# **Important Financial** Aid info

Those planning to apply for BC Student Assistance for the 1990/91 year can now pick up application forms from the Financial Aid Reception in Student Services.

Students are encouraged to register for one of the BCSAP workshops offered at 12:30 p.m. three times each week to find out more about the BC Student Assistance Program and get tips on how to complete the application form properly. Details will be given on changes to the program for next year, including an increase in maximum assistance for a 9-month Technology program year to \$8,190 for students without dependents and \$12.285 for students dependents.

Students with outstanding student loans who are graduating this June are reminded that they should contact their bank/credit union to arrange a payment schedule. While payments and interest do not start until six months after a student finishes school, the payment arrangements should be made as soon as possible. Graduating students with student loans totalling over \$12,000 should also investigate the Loan Remission program to determine if any of their student loan debt can be cancelled.

The Financial Aid Reception in Student Services is located on the second floor of the 1A Building. Northwest corner. Hours 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Telephone: 432-8555.


A new theatre for west

narrative structure. Rarely, however, are these films conventional fare. "Student filmmakers are in a unique


