## Anik-B Courses a failure?

Students at community colleges in B.C.'s North are staying away in droves from BCIT's Anik-B satellite education program.

Five courses, to be beamed from the institute live will be in operation at the College of New Caledonia in Prince George, and only 13 people have signed up so far.

"Only three students have enrolled in the Forest Utilization

course, and no students have enrolled in the Mining Course," says Don Anderson, CNC Dean of Instruction.

There are also no students, so far, in the Construction Course, six in a hospitality and Tourism Course, and four for a Graduate Nurses Refresher course. All courses begin October 1st.

The situation is apparently much the same in the four other cities. Colleges in Terrace, Dawson Creek, Cranbrook, and Prince Rupert all report a distinct lack of interest from potential students.

The courses will be run with a BCIT Instructor standing in front of a television camera and teaching, while students in classrooms around the province and at BCIT watch him on television monitors. The students in the remote areas have telephone access to the instructor during the class.

CNC Principal Charles McCaffrey suggests a lack of response to the new program could be explained by fear of the unknown, and a lack of extensive advertising.

## Board meets with McGeer

This afternoon, the Board of Governors has been asked to meet with Education Minister Pat McGeer. Although it is expected McGeer will simply inform the Board that BCIT has been designated under Bill 82, members of the Board still object to Bill 82. The following is taken from a prepared presentation student board representative Gord Rollick will make to McGeer this afternoon on behalf of the student association.

"The major concern of the Student Association regarding redesignation of BCIT is that we will lose our representation on the Board of Governors. We strongly believe that the students of BCIT should have a voice in their education and in the

future of the institute. To take away this voice would be a great loss.

The Student Association would like to emphasize that our representatives on the Board of Governors have been responsible, genuinely concerned students who have been keenly aware of the need to provide valuable input. Further we think that it would be a loss to the board itself if students and faculty were eliminated from board matters. There are many board members who feel student and faculty representation is valuable and necessary.

A second major concern of all students at BCIT is the possible threat to the value of a technological diploma. There is considerable concern that the

redesignation potentially threatens the uniqueness of BCIT and the quality of education it can deliver to its students. Since BCIT was created to fill, and was responding to, a high level industrial need in the province, inclusion of the institute under Bill 82 may make it more difficult for BCIT to respond quickly and effectively to changing industrial demands in the province. BCIT is clearly unique in its concept and value.

The student Association is very concerned that the proposed designation could undermine the optimistic view that has been pervasive among students at BCIT. We feel it is wrong to adjust an educational environment that has worked so spectacularly well."

A long-awaited Educational Council for BCIT is to be established this fall through a series of elections and appointments starting in early October.

The main purposes of the Educational Council include providing an Institute-wide forum for discussion of educational issues and to make recommendations to the Board of Governors, via the Principal, on all matters of educational planning and policy making.

On this council will be four student representatives, one to be elected from each of the three divisions, with the SA President as an ex-officio member of the council.

The Educational Council will be composed of at least fifty-two members, of which one third will be from the administration, one third from the faculty/tech staff, and the remainder from the other areas of campus.

These others include the SA, three from the Alumni, three Board Elected Provincial Representatives, four representatives from Advisory committees, and five ex-officio union and association reps.

Not everybody is happy with the size of the council.

In their newsletter of April 6 this year, the Staff Society states that 'The inclusion of so many administrators results in a unwieldy total committee of approximately fifty members.'

The staff society felt that the administrators, including the principal, the three vice principals and all seven deans as ex-officio members of the council, had enough input already.

'These people have direct access to the Board of Governors already and do not need an additional 'Forum' through which their views can be heard.'

The Staff Society, which represents the faculty and tech staff on campus, proposed that the council be kept to a maximum number of fifteen members. Their proposal called for a council composed of five administrators, five from the Staff Society, and five others.

