### S.A. wants vending revenue

Council Report by Delanne Reid

VP of Administration & Finance, Victoria Gray, told the executive at last week's meeting that she had left the BCIT Finance Committee meeting the week before with confidence after the auditor's budget was presented. "They were very impressed with the turnaround the S.A. has made," she said. Business Manager, Lorne Hildebrand, and S.A. president, Guy Steves attended the meeting as well.

A proposal was also put forward to the board for the SA to take over the vending contract on campus to generate more revenue.

"The way I saw it", said Steeves, "they're going to extend Versa's contract until July and then we can approach Versa Foods if we wish". Regardless of the outcome Steeves felt it was re-assuring to see Roy Murray going to bat for the S.A., even though he is leaving.

Steeves also attended a Socred breakfast, at which Advanced Education Minister Stan Hagan was

"He told me personally that there are good things in store for BCIT's future and that I should feel confident", he reported.

The Hospitality technology issue was discussed in detail and according to Steeves "it seemed hospitaity is going". He said a person from the hospitality industry actually stood up and threatened Hagan that various employers would go to the extent of boycotting hiring hospital-



ity grads from VVI. Steeves said this is unlikely to happen, the S.A. is concerned and would still like "high-tech" defined. "A route to go may be to approach Drug Svetic, who is the past VP of education and in charge of program changes", suggested Steeves. "He could give us his opinion on the

Cougars Soccer Team finished second in the province by losing only one game throughout the entire

The team travelled to Kamloops past weekend for the qualifying rounds to a spot in the nationals hosted by Malaspina College in Nanaimo.

The first game pitted the Cougars against Malaspina, a well disciplined team, who gave the Cougars a run for the money.

### Marine scientists detect PCB's in the Arctic seas

Marine scientists from department of Fisheries and Oceans are measuring quantities of manmade chemicals in the Artctic at Canada's most northerly research station - a floating ice island in the

By measuring the levels of industrial chemicals - such as chlorinated hydrocarbons, DDT and PCBs - in marine organizms, water, ice, sediments and air, the scientists will be able to determine how these chemicals move through the Arctic ecosystem. The measurements will also provide scientists with baseline data for future comparisons.

Dr. Barry Hargrave, project coordinator with the Department of Fisheries and Oceans at the Bedford

Institute of Oceanography in Dartmouth, Nova Scotia, says that the project is the first to measure levels of the man-made chemicals throughout all parts of the Arctic environment.

"We were surprised to find the chemicals so widely spread," says Hargrave. "They're still present just in trace amounts, in the parts per billion and trillion range, but even in organisms that live only one or two years, the chemicals can be measured in their fatty tissue."

Arctic marine organisms, such as the tiny invertebrate animals called amphipods, need large fat supplies to protect themselves from the cold. Chlorinated hydrocarbons and PCBs dissolve in fat, and are stored in the

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

Continued from page 1 fat in the animals' bodies

In the Arctic food chain, the chemicals increase at each level up the chain. Animals at the top of the food chain, such as polar bears, which eat animals lower on the chain, have very high levels of the chemicals in their fat.

The chemicals travel northward on global wind currents in what scientists are describing as a 'grasshopper' motion. They become more volatile (easily evaporated in warm weather and so diffuse into the air and are carried by the winds. They then settle down on earth again during winter.

The next summer they become airborne again, and travel further north. Once they arrive at the Arctic, the cold and lack of winds means they settle out of the air and stay there.

"The Arctic Ocean is very still," says Hargrave. "The stillness and cold mean that these pollutants stop there. The Arctic is becoming a sink (natural catch basin) for these long-lived, man-made chemicals."

Hargrave says many people think that because the use of PCBs and DDT has been prohibited in North America these compounds will disappear from the environment. But they are still being used in many other countries, and may still be accumulating in the Arctic, he adds.

New compounds appearing on the market to replace the banned ones are just as protentially damaging to the environment, says Hargrave. As an example, he mentions a new group of chemicals

The research station, which consists of a few plywood huts and a landing strip for aircraft, houses scientists from March till November. The station was established by the Polar Continental Shelf Project of the Department of Energy, Mines and Resources.

The Fisheries and Oceans scientists are working with Arctic Laboratories Ltd., a marine and environmental consulting company.

Funding for the \$354,000 project is provided by the Departments of Fisheries and Oceans, Indian and Northern Affairs, and Supply and Services Canada.

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### The Accused a sobering movie

I went to see "The Accused", expecting it to be an excellent film.

The movie starred Jodie Foster and Kelly McGillis. Vancouver's own Terry David Mulligan had a small part, playing a Detective, and BCTV's Pamela Martin appeared briefly as . . . what else . . . a report-The movie was filmed on location in Vancouver, so there were a lot of familiar sights, as well as

Jodie Foster gave the best performance I have ever seen her give. Her character is a young waitress who drinks, smokes, tokes, and likes to party. The character, Sarah, ends up being gang-raped in the local pub with a room full of spectators cheering on the attack. Kelly Mcgillis does a great job, which is somewhat overshadowed by Foster's performance, playing the prosecuting attorney who takes

The film eventually centers in on the spectators, who not only encouraged the rape, but were possibly responsible for it.

"The Accused" is highly emotional and believable. It brings home the horror of this kind of violent crime. The rape scene is so real and intense, that I honestly believed any woman watching it, could actually feel the terror and anguish Sarah went through.

"The Accused" openly takes rape-victim stereotypes to task. The victim, in the film, could be considered "loose". This leaves some people open to the question, "did she ask for it?". The film deals with this issue in a strong way. The answer is loud and clear: A victim's character should not be put on trial, and no woman "asks" or "deserves" to be raped or violated in any way.

I would recommend this film, particularily to any man or woman who has ever thought a rape-victim "asked for it" or put herself in a


