

STUDENT CAR POOLS

Having difficulties making 8:30 classes? Do you fall asleep on the bus and go beyond BCIT or BCVS?

We may be able to solve your problem.

A Ride Exchange Board will be located (it may already be there) in the main lobby of the Library. This board lists the major areas of the Lower Mainland and there are two different colored cards — one for drivers (looking for passengers) and one for passengers (looking for rides).

All you have to do is pick up the appropriate colored card, complete it and place it in the slot of the area in which you live. Or if you're lucky, just check the Board to see if some other student has already completed a card and place it in the slot opposite your zone area.

To eliminate an accumulation of cards in the various slots, the Board will be cleaned out weekly. It may be necessary for you to complete another card the following week and the next, until you have your ride or the desired number of passengers.

Another feature of the board is that space has been allowed for out-of-town vacation rides. Many students do not call the Lower Mainland their home. They reside (for some strange reason) elsewhere. Prior to any extended break, when you plan to go to your home town, check the board to see if a ride is available or if prospective passengers are seeking rides to or near your home town. If not, complete a card.

Please do not remove and take away any completed cards. Blank paper is provided for you to jot down the facts of any ride concerned. Copy the information you want and return the colored card to its appropriate slot. At your convenience, you can contact the student concerned.

Should you have any suggestions concerning car pools or transportation in general, please contact Les Smith Room 289 or Ernie lannacone Room 260.

JULIO'S RAILROAD



Student Council held their first meeting of the year on Monday, January 12. Julio Russo announced that Ken Seabloom, Sports Chairman, had resigned from his position. At a meeting of Sports Reps. on Wednesday January 14, Mr. George Turi, former assistant to Mr. Seabloom, was elected as the new Sports Chairman.

Mr. Ray Stone, in his capacity of representative on the Traditions Committee. told meeting that the Administration and Staff are going to be more aggressive in enforcing dress regulations this term. It seems that several students have the audacity to presume that they are capable of deciding for themselves what they should wear to school. Come on you guys, surely you can sacrifice a little for that fifty bucks a month.

An interesting question was raised by one of the Council members. He asked Mr. Hudson, the Social Chairman, just how technology points

awarded at BCIT. After consultation with other executive members, Mr. Hudson explained that points are given for any "worthy function". When questioned as to what constitutes a worthy function, Mr. Hudson reluctantly explained that the definition of a "worthy function" is any function that he considers worthy. I would suggest, without demeaning Mr. Hudson, that it would be more equitable if a committee were formed to establish a definite set of parameters for the awarding of technology points. A system of this sort would also protect the Social Chairman against accusations of biased awarding of points.

This newspaper in general, and I, as Council reporter, in particular have been accused on several occasions of being unfair to the Student Executive and of concentrating on their mistakes rather than all the good work they do for the students of BCIT. I should like to explain the position of this

newspaper in regards the Student Council. Our system of student government, while effective and probably the best one available, has one serious drawback - it does not have a provision for an opposition. There is one ruling body, whose decisions are final and binding for students. This newspaper has taken on the job of acting as a "loyal opposition" to the Student Council. I emphasize the word "loyal," as we are as interested as anyone in the welfare of the students of BCIT. We simply feel that Council will be more effective if there is a body outside it observing what they do.

I would like to state that it is the opinion of this newspaper that this year's Student Council in general and the Executive in particular are among the best that this institute has had. We feel they are doing as fine a job as anyone could reasonably demand. And we look forward to working with them for the benefit of all BCIT students.



'Bob & Carol & Ted & Alice'

Basically this film is intended to be sort of downbeat farce on the nerican way of life as lived in lifornia. In this case the gap tween intention and realization is

The "in thing" among the "with it" ople out there in super screen, chnicolorland, is presently to plore the self in "sensitivity oups". This is all in keeping with the l-American ideals of Honesty, tegrity and Open-ness. And so to igin with, to the accompaniement of andel's Hallelujah chorus, the imeras take us across a vast ndscape, then in to follow a car [aguar XKE 4.2) containing our eroes on the way to somewhere. 'hen the 'where' is revealed to our tartled gaze - and appears at first lance to be a glorified nudist colony. lut no (revelation number two) it is in act a sensitivity exploration institute. ind in the interests of documentary film-making, enter Bob and Carol.

It is interesting here to note that the principals in the film are 1.

pot-blowing film-maker types, and 2. uptight attorney types (Ted and Alice). These are the exponents for the archetypal home of democracy, land of the free, and it is the interaction between the two couples that determines the action of the film. Or wandering, one might say. In any case, as a result of their mind-bending weekend at the institute, Bob and Carol find their lives changed. They are also driven to share their new knowledge with their bosom buddies, Ted and Alice. And so forth.

The film brinds on with all the subtlety of a gravel truck. Question at the institute - "why did you come here?" Reply - "I came because I want a better orgasm." Carol to Ted and Alice: "I love you and I want to share this beautiful experience with you - Bob had an affair in San Francisco." Audience reaction - ho hum and an embarrassed snicker or two. Exaggeration, your name isn't necessarily humor.

As an amalgam of poor taste, heavy-handed direction, stale script and non-existent acting this film doesn't even succeed in setting a new low. But it tries - brother, does it try! And, crime par excellence in the entertainment business, it is dull.

Note - on the more enjoyable side, try "On Her Majesty's Secret Service" for some sizzling action with no let-downs, good script, and better than ordinary acting. Also "Goodbye Mr. Chips" is not nearly as bad as you might expect - Mr. O'Toole and his wife both notable for their entrance into the acting world in creditable performances, and Petula Clark rather better than merely inoffensive. Good direction all round. Also, on stage at the Queen Elizabeth, "Events While Watching the Bofors Gun" will make you think a bit and wake up your mind if you have one. Excellent acting and directing and good staging of an average script.