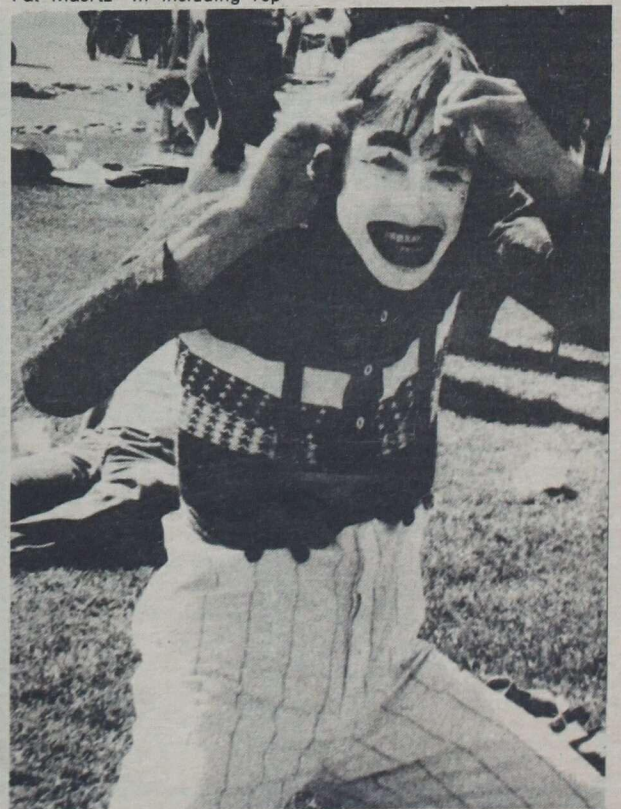
According to Board Secretary Pat Maertz 'In including rep-

resentatives from the administrative departments, the Board recognizes that all components of the institute have an impact on educational programs, facilities and services. It will provide an open forum for the discussion of all educational topics and issues.'

Another area of contention with the Staff Society is the method of electing the faculty/tech staff representatives. The election procedures call for eight reps from specific sections, as well as nine members elected at large. The Society fears that this is a way of getting around the Staff Society, and that by conducting the elections through the Board rather than the Staff Society, the faculty/tech staff would be scattered and divided without any responsibility to truly represent their peers or to even let them know what is happening.

The Student Association has the same problem with the three elected positions they have been given. Any three students could be elected onto the board without the requirement that they consult with the student

## Legal Aid On Campus

Effective Wednesday September 26 the B.C.I.T. Student Association will be sponsoring a legal aid clinic on campus. This service is offered by the Greater Vancouver Law Student Legal Assistance Society and will be co-ordinated by Norine MacDonald of U.B.C. Initially the clinics will be offered every week but this may be changed to suit demand.

The clinics will run from 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. and will consist of two law students. Each student will need the use of one of the executive offices for this time. In addition, the reception area will be used as a waiting area.

As our clinic is sponsored in part by Vancouver Legal Aid, non-students from the area around the school may be referred to our clinic by Legal Aid. The basic requirement for all users of this clinic is they must have a limited income.



## Needed - Educational Student Representative Nominations

### VOTERS LIST

1. The Secretary shall obtain from the Registrar a list of full-time students registered in each Division.
2. The voters list for each Division shall be posted in the Divisional Office and in the Student Activity Centre.

### ELIGIBILITY

Full-time students shall be eligible to vote to nominate and be nominated as candidates in the election for the member representing the Division in which they are registered.

### NOMINATING PROCEDURES

1. Nominations open Oct. 9, 1979.
2. The Secretary shall notify the Deans and the Department Heads, the Divisional Student Technology Representatives and the President of the Student Association of the election. [October 18, 19, 1979].
3. Nomination forms shall be available from the office of

the Secretary [Room 229A, Administration Building], the President of the Student Association and the Divisional Student Technology Representatives.

4. Only those eligible to vote in each election shall be eligible to nominate and be nominated.
5. Nomination papers must be signed by the person nominating the candidate.
6. The nominee must indicate his/her acceptance of the nomination by signing the nomination form.
7. Nomination forms must be received by the Secretary of the Council by 4:00 p.m. on the closing date for nominations: October 12, 1979.
8. The Secretary shall forward a list of nominees to the President of the Student Association, the Deans, the Department Heads, the Divisional Student Technology Representatives, the Library, the Link and B.C.I.T. Developments.
9. The Secretary shall consult with the President of the Student Association and the Deans as to suitable sites for posting the list of nominees of the election.
10. An all candidates meeting for each Division may be held of Wednesday, Oct. 17, 1979 from 12:00 noon to 1:00 p.m.

