Burnaby Lake

project gets another boost

BCIT's Burnaby Lake System enhancement project received another boost last Monday when Environment Minister Moe Sihota announced that the provincial government would contribute \$10,000 to the project.

Sihota made the announcement while standing near the banks of the Seymour River, just below the Seymour dam. The minister and Burnaby-Willingdon MLA Joan Sawicki both donned hip waders, crossed the river, and joined over a dozen BCIT Fish, Wildlife and Recreation students who were tagging and releasing coho salmon.

It was all part of a media event to officially kick off the annual B.C. Rivers Day.

Mark Angelo, the chairman of the Outdoor Recreation Council of B.C. and Fish, Wildlife and Recreation program head, said the B.C. Rivers Day has now become the biggest event of its kind in North America.

This year over 60 events are planned throughout the province to draw attention to rivers issues.

Sihota praised the Burnaby Lake System enhancement project because of its high level of community involvement.

The project has gained support from four levels of government, both Burnaby newspapers, UTV, environmental groups, several Burnaby Rotary Clubs, VanCity Credit Union, and numerous individuals and private companies.

Management shuffled to meet new directions

President John Watson announced a slate of changes to the management structure September 15 to meet the challenges facing BCIT in the coming year.

"It became clear to me that we need to apply more resources to managing the challenges and opportunities represented by the transfer of the Pacific Marine Training Institute, the new downtown campus, Richmond and potential new sites in the

Fraser Valley," said Watson in a letter to staff.

As a result David Harvey, the director of Personnel/Employee Relations, assumes the new role of Director of Campus Development reporting to Clayton McKinley. Harvey will oversee the PMTI transfer, review BCIT's multi-campus operations and give recommendations to the executive.

Marilyn Duggan will assume the position of Director of Human

Resources and Tomi Eeckhout is appointed as the Director of Labour Relations, both reporting to Clayton McKinley.

Wendy Waite-Kumagai will join the Human Resources department and continue her work with employment equity. Maggie Ross, Harassment and Discrimination Advisor, will now report to Pat Maertz, secretary to the Board of Governors.

Clayton McKinley, who chairs the steering committee for the

new Downtown Education Centre, will now have responsibility for the DEC, while Duke Dukowski, director of the DEC, will now report to McKinley.

Finally, Dave Peppar and Computer Resources will now report to Gerry Moss who is spearheading a review of BCIT information technology needs for the next decade.

All changes are effective immediately.


Kim Boswell, a temporary instructor last year, joins Operations Management as a permanent faculty member.

Glynis Pernicelle: **Full-time Trades Records Assistant**

Near Glynis Pernicelle's desk in Student Records there is a cartoon that shows a goldfish swimming inside a kitchen blender. The caption reads: "And you think there's stress in your life."

Glynis has a tough job that has more than your average amount of stress.

In a nutshell, she is the key liaison with several hundred trades instructors and about 3,000 trades students. By keeping current in a constantly changing grade structure, she determines whether a trades student has completed all course requirements to be eligible for graduation.

If a student must maintain at least an 80 percent average and he gets 79 percent in one course, Glynis is the one who must deny his graduation.

She inputs all marks from full-time trades students, of which there are about 3,000 at any given time. She makes

sure each receives a transcript of marks and a certificate or diploma if they meet all graduation requirements.

She also becomes involved in resolving disputes between students and instructors.

Besides her demanding job, Glynis is also a member of the Directions Assessment Group within the Registrar's Office. The committee is looking at morale, communications and efficiency issues as well as helping develop a department mission statement.

She has been at BCIT for 12 years. She is married to Larry and they have a five-year-old daughter named Autumn-Lee. Glynis likes to play bingo and go crab fishing and camping. She also enjoys attending a monthly healing workshop at Burnaby General Hospital on Therapeutic Touch.
