## Grad says, "BCIT education path to success"

Highways are North America's number one mode of transportation, and without good planning and a lot of asphalt, we would never enjoy the freedom they provide. I was reminded of this reality during my discussions with Stefano Condotta, a 1985 Graduate of Civil and Structural Engineering.

At age 35, "Stef" has worked for the B.C. Ministry of Highways since graduating from BCIT. He first started as an engineering aid working in the company laboratory where he applied his skills to all aspects of paving design. He then progressed to managing the laboratory and inspection division of the Field Coat Crew. During a technical explanation, unfamiliar terms worked their way into the conversation. Terms such as: application rates, emution testing, and Marshall designs.

Recently, since the provincial government has moved towards privatizing operations, Stef has been working in a specialized group of seal coat inspectors. Their work takes them around

the province, working seven days a week for 12-hour shifts, eight months of the year. Through his travels Stef has grown to appreciate the interior portions of the province and specifically, the community of Kelowna. He enjoyed Kelowna so much he now lives there.

Stef believes his BCIT education has been a strong contributor to his success.

Since our conversation, my own long road trips will lead me to think of Stef and the people who keep us on the road.

## BCIT graduates succeed in today's workplace environment

BCIT developed the Bachelor of Technology degree program to help graduates succeed in today's aggressively everchanging industry. This is a degree program offering graduates the opportunity to advance within the work force with a solid theoretical and practical education.

The Bachelor of Technology degree is designed for and is validated by industry, which gives graduates a competitive edge. Degree programs are developed and offered only in fields recommended by industry advisory committees. The design offers a flexible part-time schedule to meet the needs of career-focused graduates; which means that BCIT grads can continue to work while earning a Bachelor of Technology degree.

The unique curriculum integrates theory with the practical skills and meets the employers needs for advanced technical training. The Bachelor of Technology develops the portable skills needed to keep pace within an industry, or allows for a change

in career direction. The program focuses on learning outcomes such as: critical thinking, problem solving, teamwork, ethics, numeracy, communication, and literacy.

#### An Accomplished Biologist


Don brought to BCIT an impressive academic background. He studied gray squirrels for his M.Sc. degree at Virginia Polytechnic Institute & State University and researched pocket mice for his Ph.D. at the University of British Columbia.

#### A Friend and Mentor

Don treated his students as equals with a respect uncommon in post-secondary education.

#### A Passionate Teacher

Don had a deep commitment to his students and to the FWR Program. He provided students with the leading-edge technology needed for modern



resource management, most recently, Global Positioning Systems (GPS) and Geographic Information Systems (GIS). Don was instrumental in establishing the Burnaby Lake System Project, a successful and well-publicized project that continues to provide field skills to students while enhancing natural values for people and wildlife in Burnaby.

#### The Don Gutherie Memorial Award

## What do Sea Island, BCIT and aviation have in common?

BCIT was born as an offshoot of the Vancouver Vocational Institute in 1956 when the overflow apprentice classes were housed on the grounds of the PNE. It was known as the Federal-Provincial Trades and Technical Institute, under the direction of the B.C. Department of Education.

In 1956, W.A.C. Bennett, then Premier of B.C., officially opened the new B.C. Vocational School in Burnaby. The Aircraft Maintenance course at the time was two year's, with only two dedicated instructors, and one intake of students annually. In 1967 the course was reduced to a one-year course. In May 1977 it was moved to the Sea Island Site, the original B.C. Airlines Hangar, in order to provide training in close proximity to the aviation industry.

On April 1, 1978, the British Columbia Vocational School became a Crown Corporation under the provisions of the Colleges and Provincial Institutes Act, and the Pacific Vocational Institutes Act, and the Pacific Vocational Institute came into existence.

In February 1979, the first aircraft sheet metal courses were commenced to meet industry requirements, and a modest expansion of the Sea Island training facility was implemented.

Brian R.D. Smith, then B.C. Minister of Education, commemorated the official opening of the Sea Island location on March 6, 1981. The Pacific Vocational Institute amalgamated with BCIT on April 1, 1986.

On January 31, 1987, BCIT purchased the hangar and administration complex from Pacific Western Airlines. The hangar was originally built by the airlines to house the Bristol Britannia. The complex was officially opened, on April 27, 1987, by then B.C. Premier, Bill Van der Zalm. The Aviation programs moved into the facility to commence instruction on July 13, 1987.

In September 1990, student intakes were increased to six per-year, or one every two months.

The Aircraft Maintenance, Avionics, Gas Turbines, Components and Structures technician courses now offered in support of students seeking careers in the aviation industry are a tribute to the instructors, staff, industry, and founding visionaries. A recent survey shows that well-over 80 per cent of those students who have graduated from the 30-year history of the programs offered are still employed in aviation.

## Venture program proves fruitful for grad

BCIT Venture program grad, Mark Whalen, recognized a trend toward organic food, he realized people were finding it difficult to locate inexpensive organic produce. Armed with a plan to provide organic produce home delivery, he began to research small business programs.

Whalen registered for BCIT's Venture program in the fall of 1996. "I had no previous business experience and I needed help putting together a business plan. BCIT's (program) was the most developed and reputable of the lot," said Whalen.

With no credit history, Whalen had to do some creative thinking to get Urban Organics off the ground. Brainstorming sessions with the rest of his class provided valuable ideas.

"It was during one of these group sessions that I figured out how to get my business started with no capital investment," said Whalen.

Whalen worked out a deal with the Lifeline Outreach Society that would allow him to operate out of a church in East Vancouver. In exchange for using their space and refrigerator, he donated \$1 from every box of produce sold and all leftover produce at the end of each week to the Outreach effort.

"The arrangement helped me get my business off the ground", said Whalen, and compared the experience to that of a rocket taking off.

Urban Organics delivers produce to residential and commercial locations. The business has expanded into a warehouse space in East Vancouver, but Whalen continues to deliver all leftovers to the Gladtidings Church at the end of each week.


