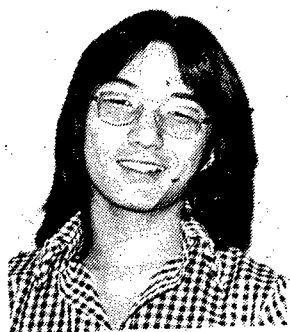

The vote was 83% in favour of strike and 17% against. It seems the instructors are fully prepared to walk the picket line if their demands are not met. I personally take this action with mixed emotions. Emotionally I am all for the instructors; however one doesn't have to be a complete jerk to realize that we the students are being used as a weapon by the instructors at the bargaining table. Should the instructors decide to strike our studies will be interrupted or suspended for an indefinite time. Are we going to just sit here as a neutral party and risk our education at the expense of a senseless bargaining impasse?

Perhaps I should put the question to Jim Britton as to how concerned the Board of Governors is with the students here. I certainly hope that in years to come we won't have to appeal to the Board because both Administration and instructors are so concerned with their own "rights" that students are neglected.

I hope that no one is afraid to mention the fact that some instructors will vote for a strike so long as the skiing is good.

Is there any truth to the rumor that groups of students are circulating written statements to the effect that they disagree with the statements published by the Student Association? Could they be the students who have boycotted Council meetings on the grounds that the Council was apathetic and ineffective and afraid to take a stand? Are these groups pretending to be speaking for whole technologies when really they are just reflecting the views of a very few students (or perhaps instructors)?

Is there any truth to the rumor that the members of the Student Association who were loudest in complaining about the lack of a quorum at recent meetings were the first to leave last meeting? And leave it in a position of having to operate without a quorum. a position of having to operate without a quorum?

Is there any truth to the rumor that at a party held in New Westminster on Saturday, January 18th, a member of the administration said to a first year student of BCIT "If you run for student council next year. . . I will make sure you don't get a vote. . ."? Could this be an example of administrative interference in student politics? I also hope that those people aren't afraid to say that the Staff Society is not fully backed by the instructors in Business, Engineering and Health. They may belong to the Staff Society but the nucleus of the Staff Society are instructors who are not attached to any technology and just how interested they are in BCIT is questionable. They aren't directly responsible for any specific group of students so perhaps their interests lie only with themselves. Our instructors in Business, Engineering and Health just aren't taking part in policy decisions in the S.S. even though they are the vast majority.

I know that most of our instructors are interested in the future of BCIT and I sure wish they'd speak up.

The working conditions of instructors will affect the classroom condition of students. The instructors have it pretty easy now and the students have it tough. I guess that if things get better for instructors they get worse for students. Some instructors have been asking students to fill out "evaluation" forms in the past years. Some instructors even read them and tried to improve their teaching methods. I certainly hope that the S.S. in its collective agreement, will demand that all instructors use these forms to improve their lectures and as a form of self-evaluation.

The Student Association should remind both groups that students are a vital part of BCIT.

Audiences at the Playhouse Theatre Centre are being treated to the first show of 1975 in the form of OF THE FIELDS, LATLEY. A sequel to last year's LEAVING HOME, OF THE FIELDS, LATLEY is proving that it can stand on its own and is adding a whole new dimension to the Mercer family.

The play, by Canadian writer, David French, concerns Jacob and Mary Mercer, a working class couple in 1961 Toronto. Their eldest son, Ben returns home for his Aunt Dot's funeral and attempts to break down the wall of tension that is ever present, through invisible, between his father and himself.

The play comes alive as the actors skillfully and realistically portrayed the dramatic theme of family division. Powys Thomas is superb as Jacob, Mary portrayed by Florence Henderson, is likeable and heart warming. Together these two make a couple who are close and who have a relationship based on years of trials and successes. Barney O' Sullivan as Uncle Wiff comes across with sad restrained enthusiasm that is just right and Kenneth Farrell as young Ben Mercer displays the right amount of total frustration and helplessness as he realizes that the wall, which had been begun when he was only 12, is now no nearer to crumbling as it was then.