### VOTING PROCEDURES

1. Polls shall be set up as follows:  
October 18, 1979 - North Foyer  
October 19, 1979 - Student Activity Centre
2. No proxy votes shall be accepted.
3. The Secretary shall make appropriate arrangements for those students who are off-campus because of field trips, clinical experience, practicums, or other Institute educational projects to cast their votes in advance polls.

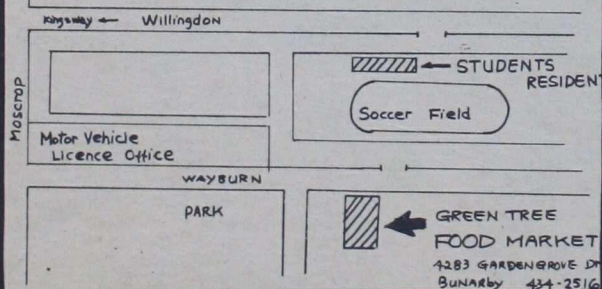

# Could you get a job ?

This is reprinted from the 1979-1980 University and College Planning Annual.

A survey of employers across Canada was conducted by the University and College Placement Association to accumulate data on the attitudes Canadian private and public sector employers value in prospective employees.

The scenario presented in this survey was as follows:

You are interviewing a group of college and/or university trained students who will be graduating shortly. None of the candidates has any related work experience. Presuming that all have the technical ability to do the job, how important are the following factors in making your selection (presuming you could judge)?

Seventeen attitudinal factors were listed and 108 employers rated these on a five point scale ranging from very important to not important. Rated as the five most important factors were:

## 1) Ability to communicate

This quality is probably the easiest one to evaluate since the interview is face to face encounter in verbal and non-verbal communication. Many recruiters will try to help the communications process by asking questions such as, **Would you**

tell me a little about the jobs you have held, how they were obtained and why you left? Others will test your 'ability to communicate' by more challenging questions such as, 'What is your major weakness?'

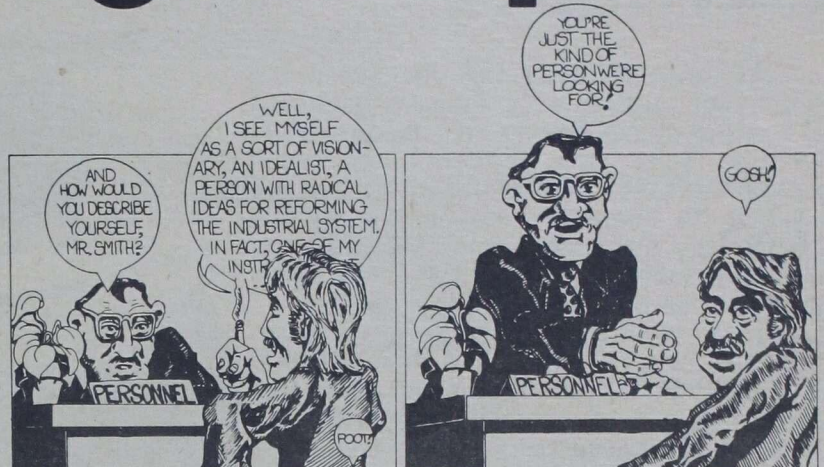
## 2) Willingness to take initiative

This trait is an important one for any person who wishes to prove himself/herself on the job. In an interview it can be demonstrated if you answer **How do you spend your spare time?** or, **What have you done in your life that demonstrates initiative?** in a satisfactory manner.

## 3) Willingness to accept responsibility

A good manager must be responsible not only for his/her own work projects but for the functioning of the whole department which may involve a number of employees. Questions such as the following are asked during an interview to determine whether the individual has managerial potential. **How old were you when you became self-supporting? Describe the work environment which best suits your work style. What kind of boss would you ideally like to work for? What is your attitude towards overtime work?**

**4) Leadership potential**  
Many employers believe that leaders are born, not made.



Regardless of whether or not you agree with this opinion, there is evidence to prove that people who generally get top management positions demonstrated their leadership potential quite early in life. If, during the interview, you were able to prove by examples that you had served on the executive of student clubs or outside organizations, the recruiter would most likely assume that you possess this trait.

