A day in the life of a program advisor

Although a program advisor's day may start out fairly structured, flexibility is key in responding to external and internal client needs. Four major functions take up an advisor's day, but often unexpected events lead to a gear shift and redirection on short notice.

The first portion of each day is spent returning phone requests to speak with an advisor that have come in the previous day. On average, 2,000 advising interviews are conducted by phone each month.

After calls have been returned, advisors conduct half-hour personal interviews throughout the day, averaging 365 interviews conducted each month.

Since July 1996, clients have been given the option of corresponding with advisors via e-mail. Each advisor now spends part of the day responding to more than 500 e-mail inquiries received each month.


The Program Advising department's toll-free line is in operation four afternoons each week and receives approximately 300 calls monthly.

The focus of telephone, e-mail and in-person advising is on serving college/university students and graduates, people exploring career changes, displaced workers requiring retraining, clients funded under special government initiatives, and high school students.

Program advisors assist prospective students in making sound education decisions by providing information on:

- BCIT courses and programs
- Entrance Program requirements, prerequisite planning and upgrading strategies
- Application and admissions processes
- · What to expect from the program
- · Job opportunities and job placement rates for BCIT graduates
- · Part-time studies courses and programs
- Formalizing certificate programs and transfer credit agreements, and transfer credit agreements between BCIT and companies.

Part of every advisor's day is spent playing detective: tracking down and clarifying information from program areas, service areas and external

agencies, in an effort to provide accurate and up-to-date information on programs, courses and services to clients.

In addition to those core duties, program advisors participate in Information Sessions held by many BCIT program areas throughout the year. In the 1997/98 academic year, advisors participated in 50 Information Sessions.

Most program advisors have other administrative duties including advising via the regular mail system, managing Institute publications inventories, responding to internal and external requests for publications, coordinating BCIT's participation in the

provincial high school liaison program and acting as the Advising representative in Institute Recruitment Review Group meetings. They also undertake special initiatives. For example, advisors are coordinating and will be hosting a new Institute-wide High School Counselors Update day set for February 1999.

From late September through early February, two of six advisors in any given week are travelling around the province on a rotating basis, visiting high schools, colleges to promote and recruit for BCIT programs. Advisors also attend several career fairs throughout the province each year.

Leaders in metalworking make major donation

Two leading companies in the field of high-quality metal-working have donated \$125,000 worth of equipment to BCIT's machine shop.

Thomas Skinner and Son Ltd. and Haas Automation Inc. have donated 16 training simulators for computercontrolled machining, which keeps BCIT on the leading edge of the machining industry.

"Training on the latest equipment is vital for our students," said Kate Pelletier, associate dean of manufacturing and industrial/mechanical programs at BCIT. "That lets us ensure our graduates have the kind of skills needed to work in today's

competitive manufacturing industries."

Included in the donation is a sizable contribution toward the purchase of two computer-controlled metalworking machines.

"British Columbia machine shops are producing highly engineered parts for clients including Boeing, Raytheon, Spar Aerospace and others," says Rob Silins, marketing coordinator for Richmondbased equipment distributor Thomas Skinner. "That wouldn't be possible without a well-trained and well-equipped workforce."

A BCIT student team took top prize among 783 teams at an international problem-solving competition in late spring.

The six-member team, comprised of full and part-time BCIT students studying Business and Engineering programs, won its division at the world championships of Odyssey of the Mind, a U.S. education-oriented organization devoted to fostering creativity and problem-solving.

"It comes down to

teamwork," says team member Sarah Garriock, 22, a secondyear Marketing Management student. "We have to work effectively in teams, take risks and accept other people's ideas to be successful."

"We've always required our students to work in teams, solving complex problems as part of their training," says president Brian Gillespie. "That's an important skill both on the job and in life."

Boeing 757 training takes flight in east

BCIT offers the only course of its kind not provided by Boeing or an airline.

BCIT has completed the first offering of its five-week, full-time Boeing 757 course

in Toronto for Royal Air Lines.
The Institute now delivers
the only approved course

Canada-wide — what's unique is that the training is usually delivered by Boeing or by an airline, rather than by a third party such as BCIT.