OF THE FIELDS, LATLEY is well worth seeing if only because of the reflections of your own family life that you will see. Some words spoken, some small actions of the characters, all help create the feeling that you are watching your own family life unfold. Remember, the whole world is a stage and the inhabitants are the players. Thanks to the cast, director and writer of the fields lately is a classic example of this. OR FLUSH TWICE ITS A LONG WAY TO BRENTWOOD

These are just a sample of the 243 "Short one-liners" that made up the 79 telegrams that went to Mrs. Eileen Dailly, January 14, 1975, as part of the kick-off to OPERATION BUG EILEEN. Brentwood House students, led by student rep. Brian Lunt, a BCIT Administrative Management student fed up (excuse the pun) with Department of Education inregards to the food situation at the Residence, decided to try and get some action. At the time of writing, the only word that has been received from Victoria is that Mrs. sDailly is away and the telegrams have been put on her desk. MEANWHILE, STUDENTS GO HUNGRY!!!!!!!

For those of you who don't yet know of the situation that presently exists at Brentwood House, here goes. There are approximately 243 students living at Brentwood; 50% BCIT and 50% BCVS. When they moved in, most of them were told that within a month there would be some sort of food services in the residence. This statement has since been denied by the British Columbia Housing Commission, the provincial agency that runs Brentwood House. They have an obligation, they say to the 30 odd senior citizens who still call Brentwood House their home. This is not an issue, most of the students agree with this statement.

However, the issue is that there is still no food services at the Residence. Students are paying \$80.00 a month rent for a one room apartment with en suite

plumbing, but without any food facilities, students are having to

go out to local restaurants, drive-ins, etc; to get some sort of nutritional meal.

Food bills for this type of "nutritional meals" are averaging around \$185-\$200 per month. For the traditional poor student, this is creating severe financial problems.

In November, another serious aspect to the food situation reared its head. Two students were admitted to hospital with illnesses traceable to poor food habits - in effect, malnutrition. As a result, several students with the concerned help of a few Burnaby citizens who had some knowledge of the Brentwood situation, initiated OPERATION GOURMET. Gourmet meals they were not, but for a \$1.00 a day, students, in the midst of final exams, could eat a hot T.V. dinner. It was better than a A&W Burgers or MacDonald's french fries. Operation Gourmet died out as the residents of Brentwood House went home to good meals over the Christmas Holidays. Thanks for the attempt anyway!!!!!!

Now, in January, there is still no food, and not even any quick remedies in sight. Students still use hot plates, fry pans, etc in their rooms. While doing so, they are risking possible eviction from the residence. Students are experiencing both physical and mental problems from the lack of food. In many cases, marks are suffering, and instead of residence students having the best marks, many are not making it through.

What can be done? This is a question that students have asked themselves since September. Whatever the answer, something must be done! Students can not go on living in this sort of environment.

This is where OPERATION BUG EILEEN DAILLY comes in. The telegrams went to Victoria the Vancouver Sun picked up the story, so did the Province, and the Brentwood students were getting the publicity they had been crying for so long. Whether or not a direct result of this publicity a meeting was set up between the students of Brentwood House and Mr. Fletcher from the BCHC. Everything looked a little more promising after that meeting but the remedy for the food situation is still dependent on getting a subsidy from Victoria. If that subsidy is forthcoming quickly, Brentwood House residents can be eating properly in February. If not, maybe next year's students will have food.

Meanwhile, in an effort, to help alleviate the financial worries of the students, the Canada Student Loan Department, through the Department of Student Services and the Department of Education has said that students may apply for further assistance if need be. Also, the BCIT Student Services Department is presently lobbying for a total grant from Victoria to bring the amount paid for room and board by Brentwood House residents down from approximately \$250.00 per month to \$140.00 per month.

