

# Staff Society to consider vote of non-confidence

Members of the Staff Society will be voting on a motion of non-confidence in the Ministry of Education, BCIT Board of Governors, BCIT Administration and others at their regular membership meeting today during the three hour break. According to a notice posted outside the Society office, members present at the emergency meeting last Wednesday were 'overwhelmingly in favour' of meeting again this week to discuss their response to the 'emergency' at BCIT. the motion presented at our February 13 meeting which expresses lack of confidence variety of significant s within and without

Staff Society President Greg Layton confirmed the nature of the motion, but said that because it was on the table, it had 'no public status' and he could not release the exact wording. Layton said todays meeting will allow for continued discussions about the 'issues facing us...the priorities as revealed by Gordon Thom,'

Layton said he expects the membership to direct the executive (of the Staff Society) to 'respond in certain ways.'

Two members of the Staff Two members of the Staff Society have already submitted their ideas about direction in the form of motions to be presented at the meeting today. A 'notice of motion' attached to the notice of meeting listed four motions to be considered in motions to be considered in addition to the confidence vote.

Motion 1 calls for the Staff Society to officially express its opposition to the 85-86 proposed budget and asks that positive alternatives be formulated. Motion two calls on members of the Staff Society to contribute to a preliminary brief for submission to the Board this Friday, to be followed by a 'complete' brief for presentation at the Board's March meeting. Bill Sheriff, an Operations Management instructor, contends that the 'educational line' deserves the highest priority in the allocation of limited funds, but that the administrations proposed budget does not reflect that priority.

Two others motions, moved by instructor Mark Angelo, suggest that the Staff Society urge the Ministry of Education to 'review, and subsequently enhance, BCIT's provincial grant for the coming fiscal year.' Angelo cites the greater reductions BCIT has been subject to, despite the capital intensive nature of the intensive nature of the Institute. Angelo also asks the Staff Society to submit a brief to the Ministry of Education dealing with the effects of formula funding at BCIT.

Two weeks ago 89 members of the Staff Society, which represents faculty and technical staff, received layoff notices in conjunction with announcements. cutback

Representatives, including students, faculty, department heads, advisory committee members and industry people, and counselling personell all have about ten minutes each to convince the minutes each to convince the Board to retain their Board to retain their technology or service area. Some will be asking the Board to retain the whole

plans to adjourn for lunch and return for normal Board business later in the afternoon. Both sessions are open sessions, with at least the morning session to be held in the Staff Dining Room at the Food Training Centre.

Among the groups making presentations will be the Student Association. Donald Rippon, S.A. President, said he will be presenting an alternative 'priority list' that places all educational places all educational programs above administrative costs. 'We're calling it 'Excellence Achieved" said Rippon, who added that BCIT has the reputation, but that 'we have to work at maintaining it.'

# **Tech reps discuss** possible protest action

Fifteen tech reps turned out last Friday to discuss BCIT cutbacks and possible protest action. Suggestions ranged from writing letters to placing ads in local papers and organizing rallies, although the consensus was that BCIT students should

avoid joining marches and rallies organized by other student groups. If we're just a faction, we won't have the impact that we would as an individual institute,' S.A. V.P Paul Fenney told the Paul Fenney told the gathering.

**Options announced** for management

BCIT President Gordon Thom has announced more budget cuts designed to meet the shrinking provincial grant. But this time, neither students nor teaching staff are the targets.

Thom is calling on BCIT's department heads and managers Thom is calling on BCIT's department heads and managers to take a 10 per cent cut in salaries directly, or through a series of benefit reductions. Thom says the goal of 10 per cent cuts in administrative costs has not been met which means either people or salaries will have to go. A 10 per cent reduction of administrative costs amounts to \$471,000. Thom said eight positions already cut will save \$359,000, which leaves a further \$112,000 to be made up. Thom is looking to management to do just that

Thom asked for direction as to just how management would achieve the \$112,000 goal and offered these ten proposals.

1. Reduce one week of vacation - 2 per cent of salary; 2. Increased workload to minimum of 40 hours/week from present Increased workload to minimum of 40 hours/week from present 35 hours/week; 3. Department Heads and other managers (as appropriate) scheduled for evening coverage within 40 hour week; 4. Suspend the merit pool for one to two years - 5 per cent, bonuses taken out of overall administration expenditure; 5. Suspend choice benefits one to two years - 2.5 per cent, option to buy back 8 per cent of vacation; 6. Change choice benefits payment date deferred - 2.5 per cent; 7. One week off without pay - 2 per cent, optional or general; 8. Contribution through pledges to 20th Anniversary Fund. Voluntary and in excess of the 10 per cent; 9. Reduce salaries by 'X' per cent until April 86; 10. Assume cost of benefits.

