Math and Science education:

in need of an "attitude adjustment?"

BCIT Broadcasting students and Marketing and Development staff pulled out all the stops to produce a video-taped panel discussion on math and science education.

October 16.


Over 120 high school math and science teachers spent the morning as members of the studio audience in the video-taped television discussion answering the question: Does science and math education need an attitude adjustment?

The answer was a resounding YES. Moderated by veteran broadcaster Don Hamilton, the panel discussion included Len Reimer, the vice principal of Kerrisdale Elementary, BCIT math instructor Louise Routledge, new CBC-TV science correspondent Lorraine Graves, scientist and astronaut finalist Dr. John Boyce, and former Vancouver Sun science writer and director of Policy and Planning for MAETT Tim Padmore.

The 90-minute discussion will be available to any educators requesting copies of the tape. As well, plans are in the works for a shorter version of the debate to be used on Knowledge Network.

remier Michael Harcourt made his first visit to BCIT as premier October 16, spending the morning touring the campus and speaking at a jammed lecture hall on his reasons for voting Yes in the October 26 national referendum.

Over 200 staff, students and news media attended the speech in SW1 1205 to hear the premier and Liberal MLA David Mitchell speak in support of the Charlottetown Accord.

Introduced by new student association President Lyle Boivin whose arm was in a sling, the premier joked that "BCIT is pretty hard on its student president."

Prior to the speech, the premier visited the Broadcast Centre where he spoke to over 100 high school teachers on campus to attend a special panel discussion on science and math education. The tour continued to the Student Activity Centre, Financial Management, Cardiology, Fish and Wildlife and the Carpentry, Millwork and Machine shops before ending at the public meeting.

Wearing BCIT rugby shirts,
Harcourt and Mitchell fielded
numerous questions from students
about the accord. Both said that the
accord represents a rare moment of
consensus that will not be repeated
again if it is rejected.

By October 20, it was confirmed that Secretary of State for External Affairs Barbara McDougall would visit the campus to speak on the accord and Pacific Rim trade on October 20. Gordon Wilson, provincial Liberal leader, will speak at noon on October 23 for the No side of the referendum.

Another element discovered...

In response to your "Administratium" article it's time to announce that the staff at Sea Island Campus (who teach Aircraft Maintenance, Avionics, Structures and Gas Turbine Overhaul and operate the well known fleet of aircraft known as "AirBCIT" out of the South Terminal of Vancouver International Airport), has long been aware of a substance as powerful and as baffling as "Administratium." This substance is called "Unobtainium." This complex element is both widespread yet extremely difficult to locate. When combined with "Administratium." During the summer BCIT business administration grad Tim Kocsar applied for a special internship with External Affairs based at the Canadian Embassy in Washington, D.C. In August he learned that he had been selected but the catch was that he had to pay all his own expenses -- flight, room and board, everything. In August he came to BCIT for help in raising the money. Through a quick media blitz and a few telephone calls, Tim successfully raised the \$5,000 he needed. Here is a September 30 letter from Tim:

Dear Marilyn, Susan, Cathy and everyone who helped out.

Well its been an exciting month. In the last four weeks I've seen so many places and talked to so many people. For example, the first day at work I attended a Senate Finance Committee on NAFTA. I spoke with several senators about their perspectives on Canada's involvement in the deal. I also spoke with a representative from Mitsubishi Headquarters and got a tentative job offer to teach English in the context of Canadian Business. Presently I am following up on this. I also got invited to a party at the Mexican Embassy from my counterpart in that Embassy. As you can imagine I'm having the time of my life. Every day something new and exciting takes place. Last Friday I went to a Capitals game along with the other interns. Afterwards we all went out for dinner with two of the players who were Canadian, one from Burnaby.

As for work, I find that I'm getting a lot of experience. I did not realize that I had the right combination of work experience and academic studies for the position. One of the strongest aspects was my computer experience from BCIT. I have used Lotus, WordPerfect and dBase. Everyday I send messages to many places over North America concerning matters in Congress. Working in the Congressional Relations section also requires writing skills. I have made several reports on NAFTA and sent
