Since we don't know the results of the last rugby game of the season at this writing, we cannot comment on the ramifications of a perfect season. It is apparent to anyone who has followed the pro ress of the Panthers since Sep tember however, that ruce sep all the associated activities could has beenbetter then this past ot have beendess the this past erm, last Saturday's of last Saturday's game. At this stage, the rugby team is one of the school's biggest assets, and we hope the tradition will contin. ue after Christmas.
But since the term is on its last breaths, I want to put forward a few. ideas concerning the administration of athletics at BCIT in the hope that some changes will be made next year by the Student Council.

This statement is not a criti cism of past policy or action by the Council, it is merelya recom mendation for the future.

Because BCIT is expanding so rapidly, in the athletic field a well as in every other, the time has come for some changes in student government. The present situation gives the Athletic Chair man (who is the sole athletic representative in the whole Council) two duties: (1) to cowordinate Intramural sports and (2)to act as intermediary between coaches and the executive of the Council mainly in money matters.

Obviously this very limited system is rapidly becoming outmoded. One person -and one with very little power - simply cannot hope to look after all the athletics for a school with a present en. rolment of over 1700 .

So we need some improve. ments. And the first step is to form an Athletic Council consist ing of representatives of the vari ous teams and/or techs.
This Council would actually have two parts, one to handle In tramural sports and one to take care of Intercollegiate activities, both, of course, under the directorship of the Athletic Chairman. The advantages of such a body are obvious: it would first of all give complete control of athletics to the students, which is the situa tion in every self-respecting chool above a grade 9 level chould aive the Chairman som wuch give the chairman some much-needed help and an excellent source of advice in co-ordnating the school's sports. It would de velop school policy concerning athletic activities, initiate new ideas, and provide an authorita tive body to deal with the many sports problems of an expanding school - all without bothering the Student Council Executive.

For this is the crucial point in the whole concept: the Athletic Council must have control over all the athletic activities without hav ing to ask Student Council or the executive for permission to carr out a decision After all who knows better how to run a school' athletics than the athletics than the eleced repre sentatives of the school's athletic functions? And the executive should be the last one to object to such an operation, since 1 takes a great many detalls from their hands and leaves them with more time to look after the many other problems of Council.

To sum up, let's simply say that such a body is expedient to the administration of sports functions at BCIT. The sooner weget one, the better.