Thom was non-commital when asked what cuts are favoured by management or when cuts would take effect, but did say a statement would be made in the near future. Thom made the announcement following a closed meeting of management at BCIT Monday night.

S.A. President Donald Rippon was optimistic that something could be done. He suggested that students consider the Board of Governors and the Administration separately. Administration separately.
The Board members are volunteers from business...they won! business...they won't necessarily endorse the administration priority list.' Rippon said the S.A. will be submitting its own list of priorities to the Board that puts programs ahead of administration.



# S.A. Election hype starts

today's published official notice that nominations are being accepted for the Student upcoming Association election. On April 2, 3 and 4, members of the Student Association will have an opportunity to elect eight students to serve on the 85-86 executive.

The most significant item about the notice is, in fact, that is has been served well in advance of the election, and organizers have promised a veritable deluge of information about the election, getting nominated and specifics on each position for next week's Link.

Second year students will recall that last years election, although it attracted a reasonable number of voters, barely had enough candidates to fill all the positions. Many positions, too many, went uncontested, as has been the trend for several years. The S.A. of past years has not made the running of elections a very high priority. Last spring several candidates promised to get students involved and to make sure more students ran for election the following year.

Considering that an organized, responsible and coherent executive has far more power than any other group on campus (unlike staff, faculty or the administration, students are seen to have 'pure' intent) it is important that eight students elected truly represent the student body as a whole. This can happen only if two or more individuals are running for each position, and candidates are forced to consider the issues and clarify goals before election day.

Hats off to Paul Fenney, VP Administration and Bruce Dewar, S.A. marketing/researcher, for coming through on this executive's promise and getting the election ball rolling.

To the rest of you, do consider running for office. The acheivements of the BCIT Student Association and its operations and services are held in high regard by student groups across Canada, and the rewards participation are many.

The duties of a security officer are limited. The officer is meerly the eyes and ears of the contract employer. In our


year old car...) Security is a personal responsibility when it comes to our own property. We are not here to be babysat




# Dog day

No matter that group or company is hired for the job of building security the rules are the same, the tasks are the same. Building checks, perimeter checks, parking lot checks - the list is tedious and everything requires a written report. Students complain of paperwork. Believe me,

students complain of paperwork. Believe me, student paperwork is easy. I've seen little respect for the Legionnaires who direct traffic on a cold wet school morning. Remember, security officers can do no more than observe and report and observe and report and mediate. If there is a lighting mediate. If there is a lighting problem, fire problem, smoke or breaking and entering all they can do is report the incident to the proper department. This is the law! Depending upon the incident, as in a fire, they are called upon to use their best judgement to prevent or deter damage to company property.

judgement to prevent or deter damage to company property. In the two instances reported in The Link of February 13th, there isn't much any security firm could have done except file a report. I know this because my car was broken into in the BCIT parking lot. But I've learned my lesson and now I park close to the school and under a street lamp. As I work late, at least the light and close proximity of the school deter thieves (why anyone eter thieves (why anyone ants to break into an ugly 17

shouldn't take anything fro granted - like living in a policed state. The law allows us to police ourselves within legal limits as mature adults. Be thankful that our police and security aren't a gun-toting goon squad screaming 'aihatohla!'

We've git the best security team at BCIT that work within the confines of the law. They are experienced, intelligent are experienced, intelligent, mature and conscientious and their job is done with dignity. Their job can be done better, but not by replacing them. Instead, work with them. Security is a team effort. They deserve a lot more respoect for a job well done than what the students and staff of BCIT display.

# Board has to listen to S.A.

On February 22, the Board of Governors of BCIT is going to hold a meeting so the different factions of the BCIT community can state their cases. The Administration cases. The Administration will present their proposals of layoffs and budget cuts. The Staff Society can present their case stating their dismay. their case stating their dismay at the Administration's lack of leadership when dealing with Victoria and the issue of Administrative salary rollbacks. To which the Administration would retort, the Staff Society is presented. Administration would retort, the Staff Society is overpaid for the work they do. The Staff Society would say, we are not, and the rhetorical arguments would continue, leaving the Board of Governors in limbo, with no direction to go but to follow the Administration proposals.

