# Basketball update

## Women's

This weekend was a very important one for our women's basketball team, because if they didn't win at least one game they would have lost their chance to go to the playoffs.

However, in a very exciting game BCIT managed to nip by Capilano 48 - 44 Friday night.

"They played extremely well, both on offense and defense", said coach Tyrone Walls, "and took their time to set up the plays properly, and take the good shots."

Top scorers were Heather Murdock with 12 pts and Lorraine Mosher with 11 pts.

On Saturday the ladies played VCC and lost 45 - 43. The game was extremely close and for the most part, well played. However the Cougars didn't take control of the game when they had to, and due to a couple of sloppy plays in the final few minutes allowed VCC to come from behind and take the lead.

Lorraine Mosher and Sue

Trautman were the top scorers of the game.

Looking ahead the women travel up to Kamloops on Friday to play in the play-offs. Their first game being against the #1 Caribou team.

Friday night proved to be a good night for the men also, as they downed Capilano 69 - 65, after they suffered a defeat by Capilano last Sunday.

The game was quite exciting, seeing the Cougars behind Capilano in the first half. However they kept their composure and slowly chipped away at Capilano's lead, and ultimately controlled the game for the last 10 minutes.

Gregg Turkington was the top scorer with 24 pts and Dave Hubbard had 10 pts. Tom Raine was top rebounder with 9 while Dave Hubbard had 6.

Saturday the Cougars blew their chance to defeat the #1 ranked team in Canada, VCC. They played quite well and were

in the lead at the end of the half, but come the second half, were blown out of the gym, finally losing 87 - 64.

Top scorers on Saturday were Gregg Turkington with 14 pts and Brent Kokosha with 12 pts. Tom Raine and Dave Hubbard were once again top rebounders with 10 apiece.

The Cougars placed 2nd in the league, and are suited up against Capilano next week in the playoffs. If they win they will be guaranteed a silver medal in the conference, and would probably travel to Calgary for the 4-West Championships.

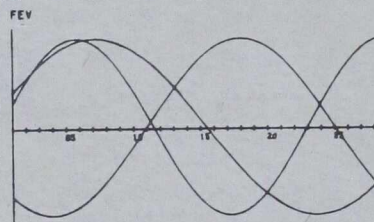
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## CAMPUS RECREATION