## 5) Ambitious/motivated

One way of determining motivation is to test whether or not the candidate has plans for his/her future. **What do you hope to be doing five years from now? If employed by this company, which department would interest you the most in the long term, and what salary do you suspect?** help the recruiter assess your ambition.

Listed below are other factors in order of importance along with questions an interviewer might pose to determine their presence in a potential candidate.

## 6) Intelligent

**What have you learned from the jobs you have held? What were your grades in high school, at college?**

## 7) High energy level

**What do you do when you are not working or studying?**

## 8) Self-confident

**Why should I hire you for the job? What qualifications do you have that make you feel you will be successful in your field?**

## 9) Self Confident

## 9) Sociable/ gets along well with others

**Define co-operation. What type of people rub you the wrong way? How do you feel about team work.**

## 12) Outgoing and friendly

Often this trait is easily recognizable in an interview situation by the way you respond to the interviewers questions.

## 13) Persistent

**Would you describe some**



## 10) Imagination

**What can you contribute to their company and what in particular interests you about their products, or service?**

## 11) Flexibility

**Describe some of the changes you've made in your life. Can you give me some examples of how you have adapted to changes in your life?**

**obstacles you have overcome in your life?**

## 14) Aggressive

**If you are pleased with an employee's work, how would you handle it?**

## 15) Orderly

**Describe your work habits.**

## 16) Independent

**How much supervision do you wish in a work situation? What kind of work do you prefer and why? [research or a more routine kind of day-to-day work?]**

## 17) Seeks help and advice

**Should you encounter a difficult problem at work would you prefer to grapple with it for a number of hours on your own or would you consult with a colleague or supervisor first?**

**Mobility of candidates** was mentioned by a number of employers as being an additional factor important to them when making selections. It is important to note that recruiters have different expectations when asking mobility questions.

If you are asked **Do you prefer any specific location? Why?** the interviewer usually wants to know if you are familiar with the companies various office locations and also what ties you (familial or otherwise) bind you to one location or another.

**Are you willing to go anywhere the company sends you?** is a wide open question which may throw candidates off because they usually imagine being sent to an undesirable place. However, it may mean only would you work at any one of the our companies locations?

Of the companies which participated in the survey the average number of employees was 5,796, with a range from 16 to 50,000. The average number of graduates recruited last year was 54, with a range of 2 to 550.