S.A. President Donald Rippon and Myself have met with the chairman of the

with the chairman of the Board, Malcolm Wickson, and I have the clear impression that Mr. Wickson and the that Mr. Wickson and the Board are genuinely concerned with the problems BCIT is facing. He is not an administration puppets, nor is he a figurehead Victoria appointed to the Board. Mr. Wickson has visited Victoria on numerous occasions lobbying the Ministry of Education on BCIT's behalf.

He has made progress with the ministry, as we have just received \$300,000 for 84/85's computer leasing cost. It is a fact, that if pressure is put on the Social Credit government, The Student Association executive has been quietly making their intentions known to both the Staff Society and Institute Administration. Both parties realize that restraint is a fact. If there is no money in the pot then something must suffer

Mr. Rippon and I presented our compromise proposal to Mr. Wickson and he was very supportive of the idea. He stated that if we could persuade the administration and Staff Society to give concessions, and to ensure students would give concessions as well, the funding shortfall could be overcome. If the internal factions of BCIT could become a unit, we could show Victoria that BCIT's innovative, productive, and a serious political force that needs to be reckoned with.

Unfortunately, due to the squabbling between the Staff Society and the Administration over the last nickels left in the pot, our educational quality is going to suffer. Both Staff (to protect their 90 laid off members) and the administration (to gain the students, Ministry of Education, and Staff Society's respect back and to Education, and Staff Society's respect back and to protect their credibility) must

listen to and adhere to the Student Association proposal.

proposar.

The S.A. will be at the Board meeting to stop the squabbling and petty noliticing between the staff. We petty politicing between the administration and staff. We will put forward our proposal to the board, and they will listen. The Board has the last say in the budgetary process.
They can veto administration
recommendations, staff
recommendations and the S.A.'s as well, so we will be prepared, and will give them a strong, realistic proposal that

their chairman supports.

Once the 85/86 financial crisis is averted we can once again deal with Victoria. It is time to get BCIT's Alumni involved (there are 25,000 of them). There are mailing lists of Alumni being compiled via the Development Group. If half of them would write to their MLA's then the Social Credit Caucus would take note, as BCIT Alumni are in the group of voters that usually vote Socred. Also,

every technolgy in BCIT has Advisory Committees that have professional people sitting on them. They could draft letters and send them to Victoria. Industry and employers hold BCIT in high regard. If the message that regard. If the message that BCIT is in trouble went out to industry, I am sure the employers would express concern with Victoria as well.

Also, there is a newly elected Federal Government in Ottawa. If the provincial government is going to government is going to persue the unrealistic path of universal funding to all colleges and institutes in the province, then perhaps we should look to the Feds for should look to the Feds for some realistic funding policy. If senior level administration is on the ball, they would have already knocked on Ottawa's door (I wonder if they have done anything like that?) When the Conservatives were elected they said 'For economic recovery in Canada we need skilled, professional people to be trained in this country. Therefore, we are committed to improving the state of technological education in Canada.' The S.A. has been in contact with the Federal Government and they have indicated they are going to undertake programs that will help B.C. back onto the road of economic recovery. This includes post-

secondary education.

85-86 is a crucial year in the brief history of BCIT. If current trends continue (ie. program cuts, student services reductions, reduced intakes) BCIT will not survive. intakes) BCIT will not survive.
The future Student
Association must take the Association must take the initiative, and show leadership in keeping BCIT's current level of education where it is at. However, the S.A. must also have some continuity. It takes the S.A. executive 4 months to get the feel for the positions they are in, another 4 months to meet the key expende (ie Minister of the key people (ie. Minister of Education, Adminsitration, Staff, Press, etc) which leaves Staff, Press, etc) which leaves only 4 months to do the work necessary to ensure quality at BCIT. I have met these people, and have seen first hand the workings of the Ministry, Institute Administration, Staff Society, S.A. Businesses and other Administration, Staff Society, S.A. Businesses and other student organizations. With upcoming Student Association elections, I am hereby announcing my candidacy for Student Association president for 85/86. 85/86 is a vital year for BCIT and the student body needs strong leadership and continuity in dealing with the various players that effect various players that effect BCIT and the diplomas of BCIT's graduates.

2. Read this form over carefully before attempting to complete it. This will help you avoid entering information in the wrong section.

3. Under the work experience section of the application, do not put 'student'. Begin with your most recent job and continue to list them in reverse order.

Most forms request a. Most forms request narrative comments on your extra-curricular activities, the type of work you desire and any additional information relevant to the field of work for which you are applying.
Remember to keep it simple and to the point. Now is not the time to write your autobiography.