All this boils down to is a large waiting game; one which is played by everyone concerned. Paul Polson, Accomodations Officer for BCVS refuses to make a comment on Brentwood House. Graham Fane BCIT student liason, who has taken on Brentwood House as a personal project, rather than part of his job comments "That it is a shame, that the parties that profess to be concerned can not come up with a solution". Senior residents of Brentwood House make the statement that the building should be returned to the aged, and the BCHC says that they are doing all they can (Which in fact they are). You have already read some of the students at Brentwood House's comments; others make these comments while they wait, and wait, and go hungry.....

DO YOU REALLY CARE ??

BCIT CARES - that's what you have been seeing posted all over campus these past few weeks. Do you know what it is you are supposed to care about?

Variety Telethon is a fund-raising campaign sponsored each year by the Variety Club of Canada and supported by the BCIT student body. It is because the students at BCIT care that prompts them to volunteer to man the telephones during an entire weekend to accept pledged money from people viewing the show. It is because they care that they devote time and energy to organizing security, typing, posters, tickets, a dance

organizing security, typing, posters, the tickets, a dance and so much more. It is our manpower that makes it all possible. But not only by working on the actual production of Telethon itself do we show we care, we have all been asked to sign over our Caution Accounts and this way we help financially. By signing over your Caution Account you have already raised over \$11,270 and there's more to come to swell this magnificent demonstration of your generosity. We must not forget too to thank the instructors for playing their part by allowing the Telethon organizers into their classrooms to ask for Caution Account donations.

The event of Telethon will take place in the Queen Elizabeth Theatre on February 22nd and 23rd with full coverage by B.C. Television Ltd. network in B.C. It will be broadcasted to 94% of B.C.

Our students will be on camera taking down the names and addresses who call in and pledge money, afterwards the cards are processed by the Variety Club of Canada who contact these people and ask them to send in their cheques. Last year 103% of pledged money was collected as donors actually became moreous when writing out cheques.

Who are you helping - children, handicapped, underprivileged, and those suffering from cerebral palsy. These children are helped because facilities for treatment and education are being built with the money collected. The centre we helped raise funds for in past years is now operational, this is the Lower Fraser Valley Cerebral Palsy Association's

centre and it includes a 20 by 40 foot hydrotherapy pool, physiotherapy, gymnasium, kindergarten, and speech therapy facilities. The Variety Farm at Ladner too has been helped by monies raised by Telethon, this is a residential agricultural training centre for mentally handicapped youths.

These, and many more, are the ways in which our caring and social consciousness provide hope and encouragement to those less fortunate than ourselves. We spend two years at BCIT not only learning, living and doing, but hopefully giving; giving because we do care!

