All meetings to be attended

Engineering Society Chairperson Brent Simpson was fined \$45 (one half of his monthly honorarium) by the rest of the S.A. executive at last Thursday's executive meeting. The reason for levying the fine was Simpson's absence from the meeting. According to the S.A. constitution, executive members are expected to attend all meetings of council and executive.


If a member is unable to attend a meeting, he or she is required to notify the Vice-President, Internal, in writing, prior to the meeting.

If notice in writing is not received or if the executive feels that the excuse for absence is not valid, the constitution calls for the penalty meted out. Simpson has a past record of missing meetings and it appears that since no written notice was given, the executive felt that Simpson's actions deserved their reaction.

Rob Seines reported that construction on the Maquinna residence is on schedule and that the facility will be ready for September, 1978. However, he also noted that due to cost overuns in certain areas there will be cutbacks in others. An example of this is landscaping which will be cut by \$30,000 to ensure proper furnishing of the interior. The reason for the budget shuffling is said to be inflation and upgrading above CMHC standards for some items, such as doors.

The S.A. is about to institute a new policy regarding technologysponsored pubs and dances. From this point onward, technologies wishing to sponsor these events will be required to post a \$25 performance bond. reason for this is that the S.A. feels it can no longer subsidize losses on these affairs. In the executive's opinion, the losses are caused by a lack of organization on the part of the sponsoring group. This policy will be in effect for the rest of this term with a newly revised policy to be applied next year.



On Wednesday, March 15, 12 noon, the BCIT Outdoors Club will be sponsoring a slide presentation of 3 treks in the Himalayas by Zdenek Prochazka. His presentation includes two pre-programmed slide projectors, background music of Nepales people, of the Himalayan monastaries and of J.S Bach, together with some poetry and narrative. Tax and the student

In this, our first advice column on "Tax and the Student", we will be examining special deductions for students. attempting to direct our tax advice to the broadest cross section of students as is possible. We hope you will find the advice beneficial. In future articles, we will be examining RRSP's and RHOSP's as well as a special issue on taxation and your graduating year.
SPECIAL DEDUCTIONS FOR

STUDENTS:

1. Tuition Fees-- you will notice when you get your receipt from BCIT that the tuition fee for tax purposes does not equal the actual amount you paid. This is because deductable tuition fees do not include books, caution accounts, student union fees, insurances, etc. Note that your tuition fee may only be claimed by students. However, it can be claimed by you even if it is paid for by your parents, employers, or anybody else, regardless of your source, you are entitled to the full deduction. Also note that you may claim your tuition fees on either a calendar year or any 12 month period commencing in the tax year for which you are filing a return.

Option A--claim tuition fees on

calendar year

Tax Year 1 Sept to Dec. (term 1) Tax Year 2 Jan to Dec(term 2,3) Tax Year 3 Jan to May (term 4)

Tax Year 1 Sept-May(terms 1,2) Tax Year 2 Sept-May(terms 3,4) . no deductions Tax Year 3

You will note that by using the calendar year to claim tuition fees, you are in effect distributing the expense over three taxation years. Year 1 being entitled to the first half of your first year of fees, year 2 being entitled to the second half of first year fees, and the first half of second year fees, and finally, year 3 being entitled to the second half of second year This contrasts with the fiscal basis, wherein the full tuition expense is claimed in each of years 1 and 2, while year 3 is not entitled to a deduction.

You should note that once you have established a basis, either calendar or fiscal in your first year, you may not change. Therefore, second year students must continue with their first year tax activity, while first year students have the option of planning tuition expenses. Most students will pay less total tax if they claim tuition deductions over 3 years (ie on a calendar basis).

2. Education Deduction: You are entitled to a \$50 per month deduction for any month in which you were a full time student at a recognized post-secondary institution, ie, BCIT. You may claim this deduction for a complete month, even if you were a student

only part of the month. Therefore, students on the term basis deduct for September through May, while quarterly students may deduct for September through June, and nursing students who are on campus for the summer months, are entitled to June, July and August. Note that you ceased to be a student after final exams, not at convo-If your other cation date. deductions will reduce your taxable income to nil, then any part of this education deduction not taken by you, may be claimed by a supporting individual, ie, your parents. This provision applies only when your taxable income has been reduced to zero and

when you're being supported by an individual while attending

3. Moving Expenses: If you have moved a distance of at least 25 miles to attend BCIT, you may be able to deduct those moving expenses from any income you earn at your new location (but not your old location). Your moving

expense deduction may not exceed your income from the new That income might consist of wages from a part time job or the taxable portion of scholarships, bursaries, or grants. (Note that the first \$500 of a scholarship, bursary, or grant is tax free. The balance is taxable continuerd on p. 6

The finger of blam

In conversations over the past weeks with both Student Association 'executives and Student Services. it seems that both sides are about to attempt a move toward a better working relationship. While the concern of the SA people seems to be constructive criticism of themselves and the SA to find a viable solution (e.g. restructuring the SS department, hiring a student ombudsman to work for the SA), the Student Services people are more concerned with looking backward in time to find the original cause of the problem.

The problem does exist. Circling around it in a "cover your ass" operation will not help achieve the objective both parties are seeking. Being able to point the finger of blame at either side wil only aggrevate the problem, not alleviate it. The time has come for both sides to start co-operating and working towards what is, philosophically at least, a common goal: providing services for the students of BCIT.