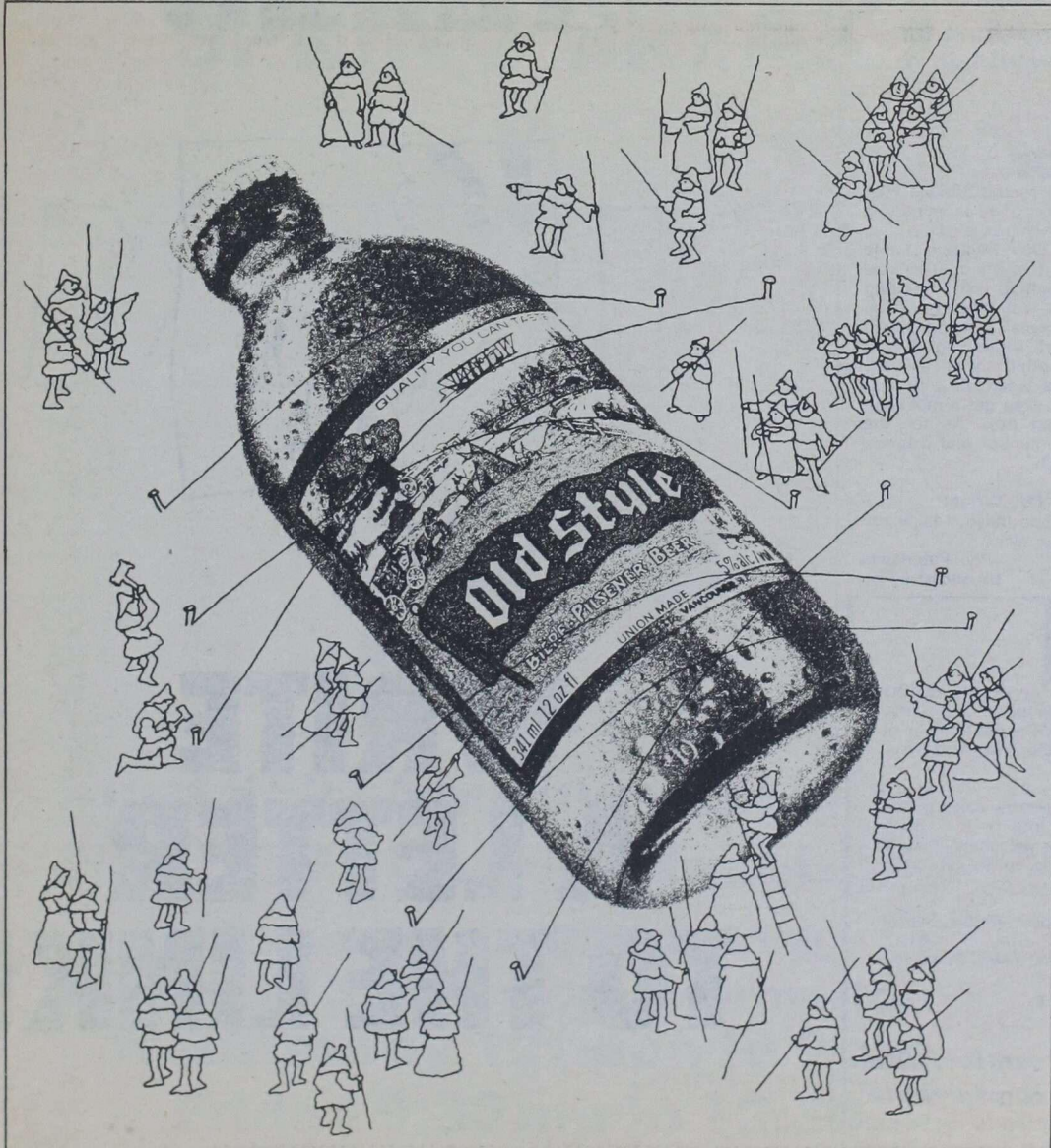

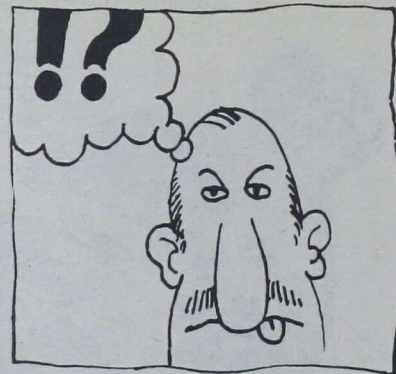

On Friday night it was the second coming of DOA. Yeehaah, they're back. Joey and the gang are just as rude, and just as wreckless as they