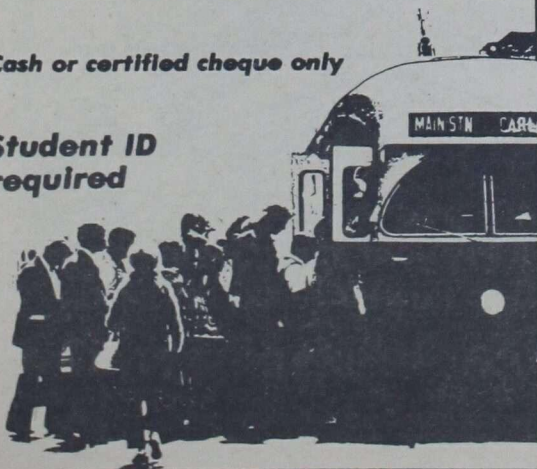

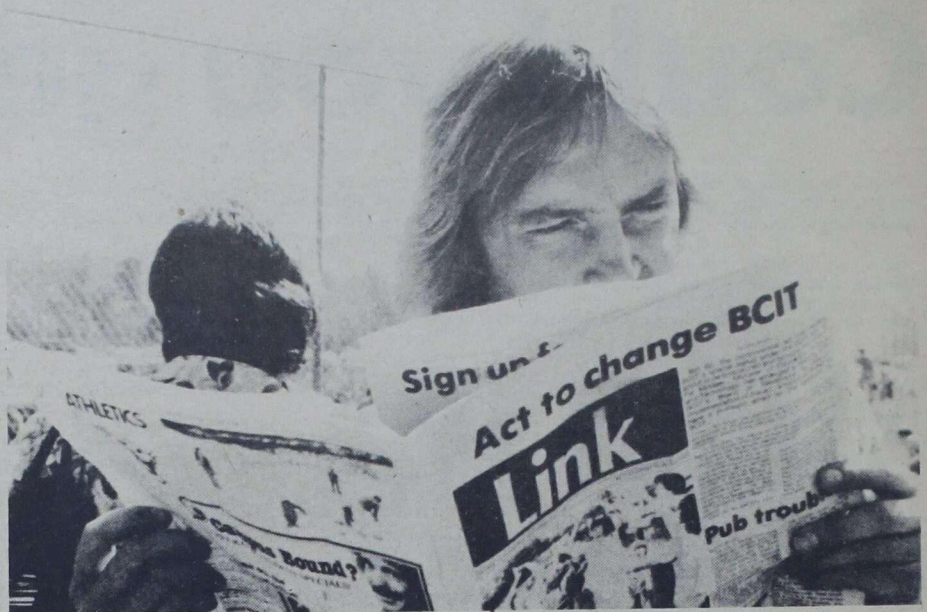

population, the SA Council, or even between themselves.

SA President, Jennifer Moore, feels that the present organization of the council creates 'too many channels of communication', and that 'the SA proposal was that the three already elected Division chairpersons would be the ideal people to sit on the Council.'

As with the Staff Society, the SA proposal also stressed that the Chairman of the Council be elected from within the Council, rather than establishing the principal as the non-voting chairman.

However, since the board has approved bylaws forming the Educational Council, and is now arranging the elections, the Staff Society is willing to see what happens.

Margaret Brisco, Staff Society President, puts it this way, 'Our current stance is that although we still have reservations about the size, composition, and method of elections; we

are keeping an open mind at this point about the Educational Council, and are co-operating with the Board. The Society certainly supports the need for an Educational Council.'

Nominations for the three elected student positions open on October 9th and close on the 12th. Following that, there will be an all candidates meeting on the 17th.

The actual election will take place on two days at two locations: on the 18th in the North Foyer and on October 19th in the SAC.

Only full time students are eligible to be nominated or to vote in the election of student representatives. All members of the council will be required to attend one evening meeting per month. The first meeting will be October 25 and will be from 7 to 10pm. From then on, the meetings are on the third Thursday of each month with

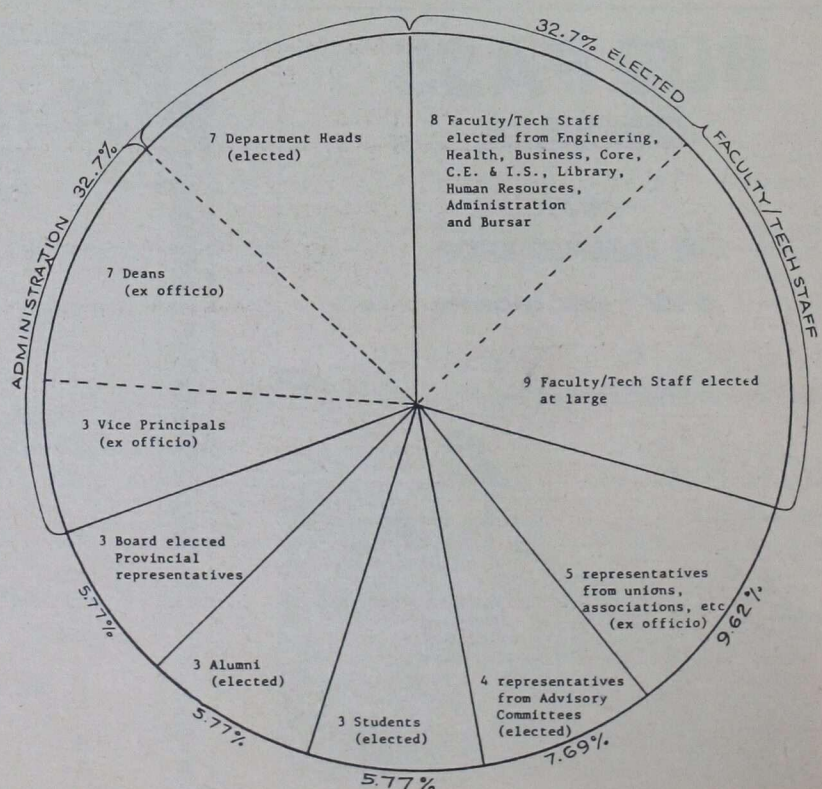
the exception of July and August.