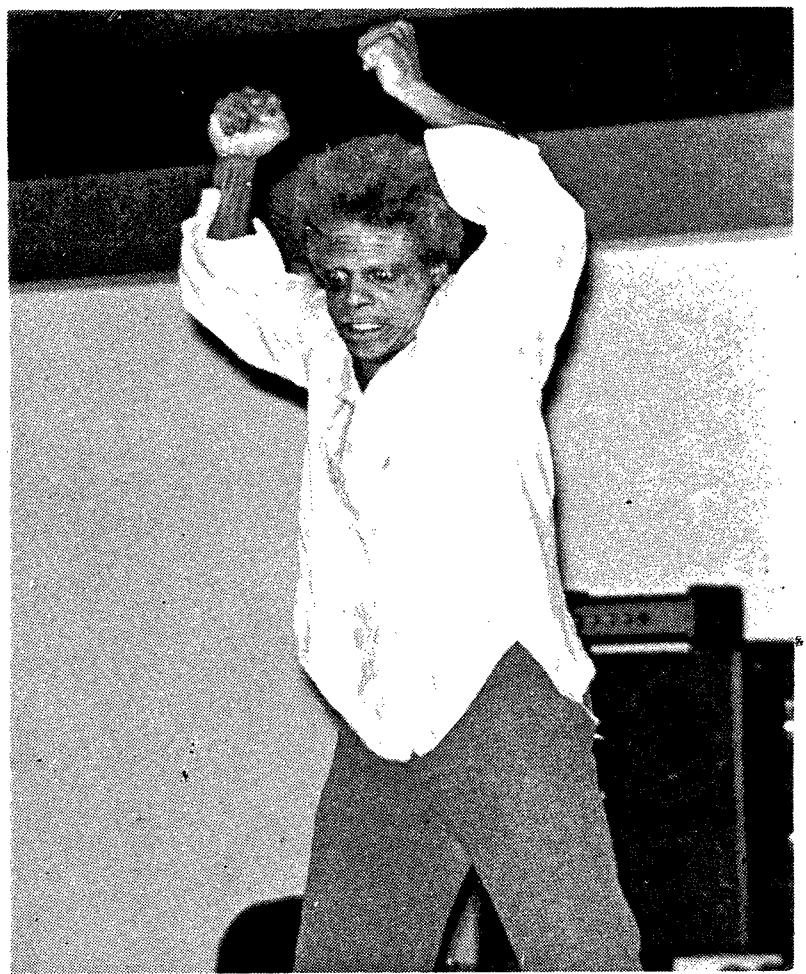

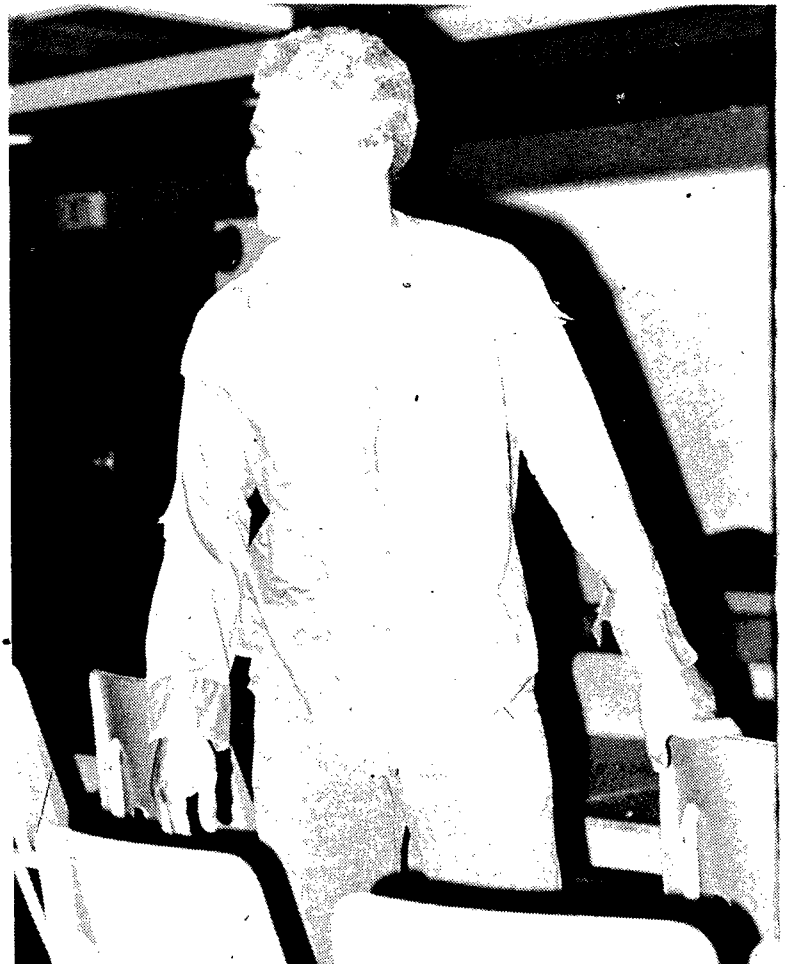
Harvey Blanks, one time football player for University of Washington, turned professional actor.

