as being sorely tarnished. It could have been because I expected them to maintain an already lefty standard...Maybe I was in a piqueish need because I had just finished listening to a classic Fleetwood Mac album and was still mourning the glory that once was Rock. Whatever the reason, Relayer accomplished something no Yes record has ever done before. It bored me.

It's often seemed to me that lead singer Jon Anderson paradoxically the simultaneous weak spot and strongest asset of the band. To begin with, consider his voice, a unique facet of the group's total sound. Robert Plant of LED ZEPPLIN is the only comparable voice I can think of and even this isn't a good example. Anderson's phrasing and material clearly

separate him from Plant.

And what of his material? Lyrically, his style seems to be a cross between Herman Hesse and Edgar Rice Burroughs. On his bad days his highly pitched almost irritating voice crosses the line into irritation and resembles a composite of Siddhartha and Tarzan.

But all this I could forgive. I'm sure electronic equalization of Anderson's voice has kept it appealing in the past and musically Rick Wakeman and Steve Howe provided some joyous moments. Whatever happened?

Well, Wakeman has departed for greener pastures and more keyboard extravaganzas, taking with him, I suspect, the perfect musical counter-balance to Anderson's other worldly excesses. Certainly when Wakemand was with Yes, Anderson's material slipped into pomposity and pretentiousness, but never did this last throughout an entire album. On Relayer it does.

Gone is any attempt at

melody, swept out of the way by a barrage of the wall-of-sound technique of music, if I can call it that. There is a sense of relentless movement but no direction is apparent. Gates of Delirium particularly left me delirious. The other tow cuts suffer from the same problems.

Now for the good news. Keyboard man Patrick Moraz and drummer Alan White are much more than competent replacements for Wakeman and Bill Bruford respectively. Yes remains one hell of a good band, all it needs is better material than that provided here. And Roger Dean (who must have read everything Robert Howard has ever wrote) has created yet another beautiful cover illustration for a Yes album. His strangely alien illustrations are a constant delight and provide at least one good reason to anticipate the next Yes release.

1974 has been referred to often as the Year of the Crossover, a crossover being a hit song on the pop charts by an artist who usually only appeals to a small selective audience. Olivia
Newton-John (country) and B. B.

King (blues) are two such artists. But there are always going tobe those musical styles which will elude mass popularity. Bluegrass for instance. Unlike mainstream country and western, Bluegrass has always been something of a (pardon the expression) grassroots movement, which occupies the same relative position to popular C & W that rural blues does to urban blues.

A couple of Sundays ago, Vancouver was treated to a rare exhibition of this elusive music idiom. The Queen Elizabeth Theatre, which sure was the not the best of possible settings played host to multi-talented John Hartford and two lesser known but no less talented Bluegrass pickers, guitarist Norman Blake and dobro virtuso Josh Graves.

Blake began the show unaccompanied, and although he started off slowly soon left no doubt that he is one of THE fastest guitar pickers alive. Particularly impressive was his version of Boggy Road to Milledgeville, a tune he had already once recorded on David Bromberg's first album. Ultimately though, his dry stage presence may have worked against his set

Blake returned with Josh Graves, or Uncle Josh, as he's sometimes called. Thirty - one years of playing the dobre has left him with a total mastery and understanding of his instrument, which resembles a cross between a guitar and a steel guitar. The dobre is a much more versatile instrument than I had thought, capable of either plucking rhythm effects, melodic one-note punctuations, or blistering staccato runs. And Uncle Josh possesses a natural, confident stage presence which many other performers onlh

dream about. Blake became the perfect foil for Grave's dry witticisms and their set was probably the best part of the evening.

I must admit John Hartford disappointed me. About three years ago I caught a great show which he did at the new defunct Egress. The whole evening was a perfect blend of music and humour. Beneath that somber exterior lurks the mind of a johnny Carson scriptwriter. However, three years have passed and sad to say, most of the material he played at the Queen Elizabeth was the very same which I'd heard at the Egress, only this time the songs weren't quite as funny as in some places tended to be somewhat tasteless and embarrassing. Perhaps it was the difference in setting perhaps times and people have changed, maybe a bit of both. Whatever the reason, regardless of the high points of his show, such as some of Hartford's fiddle palying, I got the feeling that the times have passed him by, which is something I don't think will ever happen to either Josh Graves or Norman Blake.





It seems that this drop in attendance could be attributed to man things: Perhaps...



The directory of Overseas Summer Jobs costs \$6.20 and has details of jobs, salaries, names and addresses of employees, passport and work permit requirements.

# BIAFRA HOUSE

**BRENTWOOD HOUSE** 

In our last issue of the Link, we reported on the state of the living conditions at the BCIT/ BCVS student residence. There were no food services, food costs were rediculously high and students were not eating correctly.

On Monday, February 3rd, Blaine Kennedy, President, and Graham Fane, Student Liaison, went to Victoria to ask Mrs. Daily for a subsidy to help the Brentwood students over the difficult financial times. During @ west this meeting, Mrs. Daily pointed - 1/2. out that the Provincial Government was already subsidizing a garage **Brentwood House students to** the tune of \$145.00 per month and that they could not afford to put another penny into the Brentwood project. When Graham and Blaine

came back, the students were informed that the only way that any food services could be in this year, was if the students at Brentwood House were willing

to pay themselves \$185.00 per month for room and board. Student loans would be made available to those students who did not already have one, and re-applications could be made. These loans would be looked at .: by the Canadian Loans Dept. keeping in mind that there were higher than usual living costs encountered at Brentwood.

This was put to the students in the form of a ballot. Students had the choice to either refuse the ideas of paying \$185.00 per month for room and board or just keep on living the way they are (making the best possible meals out of the cooking facilities available). The alternative was chosen ie to carry on as before, almost unanimously, and the Brentwood situation seems to have resolved itself at the discretion of the students living there, unanimously.

The students will not stop working towards obtaining food facilities at Brentwood House. Their only stipulation be that it is in par with other student residence costs at other educational institutions.

Before we let this whole issue drop off or at least die down, the Brentwood students at the Student Association would like to extend their thanks to several people who helped them a great deal during their long and tedious fight with Victoria. These people were just great and deserve all the gratitude that they can be given. So, thanks a whole bunch, Graham Fane, Jim Britton, Dale Michales and Joy Langdon. Your help and physical and moral support has