According to Pat Maertz, Board Secretary and soon to be secretary to the Educational Council, 'One of the first topics will be the Educational five year plan, it will be up to the council to decide how to deal with it.'

The main function of the Council is to deal with educational matters and make recommendations to the Board of Governors through the Principal. For example, once the council has decided what they feel should be done with the five year plan (which is used by the board and the institute to act as a guideline for growth and expansion of BCIT as a post secondary education facility) they will give it to Principal Gordon Thom who will then put the proposal before the board for their approval.

As with board meetings, the Educational Council meetings will be open to the public

# Student parking update

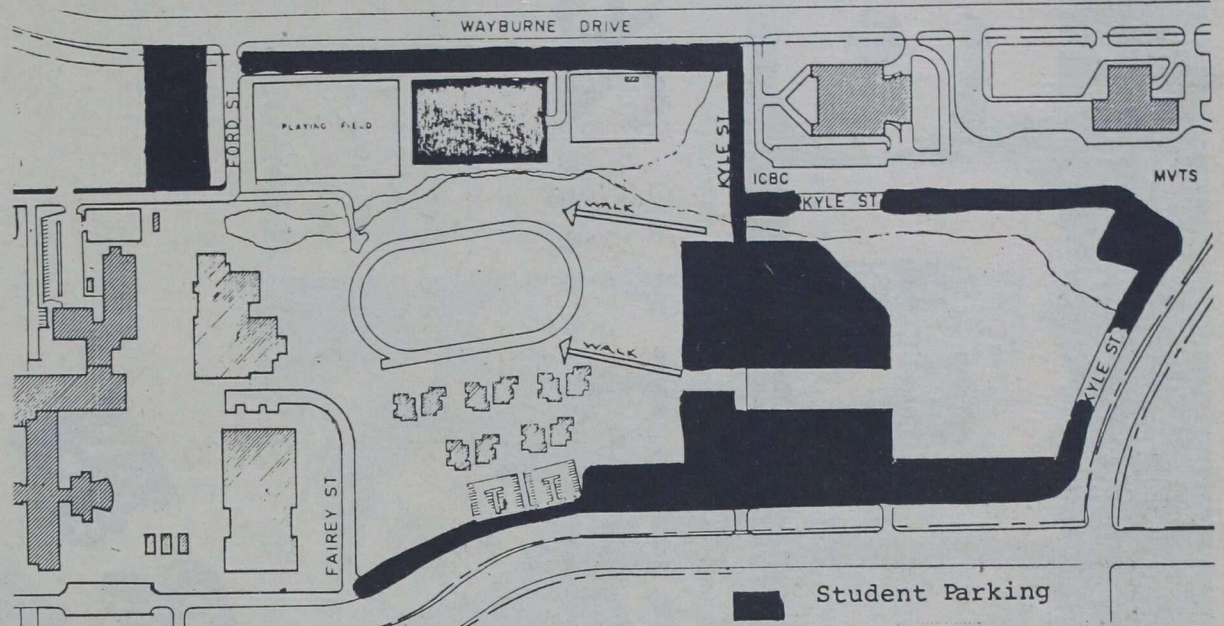
The 'teachers' lot, which faces Wayburne, was resealed over the summer while the scramble and new lots remain unpaved. Would you like to know why? Read on O ye of little faith and torn undercarriage.

The 'resealing' job was done by a government company called BCBC (British Columbia Building Corporation). Actually, it is BCBC that owns the property and buildings of this institute, not BCIT. As owners and 'landlord', BCBC is in charge of all general maintenance around the school. The resealing job on the instructors lot was a 'maintenance' project not a 'development' project.

For those of you who like numbers, the cost was between \$25,000 and \$30,000. A lot of money until you look at the price of paving, which works out to be about \$100 per parking space. BCBC had the resealing project included in their general maintenance plan for the year, along with the paving of the roadway and small parking area along Willingdon. Both of these projects were completed this summer.