Instructors Bob Rorison, Gord Weir and Bill Scott delivered the new material, which trains aircraft maintenance engineers to certify an aircraft as 'fit for return to service' after maintenance. Canadian law requires this certification after any maintenance check or repair work is performed on large aircraft.

"To my knowledge, there is no other institute offering this level of 'type' technical training to industry," comments Dave Mitchell, Associate Dean of Aviation.

The industry designates courses in this kind of training by "type": in this case, the

"type" is a Boeing 757.

Transport Canada requires an engineer to complete a "type" course before signing out the aircraft for flight.

Course development and accreditation included instructor training at an airline and at Boeing's Seattle Training Centre. Transport Canada inspected the course material, reviewed instructor qualifications and audited the training facilities.

"It puts BCIT in the same league with the carriers [the airlines] that normally deliver this type of training," Mitchell says.

Course assessments indicate that the students and the company are extremely pleased with the new product. BCIT is currently negotiating with Canada 3000 for a similar course to run in the fall.

Around the province in 90 days



6:30 a.m. Sept. 21, 1998 — Three post-secondary liaison representatives load into a car, armed with eight boxes of publications and one suitcase each. The map is at the ready and the team assesses if there is time to grab takeout coffee and make it to Spuzzum Senior Secondary by 8:30 a.m. The 1998/99 liaison season has begun!

The BCSSCLP (British Columbia Secondary School and College Liaison Program) is a coordinated high school and college liaison program. BCIT, SFU, UBC and UVIC are full members of the program and share the responsibility of managing and planning the program each year. UNBC, OLA, Trinity Western University, Emily Carr Institute of Art & Design are associate members — they participate in some, but not all, of the annual visits. Most of B.C. Colleges participate in the school visits in their region.

The coordinated liaison program typically runs from the last week in September to February each year. In that time, representatives from the various post-secondary institutions will meet with students from more than 280 secondary schools and 14 colleges. The coordinated visit program spans the entire province, from Port Hardy to Sparwood and from White Rock to Fort St. John.

Program advisors provide the link between BCIT and high school students and their communities throughout the province. During the 1997-98 liaison season, program advisors met with 10,899 prospective students. The direct result of the liaison efforts of the Program Advising department is an increased awareness of the educational opportunities offered by BCIT.

The numbers show that our recruitment activities are paying off — both applications and enrolments are on the rise.

A typical liaison day is well on its way by 7:00 a.m. Travel time varies depending on the location of the school, and sessions

the school day. Program advisors conduct three 30-40 minute presentations in the morning, move on to another school for three more presentations then wind up the average day with a Counsellor's meeting. In usual circumstances, the day would end

correspond with the start of

here; however, during the liaison season, a program advisor's day is even longer. School visits are often scheduled in the evening, giving parents and other community members the chance to participate. At day's end, the program advisors head back to

the hotel to rest up for the next long day.

If you think staying in hotels is glamorous, the program advisors may have another opinion. For example, on one visit, an advisor was surprised to find the key to her hotel room

door also opened the locks to all of the rooms in the hotel, which meant that every hotel guest had access to her room!

Once a mix-up with hotel reservations caused the hotel to be overbooked. One of the liaison team members stayed the night in the hotel's storage

closet — "stiff neck" was an understatement!

When visiting unknown parts of the province, navigation can be a challenge. The liaison team often depends on directions provided by people in the community. Sometimes those directions just don't make sense: on one occasion a team found themselves at the B.C./ Alberta border when they were supposed to be in Golden, nearby.

The other challenge facing the liaison team is weather. The Castlegar Airport is notorious for getting fogged-in during the winter. Each year the liaison team consider themselves lucky if they get out of Castlegar without a delay. One year the liaison team was fogged in for two days!

The most rewarding aspect of participating in the coordinated liaison program is visiting the beautiful and diverse regions of our province. Meeting people from different communities and providing them with a service that might otherwise be out of reach makes the days and nights on the road worth it.