SPORTS CHAIRMAN RESIGNS


With the election of George Turi as chairman comes the appointment of Pete Turgoose as head referee for volleyball.










THE OLD TOPIC - DRESS

Students were mailed with their Christmas marks a letter from the principal of BCIT, Mr. Dean Goard, requesting assistance in maintaining institute dress regulations. We visited Mr. Goard and inquired as to his opinions on dress regulations and why the letter was sent.

Mr. Goard stated, "The letter was sent out because of a request from staff and students at BCIT and it was precautionary in nature, until the Traditions Committee meets. At BCIT we offer a program not a general course and therefore we look more seriously at placement. Priority number one at BCIT is what you learn, priority number two includes such things as dress, which have an effect on the whole program."

"People come to BCIT because they are interested in getting employment in their chosen field of studies. BCIT is not one school but a combination of three schools: Business, Health and Engineering.

We then asked what role does administration play in setting regulations. Goard stated, "It is not up to administration to establish styles, the tradition committee (a staff-student effort) studies this. We shouldn't be arbitrators of fashion, that's not our job. A reasonable dress code is however required. Reasonable in the sense that it allows maximum individual freedom for the individual but does not jeopardize the group. We must balance the factors which are reasonable. Styles are changing, who are we to be arbitrary to change in that area. Where do we draw the line?

There are within BCIT both staff and students who disagree with administration's attitude. They feel that Dean Goard is too lenient in his actions. However, how can one control dress? One has just to look at some of the staff members and their attire. How do you persuade them to change?

Most of the students at BCIT enjoy wearing the white shirt and tie image. It is like that if an opinion pole were taken the majority would back the dress idea. There are only 3 to 4% of the students that do not conform with the standards. Students at the institute adopted the white shirt and tie image the students at BCIT rather than the Vocational. There is often confusion that BCIT is a branch of the Vocational School. The students at the institute are trying themselves to create for themselves and their employers a clean cut appearance, attire that they will meet in their future careers. Perhaps it's the "white shirt and tie" phrase that establishes controversy and negative reactions. This is indeed an old cliche of the 30's and should be replaced with a more appropriate classification that takes into account the new and ever changing decade of fashion.

Dean Goard was also seriously concerned with the cost of coming to BCIT and the hardships placed upon the students. He stated, "After all just look at the price of hair cuts, at \$2.50 a cut ten times a year that adds up to twenty five dollars. I don't blame them for letting it grow."

REGULATION SHEET

A working paper for "discussion only" at the Tradition Committee meeting was drafted and copies circulated to some staff members. "This was NOT a dress regulation sheet," stated BCIT's principal. Ray Stone, Vice President of the BCIT Students Association and a representative on the Tradition Committee stated that the paper has been rejected. There may be however, some staff members that may have because of misunderstanding taken the paper as a regulation notice. This is not the case.

TRADITION COMMITTEE

The Tradition Committee is a joint student-staff committee which reviews rules and regulations at BCIT. On the committee are several student representatives including Ray Stone, VP BCIT SA and four members from Broadcast Technology. The chairman is Mr. McAdam, Vice Principal of BCIT and staff members include: Miss Gray (Counsellor), Mr. Risdale (Dept. head E&E), Mr. Wooley (Business).

The purpose of the committee is the formulation of constructive revisions regarding rules and regulation. These are worked out by both the students and the staff.

Their first meeting was held last week but because of our publication deadline we were not able to report on the committee findings. We will however hope to have a summation in the next issue.

Our guess is that there will be no dramatic announcements but possibly slightly tigheter dress policies will be established that will affect only the 3-4% now presenttly not complying with the standards.


CLUBS CHAIRMAN, Edgar Rhomberg

ATHLETIC CENTER



CONSTRUCTION STARTED

TEMPORARY GYM

Dr. Neil Perry, Deputy Minister of Education announced at the Scholarship Ceremonies at BCIT this month that construction has been started on BCIT's temporary Gymnasium. The Butler Building (a prefabricated structure) is being built at BCVS and its primary purpose is a Heavy Duty Mechanics Shop for BCVS and BCIT's use of it being a welcome privilege.

The reason for the building of a temporary gymnasium is because of efforts of both last and this year's Students Council presenting to Victoria officials the immediate need of such facilities at BCIT. Department of Education officials were impressed with the presentation agreeing that there was a definite need. They were however unable to take immediate action because of the Government Budgets not allowing for construction of new gymnasiums.

However after further research into future building in and around BCIT it was discovered that a Heavy Duty Mechanics Shop was planned for BCVS and thus it was decided to speed up construction of this building in order that BCIT would at least have temporary gymnasium facilities.

BCIT's proposed Student Complex which consists of two phases has had preliminary plans drawn up and submitted to Victoria. The first phase of the complex being a cafeteria (seating 300), health and student offices centre. The second phase is a gymnasium-auditorium.

Both Victoria representatives and school officials have urged that both Phases of the complex be built together. The construction of which would reduce the overall cost and alleviate double construction. Mr. Goard in an interview with the Link stated that, Dr. Perry expressed his hope that there would be a firm commitment from Victoria in regards to the Multi-purpose Complex in thenear future

Meanwhile the temporary gymnasium, 80 x 144 ft at publication date had the foundation piles driven in and a start toward the laying of the asphalt floor. This surface has raised some concern from the Athletic Council. They had inquired to see if a more suitable floor could be provided but flooring other than asphalt was out of the question. Brian Johncox, President of the Students Association suggested a canvas floor, this matter is now being looked into. As is the timetabling of the building.

No definite date has been set as to completion date but Mr. Perry had stated that we may have it as a Christmas present.