## Student lots

The new lot and the scramble lot were to be paved through a development project taken by a private contractor, independent of BCBC. The private contractor and his sub-contractors were at work about the same time the instructors' lot was being resealed. However, in clearing the new lot area, it was discovered that the ground needed to be filled several more times than expected. The bid by the private contractor could not cover the costs of the extra filling, paving, and lighting, so at the moment paving is the last priority.



## Turn on lights

"Lighting in that back area is a higher priority than paving, in my mind," states Neal Chadwick, in charge of Safety and Security here at BCIT.

Bases for the post lamps and electrical lines are in the new lot and scramble lot, and lights should be operational within a month. A contractual error is responsible for the delay in completion. The sub in charge of lighting used the wrong size bolts in the concrete bases so all the bolts must be changed before the lamp standards can go in.

"There's no reason for the mistake...except that when you're dealing with contractors and their subcontractors at the same time, mistakes can happen. You hope they won't but

sometimes they do," confides Chadwick.

When finally complete, the lighting should be a relief to students staying late at school, who now must walk half a mile to their cars in the pitch black.

## For right now

With paving at a standstill, what is the answer to the ruts and potholes now in the scramble lot, and sure to follow in the new lot? Grading and filling is the only affordable option at the moment. It costs approximately \$2000 to grade the entire scramble lot compared to paving at \$100 per space. The scramble lot will be graded by BCBC before changing the parking layout with the positioning of new concrete headers.

Concrete headers in a new layout are supposed to allow

more cars (more?) to park with greater organization in the scramble lot. The grading and the headers along with the lighting should be completed 'imminently'. Within a month? 'Soon', is all Chadwick can promise. 'Work can only be done on weekends, so workers don't block student parking during class hours.'

## More fine print

Bill 82 could affect parking development at BCIT. If BCBC hands control of buildings and property to BCIT itself, there won't be more money for development, but there will be one less step to deal with to get things done. BCIT could become

its own landlord and hold open control of maintenance and development. But more on that if and when it happens...

## Rumours

The money for paving the scramble lot and the new lot might be on the way. Informed sources have it that the Ministry of Education's allocation for Public Works spending comes up next month could include a sizable chunk for parking. If that happens paving will get underway on fairweather weekends as soon as possible. Neal Chadwick is hoping EVERYTHING will be completed during this school year...so is your undercarriage.

### PENALTIES:

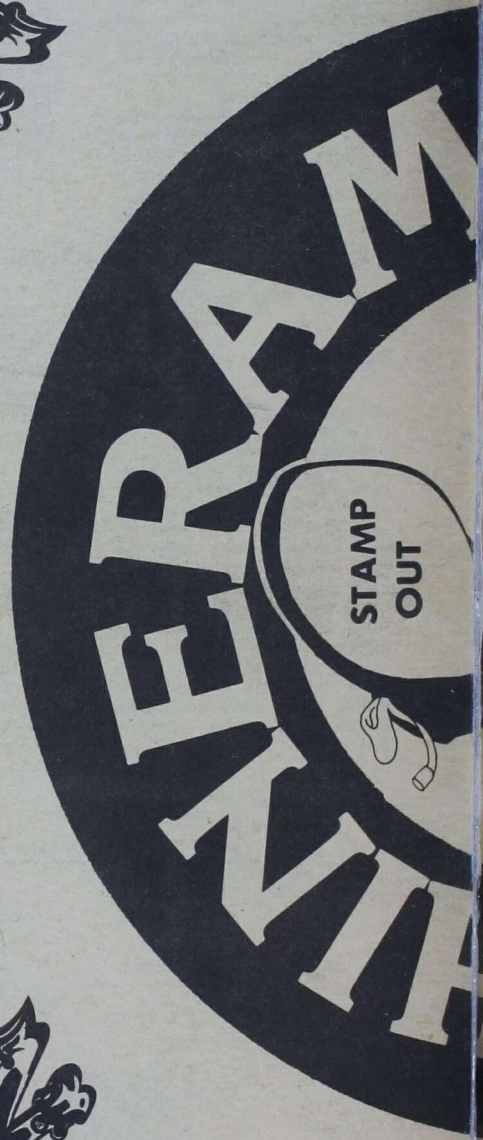
21. Improperly parked vehicles will be removed at the owner's expense (day or evening). Cases where tow away may be effected would include the following:

  - (c) Vehicles parked blocking off another properly parked vehicle or in any way that impedes the free movement of traffic.