Collective Bargaining:

The faculty members are still at the bargaining table in the process of negotiating their first contract. Whispers of strike have been drifting through the corridors of BCIT for the last several weeks. At the last council meeting all representatives unanimously agreed by resolution, that our primary concern is the Educational Objectives of BCIT students. Council then struck a committee to investigate both union and management positions, in areas that may become contentious. Council agreed that no statements regarding their position on specific issues would be made until the issues have been thoroughly investigated. At the present time there is no specific issues that have come to an impasse over the bargaining table. Although the Staff Society has expressed concern that they would like to bargain continuously in order to speed the date for a final contract. Students are in the unfortunate position of being between union and management. The event of a strike is not in the picture.....today, that is! If the instructors decide they have reason to withdraw their services it most probably would be selective disruptions of classes, ie Business today, Health tomorrow.

Students are the group that would suffer most from a selective disruption of classes, and we will keep on top of this issue. If you want any information or want to express your opinions come to the SA Offices or the Council meetings which are held the 1st and 3rd Tuesday of every month. (7 o'clock SAC Cafeteria) If your opinion is dying to get out, then come to Council; the meetings are open, exercise your freedom of speech. (E&E AND INSTRUMENTATION). Our strength is our unity!

Whistler Mountain BCIT Ski Lodge WHISTLER MOUNTAIN SKI LODGE

The lodge is finished and no one seems to want to use it. Very few people have been making reservations!

The lodge has its own cutlery dishes and basic appliances.....and beds! If you come up, you will need a sleeping bag or some bedding of some sort. Reservations and payments must be made in advance at the SA Offices. At the present time no more than 25 people will be allowed to stay at the lodge at one time. This is because not all the beds are completed yet. Posters are up around the school, outlining the policies of the lodge. Maps of how to get there are available in the SA Offices in the SAC.

SAC BUILDING

At a recent meeting between the SA and the administration, a committee was set up to study the policies of the SAC Building and to recommend future needs. The Board of Governors will receive the reports and will determine priorities for any decisions of major significance.

British Columbia Association of Student Unions

On 13,14 & 15 February, members of the Student Association will be attending a conference at the University of Victoria. The conference will have delegates from the majority of colleges and universities in B.C. Topics of discussion will be; Student Services (what services do students need?) Inter campus communication, block bookings for concerts, students bus passes and student input into college governance. These discussions with external resources are very because we are having similar policy discussions internally on the BCIT campus.

The New Buildings

The contractors were on strike but now they are back to work. Students are meeting with the architects this week to review the plans and to determine whether they are suitable from a student's viewpoint. These new food facilities are an area of particular concern.

Like many American blues/soul groups, Ike and Tina were originally discovered by the English. "River Deep, Mountain High" made little impression in the USA compared to its English reception. "I played on an old piano in a church lady's house. She would let me play if I would cut wood for her in return. At that time I didn't really know what a piano was. All I knew was that when I pushed down on the keys it made a sound that I liked. After picking out a few notes to Blues in the Night, and other tunes that were popular at the time, I started to beg my mother to buy me my own!

When school was out that year I came home with my report card full of good grades. I walked in the house and there it was.... a new piano and she said it was all mine! This was the real beginning of my career.

After teaching himself the piano, Ike started performing in school plays and impromptu recitals for friends, relatives and anyone else who would listen.

Then Ike Turner put together the original Kings of Rhythm. I played locally at first, but as their reputation grew, they began doing recording sessions and cut ROCKET 88, Ike's first R&B HIT.

ROCKET 88 was a big financial score... but some dude at the record company beat me and I only got \$40,- for

producing and recording it, says Ike. Well, I took the Kings on the road...doing shows with Howlin Wolf, B.B. King and people like that... and somehow I ended up down in St. Louis. Around 1956, I was playing at this nightclub and through very unique circumstances I met Annie Bullock the future Tina Turner!

