A star is born at new small business centre



Congratulations to our recent alumni

The faces of students crossing the stage to receive their hard-earned credential at the Feb. 20 Convocation were beaming. The ceremony, which included graduates of Bachelor of Technology degrees, advanced and post diplomas, technology and trades diplomas and Part-time Studies certificates, was a milestone in each student's life.

BCIT conferred two more Bachelor of Technology degrees in computer systems, marking the program's second degree graduation since it began accepting degree applications last spring.

Programs in attendance were Computer Systems, Diagnostic Medical Sonography, Nursing, Electronic Engineering Technology, Automotive Service Technician, Heating, Ventilating and Air Conditioning, as well as a number of Part-time Studies certificate programs.

Keynote speaker Brian Lentle, head of Radiography, Vancouver Hospital and Health Sciences Centre, and professor, University of British Columbia, encouraged graduates to look towards their future.

"I believe graduation is like reaching the top of a pass: the gradient gets better but you have to keep on traveling and in the while a whole new view opens up into the next valley," said Lentle, who went on to talk about "some of the scenes to be found in the valley."

Discussing the future of work, he mentioned that while the computer is reshaping our lives and the way we learn and communicate, the human spirit transcends machines and technology.

"Today's graduates range in their expertise over a number of disciplines, and society needs each one. However, if I have one thought for them all, it is that as much as their disciplines are important it is in our common humanity that they will find both fulfillment and security," he said.

BCIT welcomes new coat of arms

BCIT welcomed Robert Watt, Chief Herald of Canada, to Convocation on Feb. 20 for the formal presentation of new symbols for the institute: a coat of arms, flag and badge.

Explanation and symbolism

BCIT's Coat of Arms is intended for use on diplomas, honorary awards and other awards of distinction. The dominant colors are blue and white, taken directly from the official colors of the institute. These colors are also dominant in British Columbia's own Coat of Arms. Red, gold and green also appear in BCIT's Coat of Arms.

Arms (shield):

On the band across the top of the shield are a coin, a compass placed upon a cogwheel and a staff with a snake entwined around it. These objects highlight some of BCIT's program areas:

The **coin**, as the heraldic symbol for commerce and wealth, symbolizes business.

The **compass** and the cogwheel, as symbols for precision measurement, design, building and construction and trades of a variety of types, symbolize engineering and trades.

The **staff** with the snake, as the ancient Greek symbol for medicine, represents health.

The vertical line dividing the shield symbolizes BCIT's approach to learning; the interplay and fusion between theory and practice; the linkages between trades and technology and between the institute and the world beyond.

The **border** surrounding the shield includes four of the special Canadian heraldic symbols for computer chips. These stylized computer chips symbolize the theme of technology and the four main campuses.

Crest (above the shield):

The **dogwood flowers** represent the provincial character and mandate of the institute. The **eagle** symbolizes the spirit of the students, faculty and all members of the Institute's community - searching for knowledge and understanding, being far-seeing in the search. The eagle is also a powerful emblem of the province and the riches of the natural environment. It is also an honored symbol of the First Nations Peoples and a reference to BCIT's main campus, as the eagle is found in the City of Burnaby's shield.


The **torch** is a traditional and contemporary symbol, representing the light of knowledge and striving for excellence.

Supporters and Comportment (below and on either side of the shield):

The **grass** at the base of the shield represents the lands of the campus and the water: Guichon Creek on the main Campus, the ocean and other water bodies on or near institute campuses. Together **grass and water** symbolize the strong environmental orientation of many BCIT programs.

The **cougar** symbolizes land-based programs, while its wings represent aviation technology and programs. This creature represents how the institute's programs interrelate, and the innovation and dynamism associated with its teaching and research approaches.







The BCIT moto, QUISQUE DOMINUS SUMMI, located at the base of the shield translates as: To each their highest achievement. Join a few of your former classmates...


A unique development at BCIT

BCIT School of Health Sciences together with the Technology Centre and Simon Fraser University's Gerontology Research Centre, has recently developed the Living Laboratory, a unique research and testing facility located at the Downtown Campus.

The Living Lab will provide opportunities for research and testing of environments and products that promote independent living for the elderly and disabled. Many of today's environments cause amongst these groups a high rate of home accidents and dependency on others. Kitchens are too narrow for wheelchair access, cupboards are too high to safely reach. With age comes a desensitization to sounds resulting in smoke alarms going off unnoticed.

"Right now if you have a fairly minor disability, you can't live in a lot of homes," explains Nancy Paris-Seeley, director of health applied research and development at BCIT. "It's not that the person cannot mentally deal with their environment, it's just that their physical environment is not fitting to their situation."

The only one of its kind in Western Canada, the approximately 1,500 square foot facility resembles a large theater. At centre stage is a 1,000 square foot experimental living area, which can be easily adapted to simulate various environments, for example, a number of hospital rooms or a complete house. In the foreground is a viewing theater with a one-way mirror that allows researchers to unobtrusively observe experiments and provide immediate feedback. Backstage is the data acquisition room, housing computers that are fed information from both the living area and the viewing theater.

"Say we wanted to design an optimal kitchen. We could wire up or just place markers on the individual and at the same time video tape them. So the information that comes in the data acquisition room is the visual but also data on the angles of the body's position. We can then see if that person is really struggling to reach up to the cupboard," explains Paris-Seeley.

Compared to other research facilities, a key benefit of the Living Laboratory is that it allows researchers to study the elderly and disabled performing everyday activities in a true-to-life setting.

"If someone is being tested, they should feel that they are in a room not in a lab," says Paris-Seeley. "If you don't have a full-scale simulation environment then you can only evaluate things on a smaller scale that don't involve real people, but then you have to make a lot of assumptions, and you might make the wrong assumption."

With the aging of the baby boomers, Mary Ann Clark Scott, researcher with the Simon Fraser University Gerontology Research Centre, warns there will be an increasing demand for products and environments that meet the needs of the elderly and disabled.

Today, about 11 per cent of Canadians are aged 65 and over, approximately one third of whom are disabled. By 2031 this number is expected to rise to 25 per cent.

"We're sinking into a pit," says Clark Scott. "They are going to be there, they are going to breaking down the doors, and they are going to be out there coping."

Along with their fundraising efforts, BCIT's Technology Centre is currently looking for people, particularly from the School of Health Sciences, to become involved in either research or educational initiatives involving the Living Laboratory. 