# **American Buffalo**

Review by Ray Smith -Chicago Playwright David amet's AMERICAN Chicago Playwright David Mamet's AMERICAN BUFFALO is three men in a junk shop. Three men speaking the language as it is spoken, surrounded by the cast-off, the worn-out, the forgotten. The detritus of American Capitalism. Donny, Bobby and Tecah variously plot, scam, rage, wheedle, jive, connive and blunder their way through the day. Playwright Mamet's great strength is his ability to hear the language of the bug-eyed, bottom-combing fish of American entrepreneurship and reproduce it in all its wild and mangled beauty.

and reproduce it in all its wild and mangled beauty. City Satge Artsitic Director Ray Michal's production of American Buffalo is authentic: a dynamic play given a solid treatment by three hard-working

Vancouver actors. It has muscle and bone. I saw it at the first preview, half a week before it opened, just as the pieces were beginning to fall into place. It was a rewarding experience.

Stephen E. Miller, as Donny the owner of the junk shoo.

Stephen E. Miller, as Donny the owner of the junk shop, establishes himself immediately as a garbage-heap patriarch, presiding over the shattered remains of Ronald Reagon's America. Home, family, neighbour-hood; these exist for Donny, these values, but they are junk. Junk? Junk is 'herion. Junk is what's left over when someone dies in one room somewhere and the landlord sells his stuff. Junk is what sells his stuff. Junk is what gets forgotten when the ones who make it move to the suburbs. Guys like Donny stay behind to take care of things.

Donny takes care of his brother Bobby, who is trying to shake a junk habit of his own. Donny enlists Bobby in a scheme to rob the own. Donny enlists Bobby in a scheme to rob the apartment of a man who recently bought and ancient nickle from one of the piles of junk in the shop. For Bobby, even crime is a form of rehabilitation. Bobby's excrutiating weakness is sensitively delineated by Todd Duckworth He shuffles. sensitively delineated by Todd Duckworth. He shuffles, mumbles and meanders with a strangly dignified idiocy. He's the absolute, wrung-out worst of us, but Duckworth save to swim another day it's going to be him. Don't miss it.

The third character, Teach, splits the brothers like a wedge, inexorably prying his way toward a piece of the action. The moment Dwight MicFee's Teach steps into the junk shop, you know that Bobby is his natural enemy. Once he learns of the impending robbery, he works Donny with every cheap trick of gutter rhetoric, convincing him that his little brother Bobby is unreliable and has to be jettisoned, finally usurping Bobby's place in the robbery scheme. McFee rolls along with a gut-bucket bravado that nicely underlines Teach's empty bewilderment and rage. He jimmies open the Donny/Bobby familiy because even this junked-out even this junked-out
American parody of family



### Capsule to be buried




casing. Students casing.

# Wrong cuts made in BCIT budget?

Just five months ago Premier Bill Bennett said the province "is counting on the skills" of B.C. Institute of Technology graduates "to lead us out of the recession into recov-

Now the government plans to implement Bennett's vision by cutting 10.7 per cent out of BCIT's grant for the year starting April 1. That would mean a 28.2-per-cent cut — not counting inflation — over three years durcounting inflation — over three years dur-ing which enrolment has climbed.

It's hard to reconcile that with Bennett's praise of BCIT. BCIT's administration has praise of DCII. DCII's administration mas told staff the latest cut would mean 135 fewer full-time jobs. Without more funds it suggests it will stop first-year enrolments in several business and technology programs. And scrap the central student counselling

service.
Yet while BCIT is supposed to absorb huge cuts, other post-secondary colleges and institutes have been told their cut will be five per cent? Is BCIT being singled out for special cuts? We find that hard to accord since its possible to the special cuts.

cept, given its popularity among employers.
Funding for the colleges and institutes is based on estimated cost per student for specific programs, no matter where they're taught. That is basically fair. When taxpayer funds are so scarce, Institution A should not get more than Institution B for doing the same work.

Clearly, there is some political pressure on BCIT, as an institute of technology, to opt out of some business programs which, the government says, other colleges already teach at less cost.

Many students and staff at BCIT are very angry over the size of the cuts. They raise a vital issue that must be addressed if BCIT is to retain the reputation it has earned.

Why, asks student society president Don-ald Rippon, are BCIT's administrative costs 50 per cent higher than in comparable insti-tutions? Staff society president Gregory Layton said the administration is not re-sponding to restraint "by example" when dealing with itself. He calls for "change at the top."

BCIT's academic leadership says that even with the projected cuts, BCIT should maintain quality.

The funding problems at BCIT had better soon be resolved if damage to the instution is to be minimized.