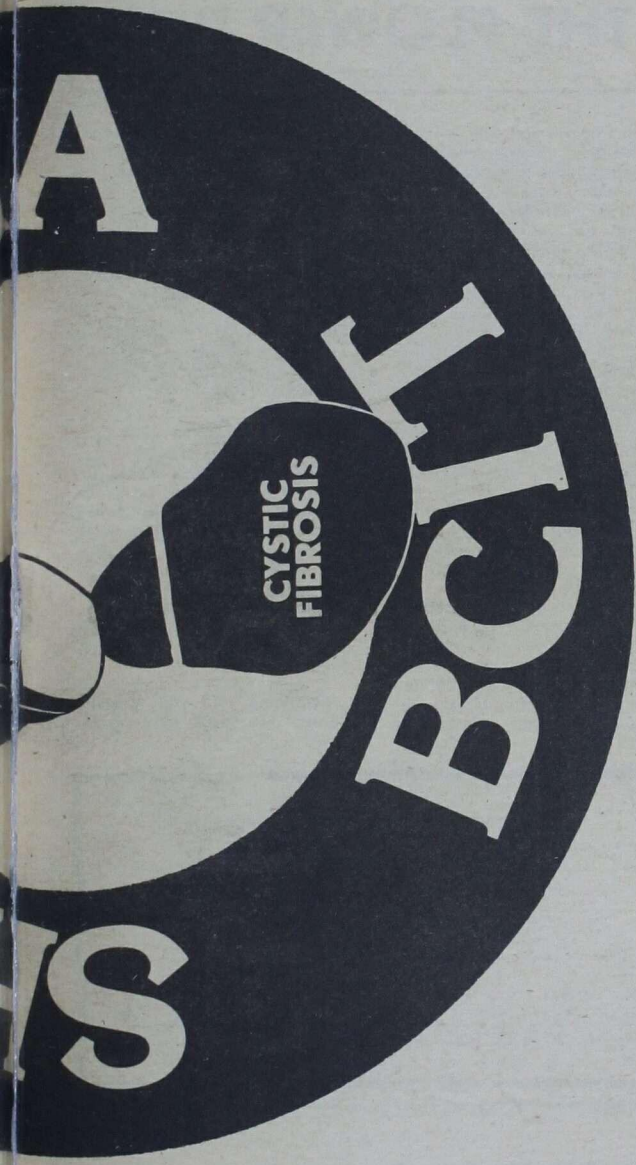

## THE FLOWER POT

**Don't drown your plants!** one of the most common ailments of houseplants is overwatering. That 'every-third-day' rule does not work for every plant. You should get into the habit of feeling the surface of the soil in your plants' pot. If the soil is dry, then water your plants. Give them a thorough good soaking. The water should seep out of the holes at the bottom of the pot. (And make sure you dump out any and all water left standing in the saucer below--very few plants enjoy having 'wet feet') Don't water your plants until the soil dries out on the surface again. The length of time this takes depends on a variety of things; the type of soil, the size of the plant, the size and type of pot, and the temperature.

If your plant does not respond well to this watering technique, I suggest that you look up more specific cultural information. There are numerous library books on housplants in our library; the call number is SB419.

Do you need something tall and elegant-looking to disguise the corner where you pile your dirty gaunch? Try a **Dragon's Blood Tree** (*Draceana marginata*), this plant has bare stems with a criss-cross pattern on it, topped with a bunch of long, narrow leaves. The leaves are dark green edged with red. The Dragon's Blood tree will grow in fairly dark locations, and needs watering only after it has gone really dry.

If you prefer a plant that looks somewhat more sturdy, you may want a **Dieffenbachia**. There are many species, all having broad leaves (6 inches to 18 inches long) that are combinations of green and white (or yellow). Diefenbachia's don't mind being neglected--low light and occasional drought are OK. Now and then you should wipe off any dust that accumulates on the leaves.

## LITTLE RIVER BAND-First Under The Wire:

This is LRB's fourth album... and by far their fourth success. I was a 'sort-of not/sort of yes' fan of LRB, until I purchased 'First Under The Wire'.