There seems to be a degree of unrest in the Bursar's Office cerning the withdra- ble deterrent it is.

wal of students who are late in paying their fees. The problem appears to be centred around the amount of paperwork involved in warning and then confirming student withdrawal for failure to pay.

According to present institute policy, a student who is delinquent in paying his or her fees is sent two letters of warning. If payment is not then received, a letter confirming student withdrawal is sent. However, the student can immediately be reinstated upon payment of fees and a \$10 reinstatement charge. Considering that the goal of BCIT is to prepare students for a responsible position in society, it hardly seems consistent to accomodate the irresponsible few who fail to meet the fee payment deadline met by the vast majority of students.

Unless a stiffer penalty is assessed for tardy fee payment, the incentive for prompt payment is just about non-existent. Foster's Lager: An Australian beer which very rarely_makes it. up here; nevertheless, Foster's is renowned as the Aussie beer for up-chucks (enjoying yourself in reverse). The guide claims it has very little character. They obviously haven't read the Barry McKenzie Phrase Book. Five

Heidelberg: Indescribable odour and flavour. Aftertaste fine if you need a strong purgative (!) (spoiled?).

Heineken Lager: Light colour, above average head, medium light bouquet. A shade too dry and salty. Five mugs. Kokanee Pilsener: Ratty ar-



Guys work asses off

Due to circumstances beyond by control--I'm back (no fanfare, please).

By the time you read this, the four members of Bazooka Joe will be midway through a week of rest. After two hectic weeks of performance after performance, it'll take at least a week for their amps to cool off. Last week was not too bad, they were at the Surf every night, but the week before and during the Telethon, those guys worked their asses off. Bazooka Joe played some nine or ten (at least) times that week. Wednesday noon and Friday night they were here at BCIT. They did a number of high school concerts through the week, one night at the Surf Saturday and Sunday at the Telethon, even leaving the Telethon Saturday for a quick appearance at a marathon roller skating benefit in Surrey or somewhere.

The whole idea, or course, was to expose the band to as many people as possible, particularly those who might buy their records at some future date. They are aiming at the AM radio market, subsequently, Bazooka Joe's debut album, which they hope to record in May will be "commercial rock" oriented. They certainly have enough material for an album. Between four of them they have written over 120 songs. Individually they have each collected awards or honours at various music

and writing festivals. Michael Lee Buscher, the oldest member of the group at 27, plays lead quitar, and it's mentioned that he has studied under many great guitarists, including the late Jimi Hendrix. Don Forgey plays bass and sings lead vocals in most of their songs, Johnny Morrison plays rhythm, 12 string guitar, and does some of the vocals. The drummer is Peter St.

These four guys are extremely versatile, and have quite a large repertoire. Wednesday and Friday they played all sorts of both recent and old hard and soft rock. The best song they did on Friday night was Deep Purple's SMOKE ON THE WATER, with Peter taking over lead vocal. From the Bay City Rollers and Rod. Stewart to Led Zeppelin and Uriah Heep, Bazooka Joe have got the songs people want to hear. Of course, this is necessary for a club band such as Bazooka Joe to survive. If you want to be in demand, you have to do other people's music.

The difference between Bazooka Joe and other club bands is the motivation. This motivation comes from their manager, Heidi Klein. Many managers and agents will only look at the percentage they get and neglect the band they are handling. This results in the band getting stuck in a rut, so to speak. They may have constant work, but it'll be night club after night club, with no chance of advancement. This is where Heidi's importance comes in. She has given Bazooka Joe the support and encouragement they need, and booked them all over to give them lots of exposure. It must be a good working relationship. When I talked to Heidi she said that Bazooka Joe was a hard working band. When I talked to the band, they said that Heidi was a hard working

income.) Those items which qualify as moving expenses are (a) travelling costs, including meals and lodging; (b) cost of transporting and storing furniture incurred in the course of moving; (c) meals and lodging for self and members of your household for a period not exceeding 15 days; (d) costs of cancelling an old lease, (e) cost of selling your old residence. To make this claim. request form T1-M and the pamphlet, "Moving Expenses" from the District Taxation Office, 1166W. Pender St., Vancouver. Note that you are also entitled

to expenses when you relocate to your original community after graduation. These moving expenses would then be deducted from the first year's income at your new job. Anv excess expense deduction which cannot be absorbed by current income may be carried forward 1 year into the next year's income.

4. Scholarships, Bursaries and Grants: The first \$500 you receive per year is tax free. Any amount you receive in a year in excess of this amount, must be reported a taxable income. However, you should note that student loans which, of course must be repaid, are not taxable, while the grant portion is.

5. You as a deduction: If you are being supported while at-tending BCIT by either your parents or spouse or other individual with whom you reside, they may make a claim for you as a dependant, IF your net income does not exceed \$2,370. See line 40 on page 2 of your 1977 T1 return. They may also be able to claim your education deduction to the full amount of \$50 per month. However, they may not under any circumstances, claim your tuition fees even if they've paid for them.

We have been advised by the Bursar's Office that your receipt for income tax purposes is in the If you have specific questions regarding tax law, phone Revenue Canada Taxation at 689-5411. They are most helpful and will offer explicit explanations to your particular problems. Next week, we will review RRSP's, RHOSP's and taxation of income in your graduating year.