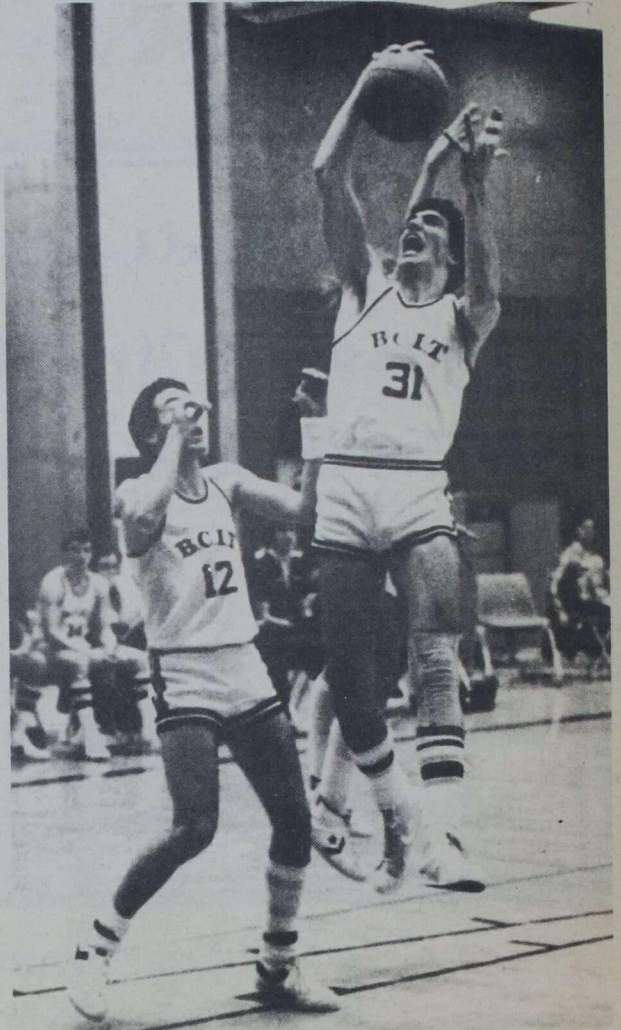

## Treat yourself

If someone asked me to suggest a live theater in Vancouver, that put on plays which deal with current topics or subjects that most people could relate to, I would have to suggest the CITY STAGE.

The City Stage has gained the reputation of running plays that usually shock, infuriate, awaken or just stir up its audiences. Sexual Perversity in Chicago and Streamers are a couple of plays that come to mind, which have had this kind of effect on their audiences. The latter dealing with racism and homosexuality in the army, the former with the disco scene and the morals and norms that surround it.

City Stage's new play 'Treats' written by Christopher Hampton and directed by Ray Michal is no exception.

Treats is a play that takes a light hearted look at some of the problems in common relationships today. The play revolves around a woman (Anne) who is involved with two men, or two men involved with a woman (depending on what point of view you take), and the problems which arise when she has to choose between the two.

The entire play takes place in the tastefully decorated living room of Anne's apartment in London. Treats opens up with Anne and her present boyfriend Patrick relaxing on the sofa

when in walks Dave, her old boyfriend! Imagine their surprise when confronted by a rather obnoxious, loud old boyfriend who is quite a character. Dave, a journalist, is the man with whom Anne had been living with for the past two years. Patrick who works in the same office as Anne, is the man currently living with her.

The storyline of Treats is quite simple but it is the acting that makes the play. Brenda Robins, who plays the part of Anne, a young woman who falls in love with the wrong man and suffers for it is quite convincing. The audience's reaction towards her was that of sadness and anger because of the situation she has put herself in.

The main action of the play however centers around the two men and their completely different characters. Dave, a harsh, insensitive, dishonest, cruel man, who dislikes women, (called a JERK by some women sitting in front of me) and Patrick, a soft spoken, lovable, over-sensitive, nice guy.

Allen Gray, who plays the role of Dave, was quite creditable but at times his acting seemed a little overdone.

Craig Holte Davidson's performance as Patrick was excellent. By the end of the show

everyone in the audience felt sorry for him and one couldn't help loving him. As usual City Stage managed to put on a play that raised some eyebrows, especially when Anne undressed to her underwear in the 2nd act. If by this time you weren't yet involved in the play, after that you sure were!!

Treats wasn't great, but it was enjoyable, it was light, funny, sad and even mad-dening. Though a little slow at first, the play picks up quite a bit as it progresses.

## Pie-eyed potatoe omelette

This recipe puts something egg-stra behind drab, dull, boring, everyday omelettes. It is just the breakfast to serve a few leftover partiers who find themselves stranded after a Friday night party, that due to circumstances out of control, developed into a Saturday morning breakfast binge. So grab a box of beer, and find a party, because the mornings arrive early around here.

