COUNCIL BRIEFS

Student Executives To Be Elected In April

The constitution changes necessary to move the executive elections from February to April were passed by the Students Council. In short, last year's council thought it would be wise to move the elections forward to February in order to allow the incoming executive to familiarize themselves with the procedures and personnel involved with the council. However, this year's council found many flaws in this approach and thus recommended the date be moved back.

Brian Gillespie visited the Student Council and put forward for discussion two problems. First, he asked the council to consider whether the present three hour break is meeting the needs of the students, and second, he asked for feedback on the possible use of the gymnasium for exams. Both suggestions met with mixed reaction from council, which will report back sometime after Christmas.

A motion was passed that will allow students to sign over 10 or 20 dollars of their caution account to the annual Variety Club Telethon in April. More on this will follow.

HOUSING CORNER

By Sally de la Rue Browne Rent Increase Regulations

If your accommodation is covered by the Landlord and Tenant Act, it is also covered by rent increase regulations. (These regulations are actually part of the Landlord and Tenant Act, but they are dealt with by a separate office, the Rent Review Commission).

In all cases, a tenant must receive three months' written notice of a proposed rent increase. (This should be given on a

special form obtainable from the Rent Review Commission, although use of such a form is not compulsory). Furthermore, a rent cannot be raised until twelve months have passed since the last increase, regardless of landlord or tenant.

A rent increase may not exceed 10.6 per cent of the present rate. (Note that this limit will shortly be lowered to 7 per cent). However, the following situations are exempt from the 10.6 per cent limit: -premises located in a building where there are only two suites and the landlord lives in one; -if the rent is more than \$500 per month; -if the landlord has entered into a five-year agreement with the Rent Review Commission; -premises first occupied on or after January 1, 1974; -other situations, as listed in section 29G of the Landlord and Tenant Act.

No tenant need pay an illegal rent increase. A tenant cannot be evicted for refusing to pay an illegal increase. Furthermore, a tenant who has paid excessive rent may make deductions from future rent payments to offset the excess, or he/she may recover the whole sum through Small Claims Court proceedings.

If the landlord has made renovations to the premises, he or she may raise the rent a further percentage. (For details, contact the Rent Review Commission at 668-2356, or the Off-Campus Housing Office). A tenant has one month to dispute this 'renovation rent increase' to the Rent Review Commission.

A 'hidden rent increase' (that occurs when a tenant is suddenly charged for a service that was previously free or at a lesser charge), is generally void and unenforceable.

Extra rent may be charged for an additional 'permanent occupant' who moves in, only if this was agreed upon in the original tenancy agreement between the landlord and tenant. The Rent Review Commission has the power to determine who is a 'permanent occupant'.

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


E. Murphy's Law

Food for thought

Last week, I had the distinct pleasure of attending the Vancouver Playhouse Theatre production of Georges Feydeau's classic French bedroom farce, "A Flea In Her Ear".

Anyone who may be of the opinion that such lighthearted fare is passe in today's world of turmoil, need only see this production to begin thinking differently. If farce is, as Aldous Huxley has said, "tragedy that happens to outsiders, then this play is terribly tragic.

The plot is so complex, that it often becomes hard to follow, until the second act when everything comes to a head. The main characters are Victor Emmanuel Chandebise, and his wife Raymond, played respectively by Heath Lamberts and Pat Galloway. Raymond attempts to catch her husband cheating is the basis of the plot. The complications which her scheme causes involve every cast member, and the uproarious race of fleeing husbands, wives and lovers between bedrooms in the notorious Hotel Coq d'Or ensues. The added complication of a hall porter who is identical in looks to Chandebise adds to the confusion, which in turn adds to the hilarity. Heath Lamberts exerts an immense amount of energy, and a true comic sense into both rolls, yet Christopher Newton, as the nephew with a speech impediment manages to rightfully steal many of the shows high points. Of the fourteen cast members, not one gives a performance that is less than well executed.

The action is fast paced, as it should be, but the one drawback of this show is that it is a bit too fast paced. Director Derek Goldby no doubt realizes that the play must really move in order for it to work. But, perhaps while becoming accustomed to the script himself, he has forgotten that for the audience the plot remains complex. The pace never lets up throughout the entire play, and at moments, it is just too much. Some of the dialogue seems to just fly right by, and I found myself losing track of the complex situations more than once.

However, just as the action never lets up, neither does the humor. Rarely does an audience laugh from beginning to end of a play, yet for this production they do, despite moments of confusion. And rightfully so. Several of the characters are funny in themselves, but mostly they are everyday type serious people. Seeing them in the ridiculous predicaments this play puts them in is an example of farce at its very best.

"A Flea in Her Ear" is playing through December 23rd at the Q.E. Playhouse. Performances are at 8:00 pm Monday through Friday, with Saturday matinees at 4:30, and a 9:00 curtain Saturday nights.

Egg Sandwich:
Chop or mash hard cooked eggs. Season with salt and pepper. Moisten with salad dressing. Add any of the following: chopped onion, pickles, ham or left over meat. Use as a filling between two slices of buttered whole grain bread. (Margarine is as nutritious as butter).

Cabbage and Carrot salad
Shred cabbage thinly (desired amount). Grate carrots (desired amount). Moisten with mayonnaise or salad dressing. Season with salt and pepper.

Chili:
Yield: - 6 servings
1 pound of ground beef
1 medium onion
1 clove garlic
2-14 oz. can of kidney beans
1-20 oz. can tomatoes
1 teaspoon salt
pepper
1 teaspoon chili powder
Brown meat, onion and garlic until meat loses its red color. Drain off fat. Remove garlic. Add beans, tomatoes and seasonings. Bake about 30 minutes in casserole, covered, in oven at 350 or simmer on top of stove until thickened.

If you are **overweight**, eat smaller quantities. Use skim milk instead of whole or chocolate milk. Eliminate cookies, sugar and granola bar.

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

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
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