I was going to night clubs with my sister. Ike was working at one that we used to go to all the time. Well, I used to ask him to let me sing...he'd say O.K. but never call me to the stage. One night he was playing organ and the drummer put a microphone in front of my sister for her to sing. She said, NO, so I took the microphone and started

singing. Ike was shocked! When he finished the tune, he called me on stage, and I did several numbers with them that night... later I joined the group.

In 1959 Ike wrote a number entitled Fool in Love for a singer, who never showed up for the record session. But Tina was familiar with it, and filled in since studio facilities were paid for in advance. And Fool in Love turned out to

be a hit.

Then came the Phil Spector-produced "River Deep, Mountain High", which was a huge hit in England, and then an exclusive contract with Liberty/UA, Inc. Their "Come Together" LP, with the hit Beatle tune and their version of Honky Tonk Woman, climbed high on national charts. And of their album, "Workin' Together" everything that was started with the earlier album jells perfectly.

Ike Turner has been an important figure in R&B for the last twenty years... He and Tina are about to get theirs. AND it's none too soon, if you ask me. Since then it has been one hit after another including a single, "Proud Mary", and an album, "What Your Hear IS What You Get" that have achieved coveted gold record status.

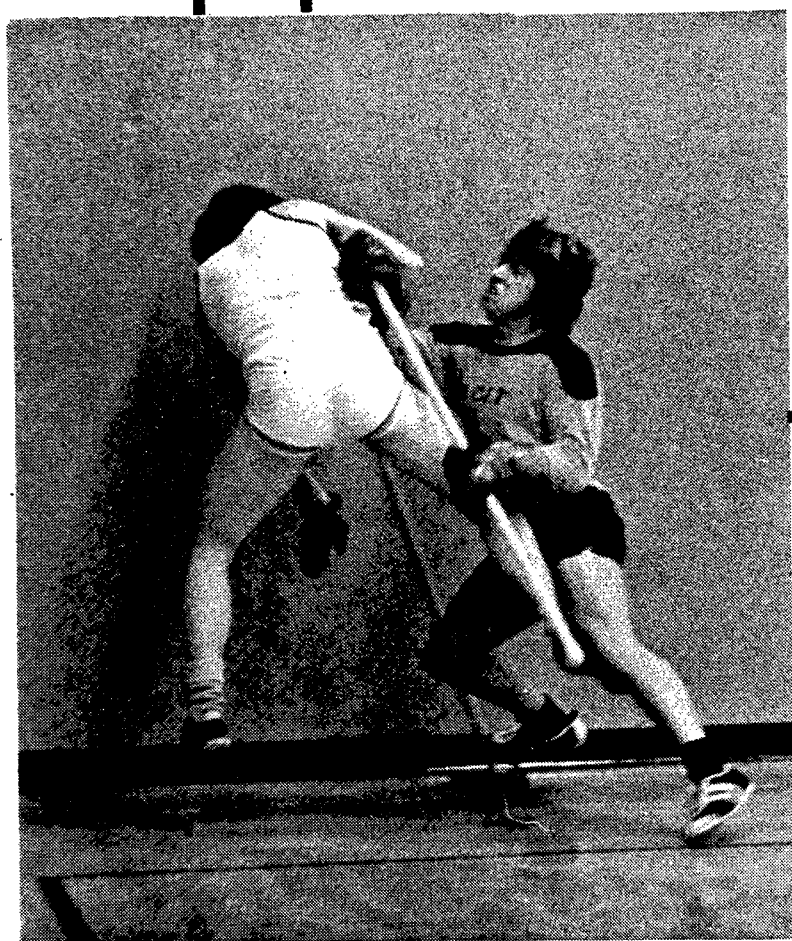

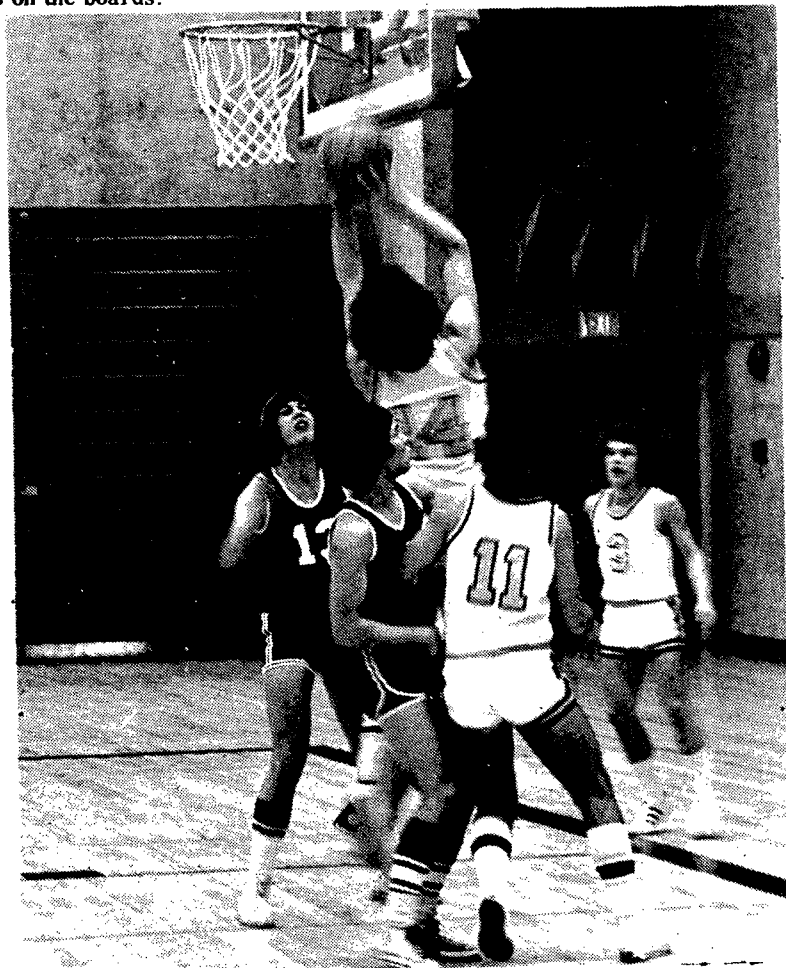
BASKETBALL

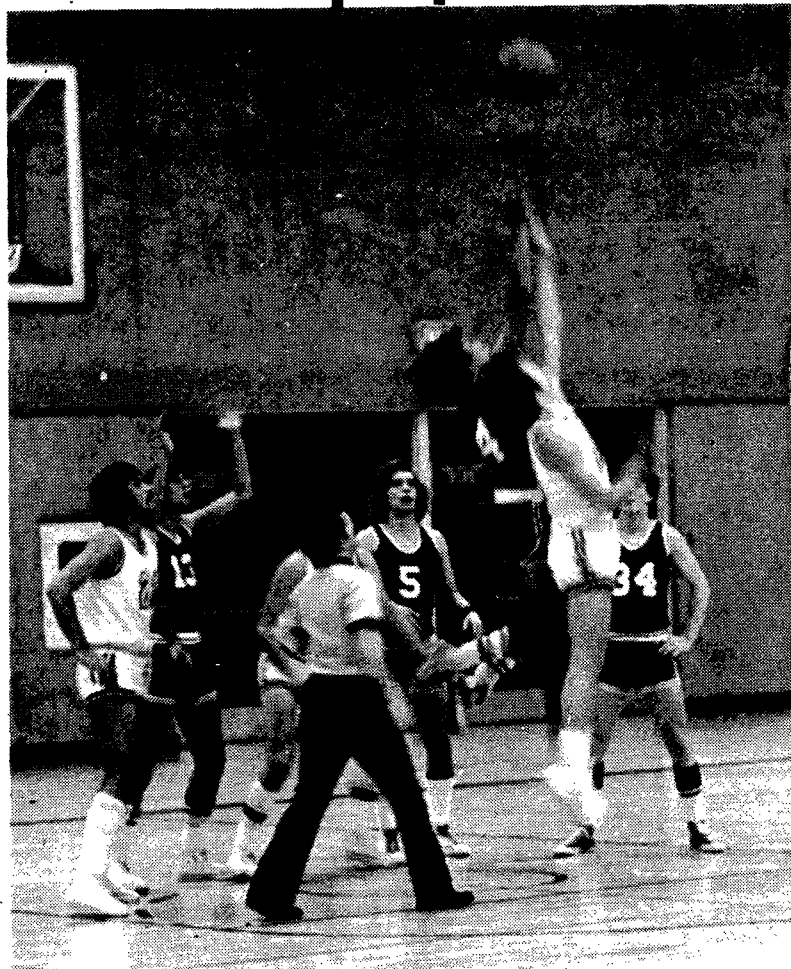

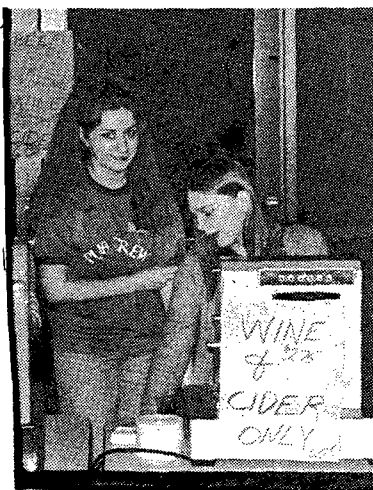

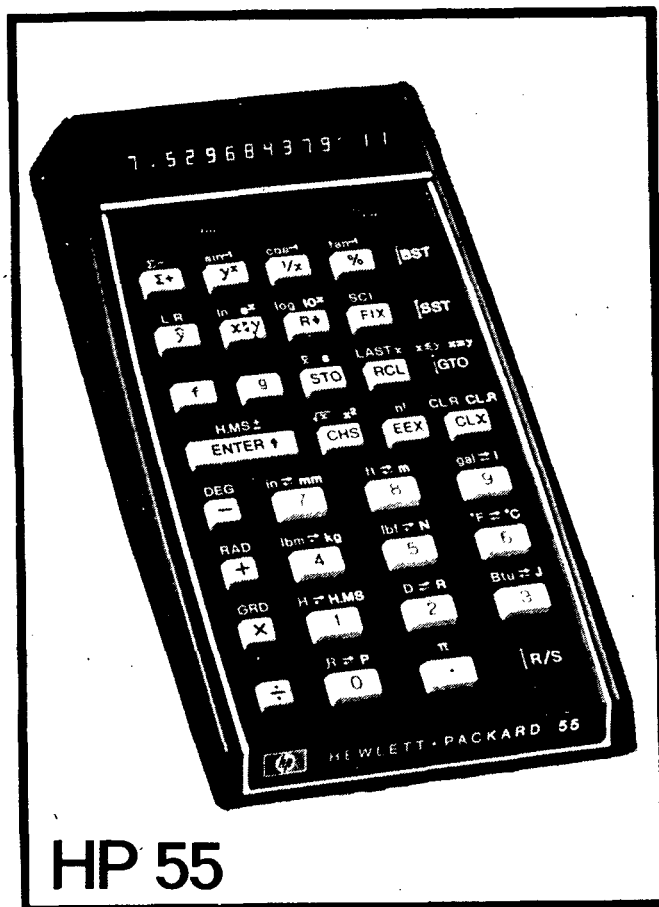
