Supporters of the Seymour River fish hatchery have organized a public meeting to discuss the future of the facility.

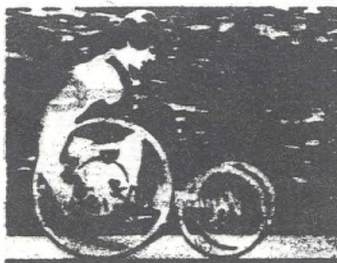

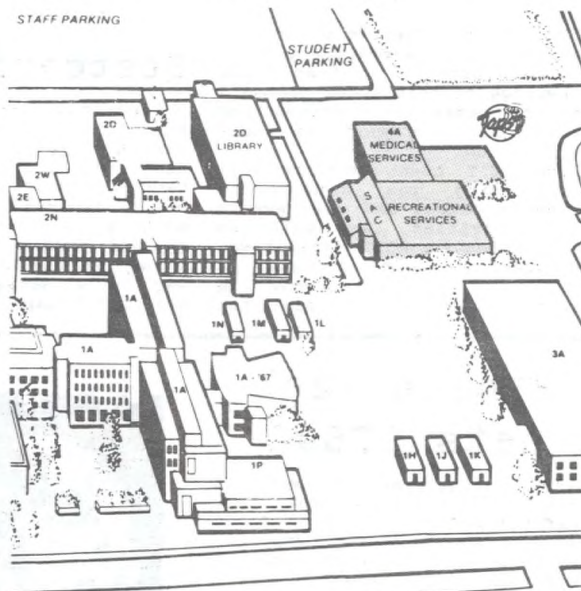

Forced volunteerism concerns opposition

The government is redefining volunteerism with its new student loan program, says NDP MLA Anita Hagen.

"The government is telling students: 'If you're unable to get paid work for the summer, you'd better volunteer or you won't get the full benefits of student aid,'" said Hagen.

"This is exactly the opposite of what volunteering is all about."

According to the government's student aid program, announced last spring, students who don't undertake fulltime work, fulltime studies or fulltime volunteer work during the summer

won't be eligible for the non-repayable portion of their student loans.

Hagen said no other policy or practice imposes a penalty on a person who does not volunteer, "it's even worse to dictate that this volunteer work must be on a fulltime basis."

"Employers may start routinely proposing that students work as volunteers rather than in paid jobs," said Hagen.

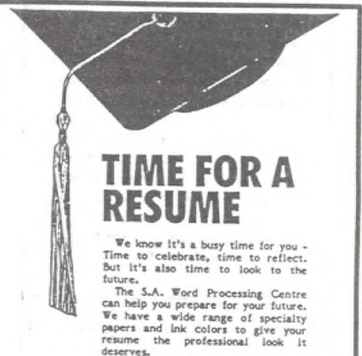

Heart - "Bad Animals"

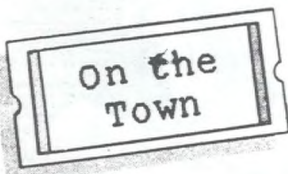
Once full of energy and loaded with raw talent, aging super-group Heart has released an album that just doesn't measure up to past efforts.

Heart shines on two or three cuts, but one has to make it through a particularly bland side one to get to the title track at the beginning of side two.

The song "Bad Animals" displays Heart's full potential, with searing guitar work by Howard Leese and wonderfully wild vocals by Ann Wilson. Their talent is really wasted on less dramatic pieces (ie all of side one).

Two other songs that suggest Heart's rock and roll spirit are "Strangers of the Heart," and "RSVP."

It's as if the Wilson sisters and band slept through side one, but did their best to make up for it on side two. What we get, though, is only half an album worth listening to. Perhaps that's better than nothing.