Serves: 6 early mourners  
2 tablespoons olive oil

3 small potatoes sliced

minutes, or until the potatoes are crispy and lightly browned.

3. Add the egg/beer mixture, chives, pepper and cook until the underside is firm, then flip (watch the ceiling) and cook the other side for about 2 minutes.  
4. Having scraped the omelette off the roof of your kitchen, you should now have a hearty meal capable of nursing those weary partiers back to life.

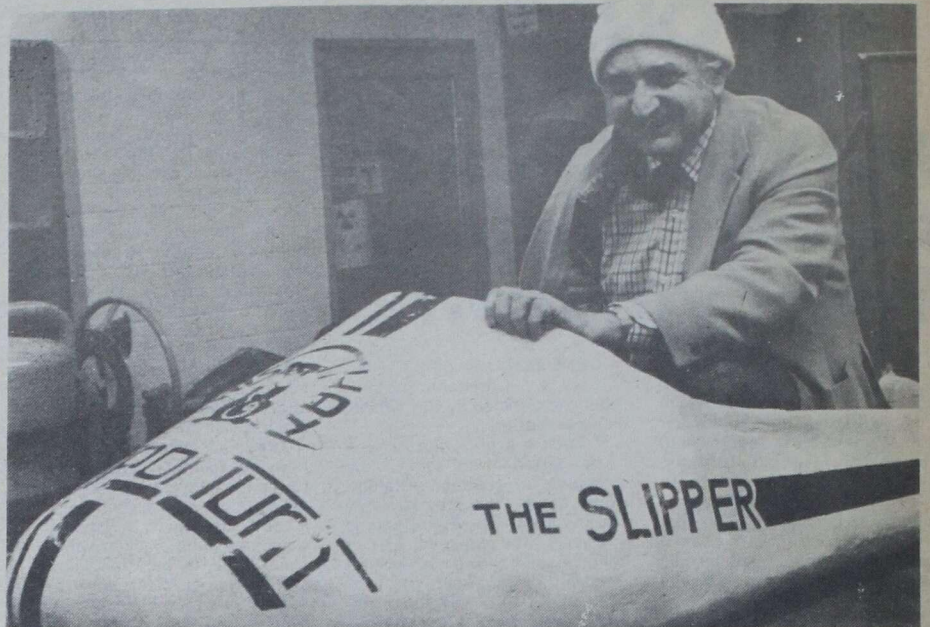

Part three: Terrarium Main-  
ance.

Several aspects to consider when you've got your terrarium established:

1. **WATERING** - it's unlikely that you will ever have to water your terrarium if it is completely sealed from the air. (eg. keep the lid to the wine bottle). Terrariums that are exposed to the air, like brandy snifters, will require watering. This type of open terrarium needs watering less frequently than plants in

regular plant pots, however.

2. **FERTILIZING** - be careful how often you fertilize; you don't want to end up with an overgrown jungle in your terrarium three weeks after you planted it. For lower maintenance, you want as slow of growth as possible.

3. **LIGHTING** - the intensity of light that your terrarium requires depends upon the plants you have chosen. With an exception of cacti, remember that a terrarium must **never** be

kept in **full sun**. Direct sunlight, through the glass, becomes such intense heat that your plants will broil to death. Avoid planting plants that require bright light in dark-coloured bottles, as well.

4. **PRUNING** - yes, eventually you will have to prune; either that, or remove overgrown plants entirely. The problem faced by many terrarium owners is the narrowness of the bottle that they have shoved their plants into. The solution can be simple: attach a razor blade to a long narrow stick with masking tape; use this like a long-handled saw. Be patient during this operation, it takes a while to get the hang of it. (Don't try to rush it, or you will end up with a hacked-up looking terrarium.) To remove the debris, use two long, narrow sticks like a pair of chopsticks.
